

'*ōhua* (very young), *pānuhu* or *pōnuhunuhu* (medium), and *uhu* (mature). Variant names are *male* and 'ō*male* for a young stage. The colors of this fish are so pretty that it is sometimes compared to a sweetheart: *Momomi wale ku'u 'ono i ka uhu mā'alo i ku'u maka*, my craving makes my mouth water for the parrotfish passing before my eyes. *Uhu-māka'ika'i* (FS 45), name of a fish killed in the Kawelo legend, said to be a designation for all *uhu*; *lit.*, traveling *uhu*, perhaps so called because they follow one another in line. 'A'ō*he e loa'a, he uhu pakelo*, not to be caught, a slippery parrot fish [a wily person]. (PPN 'ufu.) 2. n. A variety of sugar cane. 3. vi. To bolt, break away, as a horse; to pull, strain, chafe under restraint; willful, headstrong. *Uhu ka mana'o e hele*, straining, frantic to go. Also *lōuhu*.

'uhū. vi, interj. To sigh, moan, groan; to grunt as a pig (often used after *kani*); interj. of scorn (Kel. 20), huh! *Kani 'uhū a'e ana i ke aloha 'ole o ku'u kaikamahine*, sighing over the heartlessness of my daughter.

uhu.ao. Rare var. of 'uao.

-uhuhī, ho'o.uhu.hī. To tease, annoy, vex, nag. *Rare*.

uhuki. Same as *huhuki*. (Am. 9.15.)

'uhuku. Var. of 'ōhuku.

Uhu-mā.kā'i.kā'i. Same as *Ka-uhu-māka'ika'i*.

Uhu-maka.lī'i. n. A stroke in *lua* fighting.

uhu pā.kali. n. An *uhu* fish used as a decoy. *Fig.*, to deceive.

uhu pā.nuhu.nuhu. n. Same as *pānuhunuhu*.

'uhū.'uhū. Redup. of 'uhū; to neigh (Ier. 8.16), bray, cough, hem; to hawk, as in clearing the throat.

ui. 1. nv. To ask, question, appeal, turn to for help or advice, query; question, catechism. *He ui, a he nīnau kēia* (chant), a query, a question this. ho'o.ui. To cause a question to be asked, to ask. (PPN 'ui.) 2. v. To stir up, activate. *Rare*. ho'o.ui To bestir, hurry, surge. *Rare*. 3. Rare var. of *uhi* 1.

ūi. interj. Halloo.

u'i. nvs. Youthful, youthfully stalwart, heroic, handsome, pretty, beautiful, vigorous; youth; youthful vigor and beauty; youthful hero, beautiful young woman. *Ka wā u'i*, youth; age of youthful vigor, grace, and beauty; age of greatest physical beauty. *Nā po'e u'i*, young people, as in the late teens and early twenties. ho'o.u'i. To beautify, make beautiful.

'uī. Var. spelling of 'uwi 1, 2.

uia. n. A variety of taro. (HP 34.)

uifi. n. Whiff. *Eng*.

ui.hā. vs. Weary, tired, bored, tiresome, burdensome.

'uiki, 'uwiki. 1. vi. To glimmer, especially of a light through a hole, crack, or narrow opening; to twinkle faintly; the opening through which light shines. hō.'uiki. To open a crack or sliver; to cause to gleam. *Hō'uiki mai i ka maka*, to open the eyes just a slit. 2. n. Piping, as used for dress trimming. 3. n. Wick. *Eng*. 4. n. Whist. *Eng*.

ui kula Sā.bati. n. Sunday school catechism.

uila, uwila. nvs. Lightning, electricity; electric. *Ka'a uila*, electric bus. *Kapuahi uila*, electric stove. *Kukui uila*, electric light. *He nuku uila*, a lightning snout [an incessant talker]. ho'o.uila, hō.'uila. To flash, as lightning. (PPN 'uhila.)

ui.lani. vs. To chafe under control, fret; restless, irritated by restraint; constantly seeking pleasure, spirited, flighty. *Uilani noho'i ka na'au*, the mind is restless.

uilo. n. Square-shaped braid, as in *lei palaoa* cord.

'u'ina. 1. nvi. Sharp report, as crack of a pistol; to crack, snap, crackle, creak (as joints); to make a splashing sound. Cf. 'a'ina, 'e'e'ina, pāpa'a'ina. 'U'ina ka pu'u, sound of swallowing. 'U'ina pōhaku a Kāne, crackling rocks of Kāne [thunder]. *He 'u'ina, he nākolo ka wai o Nā-molo-kama* (song), the water of Nā-molo-kama makes a splashing and rustling sound. (PCP ku(u)-kina.) 2. n. Glottal stop.

'u'ina.kolo. nvi. Rustle, roar; to rustle ('u'ina and nākolo). *I ka ua nui hō'eha 'ili, i ka wai 'u'inakolo*, in

the rain whose cold penetrates the skin with the rumble of roaring water.

uini.hapa. Var. spelling of *winihapa*, brick.

ui.ui. Redup. of *ui* 1, 2. ho'o.ui.ui. Caus/sim. *Ho'ola'i nā manu ke 'ike i ka wai ho'ouui kino* (chant), the birds are calmed when they see the liquid that excites the body.

-u'iu'i. ho'o.u'i.u'i. To beautify, make attractive. *Mea ho'ou'iu'i*, cosmetics.

'uī.'uī. Var. spelling of 'uwi'uwī.

'ui.'uiki, 'uwi'uwiki. Redup. of 'uiki 1.

ui.ui.lani. Redup. of *uilani*.

'u'i.'u'ina. Redup. of 'u'ina.

'uiwi. n. A small endemic undershrub (*Hedyotis cookiana*) with narrow leaves and slender branches. Cf. *kopa*.

uka. loc. n. Inland, upland, towards the mountain, shoreward (if at sea); shore, uplands (often preceded by the particles *i*, *ma-* [usually written *mauka*], or *o*). (Gram. 8.6.) *Uwā 'o uka* (FS 259), those inland shouted. *Kō uka*, those belonging to the uplands; mountain folk. *Hele i uka*, go inland; go ashore [if at sea]. *Uka manu*, uplands where birds are found. (PPN 'uta.)

-uka. Cf. *ukana*. ho'o.uka. (a) To load, as cargo or freight; to put on, as gear on a horse; to send, as a letter (2 Sam. 11.14). *Ho'ouka pū nā wāwae*, to cross the legs. (PPN *uta*.) (b) To rush on, as in battle; to attack, raid. *Ho'ouka kaua*, to attack, battle, wage a military campaign. Cf. *kahua ho'ouka*.

'uka. 1. n. Wrinkles. 2. vs. Good-for-nothing, worthless. Cf. 'ala'uka, ma'uka.

'ukā. interj. A word used in calling hogs; to gobble noisily, as a pig; to eat loudly, smack. *Mai, mai, 'ukā, 'ukā*, come, come, gobble, gobble [calling pigs].

uka'a.wale. Plural of *ka'awale*.

'ū.kā'ē. vs. Having no teeth; sloppy and smeary in eating, as one without teeth. Cf. *māka'e*.

ū.kā.kā. n. Female of 'ō'ō and 'ō'ū, birds.

'uka.kai. Same as 'u'ulukai.

uka lā.'au. n. Forested uplands.

ukale.kale. vs. Watery, fluid. *Fig.*, deceitful.

ukali. 1. nvt. To follow, come after, succeed, attend, accompany, escort; follower, attendant; complement, as in grammar; reserve. *Ukali o ke kia'aina*, governor's aide. *Lede ukali*, lady in waiting. *Ali'i ukali* (FS 163), attendant chief. *Nā ukali pa'a male*, attendants of a bridal couple. *Nā ali'i koa ukali*, reserve officers. ho'o.ukali. To cause, pretend, or try to follow, accompany, attend, etc. 2. (Cap.) Same as *Ukali-ali'i*.

Ukali-ali'i. n. The planet Mercury. *Lit.*, following the chief [i.e., the sun].

ukali ha'i.'ano. n. Adjective complement.

ukali ha'i.inoa. n. Noun complement.

ukamu. n. Oakum. *Eng*.

ukana. n. Baggage, luggage, freight, cargo, supplies. *Ka'a ukana*, baggage car, baggage or freight vehicle. *Ke mālama nei au i ka ukana a ke aloha* (chant), I preserve the love carried [by me]. ho'o.ukana. To bundle up, pack up, load, as freight. (PCP *utanga*.)

-ukauka. ho'o.ukauka. Redup. of *ho'ouka*. See *-uka*.

'ukā.'ukā. 1. Redup. of 'ukā. 2. v. Rolling up of waves. *Rare*.

ukau.kai. vs. Fat, feeble. *Rare*.

'ukō. 1. vi. To swing, sway, as breasts of a large-busted woman or as a pendulum. 2. nvi. Sound of a thud, collision, tick, tap; to thud, tick, rap, tap. *Rare*. Cf. *kē*.

'ū.ke'ē. vs. Twisted, crooked, as the mouth. hō.'ū.ke'ē. To screw or twist the mouth to one side, as in disapproval or dislike.

'ukēkē. 1. Same as 'ukekeke, 'akeke'e, a bird. 2. Same as *ha'ukeke*, to quiver. *Rare*.

'ū.kē.kē. nvt. A variety of musical bow, 40 to 60 cm long and about 4 cm wide, with two or commonly three strings drawn through holes at one end. The strings were strummed. According to Roberts (see Bibliography), the old experts made no sound with the vocal
