

- po'o.lā.nui.** n. Young stage of dragonfly, between the larval stage (*lohelohe*) and adulthood (*pinao*); beggar-ticks. *Lit.*, great sun head.
- po'o.lā.nui.** n. A native species of *ko'oko'olau* (*Bidens cosmoides*), on Kaua'i only, with yellow flowers 5 cm across.
- po'o.lau.** n. Leaf base; butt end of a leaf.
- po'o.lēka.** n. Postage stamp. *Lit.*, letter head. See ex., 'ili'ili.
- po'o.lēka.kaua.** n. War-savings stamp. *Lit.*, war stamp.
- pō.ō.lēlo.** Short for *po'ō.ō.lēlo*.
- po'o.lima.** n. A half note (music). *Lit.*, arm note.
- Po'o-lipi.lipi.** n. A rain associated with Ka-lihi, O'ahu, and Hilo, Hawai'i (For. 5:119). *Lit.*, adzelike head, said to be so called because this heavy rain forced the people to spend so much time sleeping that their heads were sharpened as though by an adze.
- pō.ōlo.pū.** nvi. Blister; to billow out, as wind-filled clothes.
- po'o.lua.** nvi. Child sired by other than the husband, but accepted by both husband and sire; this acceptance increased the number of relatives of the child who gave their loyalty to him as kinsmen; it thus fostered the prestige of children of chiefs; translated "adulterous" in the 1843 Bible (Mar. 8.38), but changed in later editions. *Po'o.lua 'ia* (Ii 152), to be doubly fathered.
- po'o.luluhi.** Same as *poluluhi*. *Lit.*, tired head.
- po'o.mahi.ole.** n. Crest, as of a bird. *Lit.*, helmet head.
- po'o.mana.** n. An eighth note (music). *Lit.*, branching note, named for the stem mark.
- po'o.mana.kolu.** n. A thirty-second note (music). *Lit.*, triple branching note.
- po'o.mana.lua.** n. A sixteenth note (music). *Lit.*, doubly branching note.
- po'o.mana'o.** n. Topic, title, theme, heading, headline; subtitle, as of law. *Lit.*, thought heading.
- po'o.maunu.** n. Bait remainder. *Ola nō ka lawai'a i kahi po'o.maunu*, the fisherman can live on leftover bait.
- po'o.muku.** vs. Cut off, severed, shortened. See ex., *kāpala*.
- po'o.niu.niu.** n. Dizzy head. Same as *pōniuniu*.
- po'o.no'o, po'o.no'o.no'o.** n. A thinker, a thoughtful head.
- po'o.nui.** 1. n. A variety of 'ahi, tuna fishes, with a short body and thin tail. 2. vs. Top-heavy, as a house. (Kam. 76:97.)
- Po'o-nui.** n. Name of a cold, continuous rain. (Kep. 97.)
- po'o.nui.** nvs. Hangover, worried head, worry; to be a "headache" or source of trouble (Kel. 45).
- po'o.ōle.** vs. Illegitimate. *Lit.*, no head.
- po'o.ō.lēlo.** n. Title, as of an article; text, as of a sermon. *Lit.*, speech heading.
- po'o.ō.pae.** n. Shrimp head, an opprobrious term because the shrimp's excretory organs are said to be in its head.
- po'o.pa'a.** n. Hawkfish (*Cirrhites pinnulatus*), about 10 to 22cm long with large scales on body and small scales on face, colored in blotches of blue, brown, and red with white vertical bars; eaten raw, broiled, or salted and dried. *Lit.*, hard head. Also 'o'opu kai, 'o'opu po'opa'a, piliko'a. See ex., *hōkai*.
- po'o.pa'a.** vs. Hardheaded, stubborn, obstinate, unreasonable, set in one's ways.
- po'o.palaoa.** n. A kind of white shell (no data). *Lit.*, ivory head.
- po'o.pao'o.** n. Name for highest tip of the canoe end-piece.
- po'o.pā.pale.** n. A drooping crest, as of some birds. *Lit.*, hat head.
- po'o.pepe.** n. Flathead, a name for lesser gods. (Kep. 19.)
- po'o.po'o.** Redup. of *po'o* 3; sunken, as eyes of a sick person; indented, deep (as a bay penetrating the coastline); nook, cranny. 'A'ohe 'oe i 'ike i ko'u po'opo'o, you did not know my nooks and crannies [about my family and background]. *Ua 'eli ihola 'oia i ka lua a po'opo'o* (Hal. 7.15), he dug the pit deep. **ho'o.po'o.-po'o.** Redup. of *ho'opo'o*. (PPN *pokopoko*.)
- po'o.po'o.hina.** Same as *kīpūkai*, seaside heliotrope. Also *lau po'opo'ohina*. Both names on Ni'ihau.
- po'o.pua'a.** n. 1. Head pupil in a hula school. *Lit.*, pig head, so named because the head pupil provided a pig or pig-head offering. Cf. UL 29. 2. Image of a pig, carved of wood such as *kukui*, placed on the stone heap marking the boundary of an *ahupua'a* land division. 3. Offering. See ex., *pua'a* 1.
- po'o.pū.ali.** n. Any depression in the head, as a sunken temple.
- po'o.pu'u.** n. Bulging head; hilltop. *Fig.*, sullen, unsocial person.
- po'ou.** n. 1. Wrasse (*Cheilinus rhodochrous*). Varieties are qualified by the colors *kea* and 'ula. 2. Same as 'a'awa, wrasse.
- po'o.uli.** n. Honeycreeper (*Melamprosops phaeosoma*), discovered in 1973 by Tonnie Casey and James Jacobi, upper Hāna rainforest, Maui, named by Kawena Puku'i. *Lit.*, black head.
- po'o.wai.** n. Water source or head, dam. Cf. 'iole po'o wai.
- pō.pahi.** Small, of man or woman. (And.)
- Pope.** 1. nvs. Pope; papist, Catholic. *Eng.* *Hō'ole Pope*, Protestant; *lit.*, deny Pope. *Ho'omanapope*, Catholic religion. 2. (Not cap.) n. Poppy. *Eng.*
- popela.** n. Poplar. (Kin. 30.37.) *Eng.*
- pō.pili.kia.** n. Trouble, distress, tribulation, straits, disaster, calamity, ordeal, hardship, adversity, misfortune. *Ulia pōpilikia*, crisis, emergency. *Ke'ena o nā pōpilikia kūikawā*, industrial accident board. **ho'o.pō.pili.kia.** To cause distress, harm, trouble; to afflict.
- popo.** Same as *popopo*. *Ua 'ai 'ia e ka popo kō 'oukou kula, a me kō 'oukou kālā, he hō'ike ka popo o ia mau mea* (Iak. 5.3), your gold and silver are cankered, and the rust of these things shows. (PPN *popo*.)
- pō.pō.** 1. nvt. Ball, round mass, wad; cluster, bunch, as of flowers; to shape or wad up into a ball or bundle; baskets of 'ie'ie vine as used by *nehu* fishermen to collect *nehu* (For. 6:481). Cf. *kinipōpō*, *Pōpō-kapa*, *Pōpō-ua*. **ho'o.pō.pō.** To shape or wad into a ball. (PCP *poopoo*.) 2. Short for 'apōpō, tomorrow.
- pō.pō.ahi.** n. Fireball.
- pō.pō'ai.** n. Ball of poi or other food.
- pō.pō'au.huhu.** n. Ball of pulverized 'auhuhu as inserted in coral to poison fish. *Fig.*, poison, danger, venomous attack. *Mālama pono 'oe i kānā pōpō 'auhuhu*, watch out for a venomous attack from him.
- popoe.** Redup. of *po'e* 1.
- pō.pō.hau.** n. The hydrangea (*Hydrangea macrophylla*), an eastern Asiatic shrub, grown for the large, rounded or flat-topped clusters of pink, white, or blue flowers. In Hawai'i it succeeds at high, cool altitudes. (Neal 381.)
- pō.pō.hau.** n. Snowball, ball of snow.
- pō.pō-hau-o-Ni'i.hau.** n. A large sedge with edible seeds.
- popohe.** nvs. Round, shapely; neat and trim, as flowers; roundness, a round or clean-cut object. *Ka popohe lau o ka palai*, the dainty leaf roundness of the *palai* fern. **ho'o.popohe.** Caus/sim.
- popohe.maka.li'i.** Same as 'o'oi, a seaweed.
- popo.iwi.** n. Inside corner. Cf. *kihi*. *Ma ka popoiwi o ka pā* (2 Oihn. 26.9), at the turning of the wall.
- pō.pō.iwi.** n. Bundle of bones, as preserved of beloved relatives.
- Pō.pō-kapa.** n. Rain name. *Lit.*, tapa bundle, so-called because people bundled up tapa during rains to keep it from becoming wet. Also *Pōpō-ua*.
- pō.pō.kā.pa'i.** n. Ball of medicinal herbs used for massage.
- popoke.** Var. of *pokepoke*.
- popoki.** 1. Var. of *pokipoki* 1, 2; short, thick. (FS 235.) 2. (Cap.) n. Name of a *lua* fighting stroke, said to be used by women as well as men.
- pō.poki.** n. Cat (noted in Arago's 1819 vocabulary; said
