

- kole nuku heu.** n. Variety of the fish *kole*, said to have fine hairlike growths around the mouth. *Lit.*, *kole* with hairy mouth.
- kolepa, golepa.** n. Golf (the game). *Eng.*
- kole.pana, korebana.** Corban. (Mar. 7.11.) *Eng.*
- kole.peia. 'alu.** vs. Old, wrinkled, bleary-eyed. *Rare.*
- koli.** 1. vt. To whittle, pare, sharpen, peel; to trim, as a lamp or the raveled edges of a dress; to shave, as hair (Oihk. 14.9). See *pa'i koli*. *Pahi koli*, carving knife. *Koli miki'ao*, to pare nails. *E lilo ana kā mākou mau keiki i ke koli kukui a maluhi*, our children are engrossed in lamp trimming until exhaustion [i.e., they are going on a night spree]. Cf. *kōkolikoli, kolikoli*. (PPN *toli*.) 2. n. Meteor.
- koli.** Same as *pā'aila*, castor bean or castor-oil plant. The name may be qualified by *ke'oke'o*, light-colored, and *'ula'ula*, red. *Ni'ihau*. See *castor bean*.
- kolia.** 1. Pas/imp. of *koli* 1. 2. Pas/imp. of *kō*, to draw. *Hukia mai ke kaula i kūpono, kolia mai ke kaula i mālo'elo'e* (chant for Ka-lā-kaua), pull the rope till it fits right, draw the rope till taut.
- koli.ana.** n. 1. Accordion. *Eng.* 2. Also *koriana*. Coriander (*Coriandrum sativum*: Neal 659). (Puk. 16.31.) *Eng.*
- koli.hana.** vs. Straight, tall. *Oki kolihana ka pali o Wai-aloha*, very straight and tall is the cliff of Wai-aloha [admiration for a tall, well-formed person].
- koli'i.** 1. n. A native lobelia shrub (*Trematolobelia macrostachys*) to 1.8 m high, with several horizontal branches at the top when in flower, each branch bearing a long cluster of pink flowers, each flower 5 cm long; the narrow leaves to 30 by 2.5 cm. 2. vi. To disappear gradually, as a ship on the horizon; to evaporate; to be barely visible, as the sun's first rays. 3. n. *Luakini* dedication prayer. Also *koli'i maomao* (Kam. 64:27).
- kō.li.ko.** Same as *kōlikoliko*.
- koli.koli.** Redup. of *koli* 1.
- kō.li.ko.li.ko.** 1. vs. Swollen, enlarged, fat, greasy. 2. n. Young *wauke*, bark.
- koli.kukui.** n. A variety of domesticated 'ilima with bronze-red flowers. *Lit.*, *kukui* candle.
- kolila, gorila.** n. Gorilla. *Eng.*
- kō.iti.ā.** vs. Thin, bony. Cf. *itiā*, thin. *Kōitiā maila ke kino a hākau noho'i nā iwi*, the body was so thin that the bones stood out.
- kō.lile.lile.** vi. To glisten, sparkle, glitter.
- kolili.** 1. vi. To flutter, as a flag; to wag, as a dog's tail. Also *konini*. See *hula kolili*. *ho'o.kolili*. To flutter, wave. 2. n. An 'ilima rod, a fathom or so long, tipped with feathers and used as a wand in the 'ume game. 3. To rush out, as pent-up water; to flow swiftly, leak. (And.)
- kō.iti.iti.** vi. Dwindling, diminishing, as of water in a stream or pool, or of something in the distance, or of pain; convalescing.
- kō.iti.iti.** Same as *'oliliko*, to sparkle.
- kō.li.lili.** vi. To vibrate, as heat. Cf. *hulili*.
- koli.li'u.** Same as *kōli'uli'u*.
- koli.neka, korineta.** Var. of *koleneka*.
- kō.li'u.** Same as *kōli'uli'u*.
- kō.li'u.li'u.** vs. Dim, obscure, indistinct, as a distant object or sound. *Ka hānau 'ana ame ka wā kōli'uli'u o kō Ka-welo noho 'ana* (FS 33), the birth and dim distant time of Ka-welo's life. *'Ike kōli'uli'u*, to see faintly, to have slight knowledge.
- kolo.** 1. vi. To creep, crawl; to move along, as a gentle breeze or shower; to walk bent over as in respect to a chief or as indicative of humility. Cf. *kolo manu* and ex., *ua* 1. *Ahe kolo*, gentle-moving breeze. *Koa kolo*, a sprawling *koa* tree. *ho'o.kolo*. To cause to creep, crawl; to follow a trail, track, clue; to trace to a source. Cf. *ho'okolokolo*. (PPN *-tolo*.) 2. vt. To pull, tow, drag, to pull a seine. *Moku kolo*, tugboat. 3. n. Wagon tongue or shafts. Also *kolo ka'a*. 4. vi. To grumble. 5. interj. Call to fowl, pigs. *Kolo, kolo, kolo!* Come, come, come! 6. Var. of *kono* 2, to attract birds. 7. Also *koro*. Biblical liquid measure, about 420 pints.
- koloa.** n. Hawaiian duck (*Anas wyvilliana*). Also *koloa maoli*, native *koloa*, to distinguish it from migratory or introduced ducks, also called *koloa*. Formerly on all main islands except Lā-na'i and Ka-ho'olawe; in 1976 common only on Kaua'i; birds raised in captivity and released have been seen on O'ahu and Hawai'i; considered endangered in 1978. *Koloa* birds protected a legendary blind giant, Ima-i-ka-lani, and quacked to warn him from which side he might expect an attack (FS 169). (PPN *toloa*.)
- kō.loa.** 1. n. Long cane with a crook. 2. vi. To make a prolonged sound, roar. *'O Puna ia o ke kai kōloa i ka ulu hala*, this is Puna where the sea ever roars in the pandanus groves.
- koloa maoli.** See *koloa*.
- koloa māpu.** n. Pintail duck (*Anas acuta*), a common migrant to the Hawaiian Islands. *Lit.*, wind-blown duck.
- koloa mohā.** n. Shoveler or spoonbill (*Anas clypeata*), a migrant. *Lit.*, bright duck (said to be named for the dark glossy green head of the male).
- Kolo-'ā.pu'u.pu'u.** n. Name of a wind usually accompanied by rain, common at Wai-mea, Hawai'i. *Lit.*, rough creep.
- kolo.au.** vi. To stretch out; stretched out, long and thin. *Rare.*
- kolo.hala.** Pheasant (*Phasianus colchicus torquatus*), the showy ring-necked pheasant. *Lit.*, creep go on.
- kolohe.** nvi. Mischievous, naughty, unethical or unprincipled in any way, illegal, fraudulent, destructive; rascal, mischief-maker, scamp, rogue, prankster, comic, roughhouse, crook, vandal, lecher; to act in this fashion, misbehave, cheat, transgress, tamper; to violate, as a taboo. *Kolohe wale*, to be mischievous for no particular reason; to trifle. *Nānā 'ia ke kupu, ka 'eu, ke kolohe o kai*, look at the upstart, rascal, and mischief-maker of the sea area. *Moekolohe*, adultery. *Hihia waiwai kolohe*, law suit or case involving smuggling; *lit.*, case for dishonest goods. *Kō lāua hui kolohe 'ana*, their adulterous union. *Waiwai loa'a ma ke kolohe*, ill-gotten gains. *ho'o.kolohe*. To do mischief, play pranks, etc.; to cause to be mischievous; to disturb, annoy; to do amusing things to create laughter; funny, humorous, comical, mischievous. *Ho'okolohē noho'i kāna hīmeni 'ana*, he sings in such an amusing manner.
- kolo.hia.** Pas/imp. of *kolo* 1, 2, 4.
- koloka.** n. Cloak, cape. *Eng.*
- kolo ka'a.** See *kolo* 3.
- kolo.kō.** n. Croquet. *Eng.*
- kolo.kio.** nvt. Method of catching birds by means of a long stick with a crosspiece at the end; flowers were attached and smeared with sticky juice to which the birds stuck. The birds were first attracted by whistling. A bird catcher; to catch thus. *Lit.*, creep whistle.
- kolo.kolo.** 1. Redup. of *kolo* 1; to track down, investigate, seek evidence. *ho'o.kolo.kolo*. To try in court, judge, investigate; judiciary; trial. *Ho'okolokolo moku*, admiralty cases. See *hale ho'okolokolo*. (PPN *tolotolo*.) 2. n. Any creeping vine. 3. vi. To gobble, rumble, grumble, scold. 4. See *'ānapanapa* 2.
- kolo.kolo.hai.** vs. Humble, modest, thoughtful, kind. Cf. *kolokolo*, creeping, as in respect to a chief, and *akahai*, modest. *Rare.*
- kolo.kolo kaha.kai.** n. The beach vitex (*Vitex ovata*), distributed from Hawai'i west to Japan and India, an aromatic, prostrate beach shrub, with downy, ovate leaves and small, blue, clustered flowers. (Neal 728.) *Lit.*, beach creeper. Also *mānawanawa, pōhinahina, pōlinalina*.
- kolo.kolo.kio.** Redup. of *kolokio*.
- kolo.kolo kua.hiwi.** n. Two loosestrifes (*Lysimachia daphnoides, L. hillebrandii*), small native shrubs with purplish flowers, the branches densely covered with narrow, pointed leaves. *L. daphnoides* is confined to the high bogs of Kaua'i. *Lit.*, mountain creeper. Also *kolekole lehua*. Cf. *pua hekili*.
- kolo.kolo lehua.** Same as *kolokolo kuahiwi*.
