

- '**ike maka**. nvt. Eyewitness, witness as to a will, eyesight, visual knowledge; visible; to see or witness personally.
- '**ikena**. n. View, seeing, knowing, association, scenery, knowledge. *E ho'oma'amaui i ka 'ikena* (song), continue forever seeing [one another]. *Nalo ka 'ikena a ka maka*, lost from view. (PCP *kitenga*.)
- '**ike.oma**. nvs. Idiom; idiomatic. *Eng.*
- '**ike pā.pā.lua**. nvt. To see double; to have the gift of second sight and commune with the spirits; supernatural knowledge, extrasensory perception.
- '**ike pono**. nvt. To see clearly; to know definitely; certain knowledge.
- iki**. nvs. Small, little, slightly; a little, trifle; not at all (with a negative). Cf. *'auiki. Ua 'eha iki*, slightly hurt. *He mea iki*, it's a trifle; you are welcome; don't mention it. *'A'ole kohu iki*, not the least fitting; most inappropriate. *'A'ole au i hele iki i laila*, I've never been there. *He iki pua mau'u*, a small blade of grass. **ho'o.iki**. To lessen, diminish, make small. (PPN *'iti*.)
- iki.'ala.mēa**. n. Name given for a disease, probably stomach ulcers. Cf. *hiki'alamea*.
- ikiiki**. 1. nvi. Stifling heat and humidity; acute discomfort, pain, grief, suffering; to be weary, stifling, sultry, stuffy. *Ikiiki o ke kaua*, fury and heat of war. *Ikiiki au i ka ho'omanawanui 'ana* (Jer. 20.9), I am weary with forbearing. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Name of a month in the summer season. (FS 281.) See *month*. 3. (*Cap.*) n. Name for the planet Jupiter.
- iki.makua**. n. A kind of stone, as used for making *maika* stones.
- iki.pua.hola**. n. A pestilence said to have come in the reign of Waia, believed the same as the 'ōku'u disease of 1804. (Malo 245.)
- ikō**. To imitate, copy. (*And.*)
- 'T.koi**. 1. Same as *pīkoi* 1, 2; breadfruit or pandanus core; tripper. 2. n. Float, as on a fish net; buoy.
- 'T.koi pua**. n. Spadix.
- 'T.koko**. nvs. Bloodless, wan, pale; anemia. *Rare*.
- ikū**. n. Officer, as in a society. Several types are listed below. *Rare*.
- I kū**. interj. Stand! Take your places! Get ready! Let's go!
- '**iku.ā**, '**ikuwā**. 1. nvs. Noisy, clamorous, loud-voiced; to make a din; din, clamor; voices of the gods in the elements. *'Ikuwā nā manu i ka nahele*, the birds make a din in the forest. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Month of the Hawaiian year, named, according to Kepelino, for the roar of surf, thunder, and cloudbursts of this month. (Kep. 95.) *'O 'Ikuwā i pohā kō'ele'ele*, '*ikuwā ke kai*, '*ikuwā ka hekili*, '*ikuwā ka manu*, '*Ikuwā* is the month when dark storms arise, sea roars, thunder roars, birds roar. *Pohā-kō'ele'ele* is a var. name: see *month*.
- ikū ha'i**. n. Chairman. *Lit.*, speaking officer.
- '**iku.'iku**. nvs. Stench; foul-smelling.
- ikū kau**. n. Secretary.
- ikū lani**. n. Highest officer, head, president.
- ikū.mau.maua**. nvt. To offer a prayer of thanksgiving; such a prayer.
- ikū nu'u**. n. Chief of rank below the *hoa ali'i* descendants of Kāne; chiefs of this rank could rule as *mō'i* but were not considered divine. (For. 6:266.) But cf. *mō'i*.
- ikū.ōne**. n. Treasurer.
- ikū pau**. n. Genealogy of chiefs of the *hoa ali'i* class (descendants of Kāne), the highest of all. (For. 6:266.)
- '**iku.wā**. Var. spelling of '*ikuā*.
- iku.wai**. Var. of *ukuwai*; visiting place in a grass house.
- ila**. 1. n. A dark birthmark. *Ke hele nei ā kūka'i ka ila o Pūpū-kea* (FS 195), the birthmark of Pūpū-kea appears [believed to indicate strength]. (PPN *'ila*.) 2. vs. Dark. *Pau ka wao mai'a a pala ila* (chant), all the bananas of the uplands are ripened black. 3. n. Changing colors of an octopus skin. *'O ka ila o ka he'e e holo ana i'ō ā i 'ane'i o ka he'e*, the changing colors of the octopus move here and there on the octopus. 4. Same as *kawowo*, seedling.
- i laila**. See *laila*.
- '**Ilā.lā 'ole**. n. Mighty one without branches [i.e. descendants, a reference to Ka-mehameha, who had no children by Ka-'ahu-manu].
- i lalo**. See *lalo*.
- ilā.muku**. n. Executive officer, marshal, sheriff. (PPN *'ilaamuku*.)
- '**ilau**. vi. To do together. *'Ilau hoe*, to paddle together. *E 'ilau mai kākou*, let's work together.
- '**Ile.lani, Irelani**. nvs. Ireland; Irish. *Eng.* Cf. *'Ailiki*.
- ili**. 1. nvi. Stranded, aground or wrecked, as a ship; to run aground; to run over, as with a car; to set, as the sun. Cf. *Hoku Ili*, Oih. 27.41, *Ikā 1. Ili ke aka*, to cast a shadow. **ho.'ili, ho'o.ili**. To land upon, load, as freight on a ship; to transfer, consign, transmit; to set on shore. *Ho'ili kaua*, to attack in war. *Ho'oili kolohe*, fraudulent exporting. *Ho'ili iā ha'i*, delegate to someone else. (PPN *hili*.) 2. nvi. Inheritance; to inherit. Cf. *ilina. Ili aku mai ka makua a ke keiki*, passing in inheritance from father to son. **ho.'ili, ho'o.ili**. To bequeath or leave in a will; to lay aside, save. *He mā'ona ho'oili*, filled to satiety. 3. nvi. To fall upon, as sorrow, responsibility, blessings (Kanl. 28.2), curses (Kanl. 28.15). *E ili ai ka hewa o ke ke'ena kapu* (Nah. 18.1), shall bear the iniquity of the sanctuary. *Ua ili maluna o mea ke kanikau 'ana no ka make 'ana o kō lāua pōki'i*, there befell so-and-so a sorrow for the death of their younger brother.
- '**ili**. n. 1. Skin, complexion, hide, pelt, scalp, bark, rind, peel. See ex., *kūakā. Ho'okae 'ili*, race prejudice; to have race prejudice. *Ka 'ili o ke po'o*, scalp. *Kāne i ka 'ili*, husband. *'A'ohe mea 'ē a'e, 'o ka lole wale nō i ka 'ili*, there was nothing else except the clothing on the back. (PPN *kili*.) 2. Leather. *'Ili lahilahi*, thin leather. *'Ili mānoanoa*, thick leather. 3. Surface, area. Cf. *'ili 'āina, 'ilikai*. 4. Binding, cover. *'Ili pa'a*, hard cover (of a book). 5. Land section, next in importance to *ahupua'a* and usually a subdivision of an *ahupua'a*. 6. Strap of any kind, as reins, harness, fan belt, machine belt; hose. Cf. *ala'ume*. 7. Pebble (less used than *'ili'ili*); *kōnane* pebble. 8. vs. Square, as in measurements. *Ana 'ili*, square measurements.
- '**ili. hō.ili**. To collect; to bunch together, as fish in a net.
- '**ili. ā**. n. A variety of taro.
- '**ili 'a'ai**. n. A skin or complexion prone to infection. *Lit.*, corrosive skin. Cf. *'ili 'awa*.
- '**ili.ahi**. n. 1. All Hawaiian kinds of sandalwood (*Santalum* spp.), shrubs and trees, with fragrant heart wood, small pale-green or gray-green leaves, small, dull-red or greenish flowers, and small purple fruits. From about 1790 to 1830 sandalwood trees were cut and exported to China. (Neal 325-6.) Also *'aoa*. (PPN *asi*.) 2. One whose clothes wear out fast, as due to carelessness.
- '**ili ahi**. n. A fiery surface. *Wai 'ula 'ili ahi*, red water with surface of fire [a poetic description of the waters of Wai-mea Stream, Kaua'i, the waters of which after a storm are said to be red along one bank].
- '**ili.ahi-a-lo'e**. n. A small shrubby form of Hawaiian sandalwood (*Santalum ellipticum*), found rarely and near the beach. (Neal 325.)
- ili 'āina**. n. Land inheritance.
- '**ili 'āina**. n. 1. Land area. *Ka 'ili 'āina o 0.75 'eka*, an area of 0.75 acre. 2. An *'ili* land division whose chief pays tribute to the chief of the *ahupua'a* of which it is a part, rather than directly to the king. Cf. *'ili kūpono*.
- ili.au**. n. An endemic woody plant (*Wilkesia gymnoxyphium*), related to the *'āhinahina* or silversword, found only in western mountains of Kaua'i. It is 1 to 4 m high, unbranched, the stems ending in clumps of long narrow leaves. (Neal 845.) See ex., *pū'olo. 'O ka iliau loha i ka lā* (For. 4:283), the *iliau* drooping in the sun.
