

- ho'opilihua ai 'oia iā lākou i ke kilokilo 'ana* (Oih. 8.11), he had bewitched them with sorceries.
- pili.kaha.kai.** nvs. Shore, especially the area between high and low tides; near the shore.
- pili.kai.** n. 1. A vine (*Stictocardia tiliaefolia*) in the morning-glory family, native from India eastward, possibly into Polynesia, long known in Hawai'i, as on roadsides and rocky shores. Flowers are funnel-shaped, rose-purple, about 5.1 cm in diameter, the leaves heartshaped. (Neal 702.) 2. The wood rose (*Merremia tuberosa*), another kind of morning-glory, with deep yellow flowers and five- to seven-lobed leaves, grown ornamentally in Hawai'i for its dry, brown, rose-shaped fruit. (Neal 709.)
- pili.kā.mau.** n. Relationship by friendship rather than by blood or adoption. *Lit.*, added-on relative.
- pili.kana.** n. Relation, relationship, kin, family. (Probably *pili*, to cling, + *-kana*, nominalizer; Gram. 6.6.2.) (PCP *pilitanga*.)
- pili.kia.** nvi. Trouble of any kind, great or small; problem, nuisance, bother, distress, adversity, affliction, accident, difficulty, inconvenience, perturbation, tragedy, lack; in trouble, troubled, bothered, cramped, crowded (2 Nal. 6.1), unsafe. Cf. *-pau pilikia, wahi ho'opau pilikia. 'A'ole pilikia*, no trouble, no problem. *Ke noho kāua a pilikia 'ia au* (Kel. 60), when we live together and I get into difficulties. **ho'o.pili.kia.** To cause trouble, bother, disturb, inconvenience; to lead into difficulty, get into trouble, meddle. *Hō'ailona ho'opilikia*, inauspicious omen. (Possibly PNP *pilitia*; cf. Rennellese *pigitia*.)
- pili.kino.** vs. Personal, private, subjective, worldly. *Kākau 'ōlelo pilikino*, private secretary. *Paniinoa pili-kino*, personal pronoun.
- pili.ko'a.** n. 1. Hawkfish (*Paracirrhites forsteri*, *Cirrhites fasciatus*, *Amblycirrhites bimaculata*), 18 cm or less in length and light-pink in color. *Lit.*, coral clinging. Also *Cirrhites pinnulatus* and *Oxycirrhites typus*. 2. A native variety of sugar cane named for the fish; stems yellow-green, with pale brown-red stripes when young, changing to bronze-yellow with darker brown-red stripes. 3. A stiff kind of *pākalakala*, a seaweed (*Galaxaura lapidescens*).
- pili.koke.** vs. To be closely related; to be very close, intimate.
- pili.koko.** nvs. Blood relationship, blood relative; related by blood.
- pili.kua.** 1. nvs. Giant, large strapping fellow, country person, one living in the country; countrified. 2. n. Beloved husband. Cf. *piliālo*. 3. vi. To fight in single combat. *Rare*.
- pili.kua.** vi. To cling to the back.
- pili.lā.'au.** n. 1. Wooden house shingle. 2. Edge of a forest.
- pili.lā.'ele.** n. Dark green pandanus leaves with white bases, above the *lā'ele*, old leaves.
- pili.lau.lā.** vs. Of wide application, of broad or general interest.
- pili.lima.** nv. A guessing game: to guess the contents of another's folded hand. *Lit.*, wager hand.
- pili.loko.** nvs. A close relative, closely related; concerning local places.
- pili.lua.** nvi. A close companionship of two; to associate, of two; related in two ways.
- Pili-lua.** n. Name of a pair of stars, said to bring 'ōpelu fish.
- pili.mai.** n. 1. A native variety of sugar cane, a yellow-green mutant of 'akilolo; used in *hana aloha*, love sorcery, with the prayer for love to cling and hold fast. 2. A variety of taro. 3. A variety of sweet potato.
- Pili-mai.'u'u.** n. Same as *Ka-pili-mai'u'u*, a stroke in *lua* fighting. *Lit.*, clinging to fingernail.
- pili.mea.'ai.** Same as *ho'opilime'a'ai*. *Lit.*, close association [for] food. **ho'o.pili.mea.'ai.** (a) To attach oneself for personal gain, as to a chief (often said disparagingly); to fawn; to support, especially one in the wrong. *He kaikamahine mana'opa'a nō, 'a'ole e ho'opilime-*
- a'ai* (Laie 591), a resolute girl, not fawning. (b) Perjury; to commit perjury. *He hewa ho'opilime'a'ai*, perjury.
- pili-moe.** n. Name of one of the tapas in the game of *pūhenehene*.
- pili.mua.** n. Article, the part of speech: *ke, ka, he, nā*. *Pilimua maopopo*, definite article. *Pilimua maopopo 'ole*, indefinite article.
- pili.mua.** n. Elder relative; preferred friend or companion; former associate.
- pilina.** n. 1. Association, relationship, union, connection, meeting, joining, adhering, fitting. Cf. *pili 1. He pilina wehena 'ole*, an unseverable relationship. *Ua 'ewa ka pilina a ka nihoniho*, the toothed edges do not fit perfectly [said of anything that is unsuitable or in poor taste]. (PEP *pilinga*.) 2. Springs, as of a mattress, watch, car. *Eng. He mana'o ko'u i ke kano ko'ele; ua haki ka pilina a 'o luna iho* (song), my thought is of the snapping affair; the upper springs [of the automobile] were broken.
- Pili-nahe.** n. Rain name.
- pilina.moe.** n. Bedsprings.
- pilina'ohana.** n. Kinship.
- pili.nohona.** n. Family or social structure.
- pili.'oki, bilioki.** n. Billiards. *Eng.*
- pili'ole.** vs. Unrelated, not concerned with.
- pili.'ō.lēlo.** n. Grammar, word or sentence structure.
- pili.pā.** loc. n. Alongside a fence or enclosure; hedge (Luk. 14.23). See ex., *kāpuku*.
- pili.pā'a.** vs. To stick firmly, associate constantly; to live in harmony; to fit closely, tenacious.
- pili.papa.** n. Shingle roofing.
- pili.pili.** 1. Redup. of *pili 1*; any sticky matter, adhesive; pasty, gluey, viscid. *He mea 'ai 'ia kahi pilipili maunu kāpae 'ia*, the bit of bait set to one side is edible still [one who has been the mate of another can still be a good mate]. **ho'o.pili.pili.** Redup. of *ho'opili*; to court, woo, make advances (FS 155); to associate in close friendship; to claim relationship, especially if unwarranted. *'Ōlelo ho'opilipili*, figurative language, simile (cf. *ho'opilipili 'ōlelo*, below). (PPN *pilipili*.) 2. Same as *pipili 2*, an herb.
- pili.pili'āina.** vs. Close to land. *'A'ohē pilipili 'āina mai*, not anywhere near land [far off].
- pilipili al'i. ho'o.pili.pili al'i.** To claim relationship to a chief, as of one only remotely related, or of one desirous of favors.
- pili.pili he'e.** n. 1. Thin ends of octopus tentacles, as braided together when dried. 2. Octopus or squid ink sac (*'ala'ala*) molded about a fishhook for bait.
- pili.pili.kana.** Redup. of *pilikana*.
- pili.pili.ko'a.** Same as *piliko'a 3*.
- pilipili 'ōlelo. ho'o.pili.pili 'ō.lēlo.** Word play, punning; to illustrate a point with parables, stories, anecdotes.
- pili.pili'ula.** n. A close blood relationship to one of high rank; this was said by persons entering the *hale nauā*, desirous of asserting their royal blood. (Malo 199, Emerson note.) *Lit.*, red relationship [red was a sacred color].
- pili.pili'ula.** Same as *mānienie 'ula*, a grass; also *Desmodium uncinatum* on Ni'ihau.
- Pili.pino, Filipino.** nvs. Philippines; Filipino. *Eng.*
- pili.piula.** n. Corrugated iron roofing.
- pili.pō.haku.** n. A fish (no data).
- pili.poli.** vs. To be close to the bosom or heart (affectionate).
- pili.pono.** vs. Well-suited, well-matched; close-fitting, as clothes; to refer exactly or concisely. *Mana'o pili.pono*, literal meaning. *Ā ua pili.pono nā 'ōlelo e like me ka mea hiki*, and as concise in language as possible.
- pili.pū.** vi. To unite, join, cling to; hard-pressed, as in danger. *Pili.pū ka hanu*, hardly able to breathe; to hold the breath, as in astonishment or fear. *Pili.pū i ka paia*, backed up against the wall, hard-pressed. *Ua pili.pū ko'u mau iwi me ko'u 'i'o* (Hal. 102.5), my bones cleave to my flesh. *Pili.pū ka pilina*, the springs are broken; *lit.*, packed down.
