

-huki. ho'o.huki. Willful, headstrong.

hukia. Pas/imp. of *huki* 1, 2. *Hukia ka waha o ka 'upena*, pull the opening of the net. (PNP *futia*.)

huki.he'e. 1. nvs. Smooth. 2. n. Fine-meshed net used for fish fry. (FS 167.)

huki.huki. 1. nvt. To pull or draw frequently, or by many persons; to pull by jerks or continuously, as in the tug-of-war game; to gather, as taro; friction, dissension. *Hele maila lakou ā hukihuki i ka wai* (Puk. 2.16), they came to draw water. (PPN *futifuti*.) 2. nvi. To disagree, quarrel; disagreement; not cooperative, headstrong, obstinate. *Pili hukihuki*, a relationship with constant quarrels, as in a family. **ho'o.-huki.huki.** Caus/sim. 3. nvi. Tug-of-war game; to play the game.

huki'ino. vt. To jerk, pull hard or suddenly.

hukiki. Same as *'ukiki*, small.

huki.kū. vi. 1. Snobbish, haughty. 2. Uncooperative.

huki.lau. nvi. A seine; to fish with the seine. *Lit.*, pull ropes (*lau*).

huki leo pa'a. n. Stroke that impedes speech.

huki like. vt. To pull or work together, cooperate.

hukina. n. A pulling. (Kep. 153.)

huki wai. nv. To draw water; one who draws water. *Hele a'ela kekahi wahine no Samaria e huki wai* (Ioane 4.7), there came a woman of Samaria to draw water.

hukopa, husopa. n. Hyssop. (Oihk. 14.4.) *Eng.*

huku. nvi. Protuberance, lump, projection, elevation, jutting out, heap; to protrude, jut. *Hehihehi ana i ka huku 'ale* (song for Ka-lā-kaua), treading on the swelling billows. **ho'o.huku.** To project, protrude.

Hukue.noka, Huguena. nvs. Huguena. *Eng.*

huku li'i. nvs. Small protuberance; small, little.

hula. 1. nvt. The hula, a hula dancer; to dance the hula.

For types of hula see below and *'ai ha'a*, *'āla'apapa*, *'ami*, *hapa haole*, *hue*, *ki'elei*, *kōlani*, *kuhi*, *ku'i*, *mu'umu'u*, *'ōhelo*, *'ōlapa*, *'ōniu*, *pahua*, *pa'i umauma*, *'āllili*, UL 275-6. For hulas named for instruments see *'ili'ili*, *kā'eke'eke*, *kā lā'au*, *pahu*, *pā ipu*, *papa hehi*, *pā'ili*, *'ult'ult*. For hulas named for creatures see below or *honu*, *'lilo*, *kōlea*, *manō*, *pe'epe'emakawalu*, *pua'a*. *He hula* (For. 5:479), a hula dancer. *Kumu hula*, hula master or teacher. *Hula mai 'oe* (song), come to me dancing the hula. *Haihai akula nā wāhine apau mamuli ona, me nā mea kuolokani, a me ka hula* (Puk. 15.20), all the women followed after her with timbrels and dancing. **ho'o.hula.** To cause someone to dance; to pretend to hula. (PCP (*f,s*)*jula*.) 2. nvt. Song or chant used for the hula; to sing or chant for a hula. 3. vi. To twitch, as a muscle or eyelid; to palpitate, throb. (PCP (*f,s*)*jula*.)

hulā. vi. To prod, pry, uproot, pierce and penetrate, expel, reject. Also *hula'a*, *kula'a*, *'ula'a*. *'Ō mai ma'anei a hulā ma'ō*, to pierce in on this side and come out on that. *E poholalo a'e ana 'o 'Ai-ohi-kupua i kāna pu'upu'u . . . a hulā ma ke kua*, 'Ai-ohi-kupua gave an undercut blow with his fist . . . and it came out at the back. **ho'o.hulā.** Caus/sim. *Rare*.

hula'a. Same as *hulā*.

hula'ana. n. Place where it is necessary to swim past a cliff that blocks passage along a beach or coast; sheer cliff where the sea beats.

hū lā.'au. n. Pitch, resin.

hula 'au.ana. n. Informal hula without ceremony or offering, contrasted with the *hula kuahu*; modern hula.

hula.hē. vi. To jump for joy, cavort with happiness.

hula helo. Same as *hula 'ōhelo*; see *'ōhelo*.

hula honu. n. Hula in which the dancer imitates the motions of a turtle.

hula ho'o.nā.nā. n. Any hula for amusement. (UL 244.)

hula.hula. 1. nvt. Ballroom dancing with partners, American dancing, ball; massed hula dancing; to dance. (PEP (*f,s*)*jula(f,s)**jula*.) 2. *Rare* redup. of *hula* 1-3; twitching, fluttering. *Hulahula ka maka*, throbbing of an eyelid [considered by some a sign of rain or of coming grief]. 3. nvt. Ceremonial killing of a pig and offer-

ing it to the gods during the long ceremonies dedicating a *luakini* temple. (Malo 170, 183.)

hulā.hulā. Same as *hulehulei*.

hula 'ili.'ili. n. Hula in which smooth water-worn stones are used as clappers or castanets; the pebble hula.

hula 'lilo. n. A hula imitative of the movements of a dog. (UL 223.)

hula ki'i. 1. nvi. Dance of the images in which the dancers postured stiffly like images; to dance thus. *Kaua'i*. 2. n. A dance with marionettes. (UL 91-102).

hula kō.lea. n. A kneeling hula imitative of the *kōlea*, plover. (UL 219.)

hula kolili. n. A dance with love forfeits, similar to those in the *kilu* and *'ume* games. (UL 247.)

hula kuahu. n. Altar hula, any hula taught with ceremonies and an altar, contrasting with *hula 'auana*.

hula kuhi lima. See *kuhi* 1.

hula ku'i. See *ku'i*, joined.

hula ku'i Molo.kā'i. n. The punch (*ku'i*) hula of Moloka'i, an ancient, fast dance with stamping, heel twisting, thigh slapping, dipping of knees, doubling of fists as in boxing, vigorous gestures imitative of such pursuits as dragging fish nets, and unaccompanied by instruments. This dance originated on Moloka'i, an island famous for sports. Many of the songs contain taunts, as *a la'a kō kū i ke a'u*, now you are jabbed by the swordfish. Cf. *hula ku'i* under *ku'i*, joined.

hula kuolo. n. Sitting chant dance; the performer beats the gourd drum (*ipu*) and chants. Also *pā ipu*.

hula lā.'au pili. n. Name of hulas performed for the coronation of Ka-lā-kaua, probably stick hulas.

hulali. 1. nvs. Shining, glittering, glossy, slippery; to shine, glitter, sparkle, reflect light. Cf. *ali*, *lali*. *Ka 'ōpu'u kaimana e hulali nei lā* (song), diamond pendant sparkling here. **ho'o.hulali.** Caus/sim. 2. n. A kind of *loli*, sea cucumber. Also *kūnounou*.

hū.lali.lali. 1. Redup. and intensification of *hulali* 1. 2. Same as *hulali* 2.

hula mā.nai. n. Dance with a thin flexible stick with which the squatting dancer beats time as by striking the floor.

hula manō. n. Sitting dance imitative of sharks. (UL 221.)

hula mu'u.mu'u. See *mu'umu'u* 1.

hula nēma.nēma. n. Name of hulas performed for Ka-lā-kaua's coronation.

hū.lani. vt. To praise extravagantly, gush.

hula noho. nvi. Any sitting hula; to perform such.

hula 'ō.helo. See *'ōhelo* 3.

hula 'ō.lepe.lepe. n. Name of hulas performed for Ka-lā-kaua's coronation.

hula pahu. See *pahu* 1.

hula Pahua. nvi. A kind of fast hula that increases to a frenzy, said to have been named originally for a *mele ma'i* named *Pahua* (shoved). Emerson (UL 183-5) calls it a stick dance and gives an example. To perform this dance.

hula Palani pa'i uma.uma. n. Name of chest-slapping hulas performed for Ka-lā-kaua's coronation.

hula papa hehi. n. Dance in which the dancers use the *papa hehi*, treadle boards; this dance is said to have originated on Ni'ihau.

hula pe'e.pe'e.maka.walu. n. A spider dance with stiff legs, dancers hopped, right foot forward and left in reverse; then opposite, keeping time with a boisterous chant and with hands fluttering vigorously.

hula Pele. n. Sacred dance in honor of the goddess Pele.

hula pua'a. n. A hula dance in which the hips sway from side to side in imitation of a fat hog's waddling. Also *'ami pua'a*.

hula 'ult'ult. n. Hula with *'ult'ult*, gourds.

hule.hulei. Redup. of *hulei*; repeated motions or lifting; to seesaw.

hulei. vt. To lift, raise, draw up, as a skirt; to pull, pry; to pitch and toss, as a ship on the waves; to move along, as a ship; to flap wings; to trot, as a horse. Cf.
