

mana wai. n. 1. Stream branch. 2. A variety of taro. (HP 33.)

mana-wai-ke-'ohe. n. A variety of taro. (HP 33.)

manawa 'ino. nvs. Evil disposition, hard feelings, hard-hearted, time of storm.

manawa ka'a.wale. n. Free time.

manawa.kolu. vs. Eternal. *Ola manawakolu*, life everlasting.

manawa kū.pono. n. Opportune time, appropriate time, opportunity, chance.

manawa.le'a. nvt. A generous heart, charity, alms, donation; to give freely and willingly; gratis, free, benevolent, beneficent. *Hui manawale'a*, relief society. *Ua manawale'a aku 'oia i nā hoahānau*, he gave willingly to the cousins. **ho'o.manawa.le'a.** Caus/sim.

manawa moe. n. Bedtime, time to sleep.

mā.nawa.nawa. Same as *kolokolo kahakai*, a beach vitex.

-manawanui. **ho'o.manawa.nui.** Patience, steadfastness, fortitude; to have patience, fortitude; patient, steadfast, courageous and persevering; to try one's patience. *E ho'omanawanui*, be patient. *He kanaka ho'omanawanui i ka lā a me ka ua*, a man who patiently endures the sun and the rain. *He nohona ho'omanawanui*, a way of life that tries one's patience. (PCP *manawanui*.)

mana weo. n. A variety of taro, probably the same as *weo*; distinguished by dark-purple petiole edges; a fair table taro.

mane. n. 1. Manna. (Puk. 16.31.) *Eng.* 2. Mina (RSV), maneh (KJV). (Ezek. 45.12.) *Eng.*

mā.nea. nvs. Hoof (Lunk. 5.22); claws; fingernails, toenails; ball of a foot; keel of a ship. *Fig.*, dependent, underling, inferior. *Mai ka piko o ke po'o a ka mānea o nā wāwae*, from the crown of the head to the balls of the feet. *Mānea 'u'uku o ka wāwae* (FS 91), toe of the foot. *He mānea 'o Ni'ihau, no Kaua'i*, Ni'ihau is a dependent of Kaua'i. **ho'o.mā.nea.** To harden, raise calluses; to strengthen, make steadfast.

mā.nei.'ula. Same as *mānai'ula*.

mā.nele. 1. nvt. Sedan chair, palanquin, litter, stretcher, bier (2 Sam. 3:31); to carry on a stretcher, bier, sedan chair. 2. Same as *a'e*, several trees.

mā.nele hu'a hiwa.hiwa. n. Litter with decorated sides on which a bride was carried to her groom's house. (Kam. 64:26.) *Lit.*, litter [with] festive sides.

manelo. Fissures, caves, as on ocean floor; free of stones, as land. (And.)

manena. n. A small native tree (several varieties of *Pelea hawaiiensis*), with oblong leaves and four-parted fruit capsules; related to the *mokihana*.

manene. 1. nvi. Shuddery sensation of fear, as on looking over a precipice or if confronted by sudden danger; sensation of disgust, revulsion, or repugnance; sensation of inner quaking accompanying sexual desire; to shudder, quake. *Manene ka wāwae*, tender feet. *Manene ka pepeiao*, the ear shudders [as on hearing vile language]. 2. n. A kind of small plantain or *laukahi* (*Plantago grayana* var. *grayana* native to O'ahu and Kaua'i; *P. krajinai* native to Kaua'i).

mane'o. nvs. Itch; itchy; smarting, as the throat after eating raw taro or certain fish; prickly, as some clothes; sexually titillated; ticklish; tickling. *Nahele mane'o*, nettle. *Ke pi'i nei ko'u mane'o*, I am beginning to itch. **ho'o.mane'o.** To cause to itch; to tickle. (PNP *mangeo*.)

mā.neo.neo. 1. vs. Barren. *Rare.* Cf. *neo*, void. 2. n. Sailfish tang (*Zebrasoma veliferum*).

mā.ne'o.ne'o. 1. Redup. of *mane'o*. **ho'o.mā.ne'o.-ne'o.** Caus/sim.; to tickle, titillate. 2. n. An edible seaweed, *Laurencia nidifica*.

manewa. 1. Same as *mānewanewa*. **ho'o.manewa.** Same as *ho'omānewanewa*. 2. vi. To breathe, as a fish. *Rare.* 3. n. A kind of grass (no data).

mā.newa.newa. 1. nvi. Grief, sorrow, mourning; exaggerated expression of grief, as by knocking out teeth, cutting the hair in strange patterns, eating of filth, tattooing the tongue, removing the *malo* and wearing it

about the neck; to do such. **ho'o.mā.newa.newa.** To display violent grief; to free oneself from black magic and regain health by extravagant conduct, as going nude or eating of filth or drinking 'auhuhu juice. (PPN *manewanewa*.) 2. vs. Unkind. **ho'o.mā.newa.newa.** To treat unkindly. 3. Var. of *hīnawenawe*, *hīnewanewa*, weak, spindly. 'O ka hahu 'ape mānewanewa (KL line 370), the weak young 'ape plant. 4. n. Name given for a beach grass; used in leis on Lā-na'i.

mani. 1. vs. Dull, as a blade; slick; smooth, as a water-worn pebble. Cf. *hāmani*. 2. To cool off, of heat. (And.) *E mani ka umu*, let the oven cool.

mania. 1. nvi. Shuddering sensation as on looking down a great height, or hearing a saw filed; dizziness; dizzy; to shudder; to be contracted. *Mania ka niho*, the teeth are set on edge (as on eating certain green fruits). (PPN *mania*.) 2. vs. Inactive, drowsy, sleepy. **ho'o.mania.** To cause sleepiness, drowsiness. 3. Same as *mani 1*. (PCP *mania*.) 4. Same as *mani 2*. *Mai lohi 'olua o mania ka imu*, don't be slow or the oven will cool. 5. n. Lump, as on the skin. (Kel. 13.)

māni.ani. nvs. Acidity; tart, acid.

mā.nia.nia. Redup. of *mania*. (PPN *maniania*.)

mania.wai. vs. Drowsy, sleepy, especially after bathing.

manie. Var. of *mania*.

mā.nie.nie. 1. n. Bermuda grass (*Cynodon dactylon*), a fine-leaved, cosmopolitan grass, much used for lawns in Hawai'i. (Neal 67-8.) 2. Short for *mānienie 'aki'aki*. 3. vs. Bare, barren. 4. Same as *māniania*.

mā.nie.nie 'aki'aki. n. 1. Seashore rush grass (*Sporobolus virginicus*). Also 'aki'aki, *mānienie māhikihiki*, and *mānienie maoli*. (Neal 66-7.) 2. Buffalo grass (*Stenotaphrum secundatum*), a coarse-leaved grass from the southern United States, used for lawns in Hawai'i. Sometimes qualified by *haole* and also called *mānienie māhikihiki*. (Neal 72-3.)

mā.nie.nie ali'i. n. Wire grass (*Eleusine indica*), a weed in lawns and waste places, a strong, smooth, tufted grass, with pale-green, flattened stems. *Lit.*, chief *mānienie*. (Neal 67.)

mā.nie.nie haole. n. Bermuda grass (*Cynodon dactylon*), said to have been introduced by Dr. G. P. Judd about 1835; called *mānienie* because it creeps like buffalo grass (see *mānienie 'aki'aki*), which the Hawaiians originally called *mānienie*. (Neal 67.)

mā.nie.nie mahiki. *Cymbopogon refractus*. *Ni'ihau*. See Neal 79.

mā.nie.nie mā.hiki.hiki. Same as *mānienie 'aki'aki 1*, 2. *Lit.*, *mānienie* for exorcising evil spirits.

mā.nie.nie maoli. Same as *mānienie 'aki'aki* (*Sporobolus virginicus*). *Lit.*, native *mānienie*.

mā.nie.nie 'ula. n. A small, stiff, weedy grass (*Chrysopogon aciculatus*) from southeastern Asia, found in some Pacific islands; it forms mats and bears a narrow head of reddish, barbed spikelets, which stick to animals' coats. Also *pi'ipi'i*, *pilipili 'ula*. (Neal 80.)

maniha. Same as *kamaniha*, sullen.

mani.he'u. Var. of *manuhe'u*, bruised.

manila. n. Manila hat, named for the city.

manīne. vs. Ashamed, humiliated. *Rare.*

manini. 1. n. Very common reef surgeonfish (*Acanthurus triostegus*), also called convict tang, in the adult stage. In legends *manini 'ele kuhō*. For younger stages see 'ōhualiko, 'ōhua kāni'o, palapōhaku, and kākala manini, and maninini. (PPN *manini*.) 2. vs. Stingy. Cf. Fijian *manini-taka*, to hoard up like a miser. 3. n. A kind of banana generally eaten cooked; leaves and fruits green and white striped. Also *a'ea'e*, *koa'e*. (Neal 249.) 4. n. A variety of sugar cane, named for the fish. Also *laukona*. 5. n. A variety of dryland taro with striped petiole. The name may be qualified by the terms 'ele'ele, hā kikokiko, hā uliuli, kākau, kea, lau kikokiko, uliuli. 6. n. A variety of sweet potato. 7. nvs. Wrath, anger; angry. 8. vi. To pour, spill; irrigated. *Manini aku a manini mai nā 'ōlelo 'ino*, evil words poured out, poured back and forth. 9. (*Cap.*) n. Hawaiian name of a well-known Spanish immigrant,
