unea. n. Nausea, exhaustion (Nak. 103).
unea.nea. Redup. of *unea*.
une kt. n. Shift lever for bobbin winder of a sewing machine.
unele. nvi. Honk of a goose; to honk. *Unele! unele! wahi a ka nēnē*, honk! honk! says the goose [of failure or lack; pun on *nele*, loss, deprived].
'unelu.nelu. Same as *nenelu*, marsh.
unē.unē. Redup. of *une*.
unē.unēa. Same as *uneanea*, nausea.
unē.unē 'ū.hā. n. A kind of sitting wrestling with thighs of contestants shoved back and forth. *Lit.*, prying thigh.
'unia. n. Adult *'ūhini*, locust; cricket.
uni.hapa. Same as *uwinihapa*.
'ū.nihi. Var. of *'ūhini* 1, 2.
'unihī.pili. n. 1. Spirit of a dead person, sometimes believed present in bones or hair of the deceased and kept lovingly. *'Unihipili* bones were prayed to for help, and sometimes sent to destroy an enemy. Also *'uhinipili*.
hō.'unihī.pili. Caus/sim.; to deify. 2. Same as *'uhinipili* 2.
uni.kalio, unitario. n. Unitarian. *Eng.*
'ū.niki. nvi. Graduation exercises, as for hula, *lua* fighting, and other ancient arts (probably related to *niki*, to tie, as the knowledge was bound to the student).
'ū.nina. Var. of *'ūlina*.
'ū.nina.nina. Redup. of *'ūnina*.
uni.ona. n. Union, labor union. *Eng.*
'uniu. Same as *manu* 3, canoe projections.
uno'a. Var. of *uno'o*.
unoho. Plural of *noho* 2, 3.
'unoko. Same as *kō'ele'ele*, seaweeds. *Hawai'i*.
uno.noho. Plural and frequentative of *noho* 2, 3.
uno.nokē. Redup. of *nokē*. *'Unonokē ihona i ke 'ā'ume-ume*, persist in the struggle.
uno'o. vs. Scorched, partly consumed by fire, inflamed. (Probably PPN *'unoko*.)
unou.no'o. Same as *uno'o*. *Unouno'o Puna i ke kua wahine*, the goddess scorched Puna.
unu. 1. n. Small stone, pebble, stone chip; wedge, prop. Cf. *unu pehi 'iole. Kohala i ka unu pa'a*, Kohala with the solid stone [firmness]. **ho'o.unu**. To place stones; to pave, macadamize. 2. n. Altar, heiau, especially a crude one for fishermen or for the god Lono. *Unu kupukupu* (PH 31, 202), an agricultural heiau. 3. Rare var. of *inu*, to drink (PNP *unu*; cf. Nukuoro.) 4. Rare var. of *ulu* 1, 2. *E ka unu me ka ua Kīpu'upu'u* (song), by the stirring [of the wind] and the Kīpu'upu'u rain. 5. n. Name given for a section of canoe endpiece. (For. 5:612-3.) Cf. *ulu* 7.
'unu. vt. To shorten, hoist, jerk upwards; to pull or draw together, as the hair. **ho'o.unu**. Caus/sim.; to massage with the palm of the hand and with quick movements rather than gentle pressure.
'unua. Pas/imp. of *'unu*.
unuhe. Same as *uluhe*, ferns.
unuhi. vt. To take out, withdraw, as money from a bank, or a drawer from a desk; to unsheath, extract; to take off, as a ring; to translate, interpret. *Mea unuhi*, translator, interpreter. **ho'o.unuhi**. To have something translated, withdrawn, etc. (PPN *unusi*, which is PPN *unu* + PPN *-si*.)
unu.hia. Pas/imp. of *unuhi*.
unuhi kū.like loa. nvt. Literal translation; to make such.
unuhi lau.lā loa. nvt. Free translation; to make such.
unu.hina. n. Translation.
unuhi 'ō.lēlo. nv. To translate or interpret; translator, interpreter.
unuhi pili. nvt. Close, literal translation; to make such.
Unu.lau. n. 1. A wind famous in song noted on Kaua'i, West Maui, and Ni'ihau; according to Emerson (UL 196), the trade wind. See ex., *puka, pu'upū, wili'ōka'i* 2. 2. Name of a star.

'unu.loa. n. 1. Kaua'i name for *nāpili*, a fish. 2. (*Cap.*) A wind, Puna, Hawai'i.
ununa. Var. of *uluna* 1-3.
unūnu. Var. spelling of *unuunu*.
unu pehi 'iole. n. Rat-pelting pebble, insulting epithet for a person of no consequence.
unuunu. 1. vt. To singe, as the feathers of a chicken before dressing it, or the hairs of a pig or dog by rolling it over hot oven stones; to pluck, as feathers from a fowl. Also *uluulu*. (PCP (*u*)*ngu(u)nu*.) 2. Var. of *uluulu* 3, tangled. 3. Stick erected as a taboo sign. (AP.) 4. Young *'ōhi'a* timber, as used in making images. (AP.)
'unu.'unu. Redup. of *'unu*. **hō.'unu.'unu**. To pleat, overlap in sewing; to pull up, as a sagging petticoat.
unuunu ho'o.ulū 'ai. n. Agricultural heiau.
'uo, 'uwo. 1. nvt. A group of feathers tied together in a small bunch, to be made into a feather lei or cloak; to tie thus; to tie into a lei; to string on a needle; to splice, interweave, as strands of a rope; seizing turns in lashing. *Ke 'uo lā i ka mānai* (PH 191), threading [flowers] on the needle. *'Uo 'ia i ka mānai ho'okahi*, strung on the same lei needle [married]. (PCP *kuo*.) 2. Same as *'uo'uo* 1.
uō, uwō. vi. To bellow, roar, shout loudly, howl. See *kūō, leo uō. Pule uō* (Kep. 57), loudly chanted prayer.
uoa. 1. Same as *uouoa*, a fish. 2. n. Name given for an unknown disease, characterized by aching shoulders.
uoi. vi. To move along, of many; to slouch along together. *I ka hele ua o Manu'a-kepa uoi aku i ka loa o Ko'i-āлана* (song), the rain journey of Manu'a-kepa, moving at random along the length of Ko'i-āлана. **ho'o.uoi**. Caus/sim.
uoki, uwoki. Idiom used only in commands. Stop it! Quit! Don't touch! Be careful (see ex., *hāmama*)! (PPN *'oti*.)
uolo. nvi. To call out; a loud calling. *I ka'u uolo 'ana aku e lohe mai ia'u* (Hal. 4.1), when I call out, listen to me.
uo'o. vs. Tough. *He pū hala uo'o*, a tough old pandanus [a tight-fisted person, named for Pū-hala-hua, a Hawaiian noted for thrift].
uō.uō, uwō.uwō. Redup. of *uō*. *Uōuō leo*, shouting voices, especially said of noisy pickers of mountain apples (*'ōhi'a 'ai*), contrasting with the silent people snaring birds on the branches of the *'ōhi'a hāmau* trees. **ho.'ūouo**. Caus/sim.
'uo.'uo. 1. vs. Adhesive, sticky, but without lumps, as good poi; tough, strong. *Ka poi 'uo'uo o kāohi pu'u*, sticky poi that settles nicely down the throat. 2. vt. To string, as leis.
uou.oa. n. A fish (*Neomyxus chaptalii*), known as the false mullet or false *'ama'ama*, distinguishable from the true mullet by its narrower and tapered mouth and creamy rather than silvery pectoral fins. The head, when eaten, was supposed to cause sleeplessness and nightmares. *Ua hopu hewa i ka uouoa*, accidentally caught an *uouoa* [in trouble, play on *uō*, to howl].
'uo.'uo.lēa. Shadows and gloom of a forest; weird, ghostly, fearsome. (AP.)
'ū.pā. nv. Any instrument that opens and shuts, as shears, scissors, tongs, bellows, carpenter's compass; to beat, as the heart; to open and shut, as the mouth champing food; to slam, bang, as a door. *Fig.*, a furious attack, onslaught.
'ū.pā ahi. n. Tongs for picking up hot coals.
upa'a.pa'ani. vt. To play together.
upai. Tall, thin. (And.)
'upa'i. vi. To flap, as wings, clothes in the wind; to bend in the wind, as a branch; to walk with a flapping movement. *Mehe 'upa'i na ke koa'e lā* (PH 101), like the flapping of a tropic bird's [wings].
'upa'i.pa'i. Redup. of *'upa'i*; to hover.
'ū.pā koli kukui. n. Candle snuffers. *Lit.*, scissors cutting off candlenut.
'ū.palu. 1. vs. Gentle, mild, soft-spoken, soft, tender, fragile, languid. *Ua 'ūpalu wale ke oho o ke kupukupu*, the *kupukupu* fern fronds are soft. 2. n. A soft-bodied
