

- 'ili 'awa. n. Skin not easily bruised or infected; one with such a skin is said to emit an acrid ('awa) odor; a strong-smelling fish caught by him (as *pualu* or *palani*) is said to become more offensive in odor.
- 'ili.e'e. n. Wild plumbago (*Plumbago zeylanica*), a native of tropics of the Eastern Hemisphere to Hawai'i, a shrub with white tubular flowers and thin, oval leaves that were used medicinally; the sap was used to blacken tattoo marks. (Neal 667.) Also 'ilihe'e, *hilie'e*; *lauhihi* on Ni'ihau.
- 'ili e'e. n. Contagious skin disease.
- 'ili 'ele.'ele. n. Black *kōnane* stone.
- 'ili hau. n. Bark of the *hau* tree, as used for rope and for modern grass skirts.
- 'ili.hē'e. Same as 'ilie'e.
- 'ili.helo. Unsystematic or unskilled in farming, working spasmodically. (And.)
- ili.hia. 1. Pas/imp. of *ili*; to have gone aground. 2. vi. Stricken with awe, reverence, dread (PH 33); overcome, thrilled, as by beauty. *Ā 'e ho'oneoneo aku au i ka 'āina, ā no laila e ilihia ai kō 'oukou po'e 'enemi* (Oihk. 26.32), and I will bring the land into desolation; and your enemies shall be astonished. (PPN *ilifia*.)
- 'ili.hia. n. A kind of *ha'iwale* (*Cyrtandra begoniaefolia*), on East Maui, having unequal heart-shaped leaves.
- 'ili hinu.hinu. n. Patent leather. *Lit.*, shiny leather.
- 'ili.holo. Same as 'ilihelo.
- 'ili holo.holona. n. Leather; fur, as about the neck.
- 'ili honua. n. Surface of the earth.
- 'ili.hune. nvs. Poor, destitute; poverty, poor person. *Lit.*, tiny skin. hō.'ili.hune. To cause poverty; to behave as if poor. *He hō'ilihune kona noho 'ana*, he lives as if in poverty.
- 'ili.'ili. 1. n. Pebble, small stone, as used in dances or *kōnane*. *Hula 'ili'ili*, pebble dance. *Ho'onoho i ka 'ili'ili*, to arrange pebbles on a mat in the shape of a man and his vital organs, to teach anatomy. (PPN *kilikili*.) 2. vi. To pile, overlap. hō.'ili.'ili. To gather, collect, pile up, save, store away, glean, assemble; collection. *Aia hō'ili'ili 'oe i nā huawaina* (Kanl. 24.21), when you gather the grapes. *He hō'ili'ili po'oleka*, a stamp collection.
- 'ili.'ili 'ele.'ele. n. Black *kōnane* pebble.
- 'ili.'ili kea. n. White *kōnane* pebble.
- 'ili.'ili hā.nau. n. The birth pebbles of Kō-loa (a small section of the beach at Puna-lu'u, Ka'ū), which were believed to reproduce themselves, the smooth non-porous ones being male, the porous ones female. These stones were best liked for the pebble hula. *Ka 'ili'ili hānau o Kō-loa, ka nalu ha'i o Kāwā* (song), the birth pebbles of Kō-loa, the breaking waves of Kāwā.
- ili.ili.hia. Redup. of *ilihia*.
- 'ili.'ili maka.li'i. n. Gravel, small stones.
- 'ili.ka'a. n. Harness.
- 'ili.kai. 1. n. Surface of the sea. 2. vs. Horizontal. *He kaha 'ilikai*, a horizontal line.
- 'ili kala. n. Skin of *kala*, a fish, sometimes stretched over a coconut shell to form the top of the small *pāniu*, knee drum.
- 'ili.kala.kala. n. A bird (no data).
- 'ili.kana. n. Corm immediately under the skin, as of taro.
- 'ili kani. n. 1. A skin that sounds, as used in drums. 2. Tough skin.
- 'ili kapu. n. Taboo against contact with clothing or bedding of others; one with such a taboo.
- 'ili kau.ō. Reins. *Lit.*, pulling strap.
- 'ili kea. n. 1. Fair skin, of Hawaiians less dark than 'ili kou. Cf. 'ilipuakea. 2. White *kōnane* pebble.
- 'ili ke'ehi. n. Stirrup.
- 'iliki. 1. nvt. To strike suddenly, pour down, as rain; onset, striking, downpour. *'Iliki ke kai i ka 'ope'ope la, lilo*, sea strikes the bundles, gone. *Ka 'iliki a ka ua a hana mao 'ole i ke kai a ka Hinali'i*, sudden downpour of rain, constant without cessation in the flood of Hinali'i. 2. n. A varnish, as made of candlenut bark, ti root, banana stump, and other plants.
- 'ili.kini. nvs. 1. Indian (of America). *Eng.* Also 'Inikini. 2. (*Not cap.*) Naked, nude.
- 'iliki.uma, iridiuma. n. Iridium. *Eng.*
- 'ili.kole. 1. nvs. Poverty-stricken, very poor, destitute; pauper (stronger than 'ilihune). *Lit.*, bare skin. hō.'ili.kole. To cause poverty. *He keiki hō'ilikole*, a child that makes paupers [of the parents, as with expenses]. 2. n. Flesh of half-ripe coconut.
- 'ili.kona. n. Wart. *Lit.*, hard skin.
- 'ili.kone. Rare var. of 'ilikole.
- 'ili kou. vs. Dark-skinned, as dark Hawaiians. *Lit.*, kou-wood skin.
- 'ili.kū. Short for 'ili kūpono.
- 'ili kuapo. n. Belt.
- 'ili kū.pono. n. A nearly independent 'ili land division within an *ahupua'a*, paying tribute to the ruling chief and not to the chief of the *ahupua'a*. Transfer of the *ahupua'a* from one chief to another did not include the 'ili kūpono located within its boundaries. Also 'ilikū.
- 'ili lā.'au. n. Tree bark.
- ili.lani. nvi. Unexpected rain, as from a sunny sky; to rain thus.
- 'ili lele. n. Portion of an 'ili land division separated from the main part of the 'ili but considered a part of it. Also *lele*.
- 'ili lua. n. New skin, as over a sore; new bark.
- 'ili luna. n. Epidermis; outer bark.
- 'ilima. n. 1. Small to large native shrubs (all species of *Sida*, especially *S. fallax*), bearing yellow, orange, greenish, or dull-red flowers; some kinds strung for leis. The flowers last only a day and are so delicate that about 500 are needed for one lei. Fruits of the *ma'o* (*Abutilon grandifolium*), when green and soft, are used with 'ilima leis, one fruit at each end of the lei; or the pale-green, cap-like calyx of the 'ilima flower is used. A mild laxative for babies is made by squeezing out the juice of flowers; this is called *kanakamaika'i*. The 'ilima was designated in 1923 by the Territorial Legislature as the flower of O'ahu. It is related to the hibiscus. (Neal 552-3.) See songs, *nōweo*, *pue 1*; cf. 'āpiki. *Ola nō i ka pua o ka 'ilima*, healing in the 'ilima flower [reference to its medicinal use]. 2. Area where 'ilima plants may grow.
- 'ili mā.'ila. Same as 'ili kea.
- 'ilima koli kukui. A rare 'ilima with bronze-red flowers, domesticated on O'ahu. (Neal 553.) *Lit.*, kukui candle 'ilima. Also *kolikukui*.
- 'ilima kua.hiwi. n. A kind of 'ilima.
- 'ili mā.ku'a.ku'a. n. Dark-red bark, especially of *koa* trees.
- 'ili mā.ku'e. vs. Dark-skinned. *Kanaka 'ili māku'e o ka moana Pākīpika*, dark-skinned native of the Pacific Ocean.
- 'ilima kū kaha.kai. n. A kind of 'ilima creeping on sand on which beach dodder (*kauna'oa*) grows. (Neal 553.) *Lit.*, 'ilima standing on beach.
- 'ilima kū kula. n. A wild form of 'ilima, not so often used for leis as 'ilima lei, the cultivated form. *Lit.*, 'ilima standing on plains. Also 'ilima papa. (Neal 553.)
- 'ilima lei. n. Domesticated form of 'ilima.
- 'ilima makana.'ā. n. A wild 'ilima growing on old lava beds in Ka'ū, with small flowers; of medium height. (HP 213.)
- 'ilima mamo. n. A kind of 'ilima, probably same as 'ilima lei.
- 'ili mā.noa.noa. nvs. Callus, calloused skin, thick leather; calloused.
- 'ilima ō.kea. n. A domesticated 'ilima, light yellow in color.
- 'ilima papa. Same as 'ilima kū kula.
- ili.mo'o. ho'o.ili.mo'o. n. A service for *luakini* dedications. (For. 6:23.)
- ilina. n. 1. Grave, tomb, sepulcher, cemetery, mausole-
