

kolo.kolo.nahe. Redup. of *kolonahe*.

kolo.kolo.pā. n. Tiny stage of the *kāmū*, *weke*, and other goatfish; other stages are 'āhuluhulu, *kāmū a'e*, and *kāmū*. Also *mākolokolopā*.

kolo.lani. vi. To go away silently. *Niau kololani ka helena*, silently, quickly departed. *Ka uahi kololani*, the smoke that wisps away.

kolo.lio. 1. Same as *kokololio*, gust. **ho'o.kolo.lio.** Caus/sim. 2. n. Wind associated with Moloa'a, Kāua'i (For. 5:97) and Kī-pahulu, Maui (Nak. 68).

-kololohe. ho'o.kolo.lohe. To delay maliciously, to loiter sullenly, to dillydally in order to annoy; to not cooperate, sulk.

kolo.lū. vi. Soft, weak and helpless, as a newborn baby or newly hatched bird; soft and not yet hardened, as a new growth of bone; easily influenced and impressed, as an unstable person.

kolo manu. Var. of *kono manu*. Cf. 'auli'i *kolo manu*, daintiness that attracts birds.

kolo.mēki. n. Third mate on a ship; the officer next to the second mate. *Eng.*

kolo.moku. nv. Tugboat; to tow a ship.

kolo.mona. n. 1. A native shrub (*Cassia gaudichaudii*) with greenish-yellow flowers and thin flat pods. (Neal 427.) *Eng.* Also *kalamona*. 2. A similar shrub (*Cassia surattensis* syn. *C. glauca*), with an Asian to Australian distribution, naturalized in Hawai'i and also grown ornamentally, with yellow flowers and flat pods. (Neal 427.) Also *kalamona*. 3. A weedy shrub (*Cassia floribunda* syn. *C. laevigata*), from tropic America, with yellow flowers and cylindrical pods. (Neal 425.) Also *kalamona*. 4. *Crotalaria incana*, *C. pallida*, *C. spectabilis* on Ni'ihau. 5. Name listed by Hillebrand for *Mezoneuron kavaense*. See *uhiuhi*. 6. (*Cap.*) Also *Solomon*. *Eng.*

kolona. n. 1. Colon. *Eng.* 2. Also *korona*. Crown, rosary. *Eng.* Cf. *lei kolona*. *Pule kolona*, prayer with beads. 3. Solon. *Eng.*

kolo.nahe. vi. Gentle, pleasant breeze; gentle, mild; softly blowing. *Lit.*, gentle creeping.

kolone. n. Column, as military. *Eng.* See ex., *pili 1*.

kolo.nelo, koronero. n. Coroner (used with *kiure*, jury). *Eng.*

koloni.ala. vs. Colonial. *Eng.*

-kolono. ho'o.kolono. To pretend not to hear, to feign deafness; indifferent.

kolo.nuha. Same as *kananuha*. *Rare.* **ho'o.kolo.nuha.** Same as *ho'okananuha*.

kolo.pā. 1. vi. To fight, scream, kick, as children in tantrums; to jerk away from, as a runaway horse; to bolt. 2. n. Crowbar. *Eng.* 'A'ole *kēnā he kolopā* (song), that by you is not a crowbar.

kolo.pao. n. A bird (no data).

kolo.pē'e. vi. To skulk along.

kolo.poma. n. Chloroform. *Eng.*

kolo.pū. vs. Well-proportioned, of a large person whose flesh is evenly distributed; also said of a long *koa* tree trunk that grows straight without branching.

kolo.pua. vs. Fragrant, as air laden with the perfume of flowers, sometimes said of the breath. *Lit.*, creeping flowers. *Ua hala ku'u lehua, aia i Ko'oko'olau i ka nae kolopua*, my *lehua* blossom is gone to Ko'oko'olau to breathe perfume-laden air.

Kolo-pu'e.pu'e. n. Wind name.

kolo.pupū. vs. Old, infirm, of an aged person bent with age. *Lit.*, creep crouched.

kolo.'u'a. vs. Old, worn-out, of an old hag or old sow. Cf. 'u'a, worn, faded.

kolo.waka. n. Soda water. *Eng.*

kolo.walu. n. Name of a law in the time of Kū-ali'i safeguarding the rights of commoners (For. 4:433.)

kolū. num. Three, third. (Gram. 10.3.) *Manawakolu*, eternal. (PPN *tolu*.)

kolū. n. 1. Glue. *Eng.* 2. A thorny, weedy shrub (*Acacia farnesiana*), widespread in the tropics. It is a legume with finely divided leaves and fragrant, round,

orange flower heads, used in the perfume industry. The bark yields a gum for glue; sometimes spelled *klu*. (Neal 406.) 3. Bluing used in washing clothes. *Eng.* 4. Same as 'iniko, indigo plant, used for bluing. 5. Screw. *Eng.*

kō.lū. nvi. To scatter; to drop, as bombs; bombing.

kō.lui.lui. n. Continued ringing sound. *Rare.*

kolū.kahi. n. Trinity.

Kolū.kahi Hemo.lele. n. Holy Trinity.

kolū.keiki. n. Gauge screws.

kolū.keline, golukerine. n. Glycerine. *Eng.*

kō.lulu. vt. To defend, shield, ward off. *Rare.* Cf. *pālulu*.

Kom. Abbreviation for *komohana*, west.

koma. n. Comma. *Eng.*

kō.maka. See *nihokōmaka*, a fish.

komako. n. Tomato (generally called 'ōhi'a or 'ōhi'a lomi). *Eng.*

koma.koa, komadora. n. Commodore. *Eng.*

kō mā.kou. poss. Our, ours (o-form, plural exclusive; Gram. 8.4, 9.6). (PNP *to'o matou*, PEP *too matou*.)

koma luna. n. Apostrophe, glottal stop. *Lit.*, comma (*Eng.*) above.

komana. n. Stone, as used with octopus lures. *Rare.*

kō mā.ua. poss. Our, ours (o-form, dual exclusive; Gram. 8.4, 9.6). (PNP *to'o maaua*, PCP *too maaua*.)

kome. n. Papyrus (RSV), bulrush (KJV). (Isa. 18.2.) (Heb. *gome*.)

komē.'ula.'ula. A variety of sweet potato.

kōmi. vt. To press, bear down, rub, as in massage; to pull taut, as a fishline. Cf. *kaomi*.

kō.mike, komite. n. Committee, committee member. *Eng.* *Kōkime mau*, standing or permanent committee.

Kōmike kūikawā, ad hoc committee.

kō.mike hui. n. Joint committee.

kō.mike komo 'ā.pana. n. Visiting committee.

kō.mike ola. n. Welfare committee.

kō.mike wae. n. Select committee.

komi.kina, komisina. nvt. Commissioner, commission; to commission. *Ali'i koa i komikina 'ia*, commissioned officer. *Uku komikina*, commission (pay).

Komi.kina Ho'o.nā 'Āina. n. Commissioners to Quiet Land Titles, a board set up by Ka-mehameha III to settle land claims; it served between 1846 and 1855 and heard more than 11,000 claims (Indices, VII-VIII).

komi.kina kū.i.ka.wā. n. Acting commissioner.

komi.kina palena 'āina. n. Land boundary commission or commissioner.

komi.kiona, komisiona. n. Commissioner.

kōmi.kōmi. Redup. of *kōmi*.

Komi.nika, Dominika. nvs. Dominican, dominical. *Eng.*

Komi.nika o ka 'Eha. n. Passion Sunday. (Catholic term.)

Komi.nika o nā Lā.lā Lā.'au. n. Palm Sunday. (Catholic term.) *Lit.*, dominical of the tree branches.

komo. 1. nvt, vs. To enter, go into, penetrate, include; to join, as a class or organization; to sink, as a heavily laden canoe; to entertain or feel, as an emotion; entered, filled, included; entrance. (Gram. 4.5.) *Komo 'ana*, access, admission, entry, entrance. *Haumana komo hou*, freshman, new pupil. 'Aha'aina *komo*, initiation feast. *Komo mai!* Come in, welcome! *Mele komo*, welcoming song. *Komo mai e 'ai*, come in and eat. *Komo maila ka huhū*, filled with wrath. *Ua komo ka wa'a*, the canoe is filled [as with fish]. *Komo i ka hale*, enter the house. *E komo no ku'u ho'oilina ia 'Ilio*, including for my heirs this dog. *Komo 'ole ka wai*, waterproof. *E nānā 'oe i kō lākou komo 'ana . . . a 'ike 'oe ua pau loa i ke komo . . .* (FS 111), watch them coming in . . . and when you see they are all in . . .

ho'o.komo. To insert, put or let in, enter, pack, penetrate, import, sink into, deposit, install, admit. See *niho ho'okomo*. *Ho'okomo waiwai ho'opae mai*, entry of goods. *Ho'okomo makani, ho'okomo ea*, to ventilate. *Ho'okomo i ke kālā i ka panakō*, deposit money
