

mā.kā'i.ki'e.ki'e. n. High sheriff.
Māka-iki-o-Lea. n. Wind name, probably at Kaua'i. *Lit.*, small eye of Lea.
mā.kā'i.kiu. n. Detective. *Lit.*, spying police.
mā.kā'i.koa. n. Military police. *Lit.*, soldier police.
mā.kā'i.kū.huina. n. Traffic policeman. *Lit.*, policeman stationed at corners.
maka.ila. n. A senile pigmentation caused by sunburn of the eye, as found among Hawaiians; person with such an eye (such persons were said to be observant and critical). *Lit.*, birthmark eye.
maka.ili. n. Rocky patches where sweet potatoes or taro were cultivated (For. 6:165); soil consisting of coarse sand, cinders, or gravel. Cf. 'ili, pebble.
maka.ilo. n. Young shoot, as for transplanting.
Maka.imo.imo. n. Name of a constellation in the Milky Way. *Lit.*, blinking eyes, twinkling eyes.
maka.ina. nvs. Guard; watchful.
maka.ino. vt. To look at with hatred; to lose affection for one; one who looks with hatred. 'O ke kanaka palu-palu . . . e maka 'ino aku ia i kona hoahānau (Kanl. 28.54), the man that is tender . . . his eye shall be evil toward his brother.
mā.kā'i.nui. n. Sheriff.
maka.ŋ.ō. Same as *maka.ŋ.ō*, wild eye.
Maka-io-lani. n. Name of a star. *Lit.*, eye of the royal hawk.
mā.kā'i.pō. n. Night watchman, night police.
maka.iwa. n. 1. Mother-of-pearl eyes, as in an image, especially of the god Lono. 2. (Cap.) Nine guiding stars. (Johnson and Mahelona 74.)
mā.kā'i.wahine. n. Police matron.
maka.kā.ālā. Same as *maka.keleawe*.
maka.kai. nvs. Sea-washed; spray. *Ea mai ka makakai he'e nalu* (UL 36), the spray of surfing rises. *Ua 'au'au akula 'oia i ka wai a pau ka makakai*, he bathed in fresh water so as to be rid of the spray.
maka.kaka'a. nvs. Shifty eyes; to have such.
maka.kanaka. n. Many people, crowds of people. *Lā maka kanaka*, day when many people gather, as a holiday.
maka.kō.hau. n. Heart's desire. *Lit.*, dew eye.
maka.keleawe. n. Brazen look; horse eye of a whitish color, but with good vision. *Lit.*, brass eye.
maka.kī. vt. To look at with hatred. *ho'o.maka.kī.* To look at with hatred; to plan revenge or evil.
maka.ki'ē.ki'ē. n. Proud look (Sol. 6.17); haughty air.
maka.kihi. nvi. To look out of the corner of the eyes; eye drawn back at the corner.
maka.ki'i. n. Mask. *Lit.*, image face.
maka.ki'i. nvi. Flirtatious eyes; to lure or attract with the eyes.
maka.kila. n. 1. A name given to the *kala poni*, sweet potato. 2. Pen; steel point, as of a weapon. *Lit.*, steel (Eng.) point.
maka.kilo. nvi. Observant, watchful eyes; to watch with great attention.
makā.kiu. nvs. Spy, detective, spying eye; watchful, vigilant, spying; to spy. *ho'o.makā.kiu.* To spy, watch, reconnoiter.
maka.koa. nvs. Bold, unafraid, fierce. *Lit.*, brave eye. *He lāhui kanaka maka koa*, 'a'ole e mālama mai i ka 'elemakule (Kanl. 28.50), a nation of fierce countenance, which shall not care for the old. (PPN *mata to'a*.)
maka.ko'a. n. Landmark for a fishing ground. *Lit.*, fishing-ground point.
maka.koali. n. Wild sweet potato found in Puna, Hawai'i; it may have been eaten in famine times; fed raw to pigs.
maka.kole. Same as *mākole*.
maka.kū. n. Creative imagination of an artist. *Rare*.
maka.kui. n. Needle or nail point; stitch. Cf. *maka o ke kui*, eye of a needle.
maka.ku'i.ku'i. vt. To scowl, leer hatefully. *Lit.*, pounding eyes.

makala. 1. vs. To loosen, undo, untie, open a little, liberate or set at liberty; to remit, as a debt; to forgive; to free of defilement or uncleanness; to open or unfold, as a flower. Cf. *kala 1. Ua makala nā pua i ka ua*, the rain unfolded the flowers. *ho'o.makala.* Caus/sim. (PPN *matala*.) 2. n. A trail. (Malo 92.)
makāla. Short for *maka'ala*. *Rare*.
mā.kala. n. 1. Myrtle. *Eng.* 2. Marshal. *Eng.* 3. (Cap.) Marshall (Islands). *Eng.*
maka.lae. loc. n. Beach, shore, coast near a point (*lae*). *Aia akula i makalae i ka paeaea*, there [he's] gone on the shore pole fishing.
makala.hia. 1. vs. Sleepless, awake. 2. Pas/imp. of *makala 1*.
mā.kala.kala. 1. Redup. of *makala*. *Mākalakala iāia nei a pau nā hihia i kauhale*, free him of all defilements at home. (PPN *makalakala*.) 2. Same as *makalahia*.
maka.lalau. nvs. Cross-eyed, with eyes that seem to look inward. *Lit.*, roving eyes. Cf. *maka 'āhewa*.
makala.pua. vi. Handsome, beautiful; to blossom forth. 'O *makalapua ulu māhiehie* (Elbert and Mahoe 76), profuse bloom growing as a delight. *Nā hi'ona ua hele wale ā makalapua*, features handsome indeed. *Ke kau o makalapua* (Kel. 5), the spring season. *Nani ho'i nā lau nahele e 'ōmaka ana, e mōhala ana ā e makalapua ana*, beautiful indeed are the budding plants, opening and blossoming.
maka.lau. n. 1. Carbuncle, boil. 2. Cluster of spears. 3. Many buds, as on a pussy willow. *Fig.*, many offspring.
Maka-lau-koa. n. Rain name.
makāla.ulua. n. *Ulua* fishermen; seekers of human victims for sacrifice. (Malo 92.) *Rare*.
maka.launa. vs. Friendly, having many friends and associates; sociable. *Ua ma'a i ka maka launa*, used to being friendly.
maka.lō. n. Mackerel, canned sardines. *Eng.*
maka.lō'a. nvs. Twinkle-eyed, happy-eyed, mischievous.
maka.lōha. vi. To look about as in wonder or admiration, to glance.
maka.lōho. nvs, nvt. Covetous, lustful, wanton, lascivious; incontinence; to admire (Kel. 17), desire. *Lit.*, cowrie eye, perhaps so called because the octopus clings to the cowrie. *Hahai ana i ka makaleho* (1 Pet. 4.3), walked in lasciviousness.
maka.lehua. nvs. *Lehua* flower petals. *Fig.*, attractive, as young girls. *Nā kini maka lehua o nā 'ōpio*, the many youths, lovely as *lehua* flowers.
mā.kā.lēi. n. 1. Fish trap. 2. Name of a supernatural tree found on Moloka'i; portions of its root were placed by the gates of fish ponds, as they were thought to attract fish. 3. Same as *melomelo*, a stick lure.
maka.lōlō. n. Name of a major illness (no data).
maka.lōna. n. Fine muslin cloth. *Eng.*
maka.lōna. 1. nvs. Unfriendly, suspicious glance from under the eyelid; to glance thus. *Lit.*, drawn eye. 2. n. Yellow center of a flower, as of a daisy. *Mehe ipo lā ka maka lena o ke Ko'olau* (chant), like a sweetheart is the yellow flower center of the Ko'olau.
maka.lōna.pu'u. n. Dotted swiss cloth. *Lit.*, lumped muslin.
makali. 1. Same as *mali*, to flatter. 2. vs. Barely cooked, underdone. *Rare*. 3. vs. Glowing, bright, as of fire. *He ahi makali ho'āli na ke kupa* (chant), a glowing fire stirred by the native son. 4. vt. To bait a hook. (PCP *matali*.)
maka.li'i. 1. nvs. Tiny, very small, fine, wee, small-meshed; narrow wefts. *Makali'i 'ōhua*, tiny 'ōhua, spawn; *fig.*, anything wee, tiny. (PPN *mataliki*.) 2. (Cap.) n. Pleiades; Castor and Pollux. See *Pleiades*. (PPN *Mataliki*.) 3. (Cap.) n. Hawaiian month name; the six summer months collectively.
maka.li'i.li'i. Redup. of *makali'i*. *He i'e makali'ili'i* (For. 5:639), a tapa beater with closely spaced grooves.
maka.lika. n. Marguerite, daisy. *Eng.*
maka.like. nvs. Uniform, as in color, style, clothes. *Lit.*,
