

- T.T.** 1. vs. Sour, rancid, moldy, musty. **hō.T.T.** Caus/sim.; to cause to sour. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Family name of John Papa 'I'i.
- 'i.i.ao.** n. Cooked and partly dried taro or sweet potato that becomes sour or ferments.
- 'i.iao.** Same as 'iao, a fish.
- 'i'i.** 1. Intensification of 'i'i 1, small, tiny. *Pua'a 'i'i'i*, tiny pig. 2. Same as 'i'i 5, 6; small *hāpu'u 'i'i* and 'ama'u 'i'i ferns.
- 'i.i.T.** vi. To restrain, choke back; to groan, as with exertion.
- 'i'ika.** vi. Contracted, drawn, as facial features; wincing, as in pain; to contract, wince, shrivel, as octopus that writhes or turns while being broiled. **ho'o.'i'ika.** To contort the features; to pucker, shrink, contract, wrinkle, scowl.
- 'i'ike.** vt. To see well; observant; to recognize and accost in a friendly way.
- 'i'imi.** nvt. To seek again and again; one seeking everywhere, as for knowledge. Cf. 'imi, 'imi'imi. *Kanaka 'i'imi 'ike*, one constantly seeking knowledge.
- 'i'imo.** vi. To blink. Cf. 'imo, 'imo'imo. **ho.'i'imo.** To blink rapidly; to twinkle, to cause a twinkling.
- i** (verb phrase) **inā.** Same as *inā* (phrase) *inā*. *I 'ai 'ia iho nei e 'oe, inā 'a'ole e 'eha kō po'o*, if you had eaten, then your head would not be aching.
- 'i'ini.** nvt. To desire, crave, yearn for, wish; desire, liking.
- 'i'iwī.** n. 1. Scarlet Hawaiian honey creeper (*Vestiaria coccinea*), found on all the main islands; its feathers were used extensively in feather work. Also 'iwi, 'i'iwī *pōlena, olokele*. Cf. also 'i'iwī *pōpolo* and *kikiwi*. *Ka mahiole 'ie i haku 'ia i ka hulu o nā 'i'iwī* (Laie 479), plaited helmet made of 'i'iwī feathers. 2. Same as the honey creeper called 'akialoa on O'ahu (*Hemignathus obscurus ellisianus*).
- 'i'iwī haole.** n. Cape honeysuckle (*Tecomaria capensis*), a climbing shrub bearing narrow, curved, tubular, scarlet flowers and fernlike leaves (Neal 765), introduced to Ka'u by George Jones.
- 'i'iwī pō.lena.** Same as 'i'iwī 1.
- 'i'iwī pō.polo.** n. Immature, greenish-yellow, black-spotted stage of the 'i'iwī bird. *Lit.*, *pōpolo* berry honey creeper.
- ika.** vs. Strong. Cf. *ikaika, lima ika*.
- T.kā.** 1. nvi. To drift upon, strike against; to turn aside from a straight course; flotsam and jetsam. *Pa'a 'ia iho i ka hoe uli i 'ole e ikā i ke ko'a*, grasp the steering paddle lest [we] strike the coral head. *Ikā ihola lākou i lalo i kahi wiliau, ili ihola ka moku* (Oih. 27.41), and falling into a place where two seas met [currents mixed] they ran the ship aground. **ho'o.T.kā.** To put or throw ashore; to float, strike, drift. 2. n. Sides of taro patch or garden. *Rare*.
- i kai.** See *kai*, sea.
- i ka T.** See T4.
- ikaika.** 1. nvs. Strong, powerful, sturdy, stalwart, potent; strength, force, energy, might, vigor, determination (*rare*) (usually pronounced *ikeika*; Gram. 2.7). **ho'o.ikaika, hō.'ikaika.** To make a great effort, work hard, encourage, animate, strengthen, fortify, try, strive, strain; calisthenics. *Ho'oikaika Kalikiano*, Christian Endeavor Society. *Ho'oikaika kino*, body-building exercise. *Pili ho'oikaika kino*, relating to body building, athletic. *Pōhaku ho'oikaika*, stones lifted as a test of strength. *E ho'oikaika ana au e hana i kēia*, I'm going to make a great effort to do this. *Ua ho'omaka 'ia nā ho'oikaika pāloka 'ana mawaena o nā kālai'āina 'ekolu*, political campaigns were begun by three political parties; *lit.*, ballot strengthening. 2. n. A name reported for Jupiter.
- ikaika lio.** n. Horsepower.
- Ikalia, Italia.** nvs. Italy; Italian. *Italian*.
- ikamu, itamu.** n. Item. *Eng. Ikamu mea hou*, news item.
- ikā.mū.** n. Gathering together, as of fish about a hook. Cf. *mū* 3.
- i kana mai.** See *kana* 2.
- ikāna wai.** n. Bank of a stream. *Rare*.
- l-ka-wao-lani.** n. Name of a star. *Lit.*, in the mountain area occupied by gods or high chiefs.
- 'ike.** 1. nvt. To see, know, feel, greet, recognize, perceive, experience, be aware, understand; to know sexually (For. 4:275); to receive revelations from the gods; knowledge, awareness, understanding, recognition, comprehension and hence learning; sense, as of hearing or sight; sensory, perceptive, vision. Cf. *anaina 'ike ali'i, 'ike loa. 'Ike nui 'ia*, well known, famous. *'Ike 'e*, foresee. *'Ike mamao*, far-sighted. *'Ike pōkole*, near-sighted. *'Ike wale 'ia*, easily seen, conspicuous. *Aniani ho'onui 'ike*, magnifying glass, telescope, microscope. *Hāiki ka 'ike*, narrow-minded. *'Ike aku, 'ike mai*, to recognize one another. *E Leo, e hele mai e 'ike i kō ho-ahānau*, Leo, come and greet your cousin. *Pau ka 'ike*, to lose consciousness. *'Ike ho'omaopopo*, conscious, consciousness. *Ua hele au e 'ike i ku'u hoaloha; ua pau ka 'ike, pau ka lohe*, I went to see my friend, he was in a coma, neither seeing or hearing. *He 'ike kumu, he 'ike lau, he 'ike lono, he 'ike pū 'awa hiwa; ka 'ike ia āu e ke akua* (hula prayer), a knowledge basic, a knowledge flowering, a knowledge heard, a knowledge from kava offerings; this is the knowledge from you, O god. **hō.'ike.** (a) To show, make known, display, tell, exhibit, reveal, indicate, inform, report, notify, explain, testify, cause to know or see, discover, announce, allege; acquaint; testimony, notice, information; identifying characteristics, as of land claims; proof, token, guide, exhibition. *Hō'ike maopopo aku*, to demonstrate clearly. *Hō'ike 'ōlelo*, grammar. *Ha'awina hō'ike*, examination, test. *Hō'ike ā maka, hō'ike ākea*, to reveal openly and clearly. *Hō'ike 'ana*, show, exhibition, (*cap.*) Revelation (Biblical). *Hō'ike 'ano*, description, example, illustration; to tell the nature of, describe. *Hō'ike honua*, geography. *Hō'ike ho'opōkole*, shortened review, synopsis, sketch, summary, outline, resumé. *Hō'ike manawa*, chronology. *Hō'ike panakō*, bank statement or report. *Palapala hō'ike*, affidavit, report. (b) Witness, as in court. *Hō'ike ho'opunipuni, hō'ike wahahe'e*, false witness; to lie, commit perjury. *Hō'ike pa'a*, witness, one who confirms. *Hō'ike pāku'i*, rebuttal. (c) School commencement; to hold commencement. (d) Congregational convention of various Sunday Schools with singing and recitation. *Nā hō'ike makahiki*, the annual conventions. (PPN *kite*.) 2. interj. of scorn in the phrase: *I ka 'ike!* What does [he, she] know!
- 'ikea.** Pas/imp. of 'ike 1. **hō.'ikea.** Pas/imp. of *hō'ike*. *E Kāne-i-ka-wai-ola hō'ikea mai i ke ola* (prayer), O Kāne-of-the-living-water, bring forth life. (PPN *kitea*.)
- 'ike hana lima.** nvs. Skilled craftsman, craftsmanship; deft.
- 'ike hā.nau.** n. Instinct. (Kep. 11.) *Lit.*, birth knowledge.
- 'ike.'ike.** Rare redup. of 'ike 1. **hō.'ike.'ike.** To display, exhibit, as in a museum or show; entertainment, play, fair, exposition, circus, carnival, show of almost any kind; demonstration. *Hale hō'ike'ike*, museum, art academy, exhibition hall. *Hō'ike'ike honua nui*, world's fair. *He nūpepa hō'ike'ike ki'i*, illustrated newspaper. (PPN *kitekite*.)
- 'ike ka'a kaua.** nv. Strategy, knowledge pertaining to war; to know the strategy of war.
- 'ike kū.hohonu.** n. Deep knowledge or insight.
- 'ike kumu.** n. Basic or fundamental knowledge.
- 'ike.la'ela, Iseraela.** nvs. Israel. (Heb. *Yisra'el*.) (For the Hawaiian glottal stop, cf. Gram. 2.9.3.)
- 'ike lihi.** vt. To glimpse.
- 'ike loa.** vi. To know very well indeed, knowledgeable, versed, wise.
- 'ike mahu'i.** nvt. To glimpse; inkling.
