

- mō.hai pui.** n. Offering by fire. (Oihk. 2.3.)
- mō.hai pui 'ala 'ono.** n. Sweet-smelling offering. (Oihk. 3.5.) *Lit.*, burnt offering tasty fragrant.
- mohala.** vs. Unfolded, as flower petals; blossoming, opening up; spread, as a turkey's tail; blooming, as a youth just past adolescence; shining forth, as a light; appearing clear, as a thought; evolved, developed; freed or recovered, as from fear, worry, illness. 'A'ohē *mohala pono ka mana'o*, a thought not clearly stated or brought out. *Mohala ka hehehēlena*, pleasant, open features. **ho'o.mohala.** To open, unfold, spread, recover, develop, evolve; development, etc. *Ua ho'o-mohala 'ia kona na'au kānalua*, his doubting heart began to feel courage.
- mō.hala.hala.** Redup. of *mohala*.
- mō.hala.pua.** n. Blossoming of flowers or youth. *Kona lā o ka mōhalapua*, his days of blossoming youth.
- mō.halu.** 1. vs. Loose, slack; at ease, unrestrained, at liberty; comfortable. *Hale mōhalu*, house of relaxation. **ho'o.mō.halu.** To slacken, relax; to cause relaxation, ease. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Twelfth day of the month and first of the Kāne taboo, liked for planting flowers because it was believed the flowers would be round and perfect like the moon on this night. 3. vi. To open, unfold, as flowers. Also *mohala*.
- mō.halu.halu.** Redup. of *mōhalu* 1, 3. *Mōhaluhalu ka lihilihi o ka pua*, the petals of the flowers unfold in blossom. *Mōhaluhalu ka 'ai 'ana a ka i'a*, the fish are opening [their mouths] to bite.
- Moha.meka, Mohameta.** nvs. Mohammed, Moham-medan. *Eng.*
- mō.hihi.** n. 1. A variety of sweet potato, sometimes qualified by the colors *ke'oke'o* or *'ula'ula*. 2. A native mint (*Stenogyne scrophularioides*), more or less shrubby and climbing, leaves ovate, flowers reddish.
- mohi.hihi.** n. A herbaceous leguminous vine (*Vigna marina*), established on tropical shores of the world. Leaves are three-parted, the flowers yellow. (Neal 467-8.) Also *lemuomakili, nanea, 'ōkolemakili, pūhilihili, pūhilihili, wahine'ōma'o*.
- mohi.hio.** 1. Redup. of *mōhio*. *Mohihio ho'i ka makani*, the wind is drafty. 2. Plant name. (*And.*)
- mohi.hi'o.** Same as *moe hihi'o*: see *hihi'o*.
- mō.hio.** n. Draft, gust of wind. *Mōhio lū 'ope'ope*, gust that scatters bundles; *fig.*, careless, heedless, impudent person.
- mō.hio.hio.** 1. Same as *mohihio*. 2. vs. Red, as from sunburn.
- moho.** 1. n. Candidate, as in politics; representative selected to participate in a race, wrestling, or betting contest, champion. 2. n. Hawaiian rail (*Pennula sandwichensis*), an extinct flightless bird. See *ex.*, *pūhili* 1. (PPN *moso*.) 3. vi. To unfold, of leaves, especially upper leaf of a plant, as sugar cane, taro (PCP *mo(f,s)ō*.)
- moho. ho'o.moho.** To stalk; to lie in wait, as a cat ready to pounce; to trail or follow behind, sneak. *Ka'ū.*
- moho.ēa.** Same as *moho* 2.
- mohola.** Var. of *mohala*. *He'e mohola*, octopus lying flat on the sea floor with tentacles spread. Cf. *moho* 3.
- mohole.** Var. of *mahole*.
- mō.hole.hole.** Redup. of *mohole*.
- moi.** n. 1. Threadfish (*Polydactylus sexfilis*). Stages of growth: *moi li'i*, little *moi*, 5 to 8 cm long; *pālāmoi* (Kaua'i) or *manamoi* (Hawai'i), about 13 cm; *moi*, adult, 45 to about 97 cm. On Hawai'i the *pālāmoi* was about 30 cm. This fish was much esteemed for food. A large school was an omen of disaster for chiefs. See *'ehu* 1. *Kō kuli ē, nuku moi oe* (song), your knees, like a *moi* fish nose. *He moi ka i'a, ehū ka lani, moi* the fish, misty the sky [of easy victory]. (PCP *moi*.) 2. White birthmark. 3. A native variety of taro, with short, stocky growth, the leaf stems light green, the base pinkish, and base of leaf blade whitish; used for poi and table taro. Also *ne'ene'e*. (HP 25; Whitney 69.) This name may be qualified by the colors *'ele'ele,*
- ke'oke'o*, and *'ula*. 4. A variety of sweet potato. (PCP *moi*.)
- mo'i.** vi. To remain long in one place. (Kam. 64:109.)
- mō.ʻī.** n. 1. King, sovereign, monarch, majesty, ruler, queen. (Perhaps related to *ʻī*, supreme. According to J. F. G. Stokes, the word *mōʻī*, king, is of recent origin and was first in print in 1832.) Temple image (Malo 162); lord of images (Malo 173); according to Kepelino and Kamakau, a rank of chiefs who could succeed to the government but who were of lower rank than chiefs descended from the god Kāne (For. 6:266). See *ikū nu'u*. The term *mōʻī* was apparently not used in the Fornander legends collected in the 1860s nor in RC. 2. Same as *'awa mōʻī*.
- mō.ʻikē.** nvt. To interpret dreams; dream interpreter. *Kaua'i. E hele ana au e nīnau i ka mōʻike*, I'm going to question the dream interpreter.
- mō.io.io.** vs. Churning, roiled, as water.
- mō.ʻiu.** vs. Far, at a distance; venerated. Cf. *kō'iu'iu*.
- mō.ʻiu.ʻiu.** Redup. of *mō'iu*. Cf. *kō'iu'iu*.
- mō.ʻī wahine.** n. Queen.
- moka.** n. Offal, waste matter, refuse, filth. *Ho'oleina moka* (Dan. 3.29), dunghill.
- mokae.** 1. n. A plant resembling *kili'o'opu*, a sedge. (KL line 246.) 2. Same as *mōkaekae*.
- mō.kae.kae.** vs. Gratifying to the taste, tasty, as mealy sweet potato. Cf. *kaekae*.
- mokaika, mosaika.** n. Mosaic. *Eng.*
- mō.kā.kī.** nvs. Scattered, littered, disheveled; disorder, untidiness, mess, chaos. **ho'o.mō.kā.kī.** To litter, scatter, cause disorder or untidiness.
- mokala.** Var. of *makala*.
- mō.kā'o.kā'o.** vs. Hard and lacking moisture, as of tasteless bananas, taro, meat, poi.
- mokapu. ho'o.mokapu.** To separate by imposing a taboo.
- Moke.kao, Mosokao.** n. Moscow. *Eng.*
- mokeko, mosoko.** n. Mosque. *Eng.*
- mokī.** vi. To spurt, shoot forth.
- mō.kī.** nvt. Bundle; to wrap in a bundle. *Rare.*
- moki.awe.** n. A variety of sweet potato.
- mō.kiha.** Short for *mo'o kiha*.
- moki.hana.** n. 1. A native tree (*Pelea anisata*), found only on Kaua'i, belonging to the citrus family. The small, leathery, cube-shaped, anise-scented fruits, which change from green to brown, are strung in leis; they represent Kaua'i in the leis of the islands, as designated in 1923 by the Territorial legislature. The large leaves are also fragrant. (Neal 478.) 2. A variety of kava famous on Kaua'i; it has short, stubby internodes. It is named for the *mokihana* fruit because of its fragrance. 3. A native variety of taro. (HP 33.)
- moki.hana kū.kae moa.** n. A small native tree (*Pelea hawaiiensis*) with red leaf stems; when bruised its leaves have a lemony odor; found on several islands. *P. h.* var. *gaudichaudii* is believed restricted to the KI-lau-ēa area. *Lit.*, chicken dropping *mokihana*, probably so called because of small black seeds falling from the fruit.
- mō.kila.** 1. Kaua'i name for *mānai*, needle; to string, as leis. 2. Similar to *kilakila*.
- mokī.mokī.** Redup. of *mōkī*.
- mō.kio.** 1. vi. To pucker or contract, as the lips for whistling, or the nostrils after diving. 2. vi. To steal something and dash away; to head straight for a destination. *Mōkio pololei maila i Kaua'i*, to go straight to Kaua'i. 3. Also *motio*. n. Motion. (Latin *motio*.)
- moki.weo.** The name for *'āweoweo* seeds.
- moko.** 1. Same as *mokomoko*. (PPN *moto*.) 2. vs. Flooded, filled with water, as a taro patch. **ho'o.-moko.** To flood, fill with water. 3. n. Lizard. *Rare.*
- mokohi.** Same as *lana*, to float. *Rare.*
- mō.kohi.** Same as *mākohi*, a taro.
- mō.koi.** Var. of *mākoī* 1, 2.
- moko.kai.kala.** n. Motorcycle. *Eng.*
