

- Pale pink tapa; any faded color. **3.** A variety of sugar cane named for the fish, either a deep-red mutant of 'āwela or related to it; internodes barrel-shaped, leaves purple. (HP 221, 224.)
- alā.iki.** nvt. Appropriation of property by force, as practiced by some chiefs on their travels; to do so.
- a laila.** See *laila*.
- ā.laina** n. Obstacle, obstruction.
- Ā.laka.** n. Alaska. *Eng.*
- ala kai.** Sea course, path where one must swim past a projecting cliff.
- ala.ka'i.** nvt. To lead, guide, direct; leader, guide, conductor, head, director (a putative PCP *ala*, to lead [cf. Maori *arahi*] + *-ka'i*, transitivizer: Gram. 6.6.4). *Alaka'i hīmeni*, *alaka'i mele*, song leader. *Alaka'i hula*, hula leader. *Alaka'i ho'opaipai*, cheerleader. *Alaka'i pāna*, band leader. *Kī alaka'i*, tonic, keynote. *Kumu alaka'i*, leading teacher; exemplary teacher, pattern, or example. (PPN *alataki*.)
- 'ala.kai.** vs. Potbellied, bloated.
- ala.ka'ina.** n. Leadership, guidance.
- ala kā.pae.** n. Detour.
- 'ala.kapaika.** n. Allspice. (Neal 634-5.) *Eng.*
- 'ala.kē.** vi. To jump, hurry from place to place.
- Ala-kea.** n. **1.** Name of a star, probably used in navigation. **2.** Name of a downtown Honolulu street. *Lit.*, white road.
- 'ala.kenika, arasenika.** n. Arsenic. *Eng.*
- ala.kō.** **1.** vt. To drag, pull along. **2.** n. Bird-catching pole. Also *'auku'u*.
- 'ala.kuma.** n. A large crab (*Carpilius maculatus*), with 11 dark red spots on its back, usually found concealed in rocks or under stones.
- ala.ku'u.ku'u.** n. Place for climbing a cliff, usually with ropes.
- alala.** Var. spelling of *-alaala*.
- ā.lā.lā.** n. Sweet potatoes that bear from branch (*lālā*) vines.
- 'ala.lā.** **1.** nvi. To bawl, bleat, squeal, cry, caw, yelp, wail, scream; such noises. *Hele ka makuahine, 'alalā keiki i kauhale*, when the mother goes, children bawl at home [a neglectful mother]. **hō.ala.lā.** Caus/sim. *He aha lā kāu i hō'alalā mai nei i kēlā keiki?* Why did you make that child cry? **2.** n. Hawaiian crow (*Corvus tropicalis*), named for its caw; endangered. *He 'alalā, he manu leo nui*, a crow, a bird with much talk [a talkative person]. **3.** nvt. A style of chanting with open mouth, vibration and tremor of the voice, and prolonged vowels; to chant thus. **4.** vt. To gargle. *Rare*.
- ala.lai.** Redup. of *alai*. *Ua alalai mai 'oia i ko'u hele 'ana*, he obstructed my going.
- 'ala.lala.** vt. To dry or wither leaves over a fire, as of tobacco. Also *lala 2*, *'ōlala*, *'ōlani*.
- 'ala.lāna.** n. Bleating, wailing. See *'alalā 1*.
- 'ala.lau.ā, 'alalauwā.** n. Young of the red 'āweoweo fish. Appearance of schools of this fish near shore was an omen that royalty would die. Also *'alauwā*.
- 'ala.lehe.** nvs. Sickly, weak, fretful, as a child; fretfulness. *He ukuhi 'ōhemo nā keiki, 'ōmino 'alalehe, ka 'alalehe, ka uwē wale*, weaning children are sickly, crying and fretful, weak, just crying.
- 'ala.ii.** nvi. Sharp shrill yelp, sudden screech; to yelp, screech.
- ala.loa.** n. Highway, main road, belt road around an island, a long road.
- 'alama, arama.** n. Protection, defense. (*Eng. arms.*)
- ala maika.** n. Bowling alley.
- 'ala.mea.** **1.** vs. Ripe. **2.** vs. Precious, as a child. **3.** n. A bird (no data). **4.** See *iki 'alamea*.
- 'alā mea.** n. Hard volcanic stone, used for adzes.
- 'ala.mihi.** n. A common black crab (*Metopograpsus thukuhar*). Also *'elemihi*, *'elepī*. *'Alamihi 'ai kupapa'u*, corpse-eating black crab [a scavenger]. (PPN *kalamisi*.)
- ala.mimo.** vs. Quick, fast. *Nā kapua'i alamimo o nā kini maka lehua o nā 'ōpio*, nimble soles [dancing feet] of the many *lehua* blossoms of youth.
- 'ala.mo'o.** n. An endemic fresh-water 'o'opu fish (*Leptipes concolor*). *Hilo*. Also *hi'u 'ula* and *hi'u kole*.
- ala muku.** n. Cut off or unfinished road, dead-end road. *Fig.*, an incomplete rainbow, rainbow fragment.
- alana.** nvi. Awakening, rising. See *ala 2, 3*. *'Ike 'ia ke alana o ka pua*, the upward flight of the arrow was seen. *Alana 'ia* (Kel. 29)! Rise up!
- 'alā.na.** See *kīkē 'alāna*.
- 'ā.lana.** **1.** nvt. Offering, especially a free-will offering, contrasting with a *mōhai* that was prescribed by a priest; to offer. *He 'alana ka mea e hā'awi aku ai e kala 'ia mai ai ka hala o ka mea lawehala*, an 'āana is the thing given so that the sin of a transgressor will be pardoned. *E ke kahuna 'i'o a me ka 'alana 'i'o*, O true priest and true victim [of Christ]. *Mo'oka'ao . . . 'alana ā ho'ola'a 'ia i mua o ka lāhui Hawai'i*, a story . . . offered and dedicated to the Hawaiian people. **2.** vs. Light, buoyant, easily floating. See *lana*.
- 'ā.lana aloha.** n. Peace offering, offering of love.
- 'ā.lana kuni.** n. Burnt offering, offering to procure death by sorcery.
- 'ala.neo.** **1.** nvs. Clear, calm, serene, unclouded, free from impediment; clearness, calm, stillness; emptiness, nothing; desolate (Ier. 50.3). *'Alaneo ka uka, 'a'ole ao*, clear were the uplands, without clouds. *E Lono i ka pō la'ila'i, ku'ua mai ka 'alaneo* (Malo 183). O Lono of the clear night, let down clear skies. *Hāhā nā lima i kahi e loa'a ai, a ho'oku'i me ka 'alaneo* (Kel. 136), the hands grope at places to find things and collide with nothing at all. **2.** vs. Of a single color or texture, especially of a feather cloak without design and made of feathers of a single kind and color. **3.** N. Swelling disease, dropsy, generalized edema, kidney disease. **4.** n. Name of a class of 12 male supernatural beings called *papa pae mähū*, said to be hermaphrodite healers from Kahiki. One at least was according to legend turned to stone and has been moved to Kūhiō Park, Wai-kīkī, O'ahu. See *Pae-mähū* in Pukui, Elbert, and Mookini, 1974.
- alani.** n. **1.** Brown seaweeds (*Dictyota* spp.), regularly divided into narrow segments. They are so bitter that they will taint other seaweeds put with them and can be eaten but little and by some are considered poisonous. Medical *kahunas* used them in small quantities to treat asthma. This name is sometimes qualified by the terms *kai* and *'ula*. Also *maka* and false *lipoa*. Cf. *kūalani*. **2.** An O'ahu tree (*Pelea sandwicensis* or *P. oahuensis*), with oblong, fragrant leaves (like the *mokihana* of Kaua'i), which were used for scenting tapa. The bark was used for medicine. Also other species of *Pelea*. (PPN *alani*.) **3.** An upland moss.
- 'alani.** n. Any kind of orange, both fruit and tree, as *Citrus sinensis*. (Neal 483.) *Eng. Melemele 'ili 'alani*, orange-yellow color.
- ala.nia.** vs. Smooth, even, not rough.
- 'alani 'awa'awa.** n. Calamondin (*Citris mitis*), a small tree with flattened-globose fruits to 2.6 cm in diameter, orange-colored, few-seeded, sour. (Neal 484.)
- ala-niho.** n. Long tattoo stripe. *Lit.*, tooth path.
- alani kua:hiwi.** n. All species of *Pelea*. Also *kūkaemoa*.
- 'alani Pā.kō.** n. Tangerine, mandarin (*Citrus reticulata* cv. 'deliciosa'), a small tree with small leaves and small, loose-skinned, orange, flattened-globose, sweet fruits. (Neal 482.) *Lit.*, Chinese orange. On Ni'ihau, identified as *C. grandis*; cf. Neal 481.
- alani wai.** n. A low native shrub (*Pelea waialealae*), found only on high, wet parts of Kaua'i. Also *'anonia*.
- ala.nui.** n. Street, road, highway, thoroughfare, waterway, course. *Lit.*, large path. *Alanui hele*, any traversed road. *Alanui o ke ke'a*, station of the cross. Poetic names for the equator are *alanui a ke ku'uku'u*, road of the spider, and *alanui i ka piko o Wākea*, road at Wākea's navel. *Alanui polohiwa a Kanaloa*, the dark path of Kanaloa [southern limit of the sun in its yearly cycle, about the 15th and 16th days of the month Hiline Mā]. *Alanui polohiwa a Kāne*, the dark path of
