

ha'e. nvt. Yearning, longing; to yearn. *Rare.*

haea. 1. Pas/imp. of *hae* 3. (PPN *saea*). 2. See *limu haea*.

hā.ēa. *Rare* var. *kaha'ea*, clouds.

hā.ē'ona. vs. Shy. Cf. *'ena*.

hae.hae. 1. Redup. of *hae* 2, 3; to tear to bits, tease. *Ua pau 'o Iosepa i ka 'Ilio hihū, 'oia'i'o nō, ua haehae 'ia 'o Iosepa* (Kin. 37.33), Joseph is devoured by a wild beast; Joseph is without doubt rent in pieces. 2. Redup. of *hae* 1. ho'o.hae.hae. Caus/sim.; to drive into a fury; to decoy *uhu* fish by tying an *uhu* to a line; to tease. *Ka 'iwa ho'ohaehae nāulu*, an *'iwa*, frigate bird, teases the showers [an attractive person provokes envy]. 3. n. A native variety of taro in the *piko* group, characterized by having the two basal lobes of the leaf blade separated up to the *piko* (point of joining with the leaf stem); a hardy taro often grown commercially for poi, formerly common at Kā'ana-pali, Maui, where strong winds tore the leaves (hence *haehae*). (HP 29, 32.) Also *piko uliuli*.

hā.ē.hā.ē. Redup. of *ha'e*; strong affection and desire. *Ā e hā'awi 'ia aku kāu mau keiki . . . i nā kānaka 'ē, a e hā'ehā'e wale nā maka ou i ka nānā aku* (Kanl. 28.32), thy sons . . . shall be given unto other people, and thy eyes shall look and fail with longing for them.

hae.hae-ka-manu-o-Kāne-alo-ha. n. A *lua* fighting stroke. *Lit.*, the birds of Kāne-alo-ha tear to bits.

hae Hawai'i. n. 1. Hibiscus. *Lit.*, Hawaiian flag, from having red petals striped with white. (Neal 556.) 2. Carnation (*Dianthus caryophyllus*), petals red with white stripes, formerly a great favorite with Hawaiians (Neal 345). 3. A variety of plumeria.

hae.hia. Pas/imp. of *hae* 1-3.

hā.ēhu. Same as *ehuehu, ahuahū*, to grow well.

hā.ēhu.ēhu. vs. Reddish-brown, as hair.

hā.ēi. vi. To peep. *Rare.*

hā.ēka.ēka. vs. Dirty, drab; smudged, as by smoke.

hae.koko. vs. Bloodthirsty. (Kel. 42.)

haele. vi. To go, come (dual or plural). *Haele mai*, come. *Pali haele a māua*, the cliffs traveled by the two of us. *Kohala makani 'Āpa'apa'a, 'āina o nā pu'u haele lua o Pili me Ka-lā-hiki-ola*, Kohala with its 'Āpa'apa'a wind, land where the hills Pili and Ka-lā-hiki-ola go by twos. (PPN *sa'ele*.)

hā.ēle. Same as *hā'ele'ele*.

hae.lele. Redup. of *haele*; to go or come to and fro together.

hā.ēle.ēle. nvs. Blackish.

hā.ēle.lepo. n. A variety of sweet potato. (HP 141.)

haena. n. *Na-* form with *hae* 1-3; wildness; barking; tearing.

hā.ēna. 1. nvs. Red-hot, burning, red. *Hā'ena nā ihu*, a red nose (with blood). 2. (*Cap.*) Place names on Hawai'i, Kaua'i, and O'ahu. 3. Same as *hā'e'ena*. *Ua lā 'ia e ka manu, hā'ena wale i ka nahele* (song), scattered by the birds, shy in the forest. 4. n. Kind of tapa wrapped about images. (Kam. 64:12.)

hae.ola. vs. Murderous. (Kel. 45.)

-haha. 1. Redup. of *hā* 2; to breathe hard, pant. 2. vs. Proud, haughty. *Rare*. ho'o.haha. To parade, strut. 3. Same as *haha kā 'upena, una*. (PNP *'afa*.)

-haha. ho'o.haha. Overcast, calm.

hā.hā. 1. vt. To grope, feel, as with the hands. (For. 6:111.) *Kahuna hāhā*, an expert who diagnoses, as sickness or pain, by feeling the body. (PPN *faafaa*.) 2. Same as *hā*, stalk; striped taro leaves boiled or baked and eaten. 3. n. Trap made of twigs and small branches, for fresh-water fish. 4. n. Lobelias. See below and *ālula, 'ōhā, 'ōhā kēpau, 'ōhā wai nui*. 5. n. Kaua'i name for *'ape'ape*.

hāhā-. ho'o.hā.hā. To beat, pound, as tapa; to harden. (PPN *sasa*.)

hā.hā-'ai-a-ka-manu. n. A native lobelia (*Clermontia clermontoides*), found only in high mountains of Kaua'i, a shrub or small tree with many branches; oblong and narrow leaves; greenish-purple, curved flowers; and sweet, edible yellow berries. *Lit.*, *hāhā*, food

of the birds, so called because the thick sap was used for catching birds.

hahae. 1. Same as *haehae*, to tear; to strip, as pandanus leaves for plaiting. Cf. *kthae*. (PPN *sasae*.) 2. n. Small sweet potatoes removed in thinning a hill. *Ka'ū*.

haha.hana. Redup. of *hana* 1; to work, of many persons.

hā.hā hele. vt. To grope here and there, feel.

hahahi. Redup. of *hahi*.

hahai. nvt. Persons following, pursuit (FS 31); to follow, pursue, chase, hunt; to accompany, go with (For. 4:47). *Kuahaua o ke 'ano e hahai 'ia ai*, declaration of policy. ho'o.hahai. To cause to follow, entice; to pretend to follow.

haha'i. 1. Redup. of *ha'i* 1, 2; to break into pieces; to break off, as to thin sweet potato vines. (PPN *fafaki*.) 2. n. Painful swelling, as in the groin. Also *'awaiāhiki*.

haha'i.anana. Same as *'awaiāhiki*, also a name for syphilis. *Rare*.

haha'i lua. vt. To break in two. *Fig.*, bad luck. *A 'o ke kuapa'a i loa'a mai ia hele 'ana, ua kapa 'ia he kuapu'u haha'i lua*, a hunchback encountered on the trip is considered an unlucky hunchback.

haha'i malū. vt. To follow secretly, "tail", stalk.

hahai manu. nv. Bird hunter, fowler; to hunt birds.

hahaka. Redup. of *haka* 4.

haha kā 'upena. n. Net spacer or mesh stick, gauge used in making meshes in nets, made of wood, turtle shell, bone, bamboo, whale rib, coconut shell, or metal.

hahaki. Redup. of *haki*, to break. *Hahaki kā*, to break without permission or recklessly. See ex., *'oi'oi* 1.

hahaku. Redup. of *haku*, to compose.

hahala.lū. Same as *halalū*, young *akule* fish. See ex., *pakt* 2.

hahale. Same as *halehale*; high, as waves.

hahalu. vs. Empty, void; somewhat deflated, as a balloon; half rotten, as wood, taro. *Fig.*, hungry.

hā.hā.lua. n. Manta ray, sea devil, family *Mobulidae* (*Manta alfredi*). *Lit.*, two mouths (two flap-like appendages extend forward on each side of the mouth). (PNP *faafaalua*; cf. Tahitian *faafaapiti*.)

hā.hā lua. n. A native tree lobelia (*Cyanea leptostegia*), found only on Kaua'i. The trunk is slender, unbranched, to 12 m high, and bears a crown of narrow leaves that are up to 60 cm long. The many flowers are purplish-red, the fruits yellow berries.

hā.hā.mau. vt. To catch fish with the hands, as in crevices.

hahana. nvs. Heat, warmth; warm, sultry, hot. *Hahana ke kaua*, the battle waxes hot. See *hana* 4. *Hahana ka wela*, the heat is hot [anger]. *Holo ka hahana i ku'u piko* (FS 41), heat rushes to my navel [moved with emotion, as sorrow, love, fear]. ho'o.hahana. To create heat; to rouse to fury.

hahani. Redup. of *hani* 1; to touch.

hahano. Redup. of *hano* 1, 4, 6; enema.

hā.hā nui. n. A native shrubby lobelia (*Cyanea horrida*), from Maui, with thorny branches and rough, lobed leaves.

hahao. vt. To insert, put in. (Oihk. 10.1.) *Hahao iho i nā mea maika'i i loko o nā ipu* (Mat. 13.48), gathered the good into vessels. (PPN *fafa'o*.)

hā.hā.pa'a.kai. nv. Salt bed or pool; to gather salt. ho'o.hā.hā.pa'a.kai. To gather salt. *Po'e ho'ohāhā-pa'akai*, salt-gatherers [fig., those who do easy work not requiring stamina or courage].

hahape. Same as *awa* 1. *Kaua'i*.

hahau. 1. nvt. To strike, hit, whip, beat, switch, smite, wield, thrash; to throw down, as a playing card with force; to trump; to play, as a card or *kōnane* pebble; to insert; whip, lash, stroke; to bat, as a ball; a blow. *Hahau ikaika*, to lambaste, wallop. *Pepa hahau*, playing cards. (PPN *sasau*.) 2. vt. To offer a prayer or sacrifice; to lay before. (FS 205.) 3. vt. To build, as by laying bricks.

hahaua. Pas/imp. of *hahau*.

-hahau.hia. ho'o.hahau.hia. To be struck: see *hahau*.
