

paka.nika. n. Parsnip (*Pastinaca sativa*). (Neal 659.) *Eng.*

pā kanu. n. Garden, cultivated field. *Lit.*, planting enclosure.

pā.ka'o. Similar to *pōka'o*. *Rare.*

paka.paka. 1. Redup. of *paka* 3. 2. vs. Many, numerous. *Pakapaka ka i'a a Paulo*, Paul has a great lot of fish. 3. Same as 'ōpakapaka 2, 3; wrinkled; scaly. Cf. *pakalua*.

paka.pakai. 1. n. Young *pakai* seedlings. 2. See *pakai* 2. 3. Same as 'āheahea 2. *Ni'ihau*.

pā kā.pili moku. n. Dock.

paka.puhi. n. Smoking tobacco.

pā.kau. nvt. To place; table, stand. See *pākaukau*. *Fig.*, beloved. *Hoa pākau noho'i i ke aloha*, companion upon whom [my] love rests.

paka.ua. n. Raindrops. See ex., 'ōmamaka.

pā kaua. n. Fortress, stronghold; palace (Neh. 1.1). *Lit.*, war enclosure.

pakau.'a'aka. vs. Cranky, cantankerous. Cf. 'a'aka, cranky. *Rare.* **ho'o.pakau.'a'aka.** Same as *pakau.'a'aka*; provocative of crankiness.

pakaua.helo. *Rare* var. of *pakauhelo*.

pā.kau.ā.ke'ē. Same as *kīke'eke'e*; crooked, bent, curled; dishonest. *Rare.*

pakau.ēle. n. General name for small fish that are easily caught by hand, as *manini*, *lauhau*, *pā'o'o*.

pakauē.loa. Var. name for young stage of *hou*, a fish.

pakau.helo. vi. To live as a vagabond, wander. *Rare.*

pā.kau.kani. vt. By thousands, thousandfold; to distribute to thousands or divide by thousands.

pā.kau.kau. 1. n. Table, counter, stand, booth, desk; formerly a long mat on which food was placed (*kaukau*) (occasionally preceded by *ke*). 2. vt. To sell, as over the counter (said also of wanton women).

pā.kau.kau 'aina. n. Dining table.

pā.kaukau 'opi.'opi. n. Folding table.

pā.kau.kau uai i ka loa. n. Table that can be lengthened by adding new leaves. *Lit.*, table with movable length.

pā.kaula. n. Rigging. *Rare.*

pakau.lei. vi. 1. To gad about as a vagabond, to live without care or responsibility, carefree; to live wantonly with one mate after another. 2. Same as *kaulei*, too high or short.

pakau.lele. vi. To go from house to house, especially to ask for favors.

pā.kā.una. vt. Four at a time. (Nak. 106.)

pā kau ulua. n. Hook for *ulua*, fish. *Rare.*

pā.ka'u.wili. Same as *pāka'awili*.

paka.weli. n. 1. A variety of sugar cane, with different names on different islands. A deep purple-red and green striped cane resembling 'akilolo but the leaves somewhat variegated; also producing mutants of solid yellow and red, like *nānahu*, *pilimai*. Also *hou*, *pailolo*. 2. A fish (no data).

pake, pate. n. Putty. *Eng.*

pakē. 1. vs. Brittle; weak, of health (*rare*). **ho'o.pakē.** To cause to be brittle, weak. 2. n. A variety of sugar cane. 3. n. Plain undyed tapa. *Rare.*

Pā.kē. nvs. China, Chinese (noted in documents in the State Archives dated 1854, but possibly of earlier introduction) Also *Kina*. See *ma'i Pākē*, *mai'a Pākē*. 'Āina *Pākē*, China. **ho'o.pākē.** To imitate or act like a Chinese. (Chinese *pake ye*, father's older brother.)

pā.keā. 1. vs. Pale, gray, as the face of a sick person. Cf. *kea* 1. *Rare.* 2. n. White inner sheets of sleeping tapa. 3. n. Kind of mat made of *makaloa* rush, without design. Cf. *hoehoe-pākea*. *Rare.* 4. n. Type of stone (no data). *Rare.* 5. n. A variety of taro.

pake.'ai. Short for *pākela 'ai*, to eat to excess.

pā.keke. n. 1. A variety of sweet potato. *Eng.* 2. Also *bakete*. Bucket, pail. *Eng.* 3. Pocket. *Eng.* See 'inipākeke. *Kauoha Hou Pākeke*, pocket-sized New Testament. 4. Also *pakete*. Packet (a ship). *Eng.*

pakeko. n. Small slimy discharges, as of diarrhea.

pā.kela. nvs. Excess; excessive, surpassing, intemperate; to exceed, surpass, excel; exceedingly; great person

who excels. Cf. *kela*, to exceed. *Pākela inu*, drink to excess, heavy drinker. *Pākela nani* (2 Kor. 3.10), glory that excelleth. **ho'o.pā.kela.** To cause to exceed. *Na ia mea i ho'opākela aku i kona 'ike*, it was this thing that made his knowledge great.

pā.kela 'ai. nv. To eat to excess; gluttonous; gluttony, glutton. *He kanaka pākela 'ai, pākela inu waina* (Mat. 11.19), a man gluttonous, and a winebibber.

pakele. vt. To escape, be exempt. *I pakele mai au i ka nui manu* (song), I escaped from the many birds. *Pakele mai ka hopu 'ia*, freedom from arrest. *Na wai, na wai nō 'oe a'e pakele aku* (song)? Who, who can escape you? *Ka po'e pakele i ka 'auhau*, people exempt from taxes. **ho'o.pakele.** To rescue, save or deliver from danger, free; to protect; to help escape. *Hana kinai ahi ho'opakele*, fire-protection work.

pakele-a-wa'a. n. An edible seaweed. Also *huluhulu waena*.

pakelo. 1. vi. To slip out, as an animal from a trap or a fish from the hand; slippery, slick, slipping, sliding; to thrust, as a spear. See ex., *uhu* 1. 'Olelo *pakelo*, to talk in a wily, slippery fashion. **ho'o.pakelo.** Caus/sim. (PCP *pa(a)telo*.) 2. n. A purgative in which a slimy substance made of *hau* bark is drunk. 3. n. A seaweed.

pakelo.kelo. Redup. of *pakelo* 1.

pake.lona, paterona. n. Patron, patron saint. *Eng.*

pakemo. Same as *pakelo*.

pake.neka. n. Per cent, percentage. *Eng.*

pake'o. vi. To project, stick out, as the tongue tip (a gesture of contempt); slipped, escaped by slipping. **ho'o.pake'o.** To thrust out, slip out, etc.

pā.keo.keo. People who might eat with the chief. (And.)

pā.kepa. n. Extravagant mourning behavior, as knocking out the teeth, cutting the hair, destroying property.

pakē.pakē. 1. Redup. of *pakē* 1; friable. 2. n. A seaweed. Also *pakūpakū*.

pā.keu. vt. Excessive, over and above; to surpass. *Ua pākeu aku kō 'Au-kele lele i kō nā kaiko'eke* (For. 4:79), 'Au-kele's flying surpassed that of the brothers-in-law. **ho'o.pā.keu.** To increase, exceed. *Ua ho'opākeu 'ia aku nā keneka o ka waiwai kū'ai*, more cents were added to the sales value.

pā.keu.pali. vs. Excessively great, greatly exceeding. *Ka pākeupali aku o ke kuko*, the excessiveness of the lust.

pakt. vs. To splash, spatter, squirt, spurt; splashing, spattering, squirting. *Ka 'auwai pakt*, the ditch [that is but a] splatter. *Nānā nō a ka 'ulu i pakt kēpau*, look for the breadfruit spattered with gum [mature; *fig.*, a man of substance]. **ho'o.pakt.** To splash, spatter, etc. (PCP *patii*.)

pāki. n. 1. Barge. *Eng.* 2. Also *padi*. Paddy. *Eng.*

pā.kī. 1. vt. To smash, crush, pound, dash to pieces, flatten, throw; worn-out, driven to death, as an abused horse. Cf. *pāki 'ai*, *pāki lio*. **ho'o.pā.kī.** To smash, etc. 2. vs. Numerous, overplentiful, surfeit, so many of a thing that it is sold cheaply; well-equipped, abundant, well-supplied, well cared for. *Pāki ka hahalalū i ka mākeke*, the *hahalalū* [fish] were so numerous that they were sold cheaply in the market. **ho'o.pā.kī.** To act as though one has plenty, to show off, as by spending in a flashy way.

pā.kī'aha. v. To hold a glass, as to make a toast. *Nā 'ano wai pā kī'aha like 'ole*, all kinds of alcoholic drinks.

pā.kī'ai. vs. Over-sexed, sensual. *Lit.*, excessive copulation.

pā.kī'ai. 1. vs. Scorched, burned, parched, as land by the sun in hot months; sunburned. (Kep. 91.) *Lit.*, excessively eaten. 2. vi. To break up cooked taro with a pounder in first stage of poi making.

pā.kia'i. n. Watchman's stand, as in an enclosure or on a wall.

pā.ki'a.ki'a. vs. Wanton.

pā.ki'i. 1. vs. Flat, fallen flat, spread out flat, flattened. *Ihu pāki'i*, flat-nosed. *Moe pāki'i*, to lie sprawled. **ho'o.pā.ki'i.** To flatten out. 2. n. Various flatfishes (*Bothus mancus*). The name may be qualified by the
