

maka peni. n. Pen point.
maka pepe. vs. Fine-meshed, as a mat of medium weft, as 1.5 cm.
maka pī. n. Running eyes, bleary eyes.
maka pia.pia. n. Eyes sticky with viscous matter; watery eyes; insulting epithet for one who does not find what he is looking for.
maka pipipi. n. 1. Small eyes; pregnant women were discouraged from eating *pipipi* shellfish lest their children be born with small eyes, hence the name. 2. Tiny, twinkling stars.
maka pō. nvs. Blindness, blind person; blind. *Lit.*, night eye. **ho'o.maka.pō.** To cause blindness, to feign blindness, to blindfold. (PEP *matapoo*.)
maka pō.niu.niu. nvs. Dizziness, faintness, lack of courage; obscure, dizzy, faint (Lunk. 8.4). *Lit.*, dizzy eye.
maka pō.uli. nvs. Dizziness; dizzy, faint. *Lit.*, black-night eyes.
-makapū. **ho'o.maka.pū.** To frown, look with disapproval.
maka pua'a. n. Breast nipple that stands out and is easy for a baby to take; pig nipple.
maka puhī. n. Fishhook with two opposite barbs, as used for eels. *Lit.*, eel point.
māka puke. n. Bookmark. *Eng.*
maka.pu'u. n. Variety of fish (no data). *Lit.*, bulging eyes, hill point.
makau. Fishhook. *Hilikau ka makau a ka lawai'a*, the fisherman's hook is snagged [said of disorder]. (PPN *maata'u*, PCP *matau*.)
makāu. Var. spelling of *makaau*.
mā.kau. Same as *mākaukau*. The word is related to *'ākau*, right hand. (PPN *mata'u*.)
maka'u. nvt. Fear; frightened, afraid, cowardly, timid, unsafe, dangerous. *Maka'u 'oia i ke kaua*, he is afraid of war. Cf. *maka'uhia*, *maka'ulia*. **ho'o.maka'u.** To frighten, scare, terrify, make afraid; fear; to pretend to fear. (PPN *mataku*.)
makaua. 1. nvi. Hardhearted, unfriendly; troubled, vexed. *Lit.*, tough face. 2. vi. To increase, grow larger. 3. n. A variety or taro.
mā.kaua. n. War dead (short for *make kaua*).
maka'ua. Pas/imp. of *maka'u*. **ho'o.maka'ua.** Caus/sim.; to frighten, scare.
maka.ua.ua. 1. Redup. of *makaua*. 2. vi. To toughen by drying, as hide. *Rare. Lit.*, tough face.
maka uhi. n. 1. Face tattooed solid, without patterning. 2. Tattooed eyelid, as a humiliating sign of a warrior's defeat. 3. Downcast eyes. *Ke-au-hou maka uhi*. Ke-au-hou with downcast eyes [said of the people at Ke-au-hou who did not welcome visitors because of chiefly taboos].
maka'u.hia. Pas/imp. of *maka'u*.
mā.kau.kau. 1. nvs. Able, competent, capable, handy, efficient, proficient, versed, adept, skilled, expert, qualified; prepared, ready; competence, proficiency, efficiency, aptitude, preparation; to know how, to know well. Cf. *'ākau*, right. *Mākaukau 'ole*, unprepared, unskilled, unqualified, not ready. **ho'o.mā.kau.kau.** To prepare, make ready. *Ho'omākaukau 'ia ma kēia kānāwai*, provided for by this law. (PPN *maata'u*, PCP *maatautau*.) 2. (*Cap.*) n. Star name (no data). (Kuhelani.)
mā.kā'u.kā'u. Redup. of *maka'u*. **ho'o.mā.kā'u.kā'u.** To scare, frighten; scared, frightened. (PPN *matakutaku*.)
maka'u ki'i. n. Fear of images representing gods.
maka'u kū.hewa. n. Sudden fear, panic.
makā.ula. Same as *kāula*, prophet.
maka 'ula'ula. n. Pinkeye; inflamed or bloodshot eye. *Lit.*, red eye.
maka uli. n. Black eye, as from a bruise.
maka'u.lia. Pas/imp. of *maka'u*. (For. 6:299.) (PCP *matakulia*.)

makau.li'i. vs. 1. Saving, economical, thrifty, provident; miserly, avaricious, eager to own. **ho'o.makau.li'i.** To economize; thrifty, saving, economical, frugal; to desire, covet. See ex., *kō'ala'ala. Po'e ho'omakauli'i 'āina*, people eager for land. *Ua ho'okō 'ia ka hana ho'omakauli'i i loko o ke aupuni*, economies in government have been effected. 2. Broad-backed, thick-shelled, of a turtle.
-makauli'i. **ho'o.makau.li'i.** To seek every detail; to find out even the smallest things, scrutinize. Cf. ex., *kō'ala'ala*.
Maka'unu-lau. n. Name of a navigational star. *Lit.*, eyes drawing many.
maka'uo. n. Gathering and tying, as *pala* fern for a heiau service. *Rare*.
makau pā.weo. n. Small shell hook, as used for *'ōpelu* fishing. *Lit.*, hook to turn away.
maka'ū.pē. n. Grief. *Ka hale maka'ūpē, pā i ka 'ū lā* (Kep. 71), the sad house, touched by grief.
maka'upena. n. Midriff, fat. *Maka'upena e uhi ana i ka na'au* (Oihk. 3.3), fat covering the intestines.
maka'upena. n. Design, as carved on a tapa beater and used in quilting.
maka'upena. n. Net mesh. Cf. *'ōpua maka'upena, uea maka'upena*.
maka'u wale. nvt. Coward, cowardice; afraid for no reason, easily frightened.
maka'u.wā.wae. n. 1. Excrement lying exposed on the ground. *Lit.*, feared [by] feet. 2. Anything on which one fears to tread.
maka.wai. n. Small outlets for water through banks of taro patches; small waterways; water sources.
maka wai. nvs. Watery-eyed; eyes welling with tears; tender-eyed (Kin. 29.17).
maka wai.ū. n. Nipple of the breast.
maka.walu. 1. vs. Numerous, many, much, in great quantities (sometimes used with implication of chiefly *mana*). *Lit.*, eight eyes. Cf. *-walu. Nā wailele e iho makawalu mai ana*, waterfalls pouring down in quantity. *Ka iho makawalu a ka ua*, the great downpour of rain. *Makawalu nā moku*, many islands are scattered haphazardly. 2. n. Type of fighting on plains covered with brush, with irregularly grouped warriors. (Malo 196, 203.)
maka.wela. 1. nvs. Glowing, burning; full of hate, fury, anger. *Fig. term for the despised kauā, outcasts. Nā pōhaku makawela o Kī-lau-ea*, the burning lava rocks of Kī-lau-ea. *'Ōlelo makawela*, words of hatred. **ho'o.maka.wela.** To treat like a *kauā makawela*. 2. n. Type of stone from which weights for cowry octopus lures were made. 3. Same as *wela* 3. *Hele e kanu i ka makawela*, went to plant the land cleared by burning.
maka.wela.wela. Redup. of *makawela* 1. *Ua makawelawela wale mai nō 'oia ia'u*, he hated me for nothing.
maka weli. nvi. Glaring, threatening eyes; to glare, glower.
maka.wī. See *pahapaha* 3.
make. 1. nvs. To die, perish; defeated, beaten, dead, killed, unfortunate; to faint (cf. *make loa*, definitely "to die"); death, fainting, danger of death, peril, destruction, misfortune; to kill, beat, execute; deathly, deadly, faint, deceased, extinct, late, obsolete, poisonous, venomous. (Gram. 4.5.) A pre-Christian concept was that *make* signified entry into the spirit world, and that *make loa* was the utter annihilation of the spirit, a kind of second death (cf. For. 5:581). *Make anu*, to die from the cold, freeze. *Make 'ole*, deathless, immortal. *Kona make*, his [own] death. *Kāna make*, his murder [of someone else]. *'A'ole kona he make maoli*, he *make na waho*, his was not a natural death, [but] a death by outsiders [sorcery]. *Nā'ehu i make aku nei*, the late Nā'ehu. *Makamaka make*, unresponsive friend. *Lawe i ka wā make*, taking at the time of death [a deceased might by his death remove taboos, curses, and sources
