

pō.ale.ale. Redup. of *poale*; pierced; wound. Cf. *aleale*.

pō.'ali. Same as *mō'ali*.

Pō.'alima. 1. nvs. Friday. *Lit.*, fifth day. 2. nvi. Work on the chief's plantations, so called because this work was done on Fridays; the chiefs' plantation where the people worked on Fridays; to work thus (For. 5:709). 'A'ole i Pō'alima 'ia mamua, not used as a Pō'alima before.

Pō.'alima Hemo.lele. n. Good Friday.

Pō.'alima Mai.ka'i. n. Good Friday.

pō.'alo. vt. To gouge out, scoop out, pluck, extract; to shell, as beans; to reach up at.

pō.'alo maka. nv. To gouge out the eyes; an eye gouge for torturing criminals. *Fig.*, an ungrateful person who repays kindness by unkindness, especially by stealing a mate.

Pō.'alua. n. Tuesday. *Lit.*, second day. See 'auhau Pō-'alua.

po'ana. 1. Same as *po'a* 3. *Kai po'ana*, eroding, undermining sea. 2. vs. Weary, sore, lame, fatigued. *Rare*.

pō.'ana.'ana. Redup. of *po'ana* 2. *Rare*.

Pō.'aono. n. Saturday. *Lit.*, sixth day. *Ho'omana Pō-'aono*, Seventh Day Adventist religion.

po'a.po'ai. 1. Redup. of *pō'ai*. 2. n. A worm shell, a marine mollusk of the family Vermetidae. Also *kio po'a-po'ai*, *pōhakupēle*, *pohokūpele*.

po'a.po'ala. Redup. of *pō'ala* 1-3.

po'a.po'a.pō.lā. vi. To gad about from house to house, especially of persons who eat constantly at houses of others. *Rare*.

pōe. 1. vs. Round; rounded. **ho'o.pōe.** To round; to form into a round shape, as a loaf of bread. *Pipi ho'o-pōe*, meat ball. 'Okī ho'opōe, to cut the hair evenly on all sides. 2. n. A sweet potato. 3. n. Stone poi pounder. *Rare*. 4. n. A fish (no data). 5. Also **boe.** n. Boy. *Eng.* *He poe mai au no Hawai'i* (song), I'm a boy from Hawai'i. 6. n. Buoy. *Eng.*

po'e. 1. n. People, persons, personnel, population, assemblage, group of, company of. (Gram. 10.4.) 'Ewalu ka po'e kaua (FS 97), eight groups of warriors. 2. Plural marker. (Gram. 10.4.) *Ka po'e wāhine*, the women. *Po'e hale*, houses. *Po'e nalo meli* (Lunk. 14.8), swarm of bees. 3. Var. of *po'i* 5. (Kep. 157.) 4. n. A native purslane (*Portulaca sclerocarpa*), with narrow, succulent leaves which have many hairs in their axes and white flowers.

pōea. Same as *poe* 1.

po'ea. Same as *po'e* 2.

po'ē.'ē. Same as *pō'ae'ae*. (Ier. 38.12.)

pōehi. Var. spelling of *powehi*. **ho'o.pōehi.** Caus/sim.

pōehi.ehi. Var. spelling of *pōwehiwehi*.

pōeko, poweko. vs. Fluent, eloquent, clever and able in speaking.

po'e kū.'ai. n. Merchants.

pō.ēle. nvs. Black, dark; dark night. *Fig.*, ignorant, benighted. (PCP *po(o)kele*; cf. Maori *pokele*.)

pō.ēle.ēle. Redup. of *pō'ele*. *Pō'ele'ele e nalo ai ka 'ili o ke kanaka*, darkness in which the skin of man vanishes.

pōe pōe. n. Bellboy. *Eng.*

pōe.pōe. 1. nvs. Round, rounded, circular; compact, compressed; full, as the moon; sphere, globe; to gather together in a circle. *Uea poepoe*, smooth wire [contrasting with barbed]. *E 'aiana i nā kāwele i poepoe*, iron the towels so they will be compact. *Nele i ka mea poepoe*, lacking round things [i.e., dollars]. **ho'o.pōe.pōe.** Redup. of *ho'opoe*. (Oihk. 19.27.) 2. n. A euphemism for penis in the phrase 'okī poepoe, subincision, circumcision.

po'e.po'e. Redup. of *po'e* 2.

pōe.pōe.hā.wa'ē. n. Flat sphere; oval. *Lit.*, sea-urchin round.

pōe.pōe honua. n. Globe of the earth.

po'e.po'ēle. Same as *pō'ele'ele*. *Ua po'epo'ele Hilo*, Hilo is darkened.

pōe.pōe.pī.koi. n. Oval; sphere. *Lit.*, core roundness.

pohā. 1. nvi. to burst, crack, break forth, crash, pop,

bang; to ferment (of poi); bursting, cracking, as of explosives or of a whip; flashing of light, breaking of bubbles. *Ua pohā ka 'ai*, poi is bubbly [in fermentation]. *Ua pohā ka male*, the phlegm has come up into the mouth. *Mālama o pohā ka lae*, watch out or [you] will crack [your] forehead [get into trouble; be shocked at the high prices]. **ho'o.pohā.** To cause to break, burst; to crack, as a whip. *Ho'opohā maila ho'i ka mea ki'eki'e loa i kona leo* (2 Sam. 22.14), the most high uttered his voice. (Probably PCP *pofa(a)*.) 2. n. The cape gooseberry (*Physalis peruviana*), a South American perennial herb in the tomato family, growing wild. Flowers are yellow; round, orange, many-seeded fruits develop singly within the heart-shaped, papery, enlarged calyxes; they are edible raw and are also cooked for jam. (Neal 740-1.) Called *pa'ina* on Hawai'i. 3. Same as *pohāpohā*, a seaweed.

pō.hā. Short for *pōhaku*, stone.

pō.hae. vs. Torn, easily torn, fragile. **ho'o.pō.hae.** To tear, as a hole in cloth.

pō.hae.hae. Redup. of *pōhae*.

pō.haha. Same as *pō'aha* 1. *Rare*.

pō.hā.hā. Redup. of *pohā* 1; volcanic ejecta of any kind. See ex., *mūkā*. *Ke pōhāhā mai nei ka lā*, the sun is breaking forth.

pō.hā.hā ahi. n. Fireball.

pō.hā.hā wai. n. Bubble. *Lit.*, water bursting.

pō.hai. nvi. Circle, group, as of people, trees (For. 5:287); gathering; to gather about in a circle. Also *pō'ai*. *Pōhai-nani* (name of a retirement home, O'ahu), beauty surrounded. *He pōhai ali'i*, a group or circle of chiefs, people constantly in a chief's circle of companions. *Pōhai 'ula*, red cloud, as of dust.

pō.haka. n. Splotch, spot, dot; small area, as a bald spot; a spot in a design. *Pōhaka ke'oke'o*, white splotch, as of tinea, a skin disease.

pohā ka'a. n. Rolling stone; thunder, peal of thunder, so called because thunder was believed caused by the gods hurling stones in the heavens. *Kāne-i-ka-pohā-ka'a* (a name for the god Kāne), Kāne of the rolling stones.

pō.haka lā. n. Sunbeam.

pō.hā.kau. n. 1. Anchor. *Rare*. 2. Stone that travelers rest on. *Rare*.

pohā kea. nvi. Bursting forth of light, as dawn.

pō.hā kea. n. White stone, as limestone.

pō.hā.kia.loa. n. Stone used as a landmark, as of a land boundary, or for locating a fishing ground; stone with a knob at the top, used as a weight for deep-sea fishing; fishing grounds about 260 m deep (Kam. 76:75, 90).

pō.hā kī.hēlei. n. Balancing stone, said to be the name of a water game, in which one person sank with a stone in his hand and tried to pull others down.

pō.hā.ki'i.ki'i. vt. To carry on the shoulders, as a favorite child who holds on to the head, with legs dangling down in front. See *lei 'ā'i*.

pō.hā.kio.loa. Var. of *pōhākialoa*.

Pohā-kō'ele.'ele. Same as 'Ikuwā, a month of storms; also said to be the name of a rain occurring in that month (For. 5:663). *Lit.*, break forth in storms.

pō.hā.ko'i. n. Firm rock or obstruction; prominent cliff. *Rare*.

pō.hā.kō.'t. n. Rock avalanche. *Rare*.

pō.haku. 1. nvs. Rock, stone, mineral, tablet; sinker (see ex., *pīkoi* 3); thunder; rocky, stony. See *haku* 3. *Mauna Pōhaku*, Rocky Mountains. *Ke ka'a maila ka pōhaku*, the thunder peals. **ho'o.pō.haku.** To harden, as lava; to petrify; hard. *Fig.*, stubborn. (PPN *fatu*, PCP *poo-fatū*.) 2. vs. Weighted with rocks, hence stationary, not moving. *Pōhaku kaomi moena*, a stone weighing down a mat, said of a homebody. *Pōhaku 'au wa'a lā le'ale'a i kai nei* (chant), fleet of canoes at anchor, happy here at sea. **ho'o.pō.haku.** To remain long in one place; to stay at home. *E ho'opōhaku, e noho mālie* (chant), stay, rest quietly. 3. n. Type of crab. See below.

pō.haku 'ā.nai. n. Stone rubber.

pō.haku 'ā.nai pua'a. n. Stone for rubbing off singed hair of pigs.
