

- small, light-colored; leaves small, compound. (Neal 455-6.) Also *pūpūkiawe*, *pūkiawe lei*, to distinguish from *pūkiawe 2* and *pūkiawe 'ula'ula* on Ni'ihau. **2.** Native shrubs and small trees (*Styphelia* [*Cyathodes*], all species and varieties), 1 to 2 (rarely 4.5) m high, common near KI-lau-ea Volcano, bearing narrow leaves 1.3 cm long, tiny whitish flowers, and many round red to white fruits .6 cm in diameter. The leaves were used medicinally for cold or headache. (Neal 663-4.) Also 'a'ali'i mahu, kānehōa, kāwa'u, maiele, pūpūkiawe.
- pū.kiawe lena.lena.** n. *Abrus precatorius* f. *lutiseminalis*. Ni'ihau.
- pū kihi lua.** See *kihi*.
- pū.kiki'i.** n. A variety of flying fish.
- pū.ki'i 1.** vt. To tie. For variants see *niki'i*. *Pūki'i wa'a*, clamps for binding down the canoe gunwale strake (*mo'o*) while it was being secured to the canoe. **2.** Same as *puhiki'i*.
- Puki.ki.** **1.** nvs. Portuguese. Eng. *Pukiki* 'ele'ele, dark-skinned Portuguese. *Palaoa Pukiki*, Portuguese sweetbread. *Pi'ipi'i Pukiki*, kinky hair. **2.** n. A tight-waisted dress, supposedly worn once by Portuguese.
- pū.ki.ki.** vs. Strong, boisterous, stormy, as wind.
- pū.ki.lū.** n. Shotgun. Lit., gun that shoots gunshots.
- pū.kini.** n. Pudding. Eng.
- pū.kipa.** n. Bookkeeper. Eng.
- pū.ki.wai, pū.ki.ki.wai.** n. Water gun, squirt gun. Lit., gun shooting water.
- pū.kō.** Same as *pua'o*; driven away. *Ho'okahi nō peku 'ana a ka moa mahi, pūkō ana* (FS 63), a single kick of the chicken champion, driven off.
- pū.kō.** n. Clump of sugar cane. Cf. *pū.kō.ko'o*. 'A'ohe *pū.kō.momona* (For. 5:407), there is no clump of sugar cane that can sweeten him [said of a great warrior who has no worthy foe, of one in great anger, or of a dreadful situation].
- pū.ko'a.** **1.** n. Coral head. *Pūko'a wāwahi wa'a*, a coral head that wrecks canoes. *Pūko'a kani 'āina*, a reef that makes the land ring [a great and invulnerable fighter]. **2.** vs. Spotted, as in several colors. Cf. *pua'a pūko'a*. **3.** vi. To rise, blow, as smoke. *Ua pūko'a a'ela ka uahi* (Hal. 18.8), the smoke rose. **4.** Same as *pu'uka'a*, a plant.
- pū.ko'a.ko'a.** **1.** Redup. of *pūko'a 1*, **2.** *Hina-ka-ōnohipūko'ako'a* (name), Hina the many-colored rainbow bit. **2.** n. A somewhat calcified green seaweed (*Halimeda* sp.), erect but not stiff, about 10 cm high, branching and spreading in fan shape, with round to triangular, flattened joints. Used medicinally, pounded up with *laukahi* (*Plantago*) and applied as a poultice to boils. The name may be qualified by the terms *lau li'i* and *lau nui*.
- pū.kohu.kohu.** vs. Red, of tapa, as dyed with *noni* juice (Malo 49). (FS 252-3.)
- pū.kō.kō.ō.** n. The lashing that holds the canoe spreader (*wae*) in place on a canoe. *Pūkōke'e, 'oia ke kaula e hiki'iki'i ai i ka wae*, the *pūkōke'e* ties down the canoe spreader.
- pū.koko.** vs. To appear red, as sunset glow or blood. *E pūkoko ana ka lā i ke kai* (chant), the sun shines red in the sea. (PCP *puutoto*.)
- pū.kō.kō.** vi. To cackle, coo; cackling, cooing. See more common *kōkō*.
- pū.kō.ko'o.** n. Sugarcane clumps held up with sticks to prevent the long stems from falling down and taking root. Also *pū.ko'o*.
- pū.kolo.** n. Team, as of oxen or mules pulling a plow.
- Pū.kō.loa.** n. Name of a star.
- pū.kolu.** n. **1.** Trio, triplet. *Ua hānau pūkolu 'ia*, born as triplets. **2.** Triple canoe. (Laie 461, Malo 131.)
- pū.kona.kona.** vs. Strong, husky, muscular, virile, tough, mighty. Cf. *konakona*.
- pū.ko'o.** Same as *pū.kō.ko'o*.
- puku.** **1.** vi. To gather together, pucker; shrunken, contracted. Cf. *pukupuku, pupuku, hāpuku*. *Ua puku 'ia nā lau lā'i*, the ti leaves have shriveled up. (PPN *putu*.) **2.** nvt. Final offering; to end. *Puku 'awa*, final kava offering. Property given by a chief into the care of his servants. (And.)
- pukua.** Pas/imp. of *puku 1* and *puku 2*; to offer, as a fish.
- pū.kua.lau.** n. Winter crookneck squash (*Cucurbita moschata*). (Neal 813.)
- pū.ku'i.** **1.** vi. To collect, assemble, as people, things (*puku + -i*, transitivizer: Gram. 6.6.4). **ho'o.pū.ku'i.** To collect, assemble. **2.** n. Council, assembly, as of chiefs or gods, especially of the major gods, Kāne, Kū, Lono, and Kanaloa (*pūku'i akua*). (PPN *pu(u)tuki*.) **3.** vi. To sit doubled up, as for protection from the cold; to nestle together, as in embrace; to hug, huddle. *Ho'i mai ke anu o ka ho'oilo, pūku'i aku au ma kō poli* (song), the cold of winter returns, I nestle close within your arms. **ho'o.pū.ku'i.** Caus/sim. **4.** n. Hub, as of a wheel. *Uhi pūku'i*, hub cap.
- pū.ku'i.ku'i.** Redup. of *pūku'i*. **3.** *Piha pūku'iku'i*, crowded, packed full.
- puku.kā.lina.** n. Collected sweet-potato vines. Poetical, a stormy or whirling wind.
- puku.ku'i.** **1.** Redup. of *pūku'i 1*, **3.** *Pukuku'i lua i ke ko'eko'e* (song), embracing tightly in the cold. **2.** n. A fish (no data).
- puku.lia.** Pas/imp. of *puku 1*. *Na Māui i pukulia i nā moku*, the islands were pulled together by Māui.
- puku.moa.** vs. Saving, miserly. Rare. **ho'o.puku.moa.** Saving, miserly. Rare.
- pū.kuni.ahi.** n. Cannon. Lit., gun burning fire. See ex., *nāku'i*.
- puku.puku.** Redup. of *puku 1*; wrinkles, crumples, frowning; to wrinkle, frown, purse, as the lips. *Puku-puku mai* (slang), to fetch, bring. *Pukupuku ku'emaka*, wrinkled brow. **ho'o.puku.puku.** Same as above and transitive. (PPN *putuputu*.)
- pula.** **1.** nvi. Particle, as dust; particle in the eye, mote, speck; to have something in the eye. Cf. *pulakaumaka*. *E 'au mālie i ke kai papa'u, o pakī ka wai ā pula ka maka*, swim quietly in a shallow sea, lest it splash into the eye [be careful!]. (PCP *pula*.) **2.** n. Leafy branch, as of coconut, pandanus, or 'ilima, used as a broom to drive fish into a net and to poke into reef crevices in order to frighten out the fish. **3.** nvt. Kindling; to start a fire with kindling. **4.** n. A fish, perhaps *Pempheris mangula*. **5.** Also *pura*. n. Pur (see M. S. Miller and J. L. Miller, *Harper's Bible Dictionary*). (Eset. 3.7.)
- pū.lā.'i.** n. Ti-leaf whistle.
- pula.kamaka.** n. A variety of sweet potato. (HP 142.)
- pula.kau.maka.** n. A person one thinks of constantly, either because of affection or from a desire to injure or take revenge on; obsession, fixation. Lit., mote resting eye [one is as conscious of the individual as of a mote in the eye]. 'O ka pulakaumaka ia, wālania ke ki'i 'ōnohi, that is the one constantly in mind like a particle in the eye, smarting the eyeballs. *Kēia kumuhana pili ho'ōla lāhui, ke kumuhana i lilo i pulakaumaka mamina nui 'ia i ka 'elele*, this topic concerned with the nation's welfare, a topic that became the desired ever-present goal to the delegate. **ho'o.pula.kau.maka.** To cherish.
- pula.lā.nahu.** n. Cinder, as in a fire.
- pū.lale.** **1.** v. To hurry, rush; to hasten, as to touch, possess. Cf. *lale 1*. *Mai pūlale mai 'oe*, don't hurry here. **ho'o.pū.lale.** To stir up to action, hurry. **2.** Same as *pula 2*.
- pū.lale.lale.** Redup. of *pūlale*.
- pū.lama.** **1.** n. Torch. **2.** vt. To care for, cherish, treasure, save. *He waiwai nui ke aloha, 'o ka'u nō ia e pū-lama nei*, love is of great value, it is what I do cherish.
- pula.maka.wela.wela.** n. Object of hatred. Lit., hot mote in eye. Cf. *pulakaumaka*.
- pū.lana.** nvi. To float; a floating object.
- pū.lapu.** vt. To bluff, as in poker; to fool. Eng. *Pālapu i ka wahine*, to fool the woman.
- pula.pula.** **1.** n. Seedlings, sprouts, cuttings, as of sugar cane. **ho'o.pula.pula.** (a) To start seedlings or cuttings; to multiply, procreate. (b) To rehabilitate; reha-
