

- open a crack; to crack. *Ho'omakili ka papa*, the board is cracked.
- mā.kili.** nvs. A drop; to drop, as water. Cf. *kilihau*, *kilihune*, Hal. 37.25. *He wahi mākili hou*, a drop of perspiration. *Mākili 'ai*, to eat just a little. *Mākili li'ilī'i ka wai* (Kep. 165), add a little water [as in mixing poi].
- mā.kili.kili.** Redup. of *mākili*.
- mā.kilo.** nvt. To eye wistfully, to look at longingly, to beg thus; beggar.
- māki.māki.** Similar to 'o'opu hue, puffer. (*Arothron hispidus*.)
- mākinī.** 1. Uneven, as land. (And.) 2. A kind of fish. (And.)
- mā.kini.** 1. n. Group of spears tied together, used as a battering ram in war (from *maka kini*, many points). 2. nvs. Many deaths; death-inflicting, deathly (from *make kini*, many deaths). 3. n. Gourd mask, as used by canoe-men.
- mā.kini.kā.** 1. nvs. Monkey. *Fig.*, ugly person; ugly. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Hawaiian whalers' name for Eskimo.
- mākinī.kēla.** n. Martingale. *Eng.*
- mā.kini.kini.** nvs. Hilly; notched, as a ridge.
- mā.kiu, ho'o.mā.kiu.** Same as *mākākiu, ho'omākākiu*.
- mā.kō.** 1. vs. Rough, rocky; large. *Mānoanoa mehe pali mākō* (chant), thick as a rock cliff. (PPN *mato*.) 2. Similar to *mākonā*, mean. *Rare*.
- mākoa.** 1. vs. Fearless, courageous, aggressive. Cf. *koa*, brave. *ho'o.mākoa*. To act bravely. 2. Similar to *mākonā*. *Pulu a'u lehua i ka mākoa* (FS 87), my lehua trees are wet in the implacable [elements].
- mā.ko'a.** n. Coral head in the sea.
- mā.ko'a.ko'a.** Plural of *māko'a*.
- mā.koē.** To rake, strip, scrape away. Cf. *koē* 2.
- mā.ko'ē.** Var. of *mākole* 1. (AP.)
- mā.koē.ā.** vs. Tedious, wearisome, difficult, as a task; hard to get along with, of a person. *Rare*.
- mā.kohi.** 1. Same as *kōhi* 1, to dig. (PPN *matofi*.) 2. n. A red variety of taro, used for pink poi, sometimes qualified by the colors 'ele'ele or 'ula'ula. Also *mōkōhi*.
- Mā.kohi-lani.** n. Name of a star. See *Mākaha* 2.
- mā.koi.** 1. nvt. Fishing pole; to fish with a pole (also *mōkoi*). Cf. *mākoī kanaka. Kā mākoī*, to fish with a pole. 2. Same as *mākonā* (AP.) 3. (*Cap.*) Also *Magoi*. n. Magi. 4. n. Magician, enchanter.
- mā.koi.ōle.** vi. To teeter, seesaw; to swing on a single rope. *Rare*.
- mā.koi kanaka.** n. A sport of strength; players lie on the ground, with bodies rigid. They are lifted up from the back and hoisted to their feet.
- mā.koi.koi.** Redup. of *mākoī* 1.
- mā.ko'i.ōle.** vi. To hold the breath, of divers. *Rare*.
- mā.koko.** 1. n. Fresh-water leech or bloodsucker. Cf. *koko*, blood. 2. vs. Reddish. Cf. *he'e mākoko, loli mākoko*. 3. n. A variety of taro, used for red poi. (HP 22.) Also *nōhu*.
- mā.kolē.** 1. nvs. Inflamed or sore eye; bloodshot; red-eyed; red-hot; red or yellow, as dying leaves; red, as a tinted cloud. *Mākole, mākolē 'akahi* (FS 223), so red-eyed, red-eyed [said tauntingly of Pele, referring to her fires]. *ho'o.mā.kolē*. To cause redness or soreness of the eyes. 2. nvi. Slightly decomposed pinkish octopus, relished by some; to turn pinkish, as octopus. Also *he'e pulu. ho'o.mā.kolē*. To prepare octopus in this fashion. 3. n. Rainbow. *Pō mākolē*, night with a [lunar] rainbow. 4. n. A small, smooth, succulent herb (*Nertera granadensis* var. *insularis*, commonly known as *N. depressa*), creeping on damp forest floors, a member of the coffee family with small ovate leaves and round, red to yellow, berry-like fruits. (Neal 794.) 5. vt. To scrape. 6. Same as *kahikole*, a time of day.
- mā.kolēa.** vs. Bold, shameless. *Rare*.
- mā.kolē.kolē.** Redup. of *mākole* 1-3. *Ua mākolēkolē*, a rain with rainbow colors.
- mā.kolē lau.** n. Leaf turning yellow or red, or drying.
- mā.kolē mā.kō.pi'i.** n. A native moss (*Thuidium hawaiense*), the plants branching in one plane, looking like small ferns. Also *mākōpi'i, maka 'ōpi'i, limu-mākole-maka-'ōpi'i, kala maka pi'i*.
- mā.koli.** n. Fragment; tiny bit, as of small shavings. Cf. *koli*, to whittle. *ho'o.mā.koli*. To cut into small bits, to render small or fine.
- makolo.** Same as *kolo*, to creep.
- mako.loa.** Same as *makaloa*, a sedge.
- mā.kolo.kolo.** Same as *honohono*, the wandering Jew. *Lit.*, creeper.
- mā.kolo.kolo.pā.** Same as *kolokolopā*, young of goat-fish.
- mā.kolu.** 1. vs. Thick, heavy, deep, as clouds; thick-coated, as dust; laden, as a high chief with taboo. (PPN *matolu*, PNP *maatolu*.) 2. n. Net mesh large enough to admit the entrance of three fingers; a net with such a mesh; three-ply, as sennit. Cf. *mākahi, mālua*.
- mā.kolu.kolu.** 1. Redup. of *mākolu*; chubby. *He papa mākolukolu*, a thick plank. *Ka-lani-nui-mākolukolu-i-ke-kapu* (name), the great chief thickly surrounded by taboo. 2. vs. Extremely, threefold. *Kuhikuhi mākolukolu* (Kel. 117), extremely savory. (PPN *matolutolu*, PNP *maatolutolu*.)
- mā.kō.makō.** Redup. of *mākō* 1. *Rare. ho'o.mā.kō-makō*. Large, billowy; to increase, enlarge.
- Makona, Masona.** nvs. Mason. *Eng. Hui Makona*, Masons' Society.
- mā.konā.** nvs. Hard, mean, hard-hearted, malevolent, unyielding, arbitrary, implacable, nasty; evil disposition. Cf. *konā. ho'o.mā.konā*. To act mean, hard, etc.
- mā.kō.pi'i.** Same as *mākole mākōpi'i*, a moss.
- makou.** 1. n. All native and introduced species of buttercups (*Ranunculus*), coarse herbs with subdivided leaves and small yellow flowers. (Neal 351.) Also 'awa *Kanaloa*. 2. n. A native perennial herb (*Peucedanum sandwicense*), in the parsley family, with coarse leaves much subdivided and tuberous roots that were used medicinally. 3. n. A native fern (*Botrychium subbifoliatum*), with fronds fan-shaped and lobed much like leaves of buttercups. 4. nvi. To blush; red, as with sunburn; bloodshot. 5. n. *Kukui* lamps, as burned all night while court retainers told stories to the chiefs; courtiers who told such stories; venerable statesmen who had served under three kings, presumably in three generations, perhaps so called because the *makou* torch consisted of three strings of *kukui* nuts.
- mā.kou.** pronoun. We, us (plural, exclusive; Gram. 8.2). (PPN *kimautolu*, PNP *kimaatou*, PEP *maatou*.)
- mā.kū.** 1. vs. Firm, hard; thick, stiff, as molasses; jellied, solidified; to gel, harden; to settle, as dregs; to thicken, as cream; dregs, sediment, lees. *ho'o.mā.kū*. To cause to harden, solidify, thicken, gel; to lower, as clouds. *Fig.*, to show off. 2. Same as *kōki'o*, a native hibiscus.
- makua.** nvs. Parent, any relative of the parents' generation, as uncle, aunt, cousin; progenitor; Catholic father; main stalk of a plant; adult; full-grown, mature, older, senior. *Fig.*, benefactor, provider, anyone who cares for one; the Lord (God). *Kamika Makua*, Smith Senior. *Ē ka Makua* (Ka Nonanona, beginning of a letter, Sept. 5, 1843), Sire. *Makua Laiana*, Father Lyons [the Hawaiians' name for the Rev. Lorenzo Lyons, 1807-1886]. 'O *kō mākou Makua i loko o ka lani*, our Father who art in heaven. 'O *ko'u makua aku ana kēia*, this one will be the one who cares for me in the future [may be said by a parent of his child]. *ho'o.makua*. To grow into maturity, mature; to act the part of a parent; to foster, adopt, as a child; to call or treat as a parent; to address as parent, aunt, or uncle one related by affection rather than by blood or adoption; to become established or permanent. *Ua ho'omakua aku au nona*, I became his parent or guardian. 'A'ole *ho'i e ho'omakua aku 'oukou i kekahi kanaka*
