

manu.ea. 1. vs. Careless, blundering, slipshod, awkward. *Rare.* 2. n. Center support of a house. *Rare.*
manu.hökili. n. Thundercloud. *Rare.*
manu.hele-kū. n. Penguin. *Lit.,* bird that walks upright.
manu heu. vi. To feather out, of young birds. *Fig.,* to leave home, as young people.
manu.he'u. vt. Bruised, injured, damaged, dented; in bad condition, as an old building; to bruise, damage, injure, deface; to bite with the teeth and peel off, as bark. **ho'o.manu.he'u.** Caus/sim.
manu huhū. n. Wild, ravenous bird. (Isa. 46.11.) *Lit.,* angry bird.
manu humu.humu. n. Tailorbird.
manu 'io.'io. n. Swallow. (Ier. 8.7, Isa. 38.14.) *Lit.,* chirping bird.
manu.kā. vs. Lagging, dilatory, slow, blundering. *Manukā noho'i kāna hana,* his work is certainly slow and careless.
manu kapa.lulu. n. California valley quail (*Lophortyx californicus californicus*), an early introduction, common in the 1890s. *Lit.,* whirr bird.
manu kū. n. Dove, including Chinese dove (*Streptopelia chinensis*); rock or wild pigeon (*Columba livia*). *Lit.,* coo (*Eng.*) bird.
manu.lēle. n. A native variety of sugar cane, the stems green striped with yellowish and reddish brown, the pith brown, the leaves purplish. Used medicinally, also in love sorcery. See *ex., kā'awe.* (HP 221; Neal 79.) *Lit.,* flying bird.
manu li'i.li'i. n. English sparrow; European housefinch (*Passer domesticus*); introduced before 1870; little bird. (Hal. 102.7.)
manu.manu. vs. Rough, irregular, nicked; dull, blunt, not sharp, as a knife; bruised; scarred, as by smallpox (Kam. 64:106). *Nui kalakalai, manumanu ka loa'a,* much whittling, nicked product.
manu mele. n. Songbird, especially canary (*Serinus canaria*). Cf. *kenele.*
manu.nē.nē. n. Possibly a local name for a small sedge (*Cyperus brevifolius*). *Lit.,* goose bird. See *kili'o'opu.*
manunu. 1. nvs. To creak or break, as bones; tremor, as of an earthquake. 2. vs. Numb.
-manunu. ho'o.manunu. To break out, as with a skin eruption. (Kam. 64:105.)
manu.nunu. Redup. of *manunu* 1, 2.
manu nū.nū. n. Dove. (Hal. 55.6.) *Lit.,* cooing bird.
manu-nū.nū-lawe-leka. n. Carrier pigeon. *Lit.,* dove carrying letters (*Eng.*)
manu-o-kū. n. White tern, fairy tern, love tern (*Cygis alba rothschildi*), a small, friendly sea bird, pure white except for a black ring around the eye. *Lit.,* bird of Kū. *Ni'ihau.*
manu'u. 1. Same as *mānu'unu'u.* 2. Sick, weak, in pain. (And.)
manu 'ū. n. Crane. (Ier. 8.7.) *Lit.,* groaning bird.
manu 'ula.'ula. n. Cardinal, redbird. *Lit.,* red bird.
mā.nu'u.nu'u. vs. Vast, great, without measure, multitudinous. Cf. *nu'u. Mānu'unu'u wale ka lokomaika'i,* very great is the kindness.
manu.wā. See *manuā.*
mao. 1. vs. Cleared, as rain; alleviated, assuaged, as grief; to clear up, as rain; to pass, as sadness. *Ua mao a'ela ke kaumaha,* the sadness has ceased. (PPN *mao.*) 2. vi. To fade, as cloth. 3. n. Type of fish. (KL line 158.) Cf. *maomao.*
ma o. Because of, due to, by means of, through. Cf. *ma,* at.
ma'o. 1. vs. Green. Cf. *mama'o, ma'oma'o, 'ōma'o-ma'o.* 2. n. The native cotton (*Gossypium sandvicense*), a shrub in the hibiscus family, bearing yellow flowers and seed cases containing brown cotton. (Neal 566.) Also *huluhulu.* Cf. *pulupulu haole.* 3. n. The hoary abutilon (*Abutilon incanum*), a small native, velvety shrub, in the hibiscus family, with small heart-shaped leaves, small pink and red flowers, and small dry fruits. (Neal 550.) 4. n. The hairy abutilon (*Abuti-*

lon grandifolium), a weedy, hairy, South American shrub, with large, broad leaves, orange, 'ilima-like flowers, and ten-parted, black, dry fruits. When green and soft, these fruits are used in making 'ilima leis, one for each end of the lei. (Neal 550.) 5. Same as 'ōma'o, thrush. (PCP *mako.*)

ma.'ō. See 'ō, there.

maoa. vs. Chafing from friction, soreness from rubbing; to chafe, rub, become sore from rubbing. (PCP *maoa.*)

-maoe. ho'o.maoe. To ask indirectly; to hint or suggest, as in asking; to imply, allude. *Ke nīnau ho'omaoe nei nā kānaka i ke kumu o kona make 'ana* (Kep. 45), the people are now asking indirectly the cause of his death.

ma'oe.ā. vs. Lazy, uninterested in work. *Rare.*

maoha. Same as *maoa.*

ma'oha. vs. Grayish, especially when contrasted with black, as of bird feathers, cloud-capped mountains, graying hair. *Ka 'iwa he manu nui ia, he 'ele'ele kona hulu, he ma'oha kahi hulu,* the 'iwa is a big bird, its feathers are black, some are gray.

mā.oha.oha. Similar to *ohaoha.*

ma'o hau hele. n. The native yellow hibiscus (*Hibiscus brackenridgei*), a small shrub with broad, lobed leaves and with large yellow flowers that turn green on drying. (Neal 560.) *Lit.,* green traveling *hau.*

mā.'ohe.'ohe. 1. vs. Tall and spindly, as trees in a dense forest that reach up for light, or as bamboo; straight and tall, as of a fine physique. Cf. 'ohe, bamboo. 2. n. A variety of sugar cane.

mā.ohi.ohi. Same as *ohiohi* 1; to grow vigorously.

mā.'ohi.'ohi. n. A native mint (*Stenogyne rugosa*), found only on the island of Hawai'i, a shrub with smooth, ovate, toothed leaves and reddish flowers grouped in whorls of six to ten at leaf bases.

mā.'ohu. vs. Misty. *Ka ua lei mā'ohu o Wai-ānuenuē,* rain of Wai-ānuenuē that is like a wreath of mist.

mā.'oi. Same as *maha'oi*, bold. (2 Kor. 11.21.) **ho'o.-mā.'oi.** To act bold, impertinent.

mā.'oi.'oi. 1. Redup. of *mā'oi.* 2. vs. Uneven, notched, zigzag.

maoki. Var. of *maoli* 1.

ma'oki. nvi. Anything cut into pieces, streaked (less used than *mā'oki'oki*). *Ua ma'oki 'ia kēia papa,* this board is cut into pieces.

mā.'oki.'oki. Redup. of *ma'oki*, sometimes with idea of small pieces. *Kaulana 'o Kona i ke kai mā'oki'oki.* Kona is famous for its streaked sea of various colors. **ho'o.mā.'oki.'oki.** To make streaks, cut grooves.

maoli. 1. vs. Native, indigenous, aborigine, genuine, true, real, actual; very, really, truly. *Maika'i maoli,* very good indeed. *Kanaka maoli, 'ōlelo maoli,* Hawaiian native, Hawaiian language [so used in reports of 1852 legislative session]. *E puka ai ka makemake maoli o ka mea koho,* expressing the free will of the voter. (PPN *ma(a)'oli.*) 2. n. A variety of 'ahi, a fish that may weigh about 90 kilos; it has light, slightly pinkish flesh.

3. n. A native variety of banana, with tall, green trunk; the fruit forming large, compact bunches, having thick yellow skin and sweet yellow flesh; edible cooked or raw. (HP 176.) 4. n. A variety of sweet potato.

maoli 'ili lahi.lahi. n. A native variety of banana. *Lit.,* thin-skinned *maoli.*

mā.'oli.'oli. 1. Same as 'oli'oli, joy. 2. Same as *lauilihi*, a shrub.

ma'o.loa. Same as *ma'aloa*, a shrub.

mao.loha. n. Large-meshed net used at *makahiki* ceremonies. It was filled with food and held at each of the four corners. The priest prayed, and the net was shaken. If the food did not fall out, the priest predicted famine. Perhaps this was named for a legendary net called *kōkō a maoloha*. During a famine Waia miraculously lowered this net from heaven and filled it with food. He shook the net, and food was scattered for the benefit of the starving people. (Malo 151, 155.)

mā.'olu. vs. Boggy, squashy; yielding to pressure, as a soft cushion. Cf. 'olu, elasticity.

mao.lua. n. A kind of red tapa.
