

ulei. Same as *hulei*. *Ulei 'ia akula ua paukū laholio nei*, this rubber was stretched.

'ū.lei. n. 1. A native spreading shrub (*Osteomeles anthylidifolia*), closely allied to other species found on some other islands of the Pacific. It has compound leaves, small white roselike flowers, small round white fruits. The wood is tough and formerly was used for digging sticks, fish spears, and the 'akēkē (musical bow). (Neal 387.) Also *eluehe*. 2. Digging stick of 'ulei wood. See *ex.*, *wali*.

ule kahe. n. Subincised or circumcised penis. See *kahe ule*.

ulele. 1. nvi. To leap at, get into action, do quickly, do at once; one moving swiftly. *He ulele Kū mai ka lani* (For. 4:395), Kū moving swiftly from the heavens. 2. vt. To set, as type. *Nā keiki ulele kēpau*, the typesetter boys.

ule.'ohi'u. n. A type of sugar cane, unknown in 1978, once used as a salve (For. 5:585); perhaps the same as 'āwela meleleme and uluhui. (HP 225.)

ule.pa'a. nvs. A male who has not known a woman; not to have or have had relations with a woman. *Lit.*, bound penis.

'ū.lepe. 1. n. Harelip. Also *kūlepe*. 2. vi. Erect, as a cock's comb; to stand erect; to bristle with anger.

ule.pua'a. Same as *wilipua'a*. *Lit.*, pig penis.

'uleu. Same as 'eleu. *E wiki mai 'oe e 'uleu* (song), hurry and be spry.

ule.ule. 1. vs. Pendulous, hanging. (PCP *uleule*.) 2. n. Sty, as on the edge of the eyelid.

ule.ule hala. Same as *ule hala*.

'uleu.lele. vs. Spry, active, nimble. *Rare*.

'ule'u.leu. Redup. of 'uleu. *Ke 'ule'uleu nei nā manu inu wai lehua o Pana-'ewa* (song), the birds that sip lehua honey at Pana-'ewa are lively now.

ule.'ulu. n. Male breadfruit flower. *Lit.*, breadfruit penis. Also *pōule* and *pō'ulu*.

uli. 1. nvs. Any dark color, including the deep blue of the sea, the ordinary green of vegetation, and the dark of black clouds; the black-and-blue of a bruise. Some song composers avoid this word because connotations of evil or misfortune are associated with darkness and because Uli is a goddess of sorcery (see *uli* 2). Also *uli-uli*. *Kai uli*, the deep blue sea. *Nuku uli*, dark lips. *Nā pali uli*, the green cliffs. *Uli māhole ka 'ili* (song), the skin is bruised black-and-blue. *Uli ka maka*, a black eye. **ho'o.uli.** To darken, to make blue, green, etc.; to make the skin black and blue; to bruise. (PPN 'uli.) 2. (Cap.) n. Name of a goddess of sorcery, said to have come from Kahiki. See HM 574, PH 144-7. *E Uli ē, ē Uli nānā pono, ē Uli nānā hewa, ē Uli i uka, ē Uli i kai* (prayer), O Uli, O Uli observe good, O Uli observe evil, O Uli inland, O Uli seaward. *'O 'oe kā ia, ē ka lāuli pali o Uli* (chant by Hi'iaka), it is you then, O cliff darkness of Uli. 3. n. Early stage in the development of a foetus, as the body begins to form. 4. n. Name given by Malo for subjects of the chief; Emerson says they are black-haired persons. (Malo 194, 201.) 5. nvt. To steer; steersman. *Uli hou 'o 'Iwa* (For. 5:287), 'Iwa again steered. (PPN 'uli.) 6. n. Short for 'ōuli, omen. *'O ka nānā uli, 'o ka nānā 'ana nō ia i nā uli o ke kanaka, inā he kanaka waiwai, a inā he kanaka 'ilihune* (For. 6:85), the study of omens, is a study of the omens regarding a person, whether [he will become] a person of wealth or a poor person. 7. n. Crowing of a cock. *Rare*. 8. n. Type of sweet potato (no data). (For. 5:664-5.)

'ult. vi. To rattle, especially of seeds in the 'ult'ult, gourds; to gurgle.

ulia. nvs. Accident; sudden; to come upon suddenly. *Ulia ka'a*, auto accident. *Ulia pōpilikia*, emergency. *He ulia pōmaika'i*, sudden good fortune. *He ulia pō'ino*, sudden trouble, unfortunate accident. (PPN *ulia*.)

uli.'oo. nvs. Fitness, aptitude; preparedness, as for running. *Rare*.

ulihī. 1. n. A small endemic shrub (*Phyllostegia glabra* and varieties), in the mint family. Leaves are ovate, 7

to 15 cm long; flowers are small, white, tubular, abundant, in racemes. 2. vs. Feebleness, of old age. *Rare*.

'ū.li'i. vs. Tiny, wee, petite.

'ū.lika. vs. Soft, sticky, claylike, glutinous, adhesive, gluey. *Kalo 'ūlika*, taro that is so glutinous, especially when cold, that it takes much water to grind it by machine, as of the delicious *kāi taro*.

'ū.lika.lika. Redup. of 'ūlika. *Lepo 'ūlikalika*, clay. Cf. *pālo*.

uli koa. Bruises or wounds of a warrior.

'ū.lili. 1. nv. Wandering tattler (*Heteroscelus incanum*), a slender regular winter migrant to Hawai'i, slaty above and white with dusky bars and streaks beneath. It breeds in Alaska and the Yukon. The cry of the bird; to cry thus. **ho'ū.lili.** To act like the tattler bird. (PPN *ku(u)lili*.) 2. n. Police whistle; ancient type of bamboo whistle; sound of these whistles. The whistles are said to be named for the cry of the tattler. 3. n. A bamboo tube used for blowing on a fire; to use this tube. 4. n. A musical instrument consisting of three gourds pierced by a stick; a whirring sound is made by pulling a string, thus twirling the gourds. 5. n. Hula step similar to 'uwehe, except that only one heel at a time is raised; this step has a distinctive beat. 6. Same as *hū*, small gourd used as a spinning top; to spin this top. 7. vs. Steep, as a mountain road. 8. vs. Firm. *Kaula 'ūlili*, strengthening cords holding the canoe cover ('*ahu uhi wa'a*) in place. See *wai 'ūlili*. 9. n. A religious ceremony in 'anā'anā, sorcery. 10. Var. of *hulili*. *Ku'u 'ia maila kekahi ānuenuē i 'ūlili 'ia* (Laie 581), let down a rainbow that sparkled. (PCP *kulili*, cf. Marquesan *ku'i'i*.) 11. n. Poles separating bannisters, as on stairs; rails of *hōlua* sleds.

'ū.lili wā.wāe. n. Flooring inside a *peleleu* canoe where paddlers might rest their feet.

Ulima, Urima. n. Urim. (Heb. or Eng.) (Puk. 28.30.)

'ū.lina. vs. Soft, rubbery, plastic. Cf. *papalina*.

'ū.lina.lina. Redup. of 'ūlina.

uli.uli. 1. Same as *uli* 1. *He lole uliuli* (Puk. 25.4), blue clothing. *'Ili uliuli*, brown skin. *Uliuli mau*, evergreen. **ho'o.uli.uli.** Same as *ho'ouli*. 2. n. A kind of rock from which adzes were made. (Malo 19.) 3. (Cap.) n. Name of a star (no data).

'ult.'ult. nvi. A gourd rattle, containing seeds with colored feathers at the top, used for the hula 'ult'ult (at one time there were no feathers); to rattle. **hō.'ult.'ult.** To shake the 'ult'ult; to rattle.

Uli.uli-ka-pali-o-Kahiki-nui. n. A stroke in *lua* fighting. *Lit.*, the cliffs of great Tahiti are green.

'ū.li'u.li'u. 1. Rare variants for 'ūlili 3, 7. 2. Same as *pū-ult'ult*, a gourd.

'ū.lō.lohi. Same as *lohi*, slow. *Ua 'ūlōlohi loa kāna hele 'ana*, his going was very slow.

'ulono. nvt. To cry out, as a prayer or lamentation; such crying. *Ka 'ulono 'ana o ka po'e ha'aha'a* (Hal. 9.12), the cry of the humble.

'ulono.kū. n. A prayer as to a god not an 'aumakua, family god.

ulu. 1. nvi. To grow, increase, spread; growth; increase or rising of the wind; to protect (PH 116, For. 6:474). Also *unu*. Cf. *mea ulu*. *Ka ulu o ka lā*, the rising of the sun. *Kai ulu*, sea at full tide. *Ulu ehuehu*, to grow fast, as a child. *Mauka 'oe e hele ai, ma ka ulu o ka makani* (PH 213), go inland where the wind blows. **ho'o.ulu.** To grow, sprout, propagate; to cause to increase, as the surf. Cf. *mea ho'oulu*, growth, crop. *Ho'oulu mea kanu*, horticulture. *Mea ho'oulu pilikia*, troublemaker, agitator. *Ho'oulu lāhui*, to increase and preserve the nation [said to be the aim of King Ka-lā-kaua]. *Pule ho'oulu 'aina*, prayer for the increased productivity of the land. 2. vi. Possessed by a god; inspired by a spirit, god, ideal, person, as for artistic creation; stirred, excited; to enter in and inspire. Also *unu*. *Mana'o ulu wale*, a thought entered of its own accord, hence fancy, impulse, imagination. *E ulu, e ulu kini o ke akua, ulu ō Kāne me Kanaloa* (prayer), enter and inspire, may myr-
