

- Kū Kana.loa.** v. To pray to the god Kanaloa, as on the *Kaloa* days of the month.
- kū.kana.wao.** n. General name for weeds. *Rare. Lit.*, resembling the *kanawao*, wild taro.
- kukane.** n. A rough lemon (*Citrus limonia*), liked for the fragrance of the skin, but too sour to eat. (Neal 482.) *Lit.*, having the nature of the *kane* skin fungus.
- kū.kāne.** nvs. Male. *He mau kākāne kēia mau akua*, these gods are male. (Kep. 11.)
- kū.kanono.** vs. Excessive, more than usual. *Kūkanono ka wela a ka lā*, the heat of the sun is excessive.
- kū.kapihe.** n. 1. Lamentation. *Lit.*, the wail arises. 2. A strong purge made from bark of the shrub called *koko* and sap of the green *kukui* nut; it was administered only as a last resort and often resulted in death.
- kū.kapu.** nvs. Chastity; chaste; taboo-surrounded and unapproachable; in a state of taboo.
- kuka ua.** n. Raincoat.
- Kū-kaua-kāhi.** n. Said to be an old name for the gods Kāne, Kū, and Lono. The theory of a trinity is believed due to remaking of Hawaiian legends by Kepelino, Kamakau, and Fornander to conform to the Bible. See Barrère 1969.
- kū.kaula.** n. Deep-water fishing with hook and line; fishing grounds at about 80 fathoms depth (Kam. 76:75).
- kū.kau.lani.** vs. With great care, with esteem, in chiefly fashion.
- kuka waniki.** n. Oilskin coat. *Lit.*, varnished coat.
- kuka.wēke.** n. Raincoat (Perhaps *Eng.*, coat and [sou]wester.)
- kū.kawowo.** 1. vt. To care for young plants or seedlings. 2. vi. To spread, reach a goal (of a sorcerer's prayer). 3. vi. To rush or gurgle, as water. *Rare.*
- kuke.** 1. vt. To nudge, push, jostle. Cf. *kuke kū. ho'o.kuke.* To shoo, drive off, banish, expel, oust, evict, eject. (PEP *tute.*) 2. n. Thin type of adze (2.5 or 4 cm wide), as used for finer work in handicraft. Also *lipi kuke.* 3. nvt. Cook; to cook. *Eng.* 4. nvi. Customs, duty; to be on duty or watch (Kel. 115). *Eng. Hale kuke*, customhouse. *Uku i nā kuke*, pay duties. 5. Also **dukē.** n. Duke. *Eng. Duke wahine*, duchess.
- kuke.awa.** n. Customhouse inspector, customs.
- kuke awa.** n. Harbor duty or tax.
- kū.kēhu.** Var. spelling of *kū ke ehu*; see *'ehu 1.*
- kukeke, dukese.** n. 1. Duchess. *Eng.* 2. Also *Tusede. (Cap.) Tuesday. Eng. Rare.*
- kuke kū.** vi. To push with elbows and shoulders, as forcing a way through a crowd; to blow violently, as wind, to bluster, rage, as waves or storm.
- kuke.kuke.** Redup. of *kuke 1.* (PCP *tutetute.*)
- kū.kele.** 1. vs, vi. Muddy, slippery; to slip, slide, as in mud. 2. vt. To sail, as a boat.
- kuke wai.wai.** n. Duty, tariff.
- kuki.** See *mea 'ono kuki*, cookie. *Eng.*
- kū.kia.** vi. Firm, steady, steadfast.
- kū.kī.helei.** vi. To straddle, stand with legs far apart.
- kū.kila.** Similar to *kūkilakila.*
- kū.kila.kila.** vs. Majestic.
- kukima, dudima.** n. 1. Mandrake (Mele 7.13.) (Heb. *dudha'im.*) 2. Also **dukima.** Bagpipe (RSV), dulcimer (KJV). (Dan. 3.5.) (*Eng.*)
- kū.kini.** 1. nvi. Runner, swift messenger, as employed by old chiefs, with a premium on their speed; to run swiftly, as of a messenger; to race. 2. vi. Close together, in great numbers, as plants. 3. n. Cushion. *Eng.*
- kū.kini.kini.** Redup. of *kūkini 2*; grouped together.
- kū.ki'o.** n. Small pool of water. *Lit.*, standing pool.
- kuko.** nvt. Strong desire, whether good or bad; lust, compulsion; to lust, desire; to think about, as approaching death (GP 56). *'Ano kuko*, of a lusty nature. *Kuko hewa, kuko 'ino, piha kuko*, lustful, lecherous, lewd, amorous, randy, "horny". *Kuko 'umi 'ole* (2 Tim. 3.3), unrestrained desire, incontinence. *Kuko makapehu*, gluttonous desire. *Nui ko'u kuko e loa'a ia'u ka na'auao*, I have much ambition to attain education. (PCP *tuto.*)
- kū.koa'ē.** n. 1. Temple for purification ceremonies (Malo 151-2, Emerson note 156), for prayers for food (Malo 188). *Kūkoa'e a hāwai*, ceremonial blessing of a stream so that water may continue flowing. 2. (*Cap.*) Name of a god appealed to in *'anā'anā*, evil sorcery.
- kuko 'aihue.** n. Kleptomaniac.
- kuko.hia.** Pas/imp. of *kuko.*
- Kū Kolu.** n. Name of the fifth day in the lunar month. Cf. *Kā Kahi, Kū Lua, Kū Pau.*
- kuko.molea, sukomorea.** n. Sycamore tree. (Isa. 9.10.) (*Gr. sycomorea.*)
- kū.kona.** vs. Unfriendly, cross, sullen. Cf. *konā*, haughty; *mākonā*, malevolent.
- kū.kona.kona.** Redup. of *kūkona.*
- kū.konu.konu.** vs. Excessive, overmuch, deep, profound, serious. *Ua 'ike kūkonukonu i nā 'ano 'ōlelo like 'ole*, having a profound knowledge of different languages. *He 'eha kūkonukonu ma ke po'o*, a serious head injury.
- kuku.** 1. vt. To beat, as tapa. (PPN *tutu.*) 2. n. Beam, as of a house; stick, as used to support and distend a net. (PCP *tutu.*)
- kukū.** 1. nvs. Thorn, barb, spine, bur; barbed, thorny, prickly, burry; jabbed, pricked, hurt by a thorn. *Lā'au kukū* (1 Sam. 13.6), brambles, thicket. *Uwea kukū*, barbed wire. 2. Redup. of *kū 1*, to hit; crowded. *Kō pāpālina e kukū nei* (song), your cheeks that stand firm. *Lihilihi kukū*, eyelashes that project. *Ua hele wale a kukū kānaka*, the people are standing close together. *Kukū mai nā ho'omana'o 'ana o ke au i hala aku*, crowding memories of the past.
- kū.kū.** 1. n. (Usually pronounced *tātā.*) Granny, grand-ma, grandpa; granduncle, grandaunt; any relative or close friend of grandparent's generation (often said affectionately; apparently a new word as it has not been noted in legends and chants). 2. vi. To shake in jerks, bounce, trot, as on a horse; bumpy. *Hele kakū*, to go jerkily, by fits and starts. *Holo kakū*, to trot. **ho'o.kū.kū.** To cause to shake; to shake, bounce; uncomfortably full, as after overeating 3. nvt. Gourd beat; the gourd is thumped down on a pad three times, and on the third rise, it is slapped; to beat thus. Cf. *'ami kakū, kāhela, pā 5.* 4. n. Sea gull (RSV), cuckoo (KJV). (Oihk. 11.16.)
- kūkū. ho'o.kū.kū.** (a) Contest, game, match; to hold a contest, compete, compare; to place evenly, as canoes about to race (*ho'okūkū like i nā wa'a*). *Ho'okūkū hīmeni*, song contest. *Ka ho'okūkū 'ana*, the comparison. *Nānā a ho'okūkū*, to make comparisons. (b). To fit, as a garment; a fitting. *'O ka ho'okūkū ka malo ali'i*, fitting the royal loincloth.
- kukua.** Faint, dizzy; to faint. (AP.)
- kukua.'au.** vi. To go smoothly. *Kaua'i. E holo ka lio ā kukua'au i ua mea o ka maika'i*, the horse ran smoothly along because everything was fine.
- kū.kū.au.** n. A large grapsid crab (*Metopograpsus thukuhar*).
- kuku'ē.** n. Clubfoot; one with a twisted or deformed foot. Cf. *hapaku'e. ho'o.kuku'ē.* To imitate the walk of a clubfooted person.
- kū.kū.'ē.'ē.** Redup. of *kū'ē* and *kū'ē'ē.* (For. 6:470.)
- kukuhe.** Redup. of *kuhe 2.*
- kukuhi.** Rare var. of *ukuhi*, to pour.
- kuku.hilo.** Redup. of *kūhilo.*
- kukui.** n. 1. Candlenut tree (*Aleurites moluccana*), a large tree in the spurge family bearing nuts containing white, oily kernels which were formerly used for lights; hence the tree is a symbol of enlightenment. The nuts are still cooked for a relish (*'inamona*). The soft wood was used for canoes, and gum from the bark for painting tapa; black dye was obtained from nut coats and from roots. (Nuts were chewed and spat into the sea by men fishing with nets for parrot fish (*kākā uhu*) in order to calm the sea (FS 38-9); see ex., *pili 1*). Pol-
