

- poise that commands admiration. *Kilakila Hale-a-ka-lā, kuahiwi nani o Maui* (song), majestic Hale-a-ka-lā, beautiful mountain of Maui.
- kila 'oki pepeiao.** n. Steel for cutting ears [of cattle for identification].
- kila 'o'oma.** n. Lathe. *Lit.*, chisel steel.
- kila pa'i puna.** n. Trowel. *Lit.*, steel slap lime.
- kila pao.** n. Steel chisel.
- kilape.** n. Giraffe. *Eng.*
- kīlau.** n. 1. Bracken or brake (*Pteridium aquilinum* var. *decompositum*), a cosmopolitan, stiff, weedy fern, with creeping underground stems and long-stemmed, triangular fronds 60 or more cm long, much divided. (Neal 15-6.) Also *kīlau pueo, pai'ā*. 2. Ti stalk with shredded leaves, as held by a fishing director (*kilo i'a*) and used to guide the fishing canoes; ti stalk used to flip water of purification.
- kīlā.** n. Small but conspicuous hill. *Rare.*
- kileka, tireza.** n. Holm tree (RSV), cypress (KJV). (Kanl. 44.14.) (Heb. *tirza*.)
- kīleo.** n. 1. Soft palate including uvula. (Ioba 29.10.) 2. Trigger of a gun. 3. Ring of 'ie, a vine, sewed to the top of a fish basket to hold fish in place.
- kīlepa.** 1. vi. To float in the wind, to flutter, flap, flip. Cf. *lepa*, flag. **ho'o.kīlepa.** Caus/sim. 2. vs. Irregular, uneven, of varying lengths. 3. n. Rooster comb, wattle.
- kīlepa.lepa.** Redup. of *kīlepa*; streamer, banner, tassel.
- kīlepa.lepa kō.** n. Sugar-cane tassel.
- kīlepe.** Rare var. of *kūlepe* 1, 2.
- kili.** 1. nvi. Raindrops; fine rain; to rain gently. *Fig.*, to go or move in a light, sprightly manner. See *kili hau, kilihune, kili nahe*. **ho'o.kili.** To rain gently. 2. nvi. Peal of thunder; to thunder. See *hekili*. 3. (*Cap.*) nvs. Chile; Chilean. *Eng.*
- kili.ani.** Rare var. of *kiani*.
- kili.apu.** nvi. A dipper or water carrier made of taro or 'ape leaf.
- kili hau.** nvi. Ice-cold shower; cold drizzle; to rain thus. *Fig.*, tipsy.
- kili.hē.** vi. Drenched, as by sea spray or fragrance. *Kilihē i ke kai melemele*, drenched by the sprays of the yellow sea.
- kili.hēa.** Same as *kilihē*. *Puna paia 'a'ala, kilihea i ke onaona* (Elbert and Mahoe 87), Puna's fragrant glades drenched with fragrance.
- kili.hē'a.** vi. Stained with color, as a sky at sunset.
- kili.hē.hē.** Obstinate, unmanageable. (AP.)
- kili.huna.** Var. of *kilihune*.
- kili.hune.** 1. vi. Fine, light rain, wind-blown spray, drizzle; to shower lightly. Cf. *hune*. **ho'o.kili.hune.** Caus/sim. *He wahi lā ho'okilihune ua kēia*, this is just a day of slight showers. 2. n. A fine, delicate species of *Hypnea* (seaweed), probably *H. cervicornis*.
- kili.hune.hune.** Same as *kilihune* 2.
- kilika.** 1. nvs. Silk. *Eng.* 2. n. The black mulberry (*Morus nigra*), introduced into Hawai'i in hopes of establishing a silk-producing industry. It is a low tree bearing juicy, sweet, red to black fruits and ovate leaves. The leaves are fed to silkworms. The tree comes from the Far East. (Neal 300.) *Lā'au kilika* (2 Sam. 5.23), mulberry tree. *Eng.*, silk.
- kili.kā.** Short for *kilika'a* 1.
- kili.kā'a.** 1. nvi. A passing, moving shower; to shower lightly and briefly. 2. n. A kind of tapa, associated with Wai-pi'o, Hawai'i.
- kilika lau.** n. Brocaded silk.
- kilika nehe.** n. Taffeta. *Lit.*, rustling silk.
- Kiliki.ano, Kiritiano.** Var. of *Kalikiano*, Christian.
- kili.kili.** Redup. of *kili* 1. *Ka wai kilikili noe*, fine, misty rain water.
- kili.kili hau.** Redup. of *kili hau*; to sprinkle slightly.
- kili.kili huna.** Redup. of *kilihuna*, fine rain.
- kili.kili.hune.** Redup. of *kilihune*.
- kili.kili.kā.** Redup. of *kilikā*.
- kili.kili.kā'a.** Redup. of *kilika'a*.
- kili.kili.oe.** Same as *kilikili noe*, misty, light rain. *Kilikilioe ka ua*, the rain falls in light mist.
- kilina.** n. 1. Ceiling. *Eng.* 2. Also *silina*. Shilling. *Eng.*
- kili nahe.** nvi. Light, soft, gentle rain; pleasant patter of gentle rain; to rain gently.
- kili noe.** nvi. Fine, misty rain, somewhat heavier mist than the *kili 'ohu*. *'O ka ua kili noe hau o Kēkē* (FS 249), the fine, cold, misty rain of Kēkē.
- kili.oe.** n. A vine with small elliptical leaves at internodes of 11.5 cm. According to C. S. Judd, this may be a native climbing shrub (*Embelia pacifica*), in the Myrsine family. (Neal 665.)
- kili 'ohu.** n. Fine rain and light mist.
- kili.ona.** num. Trillion. *Eng.*
- kili.'o'opu.** n. 1. Some small cosmopolitan weeds, grasslike sedges, as nut grass (*Cyperus rotundus*); also two others (*C. kyllinga* and *C. brevifolius*); the flower stalk with head is used for stringing small fish. (Neal 84, 86.) See *manunēnē*. 2. (*Cap.*) Wind associated with Wai-he'e, Maui, and windward Moloka'i.
- kili.'opu.** 1. vi. Absorbed in an interesting, happy pastime, as love-making; contented. *Ua kili'opu māua i ka pō nei*, what pleasure was love-making for the two of us last night. 2. vs. Graceful, as in running, jumping. 3. (*Cap.*) Var. of *Kili'o'opu*, a wind. 4. Same as *lele 'opu*, to dive.
- Kili.paki, Gilibati.** nvs. Gilbert Islands; Gilbertese. *Eng.*
- Kili.poe.** n. Name of wind.
- kili.pohe.** vs. Well-shaped and moist, as of a flower wet with dew or fine raindrops. *Kilipohe ka lehua i ka uka*, moist and of beautiful shape is the *lehua* flower of the uplands.
- kili.po'i.po'i.** 1. vi. To clap the hands with palms slightly cupped; to bring down the cupped hand. Cf. *po'i*, to pounce. 2. Same as *kīpo'ipo'i*, to cover.
- kili.pue.** vt. To embrace tightly, hug ardently. *I kēlā wā i ala a'e ai ua kanaka nei a 'ike ihola he pōhaku kā kāna e kilipue nei*, then the man awoke and saw that it was a stone he was embracing ardently.
- Kili-ua.** n. Wind associated with Wai-kāne, O'ahu. (Nak. 57.)
- kili.wehi.** vi. To reverberate, rumble. *Nā leo hurō e kiluwehi ana*, the voices shouting hurrah reverberated.
- kilo.** 1. nvt. Stargazer, reader of omens, seer, astrologer, necromancer; kind of looking glass (*rare*); to watch closely, spy, examine, look around, observe, forecast. Cf. *hākilo* and below. *Kilo aupuni*, political expert. *Kilo 'uala*, to examine sweet potatoes as in a new mound in order to thin. **ho'o.kilo.** Caus/sim. (PPN *tiro*.) 2. n. Kilo. *Eng.* 3. Also *Silo*. (*Cap.*) n. Shiloh. (Heb. *shiloh*.) (Kin. 49.10 in the KJV, not translated in RSV.)
- kilo. ho'o.kilo.** Thin, wasted. Also *hōkilo*.
- kīloa.** vt. To put away for safekeeping, as bundles on a shelf. *Rare.*
- kilo.hana.** 1. nvs. Name of the outside, decorated sheet of tapa in the *ku'inakapa*, bed coverings; the four inner layers were white, contrasting with the decorated *kilo-hana*. Hence extended meanings: best, superior, excellent. *He ali'i ke aloha, he kilohana e pa'a ai* (saying), love is like a chief, the best prize to hold fast to. 2. n. Hillock, heap, lookout, top, view out, high point (*kilo* + *-hana*, nominalizer). (Probably PPN *tirofanga*; cf. Tongan *siofi, siofia* and Samoan *tilofia*.)
- kilo he'e.** nv. One who fishes for octopus by looking through a glass-bottomed box; formerly the *kilo he'e* spit chewed *kukui* nut on the sea to calm the water, then examined (*kilo*) the sea bottom for octopus; to fish thus. Also *'ōkilo he'e*.
- kilohi.** vt. To glance, gaze, as into a mirror (*kilo* + *hi*, transitivizer). (PPN *tirofi*.)
- kilo.hia.** Pas/imp. of *kilo*. (PPN *tirofia*.)
- kilo hō.kū.** nv. Astrologer, astronomer, astronomy; to observe and study the stars.
- kilo.** vt. To throw away, discard, throw. **ho'o.kilo.** To feign throwing; to cause to throw; to attract someone's
