

- 'imi hala. vt. To find fault with, blame, seek condemnation. *Ua 'imi hala 'oia i kona kaikua'ana*, he looked for faults in his older brother.
- 'imi hale. nv. 1. To establish, as a dynasty; to acquire authority, power, property; one who does so; to look for a house. *'O Ka-mehameha ka 'imi hale, 'o Liholiho ka noho hale*, Ka-mehameha established the rule; Liholiho was the legatee. 2. To form a friendship so close that one feels welcome in the house of the other. *Rare today.*
- 'imi hana. v. 1. To seek work. *Kōmike 'imi hana*, employment committee. 2. To stir up trouble.
- 'imi-hau. n. Name of a stormy wind at Lahaina, Maui. *Lit.*, dew seeker.
- 'imi.hia. Pas/imp. of 'imi. *Ua 'imihia ka hohonu*, the depths have been searched [of search for knowledge].
- 'imi 'ikē. nv. To seek knowledge; a seeker of knowledge.
- 'imi.'imi. Redup. of 'imi. (PPN *kumikumi*, PCP *kimikimi*.)
- 'imi.'imi.hia. Pas/imp. of 'imi.'imi. See ex., *lanalanahia*.
- 'imi kā.lā. nv. To seek money, to earn a livelihood; commercial.
- 'imi loa. vi. To seek far, explore; distant traveler, explorer. *Fig.*, one with great knowledge or avaricious for knowledge. *Ahu kupanaha iā Hawai'i 'imi loa* (Kep. 143), a heap of marvellous things in Hawai'i [and its] profound knowledge.
- 'imi loa'a. nv. Money-earner, as for a family; breadwinner. Cf. *'imi ā loa'a. Kā mākou 'imi loa'a kēlā*, he's our breadwinner.
- 'imina. n. Looking, seeking; search. *Ho'onui ka 'imina o ka pono* (song), increase the search for righteousness. (PCP *kuminga*.)
- 'imi na'au.ao. nv. To seek knowledge or education; ambitious to learn; one seeking education or learning, research, learning. *Po'e 'imi na'auao*, scientist, scholar, philosopher, learned man. *Hana 'imi na'auao*, science, scholarship, work of learning.
- 'imi 'ō.lēlo. v. To lie, slander, stir up trouble by gossip.
- 'imi pono. v. To seek or strive for righteousness; endeavor. *'Ahahui 'Ōpioio 'Imi Pono o Karisto*, Young People's Christian Endeavor Society [old name].
- 'imo. nvi. To wink, twinkle; winking, twinkling. Cf. *'i'imo*, Hal. 35.19. *hō.'imo*. To cause to wink; to wink to get one to wink back. (PPN *kimo*.)
- 'imo.'imo. Redup. of 'imo. (Ioba 15.12.) *Hōka 'imo-'imo*, twinkling star. (PPN *kimokimo*.)
- 'imona. n. Twinkling.
- imu. n. 1. Underground oven; food cooked in an *imu*. Also *umu*. (PPN 'umu.) 2. Rock and coral fish trap; the fisherman might insert a branch into an opening at one side to frighten the fish into a surrounding net. Also *ahu, umu*.
- i mua. See *mua*.
- imu hau hana. n. Oven in which *hau* wood was heated (*hana*) to be bent for a canoe outrigger.
- imu ho'o.ma'a.lili. n. Oven with food intended as an offering to appease (*ho'oma'alili*) a god.
- imu kā.lua loa. n. Oven for baking a long time; oven for baking human sacrifice. *Ku'u imu kālua loa: make* (riddle), my oven for baking forever: death.
- i muli. See *muli*.
- imu loa. n. Oven used as a sweat bath: the hot rocks of the oven were covered with a thick layer of greenery (as ginger, *maile*, ti); the patient lay here and was covered with more leaves and tapa; the treatment was said to last ten days and included prayers; its purpose was to remove the influence of sorcery. *Lit.*, long oven [with idea that a long life would follow].
- imu ō nui. n. Well-filled *imu*, a breadbasket.
- imu pao. n. Hawaiian oven built above the ground, with an opening through which wood could be stoked (*pao*).
- ina. 1. vt. To pry, as with a lever. 2. To vary or modulate the tone of voice; to sound, as from a distance. (And.)
3. interj. In! (Cry of children in a marble game when the marble is "in" a hole.) *Eng.*
- inā. 1. interj. Let's go! *Inā kākou, e hana kākou i nā pōhaku 'ula* (Kin. 11.3), let's get going and make bricks. 2. conj. If, would that; unless, whether (with a negative). (Gram. 11.1.) *Inā 'a'ole 'oe e ho'oikaika, 'a'ole e holomua*, unless you make great efforts, [you] will not progress. *Inā 'oe e hele, e hele nō au me 'oe*, if you go, I'll go with you. *Inā 'oe e hana, ā e hana 'ole*, whether you work or not. *Inā nō au i make nou!* Would that I had died in your stead! *Inā e like au me nā malama mamua* (Ioba 29.2), Oh, that I were as in months past.
- 'ina. 1. n. Small sea urchin (*wana*), as *Echinometra* spp. Qualifying terms are 'ele'ele or *uli*, *kea* or *ke'oke'o*, and 'ula or 'ula'ula. Some of these are listed below. (PPN *kina*.) 2. n. Kind of stone, used to make octopus sinkers. 3. Contraction of 'ia ana in the idiom *e aha 'ia ana?* What is being done? See *aha*.
- inā.hēa. inter. When (in questions in the past). Cf. Gram. 8.5. *Ināhea 'oe i hele mai ai?* When did you come? (Probably PPN *na + fea*: see Pawley, 1966, 58.)
- T.na'i. nvi. Accompaniment to poi, usually meat, fish, or vegetable; to serve as *Tna'i*. *Fig.*, to flavor, garnish, spice. *Ku'u lā pōloli, ā ola i kou aloha, 'Tna'i pū me ka waimaka* (PH 86), on my day of hunger, your love saves me, seasoned with tears. (PNP *kinaki*.)
- inaina. 1. nvt. Anger, wrath, rage, hatred, enmity (Kin. 3.15), malice; to hate (Kin. 37.4), abhor; moved with hatred, angry. See ex., *'ena'ena I*; cf. *mainaina*. *Kēia mau mea inaina 'ia* (Oihk. 18.29), these abominations. *ho'o.inaina*. To stir up anger, rouse hate. 2. Redup. of *ina I*, 2. *ho'o.inaina*. To sooth as by soft music. *Rare*.
- inā (phrase) inā. conj. If . . . would. (Gram. 11.1.) *Inā he nui ke kālā, inā ua holomua ka hana*, if there were much money, the work would progress. *Inā i a'o maika'i 'ia kāua, inā ua holomua ka hana*, if we had been taught properly, the work would have succeeded.
- 'ina.'ina. 1. n. Reddish discharge preceding labor in childbirth, amniotic fluid. *Ua hemo ka 'ina'ina o ke keiki, ua kokoke paha i ka manawa e hānau ai*, the pre-birth matter has been discharged, perhaps the time of birth is near. 2. vs. Tiny 'ina. See *'ina I*.
- 'inā.'inau. To make love; pleasant, agreeable, sprightly. *hō.'inā.'inau*. Caus/sim. See ex., *hā'ule 3, ho'okokoe*. *He mau hō'inā'inau no nā keiki ho'opāpā*, interesting bits concerning the boys who played at contests of wit.
- 'ina.lēo. n. Prep. (part of speech). *Rare*. Also *'inawaena*.
- 'ina.lua. 1. Same as *pōniu*, a vine. See *naomakalua*. *He 'inalua, he lā'au hihī, he mea hopu i'a*, an 'inalua, vines for catching fish. 2. Another name for *huehue 2*.
- 'ina.mona. n. Relish made of the cooked kernel of candlenut (*kukui*) mashed with salt (perhaps a contraction of *Tna'i momona*, sweet garnish). (Neal 506.) Also *'akimona*.
- T.nana. nvi. To come to life or activity, as of a sick person; to show liveliness, as of young birds about to fly; animated; stirring of life. Cf. *ktana, pūnana*. *Hō'eu, kukupu, 'Tnana, kā i luna o ka moku* (ancient prayer, For. 6:267), bestir, grow, come to life, rule the island. *Ke 'Tnana lā mehe 'ōpae 'oeha'a*, active there like freshwater shrimps [of scattered foes]. *Wahi piopio moa i ka hua e 'Tnana nei i loko ou*, little chicken in the egg coming to life within you. *hō.T.nana*. To animate, give life to. *'O ka honua nui a Kāne i ho'Tnana a 'ahu ktanohinohi* (Kep. 123), the great earth that Kāne gave life to and clothed decoratively. *Ō ho'ālu 'oe, ō 'Tnana 'oe, ho'Tnana i ke ola* (prayer, PH 150), inspire, animate, give life.
- inanel interj. Let me see! Show it to me! (Cf. *'oia ana, 'oliana*.)
- T.nane. Var. of *Tnana*.
- 'inau. Same as *'inā'inau*. *Hoa 'inau*, sweetheart, mate, spouse. *hō.'inau*. Caus/sim. *Hōkū 'imo'imo hō'inau* (Kel. 10), stars twinkling merrily.
