

**lololo**. vs. 1. Intelligent, brilliant; deep thinking. 2. Tasty, rich, fat, as marrow. *Rare*. (PNP *lololo*.)  
**lolo.loa**. Intensive of *loloa* 1.  
**lolo.lohe**. Redup. and intensifier of *lohe*, to hear (said of a very keen ear). See ex., 'a'a 1.  
**lō.lolo.hua**. Redup. of *lolohua*.  
**lolo.mū**. vs. Unsuccessful, unlucky. *Rare*.  
**lolo.niu**. n. Canoe hull made of coconut log. *Rare*.  
**lolo niu**. n. Embryonic sponge in a coconut; coconut sheath. Cf. *haku* 3, *iho* 2. *Wa'a lolo niu*, coconut sheath used as a toy canoe.  
**lolo.pai.aa**. Same as *lolopaiōea*.  
**lolo.pai.ōea**. vs. Tall, spindly, thin.  
**lolo.pili**. n. Name of a design used on Ni'ihau mats.  
**lolo.pio**. vi. To die calmly and easily. (For. 6:297.)  
**lolo po'o**. n. Brain. *Lit.*, head brain.  
**lolo.pua**. n. Zenith. *Eia lā i ka lolopua o ka lani*, here is the zenith of the heavens.  
**lolo'u**. Redup. of *lo'u*.  
**lolo uila**. n. Computer. *Lit.*, electric brain.  
**lolo wa'a**. nv. Canoe-launching ceremony; to perform the ceremony. See *lolo* 2.  
**loma**. 1. vs. Lazy, indolent, slow, idle. Cf. *kāloma*. (PNP *loma*.) 2. (*Cap.*) nvs. Rome; Roman. *Eng.*  
**loma.loma**. Redup. of *loma* 1. See ex., *halalē*.  
**lomi**. vt. To rub, press, squeeze, crush, mash fine, knead, massage, rub out; to work in and out, as claws of a contented cat. *Kāmano lomi*, i'a lomi, salmon or fish, usually raw, worked with the fingers and mixed with onions and seasoned. *Kanaka lomi*, masseur, masseuse. (PPN *lomi*.)  
**lomia**. Pas/imp. of *lomi*. *Pēpē lomina e ka Inu-wai*, crushed and mashed by the water-drinking wind [as grass, but figuratively of lovers]. (PPN *lomina*.)  
**lō.milo**. nvt. To spin with fingers; to twist, as thread in making rope or cord. Cf. *milo*, to twist.  
**lomi.lomi**. Redup. of *lomi*; masseur, masseuse. (PPN *lomilomi*.)  
**lona**. 1. n. Block of wood used to support a canoe out of water. Also 'aki. 2. Useless, vain. (And.) 3. Straight, direct. (And.)  
**lona.lona**. 1. Var. of *nonanona*, ant, gnat. 2. Var. of *nonanona*, many. *Lonalona nā pu'u*, there are many, many hills.  
**loni.kū, lonitu**. n. Longitude. *Eng.*  
**lono**. n. 1. News, report, tidings, remembrance (Kanl. 32.26), rumor (sometimes formerly preceded by *ke*). *Ku'i ka lono*, the news spread. **ho'o.lono**. To listen, hear, obey; obedient, attentive. *Ku'i ka lono i Pele-kane*, ho'olono ke kuini o Palani (song), the news spread to England, the queen of France heard. (PPN *rongo*.) 2. (*Cap.*) One of the four major gods brought from Kahiki. 3. (*Cap.*) The 28th day of the lunar month. (PEP *Longo*.) 4. (*Cap.*) Name of a star.  
**lono.ā, lonowā**. nvt. Hearsay, rumor, gossip; to keep hearing, as rumor. Also *nonoā*.  
**lono.hi'i**. vi. To cry to be carried, of an infant carried too much; to fret in a spoiled way to be carried. *Lit.*, hear carry. *Mai hi'i mau 'oukou o lonohi'i kēia keiki*, don't keep carrying this child or he'll want to be carried always.  
**lono honua**. vt. To hear surprising or sudden news.  
**lono.kū**. On the back; backward. (AP.)  
**lono.lau**. n. Large-sized gourd. Also *nonolau*.  
**lono.lono**. Redup. of *lono* 1. **ho'o.lono.lono**. Redup. of *ho'olono*. (PPN *rongorongo*.)  
**lono.lono.ā**. Redup. of *lonoā*.  
**lono.lupe**. n. A banner held up by two staffs. *Rare*.  
**lono.maka.ihe**. n. Art of spear throwing, named for a god. *Ua a'o anei 'oe i ka lonomakaihe?* Have you learned the art of spear throwing?  
**Lono-makua**. A legendary fire guardian and the name of the *makahiki* image.  
**lono.mea**. n. A native tree (*Sapindus oahuensis*), to 10 m high, with ovate leaves 10 by 20 and 5 by 13 cm; it is found only on O'ahu and Kaua'i. *Kaua'i*. On O'ahu it is called *kaulu*. (Neal 533-4.) Also *āulu* 5.

**lono.papa**. 1. nvs. News spread far and wide; news so well bruited that everyone has heard repeatedly; spread far, of news. 2. n. Name of an unknown disease or fever.  
**lono.pū.hā**. n. 1. Art of healing, especially of wounds, abscesses. *A'o i ka lonopūhā*, learn the healing art. 2. A class of heiau, probably for healing.  
**lono.wā**. See *lonoā*.  
**lonu**. nvt. Cheat, liar, rogue; to cheat, lie. *Rare*.  
**lō.nū**. vs. To swell up, as with disease. Cf. *ōnū*.  
**lo'o.hia**. vs. Possessed, overwhelmed, overcome, stricken; to befall, happen. See ex., *hu'ahu'a* 1. *Ua lo'ohia i ka 'uhane 'ino*, possessed by an evil spirit. *Lo'ohia i ka nāwaliwali*, lo'ohia i ke kaumaha, overcome by weakness, overwhelmed by grief. *Ua lo'ohia mai lākou i kēia mau mea* (1 Kor. 10.11), these things happened to them. (PCP *roko(f,s)ia*.)  
**lō.'ohu**. vi. To buck, of a horse. *Kaua'i*.  
**lo'o.kahi**. *Rare* var. of *lōkahi*.  
**lō.pā**. 1. nvs. One who farms under a tenant (*hoa 'aina*), peasant, farmer; shiftless. See *naunau* 1 for an insulting epithet. *Lōpā iki hele wale*, little peasant who goes alone. *Lōpā ho'opili wale*, wretch entirely dependent on others for livelihood. *Lōpā kua kea*, lazy lōpā with untanned [*lit.*, white] back. *E aho nō ke kūmakahiki i kō ka 'auana wale ā ho'opili mea 'ai paha ā noho lōpā wale iho nō*, it is better to have a yearly contract [as hired hand] than to vagabond and be dependent for food and live just as a shiftless tenant. (PCP *loopaa*.) 2. An uncertain term in the phrase *ho'āo lōpā*, marriage with a relative 24 generations removed. (For. 6:268.)  
**lō.pā.lau.'eka**. n. Worthless, shiftless squatter (contraction of *lōpā pālau'eka*, worthless lōpā).  
**lopi, ropi**. n. Thread. (*Eng.*, rope.) (Lunk. 16.12.)  
**lopi ho'o.holo.holo**. n. Basting thread.  
**lopi hulu.hulu**. n. Worst thread, yarn.  
**lopi humu.lau**. n. Embroidery thread.  
**lopi kā.holo**. n. Basting thread.  
**lopinē**. n. Robin. *Eng.*  
**lō.pī'o**. vi. To bend over, as one nodding, sleeping.  
**lopu**. n. Consecrated adze, as used in carving.  
**lou**. 1. nvi. Hook; to hook, to fasten with a hook; to hook off, as with the *lou* pole. *Lou me ke alapi'i*, hook and ladder. *Lou ka i'a*, the fish is hooked. *Lou ka mana'o*, thoughts are hooked, as of two persons thinking of each other. **ho'o.lou**. To hook, catch with a hook; to put on a hook, as bait. *'O ka limu kala ka maunu e ho'olou ai i ka makau* (FS 143), *kala* (seaweed) was the bait placed on the hook. 2. nvi. Very long fruit-plucking pole, with short sticks lashed obliquely near the end for plucking, as for breadfruit; to pluck. (PPN *lohu*.) 3. n. Pain in the side, stitch. 4. Same as *louulu*. 5. n. Tache, clasp (Puk. 26.6).  
**lo'u**. vi. To overhang, as a cliff; to bend over, as with grief or laughter; bent over, as a laden branch. Cf. *ha'alo'u*, *lo'u pali*. *Ko'i lo'u*, adze on bent haft. **ho'o.lo'u**. Caus/sim.; to droop. (Perhaps PPN *loku*.)  
**loua**. 1. Pas/imp. of *lou* 1. *Loua mai*, hook and bring. **ho'o.loua**. Caus/sim. *Rare*. 2. Var. of *loua*. *Loua 'ole aku ka hana*, much work to be done.  
**lō.uhu**. Same as *uhu*, to bolt, strain. *Rare*.  
**lou.lou**. 1. Redup. of *lou* 1; to link or hook together. (PPN *lohulohu*.) 2. n. Finger-pulling contest: two players hook fingers and see who can keep his finger hooked the longest.  
**lo'u.lo'u**. Redup. of *lo'u*. (Perhaps PPN *loku*.)  
**loulu**. n. 1. All species of native fan palms (*Pritchardia*). (Neal 97-9.) Hats are plaited of its leaves bleached white. Also *noulu*. Cf. *hāwane*. 2. Umbrella, so called because the *loulu* palm leaf was formerly used as protection from rain or sun. 3. *Alutera monoceros*, a fish, perhaps so called because its greenish-white skin resembled the *loulu* palm; used in sorcery to cause death because the name contains the word *lou*, to hook. 4. Type of heiau said to be built for prevention of epidemics, famine, destruction; long rituals dedicating a temple including *kauila nui*, fetching of the 'ōhi'a
