

- a bird flying above, this companion would nurse great esteem. **3.** n. Fur, wool, fleece, human body hair (contrasting with *lauoho*, head hair). *Ka hulu 'ako mua o kāu po'e hipa* (Kanl. 18.4), the fleece first shorn of your sheep. (PPN *fulu*.) **4.** n. Kind, nature, color, *Ho'okahi nō hulu like o kēlā po'e*, those people are of the same sort. (PEP *fulu*.) **5.** n. Hackle; fishhook with barb on the outside (Malo 79). *Rare*. **6.** n. Brush. *Rare*. **7.** n. Muscle attaching a bivalve to rocks. *Rare*. **8.** n. Seal, named for its valuable fur. *Rare*. **9.** n. Cloth. See *hulu hipa*, *hulumanu*. **10.** Same as *hulu 'lio 1*, *nahawele 2*, *pūhuluhulu 2*, a seaweed.
- hulu 'ā'lio.** n. Horse's mane.
- hulu 'aina 'ole.** n. An esteemed, beloved person well cared for. *Lit.*, choice one not rejected.
- hulu ali'i.** n. Royal favorite and loved one; royal feather.
- hulu 'ā.nai.** n. 1. Scrubbing or painting brush, formerly made of a coconut husk. 2. A variety of sea urchin.
- hulu hipa.** n. Sheep wool, fleece; woolen cloth. *Nā mea 'ako hulu hipa* (1 Sam. 25.7), wool shearers.
- hulu.hulu.** nvs. Body hair, hair of eyelashes, fleece (Lunk. 6.37), wool, fur; hairy. (PPN *fulufulu*.) **2.** vs. Frayed, splintered, rough, not smooth, shaggy, bristling, feathery. Also *'āhuluhulu*. *'Eke huluhulu*, gunny sack. *Lopi huluhulu*, worsted thread. *Papa huluhulu*, rough lumber. **3.** n. Blanket. *Kūwili me kahi huluhulu moe kēhau o Milo-li'i*, moving restlessly on a blanket lying on the dew of Milo-li'i [poetic]. **4.** n. Feathers. Cf. *kauila huluhulu*. *Kū ā huluhulu Pana'ewa* (chant), *Pana'ewa* has trees like plumes. (PPN *fulufulu*.) **5.** n. Down or fuzz on plant stems, rootlet. **6.** Short for *'aha huluhulu*, a bristle worm. **7.** Same as *ma'o*, cotton. **8.** n. Kinds of seaweeds and mosses. **9.** n. Flannel.
- hulu.hulu-a-'lio.** n. A green, velvety, carpet-like mountain moss. The spore cases rise above the plants. *Lit.*, fur like a dog's.
- hulu.hulu-a-'iole.** Same as *hulu 'iole*.
- hulu.hulu 'i'i.** Same as *hulu 'i'i*.
- hulu.hulu waena.** n. An irregularly branching, dark-red seaweed (*Grateloupia filicina*) with many narrow segments. It is commonly eaten and is sold in some markets. Also *pakele-a-wa'a*.
- hulu.hulu weo.** vs. Bristling, glowing. *'Ele'ele ka lani huluhulu weo* (birth chant for Ka-mehameha III), the sky is dark and bristles and glows.
- hului.** **1.** nvi. A kind of bag fish net; to drag such a net. Also *huli*, *papa hului*. *He kai hului kō Kālia*, a sea for dragnet fishing at Kālia. **2.** vt. To take or grab, as winnings. *Ua hului 'ia aku nei ka 'ulu a kākou*, our bread-fruit has been taken away.
- hulu 'i'i.** n. A kind of seaweed.
- hulu 'lio.** n. **1.** A fine, red seaweed (*Centroceras clavulatum*), forming short, dense, regularly branching tufts, with tiny forked tips; not edible. Also *hulu*, *pūhuluhulu*, *wāwae'iole*. *Lit.*, dog fur. **2.** Fine, branching, edible brown seaweeds (*Ectocarpus* spp.), forming short, olive-brown clumps. **3.** A fine, branching, green seaweed (*Cladophora nitida*), forming flexible, long, bright-green tufts; said to be edible. **4.** A fine, feathery, green, fresh-water alga (*Stigeoclonium amoenum*), found in streams and ditches; said to be edible. **5.** A fine, unbranched, green seaweed (*Chaetomorpha antennina*), looking much like 3 above. Also *'lio*, *nahawele*. **6.** A fine, nonedible, brown seaweed (*Sphacelaria tribuloides*), densely tufted, shorter and darker brown than *Ectocarpus*. **7.** Some kinds of *Polysiphonia* seaweeds.
- hulu 'iole.** Same as *wāwae'iole*, a plant.
- hulu.iwi.** n. A pig that is reddish-colored about the hams. (Malo 37.) *Lit.*, 'iwi bird feather.
- hulu kā.kau.** n. A pen, quill for writing.
- hulu.koa.** n. Bird crest.
- hulu.koa'e.** n. A kind of grass.
- hulu ko'o.** n. Long tail feathers, as of a rooster.
- hulu ku'e.maka.** n. Eyebrow. *E koli 'oia i kona lauoho apau . . . a me kona 'umi'umi, a me kona hulu ku'e-*
- maka* (Oihk. 14.9), he shall shave off all his hair . . . and his beard, and his eyebrows.
- hulu kupu.** n. Pinfeathers, new-grown fur.
- hulu kupuna.** n. The precious few living blood relatives of the grandparent's generation (a term of affection and pride).
- hulu.lua.** n. Hook with two barbs.
- hulu makua.** n. Precious parent or relative of the parent's generation. Cf. *hulu kupuna*.
- hulu.manu.** n. Tick used for mattresses and pillow covers, so called because they were stuffed with bird feathers.
- hulu manu.** n. **1.** Bird feathers. **2.** Green seaweeds (*Caulerpa* spp.), growing like land plants, with roots, prostrate stems, and leaflike divided fronds; not edible. Also *'ai-a-ka-honu*, *hulu moa*, *limoa*. **3.** Court favorites of Ka-mehameha III.
- hulu.moa.** n. The Hawaiian mistletoes (*Korthalsella* spp., formerly called *Viscum*), small plants perching on trees and extracting part of their food from them. They have flat or cylindrical jointed green stems. (Neal 324-5.) *Lit.*, chicken feathers. Also *kaumahana*.
- hulu moa.** Same as *hulu manu 2*.
- hulu-o-Ka'au.hele.moa.** n. A moss said to grow only in Pālolo Valley, Honolulu, named for Ka'au-hele-moa, a legendary cock defeated in battle by a hen. She pulled out his feathers, which fell and became this moss. It is used in leis.
- hulu.pala.** vs. Light brown, bay, as a horse. *Inā 'o ku'u lio hulupala*, if it had been my bay horse.
- hulu pena.** n. Paintbrush.
- hulu.peu.** Rare var. of *hulu weuweu*.
- hulu pi'i.** n. Body hair, animal hair, or feathers standing on end.
- hulu.pua'a.** n. Beard hanging from the breast of mature turkey males. *Lit.*, hog hair.
- hulu pua'a.** n. A small, matted, red seaweed (*Spyridia spinella*), its many branches covered with short bristles. It is rather common in shallow water near shore. It is eaten in South Hawai'i, but not generally elsewhere.
- hulu waena.** Same as *huluhulu waena*.
- hulu weu.weu.** n. Downy feathers or beard, fuzz.
- hume.** vt. To bind about the loins, as a *malo*; to put on a *malo*; to wear a sanitary napkin. *Mea hume*, sanitary napkin. **ho'o.hume.** To put a loincloth on another. (PCP (*f,s*)*hume*.)
- humea.** Pas/imp. of *hume*. *O humea ka malo lani o Līloa* (chant), gird on the divine loincloth of Līloa.
- hume.hume.** Redup. of *hume*.
- humena.** n. A girding on of a loincloth; part of the loins covered by the *malo*.
- humu.** **1.** nvt. To sew, stitch; seam, stitch; to bind together parts of a fishhook; to bind, as a book. *Nā puke i humu 'ia*, the books that were bound. **ho'o.-humu.** To make someone sew. (PNP *sumu*.) **2.** n. Hole by which parts of a hook were bound together. **3.** (*Cap.*) n. The star Altair, in Aquila, said to have been used for navigation from Hawai'i to Tahiti. Also *Ho'ohumu*. (PNP *Sumu*.) **4.** Short for *paehumu*, taboo enclosure.
- humu ho'i.** nvt. Back stitching; to sew with back stitching.
- humu (humu.humu) ho'o.holo.holo.** n. Running stitch, basting. Also *humu kāhōlo*.
- humu.humu.** **1.** Redup. of *humu*; to sew, of many or continuously. *E ho'ouna ana mākou i nā puke e pa'i 'ia a e humuhumu 'ia*, we are sending the books to be printed and bound. **2.** n. Trigger fish. The name *humuhumu* is qualified by the following terms (in addition to those listed separately as identified): *kapa* or *kapu*, *lei*, *māne'one'o* (said to be irritating to the mouth), *'uwī'uwī* (thought by some to be the young of the *māne'one'o*). (PPN *sumusumu*.) **3.** n. A variety of taro with coloring like that of the *humuhumu* (fish); the leaf stem is pink at base, dark-purple midway and green above. (HP 18, 32.) **4.** n. A dark-colored birth-
