

- life-time lease. *He hoʻolimalima makahiki haʻahaʻa*, minimum annual rent. **3.** vt. To massage. *Rare.* **4.** n. Prayer in which the priest gestured with his hands; the ceremony was called *hoʻopiʻi i nā ʻaha limalima*, the *limalima* assembly rises.
- lima.lima pilau.** n. One who handles dirty matter. *Fig.*, an immoral wretch, as a pimp.
- Lima-foa.** God of mirages.
- lima loa.** n. Grabber of other's property. *Lit.*, long arm.
- lima.meke.** Short for *lima ʻumeke*, index finger, so called because poi was dipped from the bowl (*ʻumeke*) with it.
- lima miki.** Index finger.
- li.mana.mana.** n. A kind of seaweed. *Lit.*, branching seaweed.
- lima.nui.** vt. To attack violently, manhandle, assault, beat, roughhouse, administer a beating, take by force.
- lima nui.** n. Big hand; thumb. Cf. *lima iki*.
- lima pili.** n. Third or ring finger.
- lima pū.hāʻu.hāʻu.** n. Puffed sleeve, as sleeve gathered at shoulder and wrist.
- lima ulu.** n. A green thumb.
- lima ʻumeke.** See *limameke*.
- lima.wī.wī.** n. A variety of sweet potato. *Lit.*, thin hand.
- limi.** Same as *lumi 1*. *Rare.*
- limi.limi.** Redup. of *limi*. *Rare.*
- li.moa.** Same as *hulu moa*, a seaweed.
- limu.** **1.** n. A general name for all kinds of plants living under water, both fresh and salt, also algae growing in any damp place in the air, as on the ground, on rocks, and on other plants; also mosses, liverworts, lichens. See saying, *hailepo. Ua ulu ka limu*, the seaweed (pubic hairs) are growing. (PPN *limu*.) **2.** vs. Tricky, deceiving, unstable (said to be named for the octopus' ability to change its color, and its waving of a tentacle to and fro like the motion of a seaweed in water). **3.** n. Wind gust. *Rare.* **4.** n. Coil, curl. *Rare.* **5.** n. Soft coral.
- limua.** vs. Overgrown or covered with moss, seaweed, or any *limu*. Cf. *ua limua*.
- limu ahi.** n. A tree moss or liverwort.
- limu ʻahu ʻula.** n. An upland moss.
- limu alolo.** n. A *limu*, *Potamogeton pectinatus* (pronunciation not certain). *Niʻihau*.
- limu ʻele.ʻele.** See *ʻeleʻele 3*.
- limu hāea.** n. A lichen (*Stereocaulon* sp.), with erect, branching stalks.
- limu hā.ʻula.** n. A red seaweed (*Martensia fragilis*).
- limu holo.ā.wai.** n. A fresh-water moss.
- limu ʻliio.** Same as *hulu ʻliio*, seaweeds.
- limu kaha.** n. A kind of liverwort.
- limu kā-kanaka.** n. A soft, sometimes gelatinous blue-green alga (*Nostoc commune*) sometimes covering the ground in the wet season as small slippery balls, especially at Hanalei, Kauaʻi. Also *limu kā-kanaka-o-Manuʻakepa*. *Lit.*, man-striking moss, so called because people are said to slip on it and fall.
- Limu-kā-kanaka-o-Maha.moku.** n. Stroke in *lua* fighting. (Also with *Ka-*.) *Lit.*, man-striking moss of Mahamoku.
- limu kala.** n. Common, long, brown seaweeds (*Sargassum echinocarpum*), their stems covered with short branches, bearing rather stiff, twisted, more or less toothed, narrow leaves. Rarely eaten raw because of toughness (though edible); used in ceremonies to drive away sickness and to obtain forgiveness (see *kala 1*). May be qualified by the terms *lau liʻiliʻi* or *lau nui*. Also *ʻākala*.
- limu kala maka piʻi.** See *kala maka piʻi*.
- limu kala.wai.** n. One or more kinds of dark green, slippery fresh-water algae (usually *Spirogyra* spp.) consisting of rows of cylindrical cells in unbranched filaments, common to fresh-water rivulets, dripping places, and taro patches. Also *pālāwai*.
- limu kale.maka.piʻi.** See *kalemakapiʻi*.
- limu kau lā.au.** n. All tiny ferns (such as filmy ferns), lichens, liverworts, and mosses growing on trees.
- limu kele.** n. Moss growing on trees in rain forests.
- limu kohu.** n. A soft, succulent, small seaweed (*Asparagopsis taxiformis*), with densely branched furry tops that are tan, pink, or dark red, arising from a creeping stem-like portion; one of the best-liked edible seaweeds, prepared in balls for market. Also *limu koko* and for some informants *lipehe, lipehu, lipeʻakai*.
- limu koko.** n. Same as *limu kohu*. *Lit.*, blood seaweed.
- limu lana.** n. Floating seaweed. *Fig.*, a drifter, vagabond.
- limu.limu.** Redup. of *limu 2-4*.
- limu loloa.** n. **1.** Several species of edible red seaweeds (*Gelidium*), cylindrical or flattened, more or less pinnately branched, texture firm and smooth. Also *ʻāna-panapa, ʻēkahakaha, kūwelu*. **2.** A kind of edible red seaweed (*Pterocladia capillacea*), like **1** above but more finely divided.
- limu lū.ʻau.** n. A red seaweed (*Porphyra* sp.), growing in the winter on boulders in exposed places, with delicate, thin blades appearing in groups. Best known on Kauaʻi, but known on all the major islands. Also *paheʻe* or *paheʻeheʻe*.
- limu-make-o-Hāna.** n. A coelenterate (*Palythoa* sp.) containing a toxin, reported as deadly poisonous at Hāna, Maui. Also *limu-make-o-Muʻolea*.
- limu-mā.kole-maka-ʻō.piʻi.** Same as *mākole mākōpiʻi*, a moss.
- limu manau.ea.** See *manaua*.
- limu moa.** Same as *hulu moa*, a seaweed.
- limu nehe.** Same as *limu kalawai*.
- limu paʻa.kai.** n. *Limu* salted for indefinite storage without refrigeration. On Maui, usually *limu lipea*. See *lipeʻakai*.
- limu pae.** n. Landed seaweed, said of a newcomer or in a bad sense of a drifter, vagabond, or *kauā* outcast.
- limu pā.laha.laha.** Same as *pālalahala 2*.
- limu pepe.ao.** Same as *lipepeiao*.
- limu-pepe-o-Hina.** Same as *lepe-o-Hina*, a seaweed.
- limu ua.ua loli.** Same as *ʻēkahakaha 2*, a seaweed.
- limu ʻula.ʻula.** n. A red seaweed.
- lina.** **1.** vs. Soft; adhesive, sticky, clayey, gummy, tenacious; glutinous, as taro of poor quality. Cf. *nina, papalina, ʻālika, ʻālina*. **2.** n. Scar. Cf. *ʻālina. hoʻo.lina*. To scar. **3.** n. Ring (*Eng.*), hoop, race track. *Kuʻu lio kakele lina poepoe* (song), my racing horse [in the] round track.
- lina.lina.** Redup. of *lina 1, 2*.
- lineka.** n. Lynx. *Eng.*
- lino.** **1.** vs. Bright, shiny, shining with splendor, dazzling, brilliant. Cf. *linohau*. **2.** vt. To weave, twist, braid, tie. *ʻAʻohe ʻoe e pakele aku, ua lino ʻia i ka lino pāwalu* (song), you won't escape, you are bound with an eight-strand tie. **3.** Same as *linolino 2*. (PPN *lingo*.) **4.** vs. Taut.
- linoa.** Pas/imp. of *lino 2*. *Ua linoa ʻia a paʻa*, tied firmly.
- lino.hau.** vs. Dressed to perfection, beautifully decorated, ornamented. *Kū kilakila i ka noe, linohau i ka mālie* (song), standing majestic in the mist, beautifully attired in the calm.
- lino.kaipa, linotaipa.** n. Linotype. *Eng.*
- linole.uma.** n. Linoleum. *Eng.*
- lino.lino.** **1.** Redup. of *lino 1, 2*. **2.** vs. Calm, unruffled. (PPN *lingolino*; see *malino*.)
- linu.** vs. Tight-fisted, ungenerous, heartless, ungracious. *Rare.*
- lio.** **1.** n. Horse (perhaps derived from *lio 2*, or, more likely, a shortening of *ʻliio*, formerly a generic name for quadrupeds: Gram. 2.9.2). *Kona lio*, his horse. *Holo lio, kau lio*, to ride horseback. **2.** vs. Tight, taut, as a rope, or of hair or horse's ears pulled back tightly. Cf. *lilio*. **3.** n. Rope tied to the bottom of a large bag net.
- liʻo.** **1.** n. Same as *ʻaʻo*, a sea bird. **2.** Same as *liʻoliʻo 2*, the sound made by the *liʻo* (*ʻaʻo*) bird.
- li.ʻō.** vs. To act wild, as a frightened animal; to open the eyes wide in terror; to quiver, leap away, shy, as a
