

- 'ina 'ula. n. A red 'ina, perhaps young of *Heterocentrotus mammillatus*.
- 'ina uli. n. Black 'ina, perhaps young of *Echinometra oblonga*, or one of several other sea urchins.
- 'ina.waena. n. Preposition (part of speech). Also 'inaleo. Rare.
- T.nawe.nawe. Same as *hīnawenawe*.
- ine. Var. of *ina*, to pry. Rare.
- T.nea. nvi. Hardship, suffering, distress; to suffer discomfort. See ex., *pūlua*. *Hoa 'nea*, a companion who shares hardships. *He hana 'nea ka hewa*, sin is a work that brings suffering. ho.T.nea. To cause hardship, distress.
- i nōhi.nōi. See *nehinei*, yesterday.
- i nō'i. See *ne'i*, here.
- 'inē.kui.kikio, inēkuisitio. n. Inquisition. (Latin *inquisitio*.)
- 'ini-. See 'ini'ini, 'iniki. (PPN *kini*.)
- 'ī.nia. 1. nvs. India; East Indian. Eng. 2. (Not cap.) n. The pride of India (*Melia azedarach*), a tree from the Old World, naturalized in Hawai'i. It has much-divided fernlike leaves, and bears large clusters of purplish flowers and fruits like golden balls. (Neal 491-2.) Also 'ilinia.
- 'ini.ana. nvs. Indian, as Indian Ocean. Eng.
- T.niha. n. Inch. Eng.
- 'ini.'ini. vt. To pinch. See ex., *hāpapa* 2. (PPN *kinikini*, strike; PNP *kinikini*, pinch.)
- 'ini.'iniki. 1. vt. To pinch or nip repeatedly; tingling, as with cold. *Ka 'ini'iniki mālie a ke kēhau*, gentle chill [or pang] of misty rain. 2. n. A way of catching small eels by holding bait on the palm of the hand and clenching the fist when the eels come.
- T.nika. n. 1. Ink. Eng. 2. Malabar nightshade or Ceylon spinach (*Basella alba*), a succulent vine with thick, heart-shaped leaves, and spikes bearing black, berry-like fruits. It is eaten as greens. It is a native of tropical Asia or of Africa. (Neal 343-4.)
- 'iniki. vi. To pinch, nip; sharp and piercing, as wind or pangs of love. (Probably 'ini- + -ki, transitivizer.) Cf. 'ini'iniki, 'inikiniki. 'Iniki welawela, a sharp pinch. (PPN *kiniti*.)
- 'ini.kini. Same as 'Ilikini, Indian. Eng.
- T.niki.niki (sometimes pronounced 'nisinisi in songs). Same as 'ini'iniki. *Makani houhou 'ili*, 'inikiniki mālie (song), wind that pierces the skin, a gentle pang.
- 'ini.kō. n. Indigo (*Indigofera suffruticosa*), a West Indian legume with compound leaves, small reddish flowers, and small, clumped, curved seed pods, introduced to Hawai'i about 1850 for commercial purposes. It was not a financial success. (Neal 447-8.) Eng. Also 'inikoa, *kōlū* 4.
- 'ini.koa. Same as 'inikō.
- 'ini.kua. nvs. Insurance. Eng. *Palapala 'inikua*, insurance policy.
- 'ini.kua home. n. Home insurance. Eng.
- 'ini.kua ka'a. n. Automobile insurance.
- 'ini.kua ola. n. Life insurance.
- 'ini.kua pau ahi. n. Fire insurance.
- 'ini.kua ulia. n. Accident insurance.
- 'ini.pā.kēkē. n. In the pocket (used in the phrase: *komo ma ka 'inipākeke*, put in the pocket [pocketed]). Eng.
- ino. See *māino*.
- 'ino. 1. nvs. Wicked, immoral, sinful, unwholesome, unclean, bad, vicious, evil, unprincipled; hate, sin, decomposition (For. 5:713). See *kahi 'ino* and ex., 'oi 2. 'Ino loa, very bad or wicked, horrible, abominable. *Kā i ka 'ino*, curse. hō.'ino, ho'o.'ino. To insult, malign, persecute, abuse, dishonor, defame, speak evil. *Hō'ino wale*, needlessly defame, damn. *Ho'opau ho'o'ino 'ia*, dishonorably discharged [as from the armed services]. (PNP *kino*.) 2. nvi. Spoiled, contaminated, bad-smelling, of poor quality, ugly; spoiled object, pollution. *Pau ka 'ino*, the foul period is over [of a child after toilet training]. 3. vt. To injure, hurt, harm, break. 'O ka inu wai 'ona, he mea ia e 'ino ai ke kino, the drinking of intoxicants injures the body. ho'o.'ino. To harm, injure, damage. 4. nvs. Storm; stormy. 'O ka uhiwai nō ka i 'ike i ka 'ino o ka wai, the mists are those that know of storm on the water [those close by know what is going to happen]. 5. n. A comonomer. (Kep. 141.) 6 part. Very, very much, intensely. (Sometimes pejorative; Gram. 7.5.) *Aloha 'ino*, too bad, what a shame. *Nui 'ino*, very, very many or much. *Holo 'ino ke ka'a*, the car races terrifically. *Makemake 'ino au i kēlā mea*, I want that thing very much.
- inoa (in fast speech often preceded by *ke*). n. 1. Name, term, title. *Inoa laula*, *inoa nui*, general name. *Ola ka inoa*, the name lives [a family name is given to a child]. (PPN *hingoa*.) 2. Namesake. *E hele aku māua me Inoa*, we'll go with Namesake [said only by one of his own namesake; the possessive may be omitted; also used in the vocative]. 3. An affectionate term for affinal relatives, or in-laws of in-laws, or relatives usually not related by blood; *inoa* may be followed by a kinship term indicative of generation (as *mo'opuna*, *kai-kamahine*, *keiki*, *makua*, *kupuna*), or of the common relative (as *puluna*, *hūnōna*.) A grandchild's spouse's relatives united by affection to the speaker might thus be called *inoa mo'opuna*. Similarly the cousins of a *puluna* (parents-in-law of an offspring) might be *inoa puluna*, and the cousins or in-laws of a parent might be *inoa makua*. The relationship might also extend to close family friends. 4. Name chant or song. *He inoa no ka lani* (chant), a name chant in honor of the chief.
- inoa 'ala. n. Esteemed name, especially of a chief. *Lit.*, fragrant name.
- inoa kapa.kapa. See *kapakapa* 2.
- inoa makua. See *inoa* 3.
- inoa 'ohana. n. Family name, surname.
- inoa papa. n. Denomination, as in arithmetic.
- inoa pō. n. Dream name, as a name for an infant believed received in a dream; it was thought that if such a name were not given, the child would be sickly or die.
- inoa puluna. See *inoa* 3.
- inoa 'ū.lā.leo. n. A name given to a child by a supernatural voice, usually heard just before the child's birth; a voice name.
- 'ino.'ino. 1. vi. Spoiled, contaminated, rotten, foul, broken, damaged; wretched. 'Ino'ino kēia 'i'o pipi, this beef is spoiled. *Pāloka 'ino'ino*, spoiled ballot. hō.'ino.'ino. To mar, deface, disfigure, break, damage, ruin, speak evil of. (PNP *kinokino*.) 2. nvi. Stormy; storm. 3. nvi. Wicked, sinful; sin. 4. vi. Angry. *No ke aha lā i 'ino'ino ai kou maka* (Neh. 2.2)? Why is thy countenance angry? (The Neh. translation "sad" seems an error.) *Ka 'ino'ino o nā maka* (For. 5:555), the wrath of your eyes.
- inu. nvt. To drink; a drink, drinking. Also *unu*, rare. *Kāna mea inu*, his beverage. *Kona inu*, his drinking. *Mea inu ho'ohuihui*, mixed drink. *Mea inu ho'ohu'ihu'i*, cold or iced beverage. *Pākela inu*, to drink to excess. *Pū'ali inu wai*, army of water drinkers (name of a temperance society). ho.'inu, ho'o.inu. To give to drink. (PPN (*i,u*)nu.)
- inu 'awa. nv. Kava drinker; to drink kava.
- inu.hia. Pas/imp. of *inu*.
- inu ho'o.mai.ka'i. vi. To toast (as before drinking).
- inu lama. nv. To drink rum or other alcoholic drink; one who drinks.
- inu li'i.li'i. vt. To drink but a little, sip.
- inu.mia. Pas/imp. of *inu*. (PPN *inumia*.)
- inu 'ona. v. To drink until intoxicated.
- Inu-wai. n. Name of a sea breeze. *Lit.*, water drinking. See sayings, *lomia*, *milika'a*. *Hao ka Inu-wai*, *malo'o ka lau lā'au*, the Inu-wai blows, the tree leaves wither [of pillage].
- io. n. Short rib extending upward from the tip of a paddle, on the forward surface. Also 'upe. (PPN *io*.)
