

**wai wela.wela.** n. Warm or hot spring.  
**waka.** 1. vs. Sharp, protruding. 2. Same as 'owaka, *wawaka*, to flash.  
**wā kahiko.** n. Ancient times, antiquity.  
**wā kama.li'i.** n. Childhood. Also *wā li'ili'i*. *Ko'u wā kamali'i*, my childhood.  
**waka.waka.** 1. Redup. of *waka 1*; serrated, pointed, sharp, as a rake's prongs or the spikes of a sea urchin; hilly. *Puhi niho wakawaka*, sharp-toothed eel [a mighty warrior]. *Hāmākua i ka wakawaka*, Hāmākua with the sharp hills. 2. Redup. of *waka 2*.  
**Wā-kea, Ā.kea.** n. The mythical ancestor of all Hawaiians. (Kep. 61-7.)  
**wā keiki.** n. Childhood.  
**wā keiki kāne.** n. Boyhood.  
**waki.** Var. spelling of *uaki*, watch.  
**waki kia'i hale.** n. House guard.  
**Waki.kana, Vatikana.** n. Vatican. *Eng.*  
**Wakine.kona, Wakinetona.** n. Washington. *Eng.*  
**wā.kiūma.** vt. To vacuum. *Eng.*  
**wala.** vi. To tilt, lift backwards, fall backwards; to throw backwards, as with a backhand flip. *Wala kt'aha*, to tip the glass in drinking, tipple. *Ua wala 'ia mai au i ka pahi*, a knife was thrown at me.  
**wala.'au.** vi. To talk, speak, converse; formerly, to talk loudly, shout. See saying, *makani 1*. *Hoa wala'au*, person to speak with. *Wala'au wale*, to talk for the sake of talking, chatter; talkative, garrulous. *Wala'au ka waha*, to speak too much. *Kumepala wala'au* (1 Kor. 13.1), tinkling cymbal. **ho'o.wala.'au.** To cause talk, start talk or conversation. (PNP *walakau*.)  
**wala.he'e.** Var. spelling of *alahe'e*, a shrub or small tree.  
**wala.he'e haole.** Var. spelling of *alahe'e haole*, mock orange.  
**wala.kt.kō.** vt. To toss, hurl back and forth, as spears in battle.  
**wala kua.** vi. To fall over backward; to throw or stab at the back; to turn a somersault backwards; to rear, as a horse.  
**wā.lana.** Var. of *wānana*. (For. 6:489.)  
**wala.nia.** nvs. Anguish, burning pain, woe, torment; anguishing, smarting. See ex., *loloku*. *Walania ke ki'i 'ōnohi*, smarting eyeballs. *Nā 'eha walania o ka make mau loa*, the agonizing pain of eternal death. **ho'o.wala.nia.** To cause pain, wound.  
**wala.nuka, walanuta.** n. Walnut. (*Juglans* spp.) (Neal 296.) *Eng.*  
**wala.wala.** 1. Redup. of *wala*; to tilt, as a canoe in waves. *Walawala pahū*, to fall backwards and land with a thud. 2. (*Cap.*) n. Rain name.  
**wala.wala.'au.** Redup. of *wala'au*. *Rare.*  
**wala.wala.kt.** vi. To fall back; to plummet to the ground.  
**wala.wala.nia.** Redup. of *walania*.  
**wale.** 1. n. Slime, mucus, phlegm; sticky sap, as from cuts in tree ferns and *māmaki* wood that is mixed with bark in making tapa. Cf. *waha wale*. (PEP *wale*.) 2. A common part. that always follows modified words and has many meanings, as: only, just, very; alone; without pay, payment, reward, cause, reason; easily; gratuitous, free, casual. See *hele wale*, *hikiwale*, *mea wale* (*mea 4*), *wale nō*. *'Ai wale*, to eat without pay or reason; to eat alone. *Hana wale*, to do or act without justification, cause, reward. *Ho'i wale*, to go back empty-handed. *Huhū wale*, quick-tempered. angry without cause. *Loa'a wale*, easily obtained. *Maika'i wale 'o Kaua'i* (song), how beautiful is Kaua'i. (PPN *wale*.) 3. (*Cap.*) nvs. Wales, Welshman; Welsh. *Eng.* *Ke keiki ali'i o Wales*, the Prince of Wales.  
**walēa.** 1. Same as *nanea*. See ex., *pākanaka*. *E walea, nanea ana paha i ka leo nahenahe o nā manu* (song), relaxing at ease with the gentle voices of the birds. **ho'o.walēa.** Caus/sim. See ex., *peue*. (PCP *walēa*.) 2. vs. Accustomed; so familiar that one does a thing without effort, as a dance; adept; to do well and effortlessly, as an acquired skill. *Ua hana ā walea*, done until automat-

ic. *Ua walea i ka pena ki'i*, an experienced and perfect painter.  
**wale.'ā.** Same as *welē'ā*, a fish.  
**wale hau.** n. Sap in *hau* tree blossoms, chewed and swallowed to relieve constipation, and given to women before labor; slimy liquid obtained by immersing *hau* bark in water, drunk as a laxative. **ho'o.wale hau.** Unreliable, fickle, unstable; slippery and amusing, as in speech.  
**wale kea.** n. White mucus, as in the eyes.  
**wale.luka, walerusa.** n. Walrus. *Eng.* Also *wolu*.  
**wale.nia.** Var. of *walania*.  
**wale nō.** part. Only, just, all, very. (Gram. 7.5.) *'Elua wale nō*, only two. *He po'e wāhine wale nō*, just women, only women. *He maika'i wale nō kāu mau kūkaliki* (Kel. 135), your boasting is quite okay. *Maika'i wale nō Kaua'i* (Elbert and Mahoe 75), so very beautiful is Kaua'i.  
**wale.waha.** vs. To know a thing so well that it can be spoken without thought; letter-perfect; to know by rote or as a mother tongue. *Ha'i walewaha mai*, to recite perfectly, by memory. *Ua lilo ia i mea walewaha iāia*, this has become known to him letter-perfect.  
**wale wai.** vs. Slimy with saliva. *Fig.*, to talk too much.  
**wale.wale.** 1. Redup. of *wale 1*. 2. vs. Deceived. *Rare.*  
**ho'o.wale.wale.** To tempt, decoy, lead astray, beguile, fool, entice, take advantage of; tempter, temptation. *Ho'owalewale i nā naheka*, to charm snakes. *Walewale moekolohe*, libidinous soliciting, adulterous tempting. *Ho'owalewale hewa*, to seduce, lead into sin. 3. Same as *wale 2*, just, only, etc. (Nal. 1:22-34.)  
**wale.wale keiki.** n. Discharge following childbirth.  
**wale.walena.** n. Slimy discharge.  
**wali.** vs. Smooth, thin, as poi; fine, mashed, soft, powdery, supple, limber, as a dancer's body. Cf. *nā-waliwali*, *niu 1*, *'ōnāwali*, *'ōnāwaliwali*. **ho'o.wali.** To make soft, smooth, as soil, to mix, as poi or dough; to digest. *'Aila ho'owali pena*, paint thinner. *'Uala ho'owali 'ia*, mashed sweet potatoes. *Nā lio ka'inapu ho'owali lua* (chant), graceful, doubly supple horses. *Nā mea ho'owali o loko*, digestive organs. *'Ūlei ho'owali 'uala*, digging stick of *'ūlei* wood that softens [the earth for] sweet potatoes [sexual reference]. (PCP *wali*.)  
**wā li'i.li'i.** See *wā kamali'i*.  
**walina.** n. Softness. Cf. *wali*.  
**wali.wali.** Redup. of *wali*; gentle, easygoing, good-natured, smooth. Cf. *nāwaliwali*. *He waliwali kāna 'ōlelo*, he speaks gently, softly. *Aloha nō au i kou maka, kou ihu waliwali ka'u i honi* (song), I love your eyes, your soft nose I kiss.  
**walo.** Same as *uwalo*, to call, resound. *Kani ka pio, walo i ke kula*, the whistle sounds, carries across the plain. (PPN *walo*.)  
**walo.hia.** Pas/imp. of *walo*; pathos; touching, pathetic. See ex., *ha'alipo*. *Mo'olelo piha walohia*, tale full of pathos.  
**walo.ina.** Same as *walo*, to call.  
**walo.walo.** Redup. of *walo*. (PPN *walowalo*.)  
**walu.** 1. vt. To claw, scratch, rub, grate, rasp, scrape. Also *'uwalu*, *wa'u*. (PPN *waru*.) 2. n. Oilfish (*Ruvettus pretiosus*), caught in deep water; large, much prized for eating and used as a cathartic. See ex., *maku'u 3*. (PPN *walu*.) 3. num. Eight, eighth (*walu* and other multiples of four are formulistic numbers; cf. *-walu*). *Hapawalu*, one eighth. *Kanawalu*, eighty. (PPN *walu*.)  
**-walu.** Many. Cf. *kūwaluwalu*, *makawalu*, *olowalu*, *puwalu*. (Eight being a sacred number may have led to this extension of the meaning.)  
**wā.lua.** 1. vt. To carry on a pole on the shoulders, of two. 2. n. Middle, interior. (Mele 3.10.)  
**walu.hia.** 1. Pas/imp. of *walu 1*. 2. n. Bird name (no data).  
**waluna.** n. Clawing, scratching. Cf. *walu 1*.  
**wā.luna.** Prophecy. (And.)  
**walu.walu.** Redup. of *walu 1*.  
**wā mamua.** n. Formerly, old times.
