

hila.hila. 1. nvs. Bashful, shy, ashamed (2 Nal. 2.17), abashed, embarrassed; shame, bashfulness. Cf. *pua-hilahila*. *Kou wahi hilahila*, your private parts. *Hilahila 'ole*, shameless, brazen. *He ma'i nui ka hilahila*, shyness is a great disease. **ho'o.hila.hila.** To make ashamed or embarrassed; to disgrace, humiliate; shameful, bashful, timid. *Hana ho'ohilahila*, disgraceful behavior or acts. *Ho'ohilahila noho'i 'oe ia'u*, you've made me ashamed; I'm ashamed of you. 2. Same as *iholena*, a banana.

hila'i. vt. To exalt, praise. *Rare*.

hilala. vi. To reel, lean or tilt sideways. *Ua hele ā hilala nā kia, kiki'i ka pe'a i ka makani*, the masts lean over, the sails tilt in the breeze. **ho'o.hilala.** Caus/sim.; to cause to swing back and forth; to lean over, tilt.

hī lau.lele. n. Dysentery caused by eating *lau-lele* greens; name of a famine during the sandalwood-cutting days when farms were neglected and the people lived on *lau-lele* greens.

hī.lea. vs. Careless, shiftless (named for the people of Hīlea village, Ka'ū, Hawai'i, reported to have brought poorly prepared poi to a chief). *Hīlea i kalo 'eka'eka*, Hīlea of the dirty taro [a saying applied to anyone careless or inefficient in work].

hili. 1. nvt. To braid or plait, as a lei or candlenuts; a braid, plaiting, string. See *lei hili*. *Ka hili 'ana i ka lauoho* (1 Pet. 3.3), the plaiting of the hair. (PPN *firi*.) 2. vi. To turn aside, deviate, miss the way, wander, stray. Cf. *hilikau, pūhili*. *Mea hili i hope*, straggler. *Ua pā hili*, rain blown by wind in various directions. *Mai hili 'i'o paha au inā 'a'ole kēia kama'āina*, I might have gone quite astray had it not been for this native of the place. **ho'o.hili.** Caus/sim.; to lead astray. (PPN *fili*.) 3. nvt. To whip, smite, thrash, switch, bat; batter, as in baseball; stroke, as in fighting. *Mea hili kinipōpo*, batter. **ho'o.hili.** Caus/sim.; to pretend to whip, to whip gently. 4. n. Bark used in dyeing, as *hili kukui, hili kō-lea, hili noni*; the dark-brown dye made from this bark; a tapa dyed with *hili*; to dye with *hili*.

hī.lia. 1. Pas/imp. of *hili* 1-4. *He kī'oki o ke kīkākāpu, 'o ka i'a kapu hīlia au 'awahia*, stripes of the *kīkākāpu*, the sacred fish, smitten with bitter bile. 2. n. A native bird (no data).

hili.au. vi. In devious ways; to ramble; be indirect. See ex., *ne'ikū*.

hili.e'e. Var. of *'ilie'e*, plumbago.

hili.hā. nvt. Four-strand braid; to braid thus.

hili.hewa. nvi. Tangled, confused; entanglement, confusion; to become entangled; to trip or fall. *Hili hewa ka no'ono'o*, mental confusion. *Hili hewa ka wāwae*, to stumble, trip.

hili.hili. 1. Redup. of *hili* 1-3. **ho'o.hili.hili.** Redup. of *ho'ohili*. 2. Redup. of *hili* 4; dark red or brown (less dark than *hili* 4). *Hilihili honu*, turtle coloring; fig., wealthy. **ho'o.hili.hili.** To dye.

hili.hua. vi. To grope here and there. *Rare*.

hili.kau. vs. Mixed, snarled, entangled; to mix, snarl. See saying *makau*. *Hilikau nā wāwae*, to stumble. *Hilikau ka no'ono'o*, to have confused or bewildered thoughts. **ho'o.hili.kau.** Caus/sim. *Ho'ohilikau i nā wāwae*, to trip someone.

hili.kī. vt. To hit carelessly, at random. (Gram. 6.5.)

hili.kolo. Var. of *hīhikolo* 2, a legendary tree.

Hili-kolo. Same as *Ka-hili-kolo* and *Ka-hihi-kolu*.

hili.kolu. nvt. A three-strand braid; to braid such.

hili.kua. nvt. To lash against, whip. *Makani hilikua 'e'ena nā pali* (song), wind lashing furiously against the cliffs.

Hilina Ehu. n. Name of a star and of a Hawaiian month (same as *Māhoe Mua*: see month). (PPN *silinga*.)

hili.nā'i. nvt. To believe, trust; to lean on, rely on; trust, confidence. *'Ōlelo ho'oholo hilina'i*, vote of confidence. *He aha kēia hilina'i āu e hilina'i nei?* (2 Nal. 18.19) What confidence is this wherein you trust? *Hilina'i Ka'ū, kālele iā Puna; Hilina'i Puna, kālele iā Ka'ū* (saying), Ka'ū is dependent, supported by Puna; Puna

is dependent, supported by Ka'ū [Ka'ū and Puna depend on one another, said also of persons who do so].

Hilina Mā. n. Name of the eleventh month (Moloka'i), eighth (Kaua'i), or tenth (Alexander); same as *Māhoe Hope*. Cf. *alanui*

Hili.nēhu. Same as *Hilina Ehu*.

hilio.kalupē. Same as *heliokalope*, heliotrope. *Eng.*

hili.'ō.'ū. 1. Square braid of eight or sixteen strands. (And.) 2. Ailment of the bowels or stomach, accompanied by gas pains. (And.)

hili pā.hā. nvt. Four-strand braid; to braid such.

hili pā.kolu. nvt. Three-strand braid; to braid such.

hili pō. vi. To wander or grope aimlessly in the dark.

hiliu. n. Sound or call of a wind instrument, as the conch shell. *Rare*. **ho'o.hiliu.** To blow a conch or wind instrument. *Rare*.

hilo. 1. nvt. To twist, braid, spin; twisted, braided; threadlike; faint streak of light. See *lei hilo*. *Ua hilo 'ia i ke aho a ke aloha*, braided with the cords of love. *He olonā i hilo 'ia* (Puk. 26.1), fine twined linen. **ho'o.hilo.** Caus/sim. *Rare*. (PPN *filo*.) 2. (Cap.) n. First night of the new moon. See Malo 35. (PCP *filo*.) 3. (Cap.) n. Name of a famous Polynesian navigator for whom the city and district may have been named. See sayings, *Hilo* (Eng.-Hawaiian) (PCP *filo*.) 4. Same as *mau'u Hilo*, Hilo grass. 5. n. Gonorrhea; a running sore (Oihk. 15.3). 6. n. A variety of sweet potato. 7. See *iwi hilo*.

hilo.hilo. 1. vt. To lengthen a speech or story by inserting new matter; to embroider or spin out a tale. 2. Sweet juice of ti root. (And.)

hilu. 1. n. Various species of reef fishes of the genus *Coris*. The name *hilu* may be qualified by the terms *'ele'ele, lauwilli, meleleme, moelola, pano* (probably same as *uli*), *pāni'o, piliko'a* (*Paracirrhites forsteri*, hawkfish), *'ula, uli*. See saying, *no'eno'e* 2. 2. nvs. Quiet, reserved, well-behaved, decorous, unobtrusive, easygoing; such a person (a child born to a woman who craved *hilu* fish during her pregnancy was thought to be of this desirable type). 3. vs. Strange. *Eia ka mea hilu loa*, here is something unusual.

-hilu. ho'o.hilu. (a) To decorate, beautify. (b) To praise, exalt, dignify.

hilu.hilu. vs. Elegant, beautiful. **ho'o.hilu.hilu.** To beautify, bedeck, decorate. *Ho'ohiluhilu kula*, golden finery, jewelry.

Himela. n. Himalayas. *Eng.* See song, *hene* 2.

hī.mēni. nvt. Hymn, any song not used for hulas; to sing a *hīmeni*. *Eng.* *Hīmeni wae*, selected hymn or anthem. *Ā hīmeni aku ka po'e hīmeni* (2 Oihk. 29.28), the singers sang.

hī.mēni kū pā.kahi. n. Vocal solo.

hī.mēni kū pā.kolu. n. Trio (musical).

hina. 1. nvs. To fall, tumble, or topple over from an upright position (cf. *hā'ule*, to drop); to be "controlled," as a disease (Kam. 64:102); to fall morally; to throw down; a falling (a *loa'a*-type word; see Gram. 4.4). *'A'ole na'e he hina o ke kanaka o Kā-kuhihewa i nā kaikua'ana o Ka-welo* (FS 35), but the older brothers of Ka-welo did not throw Kā-kuhihewa's man. **ho'o.hina.** To throw, cause to fall, knock down; to lean over. *Ho'ohina ihola ka daimonio iāia* (Luka 4.35), the devil threw him. (PPN *singa*.) 2. n. Italics, probably so called because italics slant. 3. vi. To blow in a straight course, of wind. *Ke hina maila ka makani mai uka mai*, the wind is now blowing steadily from the uplands. 4. vs. Gray- or white-haired; gray. Cf. *'āhina. Ko'u oho hina* (Kin. 44.29), my gray hairs. (PPN *sina*.) 5. n. Hin (a Hebrew measure). (Puk. 29.40.) *Eng.* 6. A goddess. (PPN *Sina*.)

hina-ai-ka-malama. 1. Same as *na'ena'e*, shrubs or trees. 2. (Cap.) n. Name of a legendary goddess. (PPN *Sina*.)

hina.hina. 1. n. The silversword (*Argyroxiphium sandwicense*). See *'āhinahina* 2. 2. n. Florida moss (*Tillandsia usneoides*), an air plant, growing on tree branches
