

- (Zep. 2.14) (RSV); in KJV, both references, bittern, heron. *Pua'a 'ili 'oi'oi* of the 1843 Hawaiian Bible was changed in later editions to *kipoda*.
- pua'a.inaka.** n. An endemic long-branched plant (*Stenogyne rotundifolia*) in the mint family, found only on Mount Hale-a-ka-lā; the 2.5 cm long flowers woolly, purple-tinted, in whorls of six; the leaves round and rough.
- Pua'a-kā-hulu.hulu.** n. Same as *Ka-pua'a-kā-huluhulu*.
- pua'a kai.** n. Certain fish (as *āhole*, *'ama'ama*, *'anae*, *humuhumunukunukuapua'a*, *kūmū*, *pualu*) used as substitute for pig offering. *Lit.*, sea pig.
- pua'a kāne.** n. Boar.
- pua'a kau.** n. Hog offered as sacrifice.
- pua'a.kuhi.nia.** Same as *pākahakaha*, a fern.
- pua'a.kukui.** n. Carved log of *kukui* wood placed with hard taro (*pa'i 'ai*) on the altar marking boundary of *ahupua'a*. (Malo 163.)
- pua'a kumu.lau.** n. Sow, pig who has borne young.
- pua 'ala.** Same as *ālula*, lobelia. *Moloka'i. Lit.*, fragrant flower.
- pua'a laho.** n. Boar; term of reproach for a lecherous male, named for the pig demigod, Kama-pua'a. *Lit.*, scrotum hog.
- pua'a lau.** n. Name for plants that might replace pig in some sacrifices, a favorite being young taro leaves. Others were *'ama'u*, *hāpu'u*, *kūkaepua'a*, *kukui*, *olomea*, and *'uhaloa*. They were considered the plant forms of the pig demigod, Kama-pua'a. *Lit.*, leaf pig.
- pua ali'i.** n. Descendant of a chief.
- pua alo.alo.** n. Hibiscus flower. See *aloalo*.
- pua'a.lohe.lohe.** n. Larvae of dragonfly (*lohelohe*) used ceremonially as an offering.
- pua'a mā.iki.** n. Small pig.
- pua.anē.anē, puane.anē.** n. Extremity of life, extreme old age. *Kau i ka puaaneane*, to reach a stage of advanced old age.
- pua 'anuho.** Same as *laulele*, butterfly weed (*Asclepias*). *Lit.*, caterpillar flower.
- pua'a nui huēlo hulu.hulu.** n. Horse (old name, *Lā-na'i*). *Lit.*, big animal hairy tail.
- pua'a ohi.** n. A young female pig that has not borne young.
- pua'a 'ō.kala.kala.** n. Hedgehog. *Lit.*, rough pig.
- pua'a olo.mēa.** n. 1. A striped pig. 2. Poetic name for the *olomea*, a tree. Kama-pua'a took this form when pursued by Pele.
- pua 'ā.piki.** n. A name for the 'ilima flower. See *'āpiki*.
- pua'a pipi.** n. Early name for cattle when brought to the islands by Vancouver. *Lit.*, beef (*Eng.*) pig.
- pua'a pū.ko'a.** n. Spotted pig. *Lit.*, coral head pig.
- pua'a ū.kō.** n. Pig offering at the death of a chief as a plea to the *'aumākua* gods to receive the spirit of the departed. *Lit.*, fulfillment pig.
- pua.'awa.'awa.** n. Great hunger. *Rare. Lit.*, issuing sourness.
- pua'a wahine.** n. Sow.
- pua'a wā.wāe loloa.** See saying, *maka helei*.
- pua.ea.** vi. To expire, breathe one's last. *Puaea ka manu o Ka'ula i ke kai*, the bird of Ka'ula expires at sea [utter destruction, as of birds dropping dead while flying overseas].
- pua ehu.** vi. To blow spray or dust. *Pua ehu akula ka moana*, the ocean spray flies.
- pua 'ehu.** vi. To shine brightly, as reddish flowers. *Pua 'ehu maila uka* (For. 6:545), the uplands sparkled with red color.
- pua 'ēna.** vi. To glow brightly.
- pua.hala.** n. 1. A medium-sized bowl, as used for serving poi, named for a supposed resemblance to a pandanus key (*pua hala*). 2. A variety of sugar cane.
- pua-hala.** n. Design in tapa and patchwork quilts.
- pua hala.** n. Bright yellow base of a pandanus (*hala*) key that may be used for leis.
- pu'a hana lepo.** Same as *pu'u ki'o*.
- pū.'aha.nui.** Same as *kanawao 1*, small trees.
- pua hau.** 1. n. Blossoms of *hau*, a tree. 2. vs. Yellow, as a *malo*. *Moa pua hau*, chicken with yellowish feathers at neck and flanks.
- puahe.ahē.** Var. spelling of *pua aheahe*.
- pua.hēkili.** n. One of the native loosestrifes (*Lysimachia hillebrandii*). *Lit.*, thunder flower. Cf. *kolokolo kuahiwi*.
- puahi.** 1. Var. spelling of *pua ahi*. 2. Same as *puahia*, spry, quick. *ho'o.puahi*. Caus/sim.
- pua.hia.** vs. 1. Spry, quick. *Holo puahia i ka wao o lehua*, swiftly running in the *lehua* forest. 2. Hazy, gray.
- puahi.ahi.** Var. spelling of *pua ahiahi*, a flower.
- pua.hia.hia.** Redup. of *puahia 1, 2*.
- pua hila.hila.** n. The sensitive plant (*Mimosa pudica* var. *unijuga*), a low, spreading American plant, with round pink flower heads. The leaves, compound, with many small leaflets, droop and close when touched. (Neal 412.) *Lit.*, bashful flower.
- puā.hilo.** 1. vs. Fine, slender, frail as a spider's web, delicate. 2. vi. To chap, peel, crack, as skin.
- pua.hilo.hilo.** Redup. of *puāhilo 1, 2*. *Hilo, he puahilo-hilo ke 'ano, no ka mea 'a'ole i aka loa a'e kona nui, akā ua mō'ali ma'awe ke'oke'o iki wale nō* (Kep. 99), the lunar night of Hilo, the nature of the moon is a narrow sliver, because its full size has not been made clear, but is just a small white fibrous strand.
- pua.hina.** vs. Gray. *Ka lani pua hina o ka ho'oilo*, the gray skies of winter.
- pua.hio.** vi. To come and go swiftly, as a puff or gust of wind.
- pua.hio.hio.** 1. Redup. of *puahio*; whirlwind, gust. *Fig.*, worthless talk. See ex., *ko'i'ula*, For. 5:93. *E lawe aku 'o Iehova iā 'Elia i ka lani ma ka puahiohio* (2 Nal. 2.1), Jehovah was to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind. (PPN 'asiosio.) 2. (*Cap.*) n. Wind, Nu'u-anu, O'ahu. (Nak. 57.)
- pua hipa.** n. Lamb. Also *hipa keiki*.
- pū.'ā hipa.** n. Flock of sheep.
- pua hō.kū.** n. A tropical American herb (*Laurentia [Isotoma] [Hippobroma] longiflora*), 30 to 60 cm high, with few or no branches, with long, narrow, lobed leaves, and starlike flowers with 7.5 cm long tube. The plant is related to the lobelias. It is poisonous, especially to stock. (Neal 818.) *Lit.*, star flower.
- pua hō.kū hihī.** n. The waxflower (*Hoya bicarinata*), an ornamental vine from Samoa, Tonga, and Fiji, in the milkweed family. Leaves are thick, broad-oval, paired, at their bases bearing short clusters of waxy, fragrant, white and pink, star-shaped flowers used for leis. (Neal 700.) *Lit.*, entangled star flower.
- puā.holē.** Var. spelling of *pua āhole*, young of *āhole*.
- pua.huku.** n. A term of contempt; perhaps literally rising octopus head; said also to refer to erections not followed by satisfaction. *Rare*.
- pua.hulu.** Same as *pupuāhulu*.
- pua'i.** vi. To flow out, as water; to bubble or gurgle, boil; to vomit; to appear, as a color; to utter, as speech (probably *pua 2 + -a'i*, Gram. 6.6.4). (Mar. 7.15; Jer. 6.7.) *Pua'i wai*, fountain. *'A'ohe pua'i leo mai*, no word uttered. *Pua'i mai ka 'ula mai loko mai o ka 'ele'ele*, the red shows through the black. *ho'o.pua'i*. To cause to flow, show, etc. (PPN *pu'aki*.)
- pū 'ai.** v. To share a little food, take potluck. See *pū 9*.
- pū.'ā.'T.** n. Adam's apple (probably from *pu'u 'ā'T*, neck lump).
- pua i'a.** n. Fish spawn.
- pū.aia.lewa.** Same as *pūailewa*.
- pua 'i'i.** n. Tiny fry of fish.
- pua'i.leho.** Same as *puleileho*.
- pū.ai.lewa, pū.aia.lewa.** 1. vs. Suspended in the air, as clouds. 2. vi. To breathe with difficulty, gasp. 3. n. Name of a drastic remedy made of *pāpa'ahēkili* bark. *Rare*.
- pua 'ilima.** n. 'Ilima flower; eaten as a mild cathartic, especially by children.
