

- (PPN *fio.*) 2. n. Inside corners of a house, said to be so named because ghosts came whistling in at the corners. *Hio kala* (FS 29), inside angle of gables. 3. vi. To break wind silently. Cf. *pūhi'u*.
- hiō.** vi. To fall sideways, lean, slant, slope, incline, leaning, oblique, diagonal. See *pahiō*, *wele 1. Kaha hiō*, an x signifying "times" in multiplication. **ho'o.hiō.** Caus/sim.
- hī'ō.** vi. Restless, active, flighty. See ex., *palawili*.
- hio.hio.** 1. vi. To whistle softly; to blow softly, draw in the breath, as of one eating hot food. 2. nvi. Gibberish; to jabber. See *hiohio haole*. *Namu hiohio*, English talk. 3. n. Lure for trolling, said to be named for its whistling sound tripping over the water.
- hiō.hiō.** vi. To lean every which way. **ho'o.hiō.hiō.** Redup. of *ho'ohiō*.
- hi'o.hi'o.** vs. Ruddy, bright red. *Rare*.
- hio.hio haole.** vi. To jibber jabber in the white man's language, so called because English seemed full of whistling (*hiohio*), sibilant sounds. *Palalē ka leo o ka ua i luna o ka nahele, e hiohio haole ana* (chant for Ka Haku o Hawai'i), indistinct voice of rain on the plants, shishing English.
- hi'o.hi'o.lani.** vt. To level off, as a flower bed. (Kep. 157.)
- hio.hiolo.** Redup. of *hiolo*. **ho'o.hio.hiolo.** Caus/sim.; to hang or drape festively.
- hio.hiona.** Redup. of *hiona*.
- hi'o.hi'ona.** n. Features, as of a face or landscape; sight, aspect.
- hi'o.lani.** vi. To sleep, lie at ease, lounge, relax (this word sometimes replaces *moe* in poetry because *moe* suggests the sleep of death). *Ua kau ke keha i ka uluna, ua hi'olani i ka moena* (UL 130), the head rests on the pillow, stretching out on the mat [relax after work is done].
- hiolo.** nvi. To tumble down, collapse; overthrown, defeated; collapse, landslide, falling. *E hiolo ana nā kapu kahiko*, the ancient taboos collapse. **ho'o.hiolo.** To overthrow, demolish, raze.
- hiolo.hia.** Pas/imp. of *hiolo*. **ho'o.hiolo.hia.** Caus/sim.
- hiona.** n. Leaning, slanting. *'Ano 'ē ho'i ka hiona o kēlā kumu niu*, what a peculiar angle that coconut tree has.
- hi'ona.** n. General appearance, as of a person; impression. Cf. *hi'ohi'ona*. *Pehea kāu hi'ona 'ana i kēia mea?* How does this appear to you?
- hī'ō'ō.** Redup. of *hī'ō*.
- hipa.** 1. vs. Var. of *hepa*, imbecilic. 2. n. Sheep. *Eng.* (Ioane 10.2.) *Hulu hipa*, wool. *'Ili hipa*, sheepskin. *'Ilio kia'i hipa*, sheep dog. *'I'o hipa*, mutton. *Kahu hipa*, shepherd.
- hipa.hipa.** 1. Same as *puka wai*, a coconut eye that is or may be pierced for drinking. 2. interj. Hip, hip, hurrah! Cheers! (*Eng.*, hip.) *'Ekolu hipahipa no ka mō'i*, three cheers for the king!
- Hipa-kāne.** n. The star Aries.
- hipa kāne.** n. Ram. *Lit.*, male sheep. *Hipa kāne 'akolu ona makahiki* (Kin. 15.9), three-year-old ram. *Hipa kāne wāwahi* (Ezek. 4.2), battering ram.
- hipa keiki.** n. Lamb.
- hipopo.kamu, hipopotamu.** n. Hippopotamus. *Eng.*
- hipū.** n. Resting place, as in the shelter of a tree or cave.
- hī.puka.** n. A concealed snare for plovers. *Rare*.
- hī.pu'u.** nvt. 1. Knot, bond, fastening; to tie a knot. *Hī-pu'u o ka male*, bonds of matrimony. **ho'o.hī.pu'u.** To tie, bind. 2. Tied bundle, purse (Sol. 1.14, Isa. 3.22); to bundle up.
- hī.pu'u.pu'u.** Redup. of *hīpu'u 1, 2*.
- hiu.** 1. vi. To throw or fling violently; to haul energetically with ropes; to get into action, as play or sport; to pursue with energy, as love-making. *Hiu ā wela*, ardent and persistent love-making; to take by storm. *Hiu aku nei 'oia i ka pu'upu'u*, he swung into action with his fists. *E kū i ka malo ā hiu* (Malo 146), stand up with [your] malo and go to it. *Hiu nō au ā na'u 'oe*, I'll sweep you off your feet. **ho'o.hiu.** Caus/sim. (PCP *fiu.*) 2. vt. To elevate, hoist, as by block and tackle.
- ho'o.hiu.** Caus/sim. *Ua ho'ohiu 'ia ka moku i luna o ke alahukimoku*, the ship was lifted onto the marine railway. 3. n. Stones used in games of *kōnane*, *kini-peki*, and *āneo*, usually polished and flat.
- hi'u.** 1. n. Hind part or tail section of a fish, considered less delicious than the head or front section. See saying, *pau 1. Hi'u kahi*, a single fishtail; limited knowledge (*fig.*). (PPN *siku.*) 2. n. Caudal fin. 3. vi. To break wind. Same as *pūhi'u*. 4. vi. To motion with the hands in a way destructive to the addressee. (Kam. 64:141.)
- hiua.** 1. n. A game something like checkers, played on a board with five squares. 2. vs. Menstrual. *He koko hiua*, menstrual blood.
- hiu.hiu.** Redup. of *hiu 1, 2*; to pelt repeatedly; to tug, lift again and again.
- hi'u.hi'u.** n. Last bits of odds and ends; remnants of matting strips that must be cut off after plaiting is finished; ends of knots in plaiting; wispy end of a braid. Cf. *hi'u*, tail. (PPN *sikusiku.*)
- hi'u.i'a.** n. Fishtail fern (*Nephrolepis biserrata* cv. *furcans*), a kind of sword fern, with forked divisions (pinnae). In Ka'ū, leis are made by combining pinnae of this fern (or whole frond) with flower sprays of *wāpine* (lemon verbena). (Neal 14, 15.)
- hi'u.kā.** n. Whole fish used as bait for trolling. *Rare*.
- hi'u kahi.** n. A single fishtail. *Fig.*, limited knowledge.
- hi'u.kole.** n. A fresh-water 'o'opu fish with a pinkish tail (*hi'u kole*). It is taboo to some because it is believed related to the *mo'o* lizard gods. Also *'alamo'o*, *hi'u'ula*, and *nu'ukole*.
- hi'u wa'a.** n. Canoe stern. *Fig.*, a straight tree suitable for a canoe.
- hi'u.wai.** 1. n. Water purification festivities on the second night of the month of Welehu (near the end of the year). The people bathed and frolicked in the sea or stream after midnight, then put on their finest tapa and ornaments for feasting and games. (Kep. 97, 193-4.) 2. vs. "Water-tailed," said of one allegedly descended from a shark. (GP 10-1.)
- hi'u.wī.wī.** n. A kind of 'ahi, a tuna fish. *Lit.*, thin tail.
- hiwa.** 1. nvs. Entirely black, as of pigs offered to the gods, a desirable blackness contrasting with *uli* and *'ele'ele*, which have pejorative connotations. See *polo-hiwa* and its associations with the god Kāne. (PCP (*f,s*)*hiwa.*) 2. vs. Choice. See *hiwahiwa*. 3. A term qualifying coconuts and kava; see *niu*, 'awa. 4. See *'Ae'ae-a-hiwa*.
- hī.wa'a.wa'a.** vs. Corpulent, fat. Cf. *'āwa'awa'a 2*.
- hiwa.hiwa.** nvs. Precious, beloved, esteemed, petted, darling, indulged; favorite. See ex., *luxury*. *Ka Mesia, ka hiwahiwa a ke Akua* (Luka 23.35), the Messiah, the chosen of God. **ho'o.hiwa.hiwa.** To honor, adorn, decorate; to display, as the flag; to treat as a favorite; festive. *He mea ho'ohiwahiwa i ke akua*, a thing to honor the gods. *'O ka mea ho'ohiwahiwa i kāna kauā mai kona wā 'u'uku mai* (Sol. 29.21), he who delicately brings up his servant from his childhood.
- hiwa.keā.** n. An all-black pig with white hoofs and white tips of tail, ears, and nose.
- hiwa lani.** n. Esteemed chief; beloved child or favorite; royal favorite.
- hiwa pa'a.** nvs. Coal-black, entirely black, solid-black. (A *pua'a hiwa* might have a few white hairs, but none at all were on a *pua'a hiwa pa'a.*)
- hiwi.** 1. vi. Skinny, bony, thin, angular. Cf. *iwi*. **ho'o.-hiwi.** To be downright skin and bones. 2. n. Sharp ridge of a mountain. Cf. more common *kuahiwi*. (PNP *siwi.*)
- hiwi.hiwi.** Redup. and intensifier of *hiwi 1*.
- hō.** 1. vt. To give, transfer, go (followed by directionals). (Hal. 15.5.) No caus/sim. derivation with *hō* has been noted. For the word often written *hooho*, see *oho*. *E hō mai i ka 'ai* (Kin. 43.31), set on food. *Hō mai i wai no'u*, give me some water. *E ke aloha, hō mai he leo* (FS 275), O my love, give your voice. *E hō a'e kāua*, let us go. *Hō a'e kāua i ka ihu o ka lio i ka ulu kukui*
