(PPN *huru*.) **3.** n. Grove (see *ulu kanu, Ulu-kou, ulu kukui, ulu lā'au, ulu niu*); assemblage, collection, or flock, as of stars (*ulu hōkū*), birds (*ulu manu*), ships (*ulu moku*), canoes (*u'u wa'a*). (PPN 'ulu.) **4.** Same as the more common *uluulu* **3.** **5.** nvt. Stick used in spreading hot oven stones; to spread the stones. **6.** n. Kind of tapa made at Wai-pi'o, Hawai'i; name of a quilt design. **7.** n. Center, as of a canoe or net. Cf. *uluna* **3.** *Ki'hele ia ulu*, bail out the center. **8.** n. A name used repeatedly in For. 5:703-9 for Ka-welo's warriors whose names begin with Ka-ulu (Ka-ulu-kau-loko, Ka-ulu-kau-waho). *Ua po'e ulu nei* (For. 5:709), these *ulu* people. *Ka nui ulu*, the many warriors.

ulu- See *uluna* **1.** (PPN 'ulu.)

'ulu. n. **1.** The breadfruit (*Artocarpus altilis*), a tree perhaps originating in Malaysia and distributed through tropical Asia and Polynesia. It belongs to the fig family, and is grown for its edible fruits, sometimes for ornament. The leaves are large, oblong, more or less lobed; fruits are round or oblong, weighing up to 4.5 kilos, when cooked tasting something like sweet potatoes. (Neal 302-4.) See ex., *pakt*, and saying *ule* **1.** *'Ulu hua i ka hāpapa*, breadfruit that bears fruit on the flats [of the famous Ni'ihau breadfruit growing in the sand dunes]. (PPN *kulu*.) **2.** Round, smooth stone as used in 'ulu *maika* game; bowling ball; bell clapper; dice. *Ka iki 'ulu kēia o Kanēkina e kōkē ai nā pine*, a small [fellow] is this bowling ball of Kanēkina that knocks down the pins [boast of a small fellow who can do much]. **3.** Muscles in calf of leg. **4.** Name for *kōnane* stone.

ulua. **1.** n. Certain species of crevalle, jack, or pompano, an important game fish and food item. Cf. *ulua aukea, ulua 'ele'ele*, and *pa'opa'o*. Unidentified *ulua* are qualified by the terms *kaha uli, kihikihi* (or *kihi* or *huli pū*), *lā uli, mahai, moha'i* (AP), *nuku momi, uli*. Growth stages are *pāpio* (or *pāpio-pio*), *pā'ū'ū*, and *ulua*, the last attaining a length of 1.5 m and a weight of over 45 kilos. This fish was substituted for human sacrifices when the latter were not available, probably because of word magic and the meaning of *ulua* **2.** Since an *ulua* replaces a man, *ulua* also means "man, sweetheart," especially in love songs (see ex., *wewehi*). *Huki i ka ulua*, pull in the *ulua*; *fig.*, get your man. *'A'ole nō wau i mahu'i mua, e lilo ana 'oe i ulua na'u* (song), I never thought before that you'd be my sweetheart. (PPN 'ulua.) **2.** Similar to *ulu* **1, 2.**

ulu.'ā. Similar to *pā'ulu'ā*. *Rare*.

'ulua. **1.** Same as 'ulu'ulu. **ho'o.'ulua.** To assemble. **2.** Same as 'unua.

ulua au.kea. n. A variety of *ulua*, probably *Caranx ignobilis*, one of the largest of *ulua*. Also *ulua kea*.

ulua 'ele.'ele. n. A variety of dark-skinned *ulua*, probably most commonly *Caranx melampygus*. *Lit.*, black *ulua*.

ulu.ā.hewa. **1.** nvs. Mania, delusion, craziness; deranged; somewhat crazy, sometimes believed due to possession by a spirit. **2.** nvi. Overgrowth; to grow wild and lush; bushy.

-ulu 'ai. ho'o.ulu 'ai. To grow food plants; a prayer to bless crops. *Heiau ho'oulu 'ai*, temple where first crops were offered. *Kahuna ho'oulu 'ai*, a priest who made such offerings, agricultural expert.

ulua kā.ni'o. Same as *ulua pa'opa'o*. *Lit.*, striped *ulua*.

ulua kihi.kihi. n. A variety of *ulua*, *Alectis* sp.

ulua kū.kāe.nalo. n. Probably a species of 'ōmilu, a fish. *Lit.*, beeswax *ulua*.

ulu.'ā.lana. n. Offering, especially as made to priests for them to offer to the gods.

ulua.lono. n. Genealogist in the *hale nauā*. (Malo 200.)

ulua.māhi. n. Officer in the *hale nauā*. (Malo 200.)

ulu.ā.o'a. nvi. **1.** Confusion, mob, disturbance, riot; tumult; gathered in excitement and confusion. *'A'ole na ke Akua mai ka uluā'o'a* (1 Kor. 14.33), confusion is not from God. **ho'o.ulu.ā.o'a.** To create confusion, excitement; to incite, stir up bedlam, cause trouble. **2.** Jungle; growing in wild profusion. *Uluā'o'a ka lau o ke kāhili i kapa 'ia ai ka inoa o Hawai'i-loa* (*kāhili* chant), bristling is the top of the feather standard of royalty that is called by the name of Hawai'i-loa.

ulua 'ō.milu. n. Probably same as 'ōmilu, a fish.

Ulu-au. n. A wind associated with Wai-ākea, Hawai'i (Nak. 53.)

Ulu-au-nui. n. Name of a stormy Maui wind.

ulua pa'o.pa'o. See *pa'opa'o*. Also *ulua kāni'o*.

ulu.eki. n. Brush, undergrowth, forest. *Rare*.

ulu.'eo. n. Name recorded by Thrum for a tree with hard wood.

ulu.ha'ē.ha'ē. Same as *ha'eha'e*, intense feeling.

ulu.haka. n. Elevated place in the high chief's house where those of rank might rest. (For. 6:418.)

'ulu.haku. vs. Lumpy, as of poi; knotty, bumpy, pimply. Cf. *'u'uluhaku*.

ulu hale. Same as *moku hale*. (Kam. 64:106.)

ulu hā.nau. vs. Of the same age group, contemporary. *Lit.*, birth growth. *Ho'okahi o mākou ulu hānau*, we are of the same age.

ulu.ha'o. vs. Rough, jagged, as rocks. Cf. *hāo'eo'e*.

ulu.ha'o'a. Same as *ulu ha'o*.

uluhe. n. All Hawaiian species of false staghorn fern (formerly known as *Gleichenia* spp., now listed under three genera: *Dicranopteris, Hicriopteris, Sticherus*), weedy, creeping, branching ferns, forming dense thickets. (Neal 9.) Also *unuhe*. (PPN *hulu'fe*.)

uluhe lau nui. n. A large species of false staghorn fern (*Hicriopteris pinnata*, formerly known as *Gleichenia glauca*).

ulu.hia. Pas/imp. of *ulu* **1, 2.** *Po'e i uluhia e nā daimonio* (Mat. 4:24), people possessed by devils. (PPN *hurufia*.)

ulu hō.kū. n. Constellation.

ulu.hua. vs. Vexed, annoyed, discouraged, displeased (1 Nal. 20.43), harassed, weary, offended, angry. **ho'o.-ulu.hua.** To annoy, weary, vex.

ulu.hui. See *'āwela melemele* and *ule'ohi'u*.

-ulu i'a. ho'o.ulu i'a. To cause fish to be numerous, as by prayer.

ulu imu. Same as *ulu* **4**; to stir up an oven. (For. 4:259.)

ulu.kai. n. Water chestnut. *Lit.*, sea growing.

ulu.kake. Var. of *hōkake*, to disturb.

'ulu kani. n. Clapper of a bell.

ulu kanu. n. Garden patch.

ulu kau. n. Unexplained acquisition of prophetic and interpretive powers without visible possession by a god. *Lit.*, placed inspiration.

-ulu kauō. ho'o.ulu kau.ō. To inspire canoe haulers by chant and prayer.

Ulu-koa. n. Name of a star. Also *Ulu'oa*.

ulu koko. n. First victim slain in battle.

Ulu-kou. n. **1.** Site of the Moana Hotel, Wai-kīkī, Honolulu. **2.** An old name for Howland Island. *Lit.*, *kou* tree grove.

ulu.kū. nvs. Disturbed, upset, restless, depressed, nervous, agitated, perturbed; nervousness, agitation; to disturb. See ex., *hana aloha. Ulukū o ka no'ono'o*, frustrated. **ho'o.ulu.kū.** Caus/sim.

ulu.kua. Same as *ulukū*.

ulu kukui. n. Candlenut grove.

ulu.lā. n. Ostrich (RSV), owl (KJV). (Kanl. 14.15.) (*Lat., ulula*.)

ulu lā'au. n. Forest, grove of trees. *Ulu lā'au makai*, forest by the sea; *fig.*, a fleet at sea.

-ulu lā.hui. See *ulu* **1**.

ululele. A chief's favorite. (AP.)

Ulu-loa. n. Name of a star, said to appear on the night of Muku in the month of Māhoe-Mua. Cf. *Pauwala*.
