

- and hanging baskets, forming masses of gray, thread-like stems and leaves. It is often substituted for the heliotrope (below) as the flower of Ka-ho'olawe, and so called. (Neal 169-71.) Also 'āhinahina and 'umi'umi-o-Dole, Dole's whiskers. **3.** n. Native heliotrope (*Heliotropium anomalum* var. *argenteum*), a low, spreading beach plant, with narrow, clustered, silvery leaves and small, white, fragrant flowers. As designated by the Territorial legislature in 1923, it represents Ka-ho'olawe in the leis of the islands; it is used for tea and medicine. (Neal 717.) Called *nohonoho pu'uone* on Ni'ihau. **4.** n. Native geraniums (*Geranium cuneatum* var. *tridens* and other native silvery geraniums), shrubs or small trees of the high mountains, with ovate, toothed leaves and red or white flowers. (Neal 469.) Cf. *nohoanu*. **5.** n. Native artemisia (*Artemisia australis*). See 'āhinahina 3. **6.** vs. Gray, grayish. **7.** n. A variety of sugar cane, gray-green with a rosy flush, the whole covered with a wax bloom; pith dark brown; looks like *lahi* 2. (HP 224, 225.) **8.** Redup. of *hina* 1. *Rare*.
- hina.hina 'a'ala.** n. Dusty miller (*Artemisia stelleriana*), a perennial herb in the daisy family, from northeastern Asia and eastern North America. The leaves and stems have a white, velvety covering and are aromatic. (Neal 852.)
- hina.hina kaha.kai.** n. A native Hawaiian plant of the water-leaf family (*Nama sandwicensis*). *Ni'ihau*. Cf. Neal 712.
- hina.hina kolo.** Same as *pōhinahina* 2, the beach vitex.
- hina.hina kua.hiwi.** Same as *hinahina* 5, artemisia.
- hina.hina kū kaha.kai.** Same as *hinahina* 3, a beach (*kahakai*) heliotrope.
- hina.hina kula.** An unidentified plant.
- hina.hina kū loa.** An unidentified plant.
- hī.nā'i.** n. Basket or container made of braided 'ie vine, pandanus, or other material; a kind of basket fish trap, as used for shrimps, eels, *hīnālea* and 'o'opu. Also *hīnā'i ho'olu'ulu'u* or *hīnā'i ho'omoe i'a*. (PPN *fiinaki*.)
- Hinaia.'ele.'ele.** n. A Hawaiian star and month name. See 'umeke, month.
- hī.nā'i pōe.pōe.** n. A round basket or container, as braided around a calabash.
- hī.nā'i uea.** n. Wire fish trap.
- hina.kā.** n. Handkerchief. *Eng*.
- hina.kā 'ā.'ī.** n. Neckerchief. *Ni'ihau*.
- hina.kā pā'ēke.** n. Pocket handkerchief. *Ni'ihau*.
- hina.kōa.** n. Type of stone laid near the coral pile (*umu*) to attract fish; it was flat on one side and rounded on the other, and was believed to attract *manini* and young of other fish which resembled it in color. *Lit.*, white gray.
- Hina-lani.** n. Name of a star.
- hī.nāle.** vs. Thin, sickly.
- hina le'a.** vi. To blow favorably, as wind. See ex., *pēlā* 1.
- hī.nā.lea.** n. **1.** Small- to moderate-sized, brightly colored wrasses, family Labridae. In addition to those listed below, *hīnālea* may be qualified by the terms 'ele'ele, *lipoa*, *lolo*, *nī'au*, *nuku 'i'iwi*, *nuku 'i'iwi 'ula*, *nuku 'i'iwi uli*, *nuku loa*, *nuku loa 'ele'ele*. Cf. 'ōpule. *Hīnālea* was eaten raw as an aftertaste for kava. It was prepared in the *i'a ho'omelu* fashion with *kukui* nuts and chili pepper; as this had a somewhat offensive smell, the phrase *ipu kai hīnālea*, dish of *hīnālea* sauce, was applied rudely to one with unpleasant breath, especially if he had the *i'a kui*, nasal discharge. **2.** A variety of taro.
- hī.nā.lea 'aki.lolo.** n. Yellowtail coris, *Coris gaimard*, up to 46 cm. See 'akilolo.
- hī.nā.lea 'ī'iwi.** n. Bird wrasse, *Gomphosus varius*, 23 cm.
- hī.nā.lea lauwilli.** n. A saddle wrasse up to 20 cm. long (*Thalassoma duperreyi*).
- hī.nā.lea lua.hine.** n. A blacktail wrasse up to about 18 cm. long (*Thalassoma ballieui*). *Lit.*, old-lady wrasse.
- Hina.li'i.** n. **1.** Name of a chief in whose time occurred a famous deluge called *kai a ka Hinali'i*; the Biblical flood (Kin. 6.17). See saying 'iliki 1. **2.** Name of a star that appears in the month of Hilinehu and follows in its course the star Polo-wehi-lani.
- hī.nalo.** Var. of *hīnāno*.
- Hina-mā.lai.lēna.** n. Name of a star, said to be the tutelary star of Hāna, Maui.
- hina moe.** vi. To lie down to sleep; to lie low, as of smoke; to drop dead.
- hinana.** n. Young of 'o'opu, a fish, formerly caught in nets and greatly relished. 'Ai wale i ka hinana, ka i'a kaulana o ka 'āina, eat readily of the hinana, the famous fish of the land. See saying, *pā 'ili*.
- hina.nau.ō.** Same as *hīnāno*. *Rare*.
- hī.nāno.** n. Male pandanus blossom. *Moena hīnāno*, very fine mat made of the bracts of the *hīnāno*. Cf. 'ahu *hīnāno*. (PPN *singano*, PCP *hi(i)nāno*.)
- hinao.** n. Type of *pā'ū* (no data).
- Hina.ona-lai.lēna.** Var. of *Hina-mālailēna*, a star.
- hina.pā.** Var. of *hinapē*.
- hina.pē.** vs. Too weak to stand alone.
- hina.pū.** n. **1.** A rare native variety of upland taro, with green leaves, reddish leaf juncture (*piko*), dark-green petioles, and white corm. (HP 18, 32.) Perhaps same as *lauoa uliuli*. **2.** A variety of sweet potato.
- hina pū.** vi. To fall together, of several; to topple.
- hī.nau.** vs. Thin, fine, as hair. Probably obsolete except in names.
- hina.'ula.** n. A kind of seaweed.
- hina ulu.** vs. To begin to gray, of hair.
- hī.nawa.nawa.ū.** Same as *hīnawe*, *nānawāu*, *hīnewanewāu*.
- hī.nawe.** Same as *hīnawenawe*.
- hī.nawe.nawe.** vs. Thin, feeble, weak, spindling, slender, puny, debilitated.
- hine.** vs. Gaudy, showy, splendid.
- hine.** Female, feminine. Cf. *wahine*, *kaikamahine*, *kaikuahine*, *luahine*. (PPN *fine*.)
- hine.hine.'ula.** n. A moss listed by Rock.
- Hine.kū, Hinedu.** nvs. Hindu. *Eng*.
- hī.newa.newa, hī.newa.newa.ū.** Var. of *hīnawenawe*.
- hini.** vs. Weak, feeble, delicate. (PCP *(f,s)ini*.)
- hini.hini.** **1.** Redup. of *hini*; indistinct, faint, as a voice. (PCP *(f,s)ini(f,s)ini*.) **2.** n. A variety of land shell. See *hīnihini konouli*, *hīnihini kua mauna*. See ex., *māpu*. *Mehe leo no ka hīnihini, ka pā hane i ke ahe mālie* (chant), like the voice of a *hīnihini*, blown softly by the gentle breeze. **3.** n. Cooked greens, as of 'āheahea, *pō-polo*, *pakai*.
- hini.hini kono.uli.** n. A land shell (*Succinea casta orophila*).
- hini.hini kua mauna.** n. A land shell (*Succinea casta*).
- hini.hini 'ula.** n. An upland moss (no data).
- hinu.** nvs. Oil, grease, ointment; oily, greasy; smooth and polished, lustrous, slick. Cf. *maka hinu*. *Pua'a hinu*, a greasy pig [human sacrifice]. (PPN *sinu*; cf. *Fijian*.)
- hinua.** Pas/imp. of *hinu*. *I hinua i ke kukui o Liliko'i a pahe'e*, polished smooth with the *kukui* of Liliko'i.
- hinu.hinu.** **1.** Intensification of *hinu*; bright, glossy, shining, lustrous, glittering, as of polished stones or shells; splendid; splendor. *A me ka 'aila ho'i, i mea e hinuhinu ai kona maka* (Hal. 104.15), and oil to make his face to shine. **ho'o.hinu.hinu.** To shine, polish; to show off (Kel. 130). *Keiki ho'ohinuhinu kāma'a*, shoe shiner, bootblack. *Ho'ohinuhinu miki'ao*, fingernail polish. *E ho'ohinuhinu ana 'o Ke-ola i kona kāma'a*, Ke-ola is polishing his shoes. (PPN *sinusinu*.) **2.** Var. of *hiluhilu*.
- ho'o.hinu.hinu.** Var. of *ho'ohiluhilu*. *Ua ho'ohinuhinu loa 'o Makali'i i kāna wahine, ā ua nani loa* (For. 4:81), Makali'i beds his wife and [she is] very beautiful.
- hinu.pua'a.** **1.** Same as *mai'a 'ele'ele* or 'ele'ele, a mountain banana with shiny black trunk. See also *hinu*. **2.** n. A native variety of upland taro. Also 'ele'ele.
- hio.** **1.** nvi. A sweep or gust of wind; to blow in gusts.
