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On Tuesday the 12 of April Her Majesty the Queen & party left Honolulu in the Stmr. Australia for San Francisco. As the Stmr. moved away from the wharf the band played Aloha Oe & the natives joined in a chorus of Aloha Kalani Aloha Ke Alii. There were a very large crowd on the wharf to see her Majesty Queen Kapiolani off. His Majesty & party on board of the Eleu accompanied us out as far as Waikiki. The Iolani club sang many songs on our way out. The Stmr. John Cummings also followed us out with the band on bord & played several of our favorite pieces. After the King & party left us I took a last look of My Dear old Island home & went below to see after my room & to prepare for a spell of sea sickness. Most of the passengers were sick before we were out of sight of Land. Her Majesty were not sick at all. But rather enjoyed it. Dinner was served at 2.o.c. Her Majesty & princess Liliuokalani went down to dinner with the Captain & several of those that were not sick & enjoyed a good dinner. The rest of the afternoon were spent in singing. New York. At 6 o.c. tea was served to those that could enjoy it. I was too sick to take any tea. After tea was over Her majesty was on deck till 8 o.c. & then retired for the night. I tried to keep up with the rest but could not so I retired about 8.30 p.m. Good night.

Wed. April 13

I awoke this morning & found it quite ruff & stiff breese a blowing. There were a very few passengers on deck & the most of them were sick. The Queen was up on deck before breakfast at 8 o.c. breakfast was served to those that could eat. The Queen had her breakfast on deck & spent the rest of the forenoon on deck. Liliuokalani was not feeling so well to day & kept below at 12 o.c. we had made in 24 hours from the time of leaving Honolulu 260 miles. Lunch was served at 12 but then very few at the table. The Queen had her Lunch on deck. I spent most of the day below. About 2 o.c. Liliu went up on deck & spent the afternoon with the Queen at 6 o.c. Dinner on deck. I did not take any as I did n feel that way. The Queen & Liliu spent the night on deck & enjoyed it very much. I retired very early. There was one of the Lady passengers died to day & was embalmed. She was from Kaneohe.

Thursday 14

I awoke this morning feeling a little better but laid in bed till breakfast. After I had a little to eat I went on deck & found quite a number on deck. The Queen & princess were there & were enjoying themselves in listening to the singing of some of our lady passengers at 12 o.c. we had made in 24 hours 275 miles. Lunch was served to those that cared to eat. Her Majesty had Lunch on deck. After lunch we spent the afternoon in reading & singing. At 6 o.c. Dinner was served & there were several of the passengers were down to dimer. After dinner, we spent the evening on deck. Mrs. T. Lucas was brought up on deck to day in a very weak condition but felt better after taking some poi from her Majesty. About 9 o.c. we retired for the night.

Friday 15

I awoke this morning feeling quite well. I dressed & went up on deck & found quite a number walking the decks. It is nice & smooth to day & every one is nearly over their seasickness. Mrs. Lucas is feeling better to day. At 8 o.c. the gong rang for breakfast. The Queen & princess went down to the table & enjoyed a good breakfast. After I had breakfast I went up on deck & spent the forenoon in reading. At 12 o.c. we had made in 24 hours 270 miles. Lunch was served at 12 & quite a number was down to the table & enjoyed a good lunch. After lunch the afternoon was spent in singing

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some of our Hawaiian Songs & some were reading. At 6 o.c. dinner was served & nearly all were down to dinner & enjoyed it very much after a spell of sea sickness that they had. After dinner we spent the evening in the Saloon. Miss Auld played on the Piano & we Joined in the chorus of Aloha Oe. Most of the passengers were in the Saloon as it got to cold on deck. Some of the passengers spent the evening at card playing. We retired for the night at 10 o.c.

Sat. 16th

I awoke this morning feeling quite well & found it very smooth. Most of the passengers were on deck at 8 o.c. breakfast was served & all were down to breakfast & enjoyed it very much. After breakfast some spent the forenoon in reading & others were singing. Her Majesty spent the forenoon in learning how to knit. A Lady passenger is giving her lessons. At 12 o.c. to day we made in 24 hours 283 miles. Lunch was served below as usual. Her Majesty & Princess had a poi lunch on deck. After lunch we spent the afternoon in reading singing & playing Quoits. At 6 o.c. Dinner was served & all went below & enjoyed a good meal. After dinner we spent the evening in the Saloon as it got to cold on deck. Major Hendershot & Son kindly gave us an exhibition of his wonderful drum playing which was enjoyed by all. I was asked to sing after he was through so Mrs. Dillingham played on the Piano while I sang my favorite song Aloha Oe & other joined in the chorus. A Gentleman passenger played a few pieces on the piano. We all enjoyed the evenings programe very much. We retired for the night about 10.30 all well.

Sunday 17

I awoke this morning & found it quite smooth & cold every one seems to be in the best of health at 9 o.c. breakfast was served & all were down to the table after breakfast It was announced that there were to be a Service at 10.30 o.c. in the Saloon to which were all present. The Services was led by an English parson a passenger. We sang a few hymns & he preached from the bible. After Services we spent the rest of the forenoon in reading. At 12 o.c. we made in 24 hours 282. Lunch was served below at the usual hour & all enjoyed it. Her Majesty did nt leave her rooms to day as she is not feeling very well. We spent the afternnoon in reading & some were walking the decks to keep warm. A Schooner was in sight about 4 o.c. beating up for the coast at 5.30 Dinner was served. And all did Justice to it. After Dinner the evening was spent in Singing Hymns. We retired for the night about 10 all well.

Monday 18

I awoke this morning & found it quite smooth & cold. There were quite a number promonading the deck. At 8 o.c. Breakfast was served & all did ample Justice to it. After breakfast we spent the forenoon in reading & some at playing quoits. At 12 o.c. we had made in 24 hours 267 miles. Lunch was at the usual hour. After lunch Her Majesty spent the afternoon on deck at knitting others reading playing cards & the children Jumping rope. A Vessel was in sight at 2 o.c. bound north. At 6 dinner was served & all enjoyed it. After dinner it was announced that there was to be an entertainment in the Saloon at 8 o.c. at the time appointed all the passengers were in the Saloon & at 8.15 o.c. in came Mr. Macfarlane, Mr. Dowsett purser & an officer of the Ship dressed up in Chinese costumes. Mr. Macfarlane read a paper that was wrote for the occation introducing Gee Bang a Chinese embasador to the captain. They had instruments as well after the paper was red the Captain replied with a few remarks. Then followed a Solo by a Gentleman & one by Mr. Miemlan & a piano Solo by Mrs. Dillingham after which was followed by a dance which quite a number took part. We all enjoyed the entertainment very much. We retired at 11 o.c. all well.

Tuesday 19

I awoke & found it very pleasant on deck & every one enjoying the fresh air. A three masted Schooner was in sight. on her way to Honolulu. At 8 breakfast & after breakfast Her Majesty spent the forenoon in her room knitting & others on deck reading Singing & playing quoits. At 10 o.c. a Ship was in sight. When we got near enough to her she hoisted her flags asking for the Longitude which we gave her. At 12 we had made in 24 hours 289 miles. Lunch was served as usual. After lunch we spent the afternoon in playing quoits & some at reading at 6 o.c. Dinner & all enjoyed it. After dinner it was announced that there was to be a variety troupe that was going to give an entertainment at 8 o.c. at the time appointed a company of ladies came in to the Saloon with combs & played some sweet music which we enjoyed immensely. After the programe was over we retired early so as to be up early to see Land all well.

Wed. 20

I awoke this morning & went on deck & found that we were at the Golden Gate. I went below & packed up our things & got it ready to go ashore. Breakfast was at 6.30 o.c. I did not go to get any as I was to anxious to be on deck. It is a beautiful morning & clear. As we passed the Gates the Fort gave us a Salute & also an English Man of War. What a beautiful sight it was to see all the ships & steamers going in & out of the bay & the shore looked so green. At 9.30 we was alongside the wharf & in a little while Her Majesty & party were on there way to the palace Hotel. I staid behind & saw to our baggage. In an hours time I had everything up to the hotel & found the Queen & party quite comfortable. The Floral offering that were in the parlor that was sent to Her Majesty were something magnificent. Great large La France roses & a large basket of Lilacs & a variety of other beautiful flowers. We had lunch at 1 o.c. There were quite a number of people called to see the Queen. The young Princess were at the Hotel to receive the Queen at 4 o.c. The Queen & Princess Liliu went out for a drive. I am sorry to say that Mr. J. Dominis is not very well to day. Dinner is served here at 6 to 9. Her Majesty went out to an entertainment & enjoyed it very much. I took a walk around for a little while & saw what I wish to see & retired at 11 o.c.

Thurs. 21

I awoke this morning in the best of health & found every one up & in good health. Breakfast at 9 o.c. After breakfast we made preparation to visit San Mateo. At 10 o.c. we took carriages for the depot. As there was a special train waiting to take the Queen there. We left the Depot at 10.30 & got to San Mateo at 11 o.c. was met there by Mr. Brewer principle of the School. He had carriages waiting there for us. We all got into carriages 18 of us & took a drive to most of the principle places of San Mateo. All along the road on our way down was Just a mass of beautiful flowers of all collors. We visited the grounds of some of richest people living there the grounds are laid out beautiful. There were trees there a 1,000 years old & is called the live Oak. After we had visited all the most principle places we drove for the School House. When we arrived there we were received by the boys & the Teachers. It is a beautiful place where this School is situated. The Gardens are beautiful & trees are trimmed in all shapes & are very pretty to look at. We visited the chappel it is a pretty little church & Just covered with Ivy on the out side. It looks like a large tree cut in the shape of a house. From there we visited the school house & found everything very convenient for the boys after we had gone through the house we went out to the Parade Grounds & there we witnessed the parade of the boys. They went through different forms of Military drill. Her Majesty was very much pleased with what she saw. We had lunch at Mr. Brewers house & after lunch we got ready for home. Carriages were waiting to take

us to the depot after bidding good bye to friends which were quite a number of our Island boys that were there to school E. Allen Dowsett Gilliland Cummins Turton & a few others. We started for the depot & got Just in time to catch the train. We got to the city at 4.30 a got to the Hotel in a few minutes. At 8 we had dinner. After dinner I went out for a walk & got home at 10. Her Majesty spent the evening at home all well.

Friday 22

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm. I got ready for breakfast. After breakfast I took a walk around a block & back. The Queen is well & is to receive company to day at 11 o.c. & the public at 12. There were quite a number called on Her Majesty. We Lunched at 1 o.c. After Lunch Her Majesty took & ride with Her Highness to Golden Gate Park. I got on the Cal. dummy cars & rode out to lone mountain & back to the city. There are quite a number of handsome building on this St. Mrs. Hopkins & Coltons & several others. The Queen enjoyed her drive very much. After we had dinner we got ready for a walk. The Queen went to Social gathering & we to the Market St. cars & rode out as far as it went & back to the city every one is well & in the best of health.

Saturday 23

I awoke this morning & found every one up & getting ready for breakfast. After breakfast we got ready for a trip to Oakland. Her Majesty got invitations to visit some of the Schools. We left the Hotel in carriages for the Ferries & drove on board. At 9.30 we left the wharf & got to Oakland at 10 o.c. We then drove ashore & started for the Convent of Sacred Hearts. The drive on the way down was enjoyed by all. Oakland is a very pretty place. It puts me in mind of home, but every thing is different from what we have at home. The houses are very handsome in its style of building & the grounds are beautifully laid out. I was very much pleased at the style of fences they have here. It is of the Cyprus pine & cut to suit ones taste. The flowers are in bloom & everything is very pleasing to the eyes. We passed several beautiful houses on the way. We arrived to the school at 10.30 & was received by the teachers. This place is a lovely spot large grounds & beautifully laid out in Gardens all along the walk to the house is a hedge of Ivy & a high wall of Cyprus pine to seperate the school grounds from the orchard. We were received in a large Sitting room & was shown all the pretty work done by the girls. After which they were called into the rooms & there they gave us an exhibition of their guitar playing & singing which was very good. We met Miss Kamakee Cummings there after they had played & sang several pieces. We were ushered into the Dining room where we partook of ice cream cakes & Lemonade. After we had seen all that was to be seen we left for the Deaf & Dumb Institute. The drive on the way down there was beautiful. Such beautiful scenery & handsome buildings. We arrived there at 12.30. I must say that this place is one of the handsomest spots I have seen. It is on a high land & it has a beautiful view of Golden Gate & bay. The grounds are beautiful & beds of flowers here & there. There are 3 seperate building one for boys and one for girls & the other a school & Dining room. We were shown all through the house & then we went to the school house & saw the boys & girl write to us on black boards. These poor children are as deaf as could be & do all their talking by signs. It is wonderful to see how redily they use their fingers in conversing. They have the use of their eyes but cant talk nor hear & the blind is Just the reverse & does all her reading by feeling the letters that they have there for them. It is dots made by a peg that they have to write with. In begining to write they have a sheet of copper about 2 in widd & 12 inches long with square holes made in them & each hole is a letter & they have to feel along this copper plate to find out the letters they would want when writing anything. I witnessed their writing

& have some of it with me. They were a couple of girl there that could hear & talk but could not see & they played some beautiful duetts on the piano. It does seem so bad to see such a lot of children & young ladies deprived of what belongs to them. After we had spent an hour there we visited the Gymnasium & the domitory. After we had seen all that we could see we left for Mills Seminary. There are 150 in this place. Her Majesty felt very sorry for them & shook hands with some of them when we left. It took an hour to get to Mills Seminary which was situated in a valley & a beautiful place at that. The Grounds are large & covered with beautiful trees & flowers. There are beautiful lawns here & Just like a carpet of green velvet. The house stands back in the trees & is a large beautiful house covered with roses & Fuchia. We were received by Mrs. Mills & were shown to the school room where we met some of our Island Girls Miss Nolte Miss Wilder Miss Cummings & Miss Kahai. As we were in a hurry Mrs. Mills got the schollars to sing for us & then a lunch was served & then we took our departure for the city. Her Majesty was sorry that we did not have time to see all that was to be seen, but as time was short we had to go. We got to the depot Just in time to drive on board. We got home at 4.30 very much pleased with our visit. After we had our dinner we got ready for the Opera. Her Majesty & Liliu & Iaukea went. It was at the Grand Opera House. I enjoyed it very much & so did her Majesty. We got home at 11.o.c. All well & having a good time. So ends this day.

Sunday 24

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm after I had breakfast I got ready for church. Her Majesty went to church with Liliu & Iaukea. I attended the Howard St. church & enjoyed the sermon. After lunch I took a ride out to the park. Her Majesty & Liliu & Curtis to a drive out to the park. Dinner at 7.30. After dinner I went for a walk & met Mr. Calme & spent the evening with him. I got home at 10 & retired for the night.

Monday 25

I awoke this morning & found her Majesty ready for breakfast. It is a beautiful morning & quite warm. After breakfast Her Majesty got ready to visit the Mint. We got there about 11.30 & was shown all through the house. We were first shown where the gold is weighed when first brought & from there to the melting rooms & saw gold & silver in bars & then to where the gold is cut in strips then to where it is cut into 5 & 10 dollars, from there to where it is cleaned & weighed by ladies & then where it is stamped & to the finishing room. It is a very interesting place to visit. Her Majesty held a Reception at 1.30 P.M. & quite a number called on her. At 3.o.c. Her Majesty visited the Woodward's Garden & was very much pleased with her visit & in the evening at 8.o.c. we paid a visit to the fire companies & was very much pleased with the drill that they went through. It is worth the visit. All Well & enjoying ourselves.

Tuesday 26

I awoke this morning & found it very pleasant & Her Majesty getting ready for breakfast. After breakfast we got ready for a visit to Mare Island. At 9.o.c. we left the Hotel for the depot. When we arrived there we found a Navy dispatch boat there awaiting us. We were received by the officers of the vessel in a few minutes we were on our way to Mare Island. The officers made the trip very pleasant for us. The bay is so hazy that we cant see very far. But it is very pleasant on the bay. It is 33 miles across from the city to Mare Island. We arrived there at 1.o.c. We were received at the wharf by Comodore Belmap. A company of soldiers were on the wharf

a salute of 21 guns were fired. Carriages were waiting to drive us to the Comodores house. When we got there we found a band of music & it played Hawaii Ponoï as Her Majesty alighted from the carriage. It made one think of home when I heard that favorite piece played. There was a Hawaiian & America flag at the entrance of the house. On the outside side of the house was a mass of white & yellow roses which have grown like a vine & has just covered the house with blossoms. In the reception rooms were a large crowd of ladies & gentleman to receive the Queen. After the ladies & gentlemen were presented to Her Majesty a lunch was served. The rooms were very tastefully decorated with flowers. After lunch The Queen & party took a stroll in the gardens to look at the beautiful flowers which were in great abundance. It is surprising to see how the flowers grow here. The roses are of an immense size & of the most beautiful shades. I never saw such a beautiful sight that pleased me so much as this garden at Mare Island. They have all the flowers that could be got growing here. The climate here is better for plants than in the city. After we had seen all the pretty flowers we got ready to go back to the city. We bade adieu to our friends & drove down to the depot. We passed several beautiful houses on our way down. We left the wharf at 3.30 o.c. mid the firing of the guns. We had beautiful weather coming back & quite cool. We had dinner on board & at 7 o.c. we got to the depot & took carriages for the Hotel. We got home safe & well & enjoyed the trip very much. We spent the evening at home & retired early.

Wednesday 27

I awoke this morning quite early as I had to get our baggage ready. We had breakfast at 8.o.c. & spent the forenoon in packing up. At one o.c. we had all our baggage shipped for Washington as we were on our way there. We left the Hotel at 2 o.c. & got on the ferrie boats in a few minutes we left the wharf at 2.30 & got over to Oakland at 3.o.c. We got on the cars & started off on our Journey. We passed several little out towns on our way which were as follows West Oakland highland Pinole Valleys Junction Post Costa. At this last place we rode on board a stmr named the Solano one of the largest steamer that carries a whole train of cars. We had to cross the Sacramento river on this boat. After we got across we landed at Benicia & started on our Journey the next Station was Suisan. The ride on the way was delightful. We passed several vineyards & orchards the fruit trees are planted in rows & is very pretty to see. At Suisan we changed cars & proceeded on Our Journey. Then came Elmira Batavia Dixon Davis Sacramento. At this station we Jumped out & took a hasty dinner & we had but a few minutes to get dinner. After we got our dinner we boarded our train & proceeded on our way. We met several natives of the Island here. As it got dark we were not able to see any more so we got ready for bed. The cars we are on are the Pulman sleeping cars. It is very nicely furnished in side. The seats are covered with bottle green plush & are made so that at night by pulling down the sides it is formed into a nice bed. Then there are curtains put up that hides you from view. We retired at 8.o.c.

Thursday 28

I awoke & found us a traveling along the mountain & snow on the grounds. It is a beautiful sight great tall pine trees & here & there houses with the smoke coming from the chimneys. It is quite cold. We passed several stations during the night. We had breakfast at a station called Reno. After we had breakfast we started on our way. We passed several small station called Humbolt we had lunch & in a few minutes we were on our way. The scenery is very pretty at a place called Wells we had dinner & in a few minutes were off. As it got dark we retired for the night. All well.

Friday 29

I awoke this morning & found that we were at Salt lake a few miles from the town. We arrived there at 8.o.c. & had our breakfast. Here we changed cars. We had to take gage for this part of the way. We met several of our Island people here who are Mormans & was very glad to see her Majesty. There were 3 cars loads that came from the town to the station to meet the Queen. There are about 25 natives here & the rest are American Mormans. Her Majesty received them all. A Mr. Lambert, a resident of Oahu in former years introduced them to Her Majesty as they passed through. There were a great crowd standing by the cars very anxious to have a glimpse of her Maj to satisfy them the Queen leaned out of the window & shook hands with those that could get up near enough to her Maj. As there were so many there they were pushing one another to get up to the window. There were 4 & 5 had hold of Her Maj. hand at a time. There was a band there that played a few pieces. We left Salt lake mid cheers and waving of Handkerchief we passed quite a number of Mormans settlements & some very pretty scenery. We stopped at pleasant valley for lunch & in a few minutes were off. We saw some fine large trees on our way & some very pretty valleys. We got at Green river station at 8.o.c. & had dinner & in 20 minutes were off. We retired early.

Saturday 30

I awoke this morning & found us a traveling in Nevada. It is quite a barren spot here. The trees look dead & leafless. We stopped at a small station called Oxford & had breakfast there. We staid Just long enough to get breakfast & proceeded on our way. After we left the station for a few miles we came to a beautiful country where the trees are nice & green & beautiful mountainscenery. We passed through several snow sheds. At a stopping place we got out for a few minutes & made snow balls. It is beautiful weather here not to cold although there is plenty snow on the mountains. We passed along a beautiful river called the Rio Grande. We went around the mountains here & there so as to get to the top a hight of 8000 feet. It is a beautiful sight here. After we got to the top of the summit & look down to where we had come the roads look like a large snake coiled around in a heap. We got to a small station called Pueblo & had lunch. There were quite a number people here that came to get a glimpse of Her Majesty. We were off again in a few minutes & on our way to Denver we passed several small stations on our way at about 3.o.c. We passed through a Cannion of great hight & very pretty scenery. On both sides of us are great high mountains & a river flowing through this cannion. It took but a few minutes to pass through & then we came to a barren desert. We met several men on this plain at work building a new track. We arrived at a small station & had 10 minutes for supper & then proceeded on our way. At 10.o.c. we got to Denver a beautiful place as far as I could see of it great large building & splendid roads the place is lighted by Electric light. Here we changed cars & stopped about 30 minutes & were again on our way. We retired at 11.o.c. All well.

Sunday May 1st

I awoke this Sunday morning & found us near Hastings. In the State of Nebraska here we stopped 20 minutes for breakfast & enjoyed it. This is a barren spot with hardly any trees & Just a few houses. There are more rum shops than dwelling houses. It is very dry here. We arrived at a place called Lincoln & had Lunch. This is a very pretty place as far as I could see of it. Beautiful buildings & streets. There quite a large crowd of people came to get a glimpse of the Queen. We only staid 20 minutes at Lincoln & started on our way. We passed a number of small stations. There is a wide river flowing along the track called the La Platte & it emtys into the Mississippi about 6 o.c. we got to a place called Red Oak & Joined on a Linning cars. This is a pretty place also. We only stopped 10 minutes here & went on.

About a mile from here we crossed the Mississippi river on a Bridge of Steel about a  $\frac{1}{4}$  of a mile long we went very slow here so as not to have an accident. We had dinner aboard the cars & enjoyed it very much. About 9.o.c. we retired for the night. All well.

Monday May 2

I awoke & found that we were in the city of Burlington in the State of Iowa. This is a large city & the buildings are grand. We are only at the suburb of the city. We dont see the best part of the place for we dont stay long enough. We left in 10 minutes time for a place called Healsburg & arrived there in an hour. This also is a beautiful place but am not able to say much for we dont see very much of it. We passed several station during the night. We are on our way to Chicago & expects to be there at 2.o.c. The farms look dry here as it is not time to plant. Although we passed acres of alfalfa we had breakfast on the trains & at 12 we arrived at a small station called Louisville & had a 10 minutes lunch. We then went on our way. We saw some very pretty valleys & mountain scenery on the way & arrived at Chicago at 2.o.c. This is a grand city as much as I could see of it. We staid here 20 minutes to change cars. The Depot where we changed cars is a long building & streets runing over the top. It is a queer sight to see the people runing to the cars & some a riding above in their grand carriages & the news boys called out the different papers they have for sale & fruit venders & boot blacks & quite a number of other amusing sights. I like the appearance of this city. There are some beautiful buildings here & the streets are grand. I wish we had time to see this place but we cant stay. There are quite a number of people here at the depot come to get a glimpse of the Queen. At 2.30 we were off on our way to Washington. We passed several beautiful places on the way but as we were traveling so fast I could not get a good view of the places we passed. The car we are on makes  $60\frac{1}{2}$  mile an hour. We had dinner at a station called Mendota & in 20 minutes were on the way. We passed after we left Mendota several coal mines & miles of cars loaded with coal. There are some very pretty farms here also & the grain Just beginning to grow. The fruit trees are Just covered with blossoms & are beautiful. We are enjoying this part of the ride for it is a change from what we saw the first few days out. For everything looked dry & Just as warm & dusty as it could be. All well.

Tuesday May 3

I awoke this morning & found that we were nearing Pittsburg. The houses on the outskirts of the city are very pretty as they have a chance to plant & the farms look green.& the trees are beginning to leaf again but right in the city it is one of the worst places I was ever in for smoke. You cant see the place for smoke. There are some fine houses here but you cant see very far for it is like a heavy fog the smoke is. I was glad when we got out of it. The outer building in the country like are very pretty. Here in the city they have natural gas & the streets are lighted with it & familys do most of their cooking by it. All they have to do is to bore like you would for a artisian well & there you have your own gas. We passed several beautiful stations but didnt stop. The fruit trees are Just loaded with blossoms. At Mendota we had breakfast & in 20 minutes were on the way. We passed acres of land planted with alfalfa. We saw some grand scenery on the way. The Horse shoe bend is a pretty place & several other places. We got to Plymouth at 1.o.c. & had a 10 minutes lunch & were on the way for Baltimore. We rode on several long bridges on the way. We arrived at Baltimore at 6.30 & was met there by Mr. H Carter & several officers. Here we staid 20 minutes & were off again for Washington. We passed through several tunnels some of them a mile long. We could not see much of Baltimore as it was dark. We arrived at Washington 7.30. This place seems to be a beautiful place the lights are of the Electrical work & the Depot is all lit

with this light. The Depot is a fine large building of brick & fenced in with a high fence of iron. Her Majesty & Mrs. Dominis & Suit were ready in a few minutes & as Mr. Carter had carriages awaiting it didnt take long before they were on their way to the Arlington. I staid & got our baggage ready & in 10 minutes were on the way to the Hotel as there were a carriage there waiting to take me there. The streets are wide & grand beautiful riding. The stores look very pretty with the lights in the windows & goods draped up to give the costumers a chance to view the goods, here & there a fruit store. I got to the Hotel & found the Queen getting ready for dinner. The Royal party was received by Mrs. Carter. The parlor was decorated with flowers. A large basket of butiful roses was there. The gift of the President & a large boquet of popys & other beautiful flowers were in the room. A table was set in the parlor & dinner was served in a few minutes. I got our baggage all right & went & retired early as I was not feeling well. I have one of those sore throat that give me a call once in a while. The rest of the party is well.

Wednesday May 4

I awoke feeling a little better this morning at 8.½ o.c. we had breakfast. After breakfast Her Majesty got ready to receive the Mayor of Washington & at 12 Her Majesty & suite were driven to the White house to be presented to the President. She was received with great honor & at 1 had Lunch with Minister Carter & officers & at 2 o.c. received Mrs. Cleveland & her Suite of ladies. Mrs. Cleveland is quite a beauty. She is tall with a beautiful face & dark hair. After they left her Majesty got ready to receive a company of men that came to confer on her Majesty the emblem of the Masonic Lodge witch was done with great honor & at 3 they took carriages to go to the race course & witnessed a fine race & then for a drive to some of the principle part of the city. As I was not feeling well I kept in doors. At 6 I had dinner & got ready to go to a circus that played that evening as her Majesty were out to dine with Minister Carter I took the opportunity to witnessed one of the grandest circus that I ever saw perform arriving at the place the first thing I saw was great large pictures of the fat boy of Barnums Museum & several others of interest. I had quite a time to get tickets as there was an immense crowd there. I got them after pushing & crowding & went into the circus tent. There at the doors were a cage with monkeys & then a cage of Baboon & came Lions & Tigers Jaugers Lepords Deers wolfs Bears Zebra Giraffe Cammels lynx Owls Eagles Hipoportimus & several other different animals of interest. This was all in one tent & at the end of this tent was the door leading into the circus. It was most full when we went in but managed to get very good seats. This is one of the largest tents I ever saw it holds 10,000 people comfortbly but there were more there that night as there was no standing room. At 8 the circus began with a parade of the horses & their riders & Elephants & riders in the most beautiful draperys & Cammels & riders & different other riders including Mexican & Indians. The performance was grand. As the tent was so large there were 3 different performers playing at one time. It was very amusing to see the people trying to watch the three playing at once. One would call look here & another look there oh see that oh how butiful. It was a grand sight all through. They gave an exhibition of Indian war whopp & American soldiers giving chase on horse back & Cow boys robing the mail coach & Trapeze act & bycicle riding & Bar act & several other amusing acts. After the performance we went into the Museum & saw a sight a boy 14 years of age weighs 4 hundred & some odd pounds. There was a lady there that weighed 869 lbs. She is in middle life & a young lady that is tattooed all over her body & also a man, a young girl with white hair that stands right out strait she takes snake after snake & coiles it around her neck & waist. A man there 7 feet 6 in high & other ones of interest. After seeing all that was to be seen we went home & retired about 12 o.c. Their Majestys returned late & enjoyed their evenings entertainment.

Thursday May 5

I awoke this morning feeling better. Her Majesty took an early drive & got back for breakfast about 8.o.c. After breakfast they got ready to visit the Blind institute. In a few minutes they were ready. Her Majesty Liliu Mrs. Carter Mr. Carter & Boyd Iaukea & a few others got into carriages & were driven there. I got ready & visited the Capitol. It was quite a walk from the Hotel but I took my time & saw a great deal as I went along. I got to the Capitol & the first thing I saw was the Monument of Washington & another of Garfield that they were just putting put. It was to be unveiled on the 9 at the entrance was a low hedge of ivy that runs right around the capitol & keeps parties from walking on the grass. The walks are concrete & at the steps leading to the door of the Capitol are layers of marble the steps are marble. I entered the hall & went up a flight of stairs & got into a large room around the wall hung large oil painting of Washington taking command of the army & the surrender of & several other noted men. The floors are of different kinds of marble put together in squares & great large pilliars of marble from that to another room where the dome was & there I heard another party speak by standing on a certain stone you could hear what he said to you talking very low. Here also the floors are marble. All the rooms & halls are of marble & also the railings. There were great pilliars of marble by looking at it in some places you could see faces & skulls in the stone. There were statues of all the presidents there. I visited the senate chamber & where they hold court. There are some fine painting here & it is a beautiful building all through. It is a place that is worth visiting. The finishing work in carving on stone in the rooms are grand & the frescouing work in different styles are beautiful. I realy cant express my deligh with what I saw of its grandyourn & beauty. The grounds are laid out beautifully here & there statues of some of the noted men of the world. After I had spent an hour there I went over to the Botanical Garden & went through the hot house & saw quite a number of beautiful trees & flowers. The poppys & Tulips here are plentiful & are very pretty. I got back to the Hotel in time for lunch. After lunch Their Majestys visited the Capitol State tresuary & a drive to the most principle part of the city. I took a walk around & viewed the store windows & back to the Hotel. I didnt see much of Washington but what I did see was very interesting & beautiful. At 6 o.c. had dinner. Their Majestys got ready & went to the circus & as I had seen it I took a walk around & took in the sights. I met a crowd on the street--to my surprise saw a young woman singing & a gentleman playing the harp. She took up a hat went around after she had fininished her song & got a few dollars from those that stood & listened to her. We saw quite a number of amusing sights. Path <sup>& Patti?</sup> sang here the night we arrived but left the next day. We got home about 11.o.c. & got ready for our warm beds. Her Majestys party returned early much pleased with what they saw.

Friday 6

I awoke this morning quite well & got ready for breakfast. Their Majestys had an early breakfast & got ready to go to Mount Vernon. Mrs. Carter & daughter & a few ladys & Their Majestys took carriages & drove down to the depot & took a steamer up the river to Mount Vernon. I got ready & went to the rail road depot & took the 11:15 o.c. train for Baltimore & arrived there at 12.15 o.c. & went in hunt for East Pratt St. After walking a mile from the depot I took a passing car & asked the conductor & he kindly gave me the information I required & found the place without trouble. My visit to Baltimore was to find Grand Ma. When I rang the bell Aunt Margery answered it & knew me right away. I found Grand Ma well & quite strong. She was very glad to see me & so was I. It was the happiest moments I every spent. I staid & had supper with them. I met Brother Richardson & Like him very much. I saw some of his very handsome shell work. I only wished I could of staid there longer but as I only had a few hours to stay with them I made the best use of it. At 7 I bade them good bye & started for Washington & arrived there at 8.15. When

I got to the Hotel I found that their Majestys were at the White house at dinner with the President. I then took a walk over there as it was only a short distance from the hotel & found the White House lit up & the band playing sweet music. The occasion was a most enjoyable one. The dining rooms were decorated beautifully. About 10 their Majestys returned & in a few minutes the band had come over to play for the Queen. It played several favorite airs & at 11.30 they played Hawaii Poni as their last piece. We retired for the night at 12. I forgot to say that I was very much pleased with the appearance of Baltimore. The houses are beautiful & so are the roads. I have an idea it is prettier than Washington. Well good night.

#### Saturday 7

I awoke this morning & found their Majestys ready for breakfast. After breakfast Her Majesty received company. I got our baggage ready as we were to leave for Boston at 12.o.c. At the time appointed we were ready & drove down to the depot & took cars for Boston at 12.30 we after bidding good bye to friends were on the way. We passed several pretty places on the way out. Beautiful farms & acres of alfalfa. The trees were just beginning to leaf. Off in the distance were sheeps grazing and find horses feeding in pasture lands. We didnt stop until we got to a place called Wellington & we stopped to get a five minutes lunch & here we got left as we were not aware that the time was up & so we were left behind & the Queen & princess & husband were on the cars & had gone ahead. But we manage to telephone to the next station & had the cars stop & we took the next out going train & got there in a few minutes & such a laugh we did have over it. We got to New York at 8 o.c. at night but did not stop as we were on the cars & on board of one of those large ferry boats crossing the river. What a sight it was to see the lights on shore & on the boats on the water & on the brooklyn bridge such a sight as I shall never forget. It was kind of foggy when we crossed but it didnt prevent our seeing the lights on shore. The steamers look like large bird just flying across the water. There was a large fire at New York when we passed it was some lumber yard. I retired after we got over to the other side. It took  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours to cross. When we got across the cars were off in a few minutes & so was I to bed.

#### Sunday 8

I awoke this morning & found that we were only a few miles from Boston. We got ready & in a few minutes arrived there. It was about 8 o.c. when we got to the Depot. There we met a committee of Gentlemen that was sent there by the Mayor to receive Her Majesty. In a few minutes we were on our way to the Hotel Parker House. We arrived there after a short ride & was shown to our rooms. Her Majestys rooms was beautifully decorated. In the parlor was a floral offering with Aloha oe done in small flowers of red yellow & purple which was hung on the wall & on the mantle shelves were great bouquet of large red roses & in pots were plants of different kind & in blossoms. It was very pretty to see such a variety of flowers. In a corner was an easel with His Majesty the King picture & on the walls was pictures of honolulu in olden days. After we had rested we went down to breakfast at 9 o.c. As we entered the dining room the first thing that met our eyes were Banana trees in pots & bearing & the side board was a bank of roses & such beauties. Flowers here are very dear 25¢ a bud. After we had breakfast we retired to our rooms. Liliu got ready for church. The Queen did not attend church as she was quite tired after our long ride. Liliu & Mr. Gilman & wife an old resident of Honolulu went to Park St Church. At 12 o.c. The Mayor of Boston called on the Queen & was received by her. Mr. O'Brien is well liked by the people of Boston. At 1 o.c. had lunch & rested till 3 o.c. when their Majestys took carriages for Trinity Church. Mr. Gilman & Mr. Whall

accompanied them after the Services they visited Kings Chapel on their way home & was much pleased with their visit. I went for a walk in the common. It is a block away from the Parker House & it is quite a nice place to pass the time away. It is covered with trees & planted here & there in beds with Tulips pansies daisies & a variety of other plants. In the center is the Soldier Monument which is a beautiful work in bronze & here & there are benches for the public. It was just crowded with people some on the grass a reading & others promenading. I spent an hour there & went home to the Hotel. At 6.o.c. we had dinner & enjoyed it very much. After dinner we got ready to go to a concert at the Music Hall. The Queen didnt go as she was troubled with her foot. Liliu Mrs. Beckley Mr. Whall Mr. Gillman & Boyd went. I also went & enjoyed it very much. There was a large platform & there were about 600 persons on it. There was a band of about 50 members & such music & singing as I shall never forget. We all enjoyed it very much. We got home about 10.o.c. & after having a little lunch retired for the night.

Monday 9

I awoke this morning & found every one ready for breakfast. After we had breakfast we retired to our rooms. Their Majestys received company till 11 o.c. & got ready for a Breakfast that was given by the Mayor in honor of her Majesty at the Parker House dining room. There were a 100 invited guest there. The dining room was beautifully decorated as you enter the room a large American flag was draped over the door & at one end of the room was the word welcome done in flowers & above it was the American eagle holding two small flags & at the other end was the word Aloha Nui worked in flowers supported by two small flags & there were long streamers of red white & blue gracefully depending on the table. Where the Queen sat were large baskets of Paul Neron roses & along the tables were baskets of virgin lillies & violets & lillies of the valley & other beautiful flowers. At 12.30 The Queen & Mayor O Brien & Liliu & Gov Ames & Mrs. Ames & Gen Daminis & Mrs. O Brien & Teukea went down to the dining room where they found the company waiting. As they approached the rooms the Boston band struck up Hawaii Pono. The breakfast lasted 1 1/2 hours after which they retired to the parlor. Then the company was introduced to their Majestys. The rest of the afternoon was spent by the company listening to Mrs. Whitneys fine singing. About 4.o.c. the company dispersed. I spent the afternoon walking around & taking in the sights. At 6 had dinner & got ready for the theatre. At 8.o.c. we got into carriages & drove to the Globe street theatre. There was an immense crowd waiting on the side walk to get a glimpse of the Queen as she entered the carriage. In a few minutes we were there & found our selves surrounded by crowd of would be sight seers. But found our way in the theatre all right. The Box that we were in was draped in flags & flowers. We enjoyed the evenings performance very much. It was the opera of Ruddy Gore. The singing & the costumes were very good. After the performance we drove home and retired for the night.

Tuesday 10

I awoke this morning & found the party all well & ready for breakfast. After breakfast we got ready to take a drive. The Queen Mr. & Mrs. Gillman Mr. Bond & myself went to the Park St Church & visited where the first lot of missionary was sent to Honolulu. Then we were taken up stairs into the church & was pointed out to us where His Majesty sat when he attended services when was at Boston. It is quite an old church over 75 years old. But it is built so strong that it looks like new. From there we went to a large dry good store & watched how the cash is transferred from the various counters. It is done by this process. There are wires laid all over the store

about 7 feet from the floor. It is laid so that a ball containing money will roll after it is hoisted up by means of a small box like concern & drops the ball on the wire & it rolls right to the cashier & if there is any change to go back he or she sends it back the same way. Those selling goods have nothing to do with the wrapping of good sold. It is sent the same way as the cash is & done up by other parties & sent back. It was very interesting. This store belongs to the firm R. H. White & Co. After we spent a few minutes there we visited the store of Hollanders which Mr. Pitman an old resident of Honolulu is part owner of the store. He was very glad to see the Queen & showed us all through the store to the different departments. There is a place for hat trimming & another for dress making one for ladies & one for children. Then they have a room where cutting & fitting is done & several other little apartments which is done all by young ladies. There is about 400 of them. After we had seen all we thanked Mr. Pitman for his kindness & drove home & got just in time to receive relatives of Gen Dominis which was quite a number all of a 100 Sisters cousins aunts & uncles. It was a very pleasant gathering. It was quite amusing to me to see such a large gathering of ones relationship. At 1.o.c. had lunch. After Lunch at 2.o.c. The Queen Mr. Whall Counsul Bond Mr. Gilman Mrs. Beckley & myself visited the state house. This is quite a large building. The dome of this house is covered with thin sheets of gold & is magnificent its structure. In the Hall way was large glass cases with old flags that was used during the war & such a sight some of them were. Torn & full of bullets holes. We visited the court rooms & found it full of men & court was going on. After we were shown all through the building we drove home & got ready to go to Mr. Hunnewells reception. At 3 o.c. we again took carriages & drove to Charlestown to Mr. Hunnewells house. We after a long ride arrived there & found the place filled with old kamaaina. After every one was presented to the Queen & princess & the rest of the suite a light lunch of cream & cakes & coffe was served. After which we again took carriages after bidding the company good bye & drove home. We had dinner at 7 o.c. after which we got ready to go to the theatre. At 8 o.c. we got into carriages & drove to the Boston theatre & witnessed a piece called the Rio Grande which was very good. The Queen didnt go as she was to tired after the day ride. The princess after seeing the first part of the Rio Grande went with the party to the Hollis St theatre to see Evangeline. I staid & saw the Rio Grande through & went home & having a little lunch retired for the night.

Wed. 11

I awoke this morning & found every one in the best of health & ready for breakfast. After breakfast The Queen & Liliu & a company of Gentlemen took carriages for the depot & took the train for Wellesley. I didnt go. I spent the forenoon in going around the different stores & seeing what was to be seen of interest. I got to the hotel in time for lunch & again went out sight seeing which I enjoyed very much. I like Boston for it is a very pretty place the st are kept clean & are of stones set in the ground & the Houses are built all of one Hight which makes it look so uniform like & it is two stories high & handsomely built. As far as I have seen of Boston it is a very clean city. The promanade ground are kept in the best of order & covered here & there with beautiful plants. It is delightful weather here Just like home. The Royal party got home at 4.30 much pleased with their visit which was very interesting & which I missed. At 6. o.c. had dinner after which Their Majestys got ready to go to Gov. Ames reception which was given in honor of her Majesty. It was a brilliant affair. All the tonies of Boston was there. Her Majesty spent a very enjoyable evening. I spent the night at home & retired early.

Thursday 12

I awoke this morning & found it quite cold & misty & all were ready for breakfast to which we did ample Justice. After breakfast at 10 o.c. Her Majesty Liliu Gen. Dominis & the rest of the party took carriages & drove to one of the fire co & witnessed a drill which was very interesting. It is surprising to see how quick they are in getting ready to go to a fire. Everything is done in a few seconds horses harnessed & men in their places & fire a burning in the engines. Then they have several ways of saving people from the burning building. The quickest way is they have a canvas shoot which is taken to any part of the house & is held by some men at the top & also at the bottom & then whoever is to be sent down is put in the shoot & down he goes in a second & then they have a gun that they use to send a line to the top of a house which is done by a small iron ball with line attached which they put in the gun & shoot it over the house. After they had showed us all that was to be seen in that line we again took our carriages & started home. At one had lunch after which their Majestys rested the rest of the after noon. I took a walk around & came to a museum which I entered & saw quite a number of animals & different kinds of birds & I also saw a young man 16 years old & weighs 8 lbs. He is the smallest young man I ever saw. He is as tall as a baby of a year old. From there I went to a matinee & saw a play called Cat a Nip which was very amusing & got home at 5 o.c. & at 6 had dinner. After dinner we got ready to go to a reception that was given at the Mechanicks hall. At 9 o.c. we took carriages & drove there. After a short drive we arrived there & found it crowded with people. The Mayor & wife was there to receive the Queen & princess. We were taken to a large parlor where we laid aside our wraps. After which the Mayor & The Queen took the lead & followed Liliu & Gov. Ames & Gen. Dominis & Mrs. O Brien Curtis & Mrs. Ames & the rest of the party & the committee of Gentlemen. We were taken along an isle which was done by means of long ropes tied from post to post to keep the people back to a large Hall on to a platform where chairs were put for us. The first thing that met our eyes were the heads of the people that was there. There were thousands of them there & all you could see was there heads. There must of been 20000 people there for the house seated 15000 but this time they were standing up & cramed to gether. Her Majesty bowed to publick & was responded by cheers. After Her Majestys had received the committee of Boston & their wives. Then she received the public which took 2 hours. The building was handsomely decorated with flags & flowers. At one end of the building was the Boston band which played Aloha Oe & Hawaii Ponoii very well. Each of those that was present at the reception was presented with a copy of Aloha Oe which had been printed for the occasion. After the public had paid their respects to her Majestys we retired to the parlor & had a little supper of cream & cakes & wine after which we after bidding the guest good night took our carriages for the Parker House & arrived there in a few minutes & which we all retired for the night.

Friday 13

I awoke this morning quite refreshed after my night rest & found the party ready for breakfast. After breakfast at 10 o.c. we went to the state house to see a procession of soldiers composed of young men about 1500 in number who attend school in the city & who are trained at school to be a soldier. It was quite a procession. After it passed we took carriages & drove to the commons to see them drill. It was the first time that a carriage was permitted to enter these grounds. We drove in & took our stand so as to get a good view of the drill which was very good. After they had gone through their different form of military drill we drove home & took a hasty lunch & again took carriages & drove to the depot where we boarded a steamer & sailed up the river. There was quite a number of people on board which were invited to go with us & also a string band which played sweet

music as we went on our way. We first landed at Deer Island where they send drunkards & street walkers for so long a time. It is an Island & a beautiful place. A magnificent building. We first went in the parlor & was introduced to the manager & then went to the room where they hold their meetings. There we found the room full of boys from 6 years up to 25 & 30 & there were 3 little girls about 12 years. The boys were dressed in navy blue clothes & the girls wore plaid woolen dresses. They sang several songs & went through a drill in the way of marching. After they got through the Mayor addressed the boys & said My Dear children it is a great pleasure to me to stand here to day before you all & to look into your faces. I have heard how well you all have behaved. It is not very often I get the time to come here but to day I have come here with one whom probably some of you have heard or read about & it is with pleasure My Dear children that I now present to you all the Queen of the Sandwich Islands to which Her Majesty made a bow & was returned by the clapping of hands. Her Majesty said a few cheering words to them which was interpreted by Mr. Boyd. From there we visited the ladies apartments & found them all a sewing the mens clothing & then to the cooking & sleeping apartments which was kept very clean. Then we visited the Hospitals & found quite a number in bed. There was one old woman there a 105 years old she is blind & trembles very much. From there we went back & had a light lunch & then got ready to go on board. We then started for Fort Wayne & arrived there in a few minutes. We were received at the landing by officers. A salute of 21 guns were fired. We went into the fort & saw how it was constructed. The wall was 30 feet in width & composed of a wall of iron & filled in between with stones & earth. It is made very strong & is about 50 feet high & on the top of the wall are the cannon. They are placed here & there. The houses are built around the inside of the wall. They are of stone & the walls are 2 feet thick. The inside is kept very clean & there are about 12 men to each room. There are not many men kept on shore but Just enough to do the work around & keep guard. After we had visited all of interest we started for home as it was getting late. As Her Majestys left the wharf a salute was fired & in a few minutes were on our way home. It is a grand sight up the river on both sides are the large mills & manufacturing houses & here & there you would see a steamer crowded with people going to different places. We got to the depot after an hours ride on the water & found our carriages waiting to take us to the Hotel. We got there in safety & prepared our selves for dinner. After we had dinner we got ready to go to a concert given in aid of the Indian children. At 8 o.c. we were driven there & spent a few minutes there & enjoyed the singing very much. After which we again took our carriages & drove to a large school of which there are about a 1000 young ladies. It is a grand house handsomely finished & furnished elegantly. We were taken to the receiving room & after we had been introduced to the principle & teachers we were taken into the school room & there we heard some fine singing & violin playing & also a piano Duett by young ladies of the school. We spent an hour there & enjoyed the evenings entertainment. After bidding the principle & teachers good bye we started for home & arrived there safe. We then had lunch & got ready to retire for the night. All well but tired out.

Saturday 14

I awoke much refreshed by my night rest & got ready for breakfast. At 8 o.c. we had breakfast & which I got ready to pack up our things as we were to leave at 1 o.c. for New York. We had all our baggage ready by 12 o.c. & after having our lunch we got ready to go to the depot. At 12 $\frac{1}{2}$  o.c. we left the Hotel. The Mayor went with us to the depot & there we met the rest of the Boston committe. After bidding them good bye we boarded the train & was off on our way at 1 o.c. sharp. On our way out we saw several beautiful homesteads & passed acres of woodland & off in the distance we could see Rhode Island with its tall steeples a towering

above the houses. We passed along a beautiful river where races are held during summer time & also saw quite a number of fisherman out in their boats a Shad fishing. After we had rode out from Boston about 30 miles we came to a river crossing. We rhode across on a low bridge that extended about a mile in length & got to the other side & then we went through for about 10 miles of timber land which was in all its beauty. We stopped at several stations & took on passengers. After a ride of 5 hour we entered the city of New York. Some of the houses built on the out skirts of the city are very handsome with its flower gardens & fruit orchards. We passed through a tunnel of a mile long & came out about the begining of where the business houses are built. The appearance of this city dont look to me as a very neat place but it might be better further in the heart of the city. We got to the depot & met Mr. Carter there awaiting our arrival & also Mr. Allen the Hawaiian counsul. We got into carriages & were driven to the Victoria Hotel. As we rhode along the streets we saw quite a number of beautiful buildings & the streets crowded with carriages & people. We got to the Hotel about 7 o.c. and were shown to our rooms. Her Majesty rooms was beautifully decorated. In the parlor was large palm trees in pots & also banana trees & a pot of the rubber tree & a variety of beautiful plants. It looked like a garden over a mirror was the word Aloha worked in small everlasting flowers of red with a yellow background. It was tied up with long sprays of the smilax vine. After we had got all our baggage to gether we went down to dinner. The Queen & Liliu had their dinner in the parlor as a table had been set ready for them. After dinner we spent the evening in doors & retired early.

Sunday 15

I awoke this morning & found that they werent up but by 8 o.c. were ready for breakfast. After breakfast I spent the forenoon in writing letters. At 1 o.c. had lunch. Their Majestys spent the morning at home. After lunch I took a walk around the block & back to the Hotel. At 4.o.c. Mr. Allen The Queen Curtis & I went for a drive to the park. On our way there we passed thousands of elegantly dressed men & women & beautiful carriages with their fine horses & well dressed foot man. We also passed several beautiful mansions of some of the richest people in New York. Vanderbilt House for one & Whitney for another & several others. Vanderbuilt house is of red granite handsomely carved pilliars & mouldings of the same stone adorns the finishing tuches on the out side. We also passed a beautiful church that they are building which has about 30 steeples handsomely carved in stone. They have been 3 years building it & is not quite compleeted. The inside work is done & services are held there every day & it is the roman catholic church. We after a long ride up 5th Avenue arrived at the park & to my surprise saw thousands of thousands of people & carriages by the miles coming & going. It looked as if the whole of New York was there & such a sight beautiful trees in all its beauty & great lawns of green grass & benches all along the walk. This beats the California park such beautiful roads & such a pleasent place for a drive. This park has a drive of 7 miles around & is covered with trees of all kinds & beautiful flowering shrubs. This is one of the grandest scenes I ever saw in the center of this park is the resivoir that supplies the city with water. We passed a place where there is a lake & quite a number of ladies & men out rowing. There are also roads under this park from one side to the other to allow waggon carting heavy loads to pass through as it would take to much time to go around it. After we had gone around it we drove home. Liliu is not feeling so well to day so she didnt go with the Queen. We had dinner at 7 o.c. after which we spent the evening at home.

Monday 16

I awoke this morning & found it quite misty. We had breakfast at 8 o.c. after which Her Majesty received company all the morning. At 1 had lunch & rested

till 4 o.c. when we again took carriages for the museum at the park. The Queen Liliu Gen Dominis & Mr. Carter & I & Mrs. Beckley drove to the park & to the museum. The roads were crowded as usual with carriages & with people. We got to the museum & went in & saw quite a sight. The first were Statuary of different kinds & then came glass cases of different kinds of gold plates that were used in Egypt over 2000 years ago & was found in the tombs of the dead & then came glass ware so old that it has changed to different collors also found in tombs. Then Jewelery of different make also very old some over 3000 years old & belong to different kings & princess. There was a pair of armlets 300 hundred years before the birth of Christ. It belonged to a prince & it weighed 4 lbs made of gold. Then there were large Jugs made of clay & it was painted with some kind of dye done as the native of Nihau do in Pawehe of all kinds. Then we came to large caskets of stone made by those of Egypt to burry their dead kings & princes which was very old & handsomely carved in different figures. There was one 2000 years old & Just as good as new. From there we visited where the bodys were kept. It is surprising to see how well they are kept. There were corpse there 300 years old & looks Just as nice as if it were preserved in alcohol. The way that they are prepared for burrial is they take the corpse & wind yards of cloth around their bodies as tight as they can get it & then there is some kind of paper that is pasted around the body. The head is made so that it looks like the one that is dead & is painted over with different collars of paint. The features are also done so that you may know who it is. It is painted Just like life with its natural colors. There is also a casket made of wood that goes on the outside of the corpse which is carved very handsome then this is put in the stone casket & covered over with a heavy lid of stone about 5 in thickness. It is one of the most interesting place I ever visited. There are also several old coins there. Then came a lot of Japaneese curiosities such as vases & paper knives & a lot of other articles. There was one small blue vase of Japaneese work worth 7000 dollars. We then went into the art rooms & saw some grand paintings. There is a painting there of horses that cost \$50000 & several other very choice picture costing from \$30000 to \$60000 dollars. All the pictures that was in that room was worth \$4000000. After we had seen all that was to be seen we took our carriages & drove around the park & then went to the church that they are building & saw the interior of the church. The inside is all of marble the pilliars & the ceiling are handsomely carved. It is one of the grandest & larget church I ever was in. After we had seen all we want home & had dinner, after which we got ready for to go to the Wallacks theatre & saw the black Husars which was very good the costumes were grand & the singing good. We got home about 11 o.c. & retired for the night.

Tuesday 17

I awoke this morning & got ready for breakfast. After we had breakfast we got ready to go for a ride on the water. At 10 o.c. we got into carriages & drove for white star line wharf & borded the H.M.S. Minisota an old man of war vessel. The Queen was presented to the captain & then to the officers & so was Curtis & Mrs. Beckley & Boyd. Mr. Carter & Mr. Allen. A salute was fired for the Queen. We were shown all over the ship & then got ready to go on board of a small tug boat that was to take us up the river. After thanking the captain & officers we left the Minisota & boarded the tug Atlantic. As we left the wharf another salute was fired. It is a grand sight on the river all along the wharf was crowded with vessels & steamers & such large boats they were. On the left of us was Brooklyn with its green banks & houses here & there among the trees. We passed near the statue of liberty enlightning the world. This is on an island & is 387 feet high. There are rooms

in this statue occupied by the keeper & family. I was told that it is so large that 6 men can sit with ease in her nose & in her thumb 15 can get into it. It dont look large out side but they say it is very large & it has one of the strongest electric light on earth. The grounds are planted with grass which looks quite fresh & green. We steamed up to Governors Island & landed there. The Queen was met at the landing by officers living on the Island. We were taken up to the fort where a salute was fired. The Grounds here are beautiful all covered with grass & the houses of those living there are built in rows & it sets the place off. There are flowers a growing as well. A band was there & played several airs. Here we witnessed a military drill by the soldiers, after which we went all over the fort. This one is built like the one in Boston. We went in the sleeping apartments & the kitchen & in the bakery & found it as clean as it could be kept. Then we visited where all the cannons & gattling guns were kept & saw how they are used & from there we visited a museum where they have all the flags kept that was used in the southern war. Some are all torn & blotted with blood & others full of bullet holes. Here we saw the horse that Sheridan rhode in the war. It is preserved & stuffed & has the saddle & bridle on that Sheridan used & several weapons of different nations a number of Indian clothes all covered with beads & feathers & a lot of other things of interest. We also saw a small bit of leather of a pair of mocasine boot that George De Long had left from what he had eaten. It was found with him in the snow. After we had seen all of interest we then went to the House of one of the head officers & there Her Majesty was introduced to the wives of the officers, after which ice creame & cakes & coffe was served. After spending an hour there we got ready to go on our way. After bidding friends good by we again borded the tug & went up the river as we passed the fort a salute was fired. We passed a place where the emigrants are landed. It is called Castle Garden. There are 5000 emigrants landed there every month. It is quite a large place like a park right at the landing & is covered with trees & a large house is in the center which the people are put in when landed. Brooklyn is very pretty along the river side. Its bank is covered with trees & in among them are built fine dwelling houses with its great lawns & pretty gardens. We passed an Island called Blackwells Island. Its where the insane & street walkers & drunkards are put. It looks beautiful from the boat. We went around this Island & back to the depot. We met several steamers crowded with people going & coming. We arrived at the depot & found the carriages waiting. We were back to the Hotel in a few minutes & found Liliu a waiting for us. She didnt go with us as she was not feeling well. We had dinner at 7 o.c. after which I spent the evening at the 6th Ave Theatre & enjoyed the play. Their Majesties spent the evening at home. I got home at 10 o.c. & after having a lunch I retired for the night.

Wednesday 18

I awoke & found it a beautiful morning. The sun nice & bright. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. At 10 o.c. carriages were ordered & in a few minutes The Queen Mr. Allen Mr. Carter Curtis Boyd Mrs. Beckley & G Beckley & I were driven down to the depot & boarded a ferry boat & was taken up the river to blackwells Island. We got there in a little while & were taken to the place where the street walkers & petty thieves are kept. This is a beautiful place. The Island is covered with grass & the roads are made of gravel & kept very clean. There are quite a number of trees planted here & is Just commencing to look green after the winter frost had gone. We got to the house in a few minutes & were taken into the receiving room & was introduced to the maneger & wife. From there we went into the ladies sewing room & saw about 100 women sewing on machine making shirts for the prisoners. From there we went to where they are put at night & saw how each man is locked in their cells there about 1000 cells & most of them filled. Some there for 3 & 5 month to 1 year. The prisoner has his hair cut short & wears a striped pants of blue & white. The cells are very small & a small mattress is Just large enough for one to sleep on. The prisons are made very strong. Its walls are 2 feet thick & of stone & has

6 stories. It is a very fine built house. The stone was got on the Island & it is of this dark granite. The prisoners do all the cutting of stones & they do cut out some very nice work. From there we visited the hospitals & found this quite a building of its self of the same kind of work in stone. This House is attended by young ladies & it is kept very clean. There were several patients men & women. We entered a room where there were quite a number of women with their babes, some a year old some & few mont & some a few weeks. There was one lady that had a pair of twins & they were Just as cumming as it could be. We visited their dining rooms & found it very clean. From there we visited the insane people. We were taken to a large handsome house of stone & was ushered into the receiving room. After we were introduced to the doctor in charge we got ready to go to an entertainment given by those who are getting better & are not so wild. We went to a house that was built for that purpose & found it like a theatre with a stage & it was crowded with insane people but those who are all right. There was a young lady who opened the performance with a piano solo. She played very well. I was told that when she is in her room she is talking all the time to herself & imagines some one at her window. After she was through the curtain went up & out came a young lady dressed like a young man who took part & also a young lady but the first one only the day before she was so bad that she tried to commit suicide. But when I saw her on the stage one wouldnt believe that she was insane for she acted her part very well. They played a short but comical piece. After which we went to see where the poor are kept. We didnt go into their house but Just passed by. The Walks were Just crowded with people of all ages & class. They welcomed us with cheers & the waving of handkerchief. From there we visited where the prisoners are at work at the quarries cutting stones & from there we again started for home & got home to the hotel at 4 o.c. We dined at 6.30 & got ready to go to the theatre. At 8 we took carriages & drove to the Casino & witnessed a beautiful opera. The costumes were very handsome. It was of the french style in olden days. After the play we drove home & had a light lunch & retired for the night.

Thursday 19

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm. We breakfasted at 8.30 & at 10 o.c. The Queen Mrs. Beckley & Mr. Carter Mr. Boyd & the president of the schools & I. We got into carriages & drove to one of the largest schools in the city where the girls are taught. This is quite a building & there are several different class rooms. There are 2800 schollars in this school & all girls from 6 to 18 & 20 years old. We were introduced to the principle & teachers & then went into their school room where we found it full of girls from 12 to 20 years. There were some very handsome young ladies among them. After we were shown to seats they began by singing some of their beautiful songs after which some of the girls gave us a short recitation in french & after translate it in english. Then the president of the bord addressed them thus. Young ladies I have come here today with one who probably some of you have heard & read about. We have had quite a number of distingush visitors visit this beautiful school. We have had lords & presidents & kings & princes visit out school but we never have had a Queen & it is with the greatest pleasure that I now present to you the Queen of Hawaii to which Her Majesty responded by making a bow & then we went to the different rooms where the girls are taught. We entered the room where drawing is taught & then where they are taught of the different parts of the human body & into the exercise room & there we saw the young ladies go through an exercise with rubber strap about a foot long & fastened to 2 handles & then they all begin by pulling the straps as far as they can & then get it across their shoulders & different other ways. After they got through The Queen made a short speech thanking the young ladies thus. To the young ladies of this school I am very much pleased with my visit here to your school to day & I am

gratified with what I had seen. We have schools at my home in Hawaii but not carried on in such a large scale & it is with please that I will when I return to my home tell His Majesty of my visit here & of what I had seen. I have never heard of a school having 2800 scholars but I am glad that I have seen this number here to day. I now thank you all with my aloha nui. The Queen spoke in native & Mr. Carter interpreted her speech. We then went to the small childrens room & heard them sing & go through an exercise & then after bidding the teachers good by we took our carriage & drove home. We had lunch at 1 o.c. after which her Majesty rested till 4 o.c. & went out for a drive with Mr. & Mrs. Hewitt Mayor of New York. I walked around & looked at the pretty things in the shop windows & other things of interest. I got home at 5 o.c. I forgot to say that there are 235000 scollars taught in the city every year & it cost each scollar 44 dollars a year & there are 4000 teachers. We had dinner at 7.30. In the evening I walked around & took in the sight. I dont like New York so much as I do Boston. It is not kept so clean as Boston but that is owing to the amount of traffic here. The buildings in some places are magnificent & in some very poor in appearance. Here they have elevated cars that is a long & strong bridge like rail is built up on large iron post & is braced by iron rods it is 15 feet high from the ground. It is built so that it wont interfere with carriage & cars below. It is built very strong & 2 cars are running at the same time and coming & going. It is a very interesting sight to see the different shop windows & what they have there that will attract your attention. The first you would see a dry goods store & then an apple stand cigar store hair dresser a lot of other different shops. There are crowds of people on the str all hours of night & as the st are all lighted with electric light it makes it very pleasent walking all spending an hour walking around. I started home & in a few minutes retired for the night.

Friday 20

I awoke & found it a beautiful morning & the Queen ready for breakfast. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. At 10 o.c. Her Majesty got ready to go to have some potos taken at one of the best houses in New York. After she was through she got ready to go to visit Vanderbilt mansion which is on 5 av & a most magnifiant mansion. The building is of granite handsomely carved. Her Majesty was very much pleased with her visit. At 1 o.c. we had lunch & rested till 3 when carriages were ordered & in a few minutes The Queen & Boyd Mr. Dominis Mr. Carter Mrs. Beckley & Geo. B. were driven to Mr. Williams house & there they had dinner. I took a drive around the park & enjoyed it very much. There were crowds there as usual. In my drive I saw a stone high called Cleopatra Needle that was brought from Egyp. It is years old & is handsomely carved & it cost 100.000 dollars to have it brought to New York & put in its place. I got home at 6. had dinner & spent the evening at home & retired early. Their Majestys also spent the evening at home.

Saturday 21

I awoke & found it a very misty morning. We had breakfast at 9. At 10.30 o.c. Her Majesty received Sisters of Charity who had called on her Majesty. They are a branch of those that were sent to Honolulu to take care of the lepers. At 11 o.c. Mrs. Graham called on the Queen & took her out for a drive. Liliu didnt go as she is not feeling well. I went out walking & saw quite a sight of interest. I visited one of the largest store in New York & saw how business is carried on. It is similar to that of boston. After purchasing a few thing I went home & got in time for lunch. Her Majesty got back at 1 o.c. very much pleased with her ride. After having lunch she rested till 3 o.c. when she got ready to go to Mayor Hewitt house to a reception. At 4.o.c. Mr. Iaukea The Queen Mr. Boyd Mr. Carter Mrs. Carter Mrs. Beckley were driven there. I got ready & went out for a ride. I Jumped in the 6 av cars &

were driven to the park where I Jumped out & walked around awhile & took in the sight. There is one house here that I saw 14 stories high & is rented by 60 different families. It is called flatts there are severall but not so high. There were as usual crowds of people & carriages. There are police men stationed all over the park & are dressed in very neat uniforms. I took the cars at 6 o.c. & drove home. Had dinner & went to the theatre. It was a ministrell entertainment. I didnt stay long for I was disappointed & disgusted with the play. I took a walk around the streets & home. Their Majesty got home at 8 o.c. & spent the evening at home. I retired at 10 o.c. quite tired out with my walk.

Sunday 22

I awoke & found it a clear & beautiful morning. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. & Her Majesty got ready to go to church. At 10.30 Mr. Allen the Queen Iaukea drove to trinity church & attended services there. I got ready & went to the 5 av church & enjoyed the sermon very much. I got home at 12.15 & had lunch after which I got ready to go for a walk. I took the 3 av cars & rode to the Bridge depot. There I got a ticket & boarded the cars & rode across the Brooklyn bridge one of the most grand structure in America. It is over a mile in length & all of iron. It is a wonderful structure & is a great curiosity. After I had crossed I again took the street cars & rode to Green Wood depot & took the cars for Coney Island. In a few minutes we were on the way & arrived there in 15 minutes. The first thing that I saw in the distance was a large elephant. It is considered the 8 wonders of the world it is 175 feet 6 in high to the top of the Howdah which a magnificent view can be had of Jersey city Brooklyn & New York. It is 203 feet length of body 109 feet circumference of body 198 feet length of neck 19 ft circumference of neck 128 ft length of legs 60 ft circumference of legs 80 length of ears 54 ft width of ears 40 ft length of tail 70 ft diamater of tail 18 ft tapering to 26 in length of trunk 72 ft diamater of trunk 20 ft tapering to 3 ft 4 in length of tusk 42 ft diamter of tusk 12 ft tapering to 1 in. the eyes are of glass 2 in thick & are 4 ft in diamter. The inside are divided in rooms 31 in number. Main hall 92 x 38 Head room 60 x 35 ft triangular shape 2 side body rooms each 54 & 10 ft 2 thigh rooms each 38 x 10 2 shoulder each 32 x 10 2 cheeks room 42 & 10 ft 1 throat 42 x 8 1 stomach room 66 x 22 4 hoof room each 18 x 12 & 12 ft high 6 limb room 12 x 12 ft 12 feet high. Hip rooms 38 x 10 ft 2 shoulder rooms 32 x 7. 2 cheek 40 x 10. the Elephant is ventilated by 63 windows & is illuminated by 25 electric lights which is equal to 175000 candle power. It took 3 million 5 hundred thousand ft of lumber 11000 kegs of nails 12 tons of iron bolts & is covered by 57000 square ft of tim. It took 263 men to build it in 120 days. It cost a quarter of a million. It is a wonderful structure. after I went all over it & enjoyed the sight from there I went to the beach. It is so foggy I cant see far & it is very cold. I gathered a few shells & then went to the Hotel & saw crowds of people. Here they have every kind of sport to amuse the grown & young people. There is a large pavillion with merry go rounds in them & is crowded with people & also a roller coster. There are serveral refreshments stands & lot of everything. It was so foggy I couldnt see much. There were great panorama views very interesting everything seems to cost 5¢. After spending an hour there I took the 6 o.c. train & arrived home to the Hotel at 8 o.c. It was a very pleasent ride but quite chilly. I had dinner & spent the evening home & so did their Majesties.

Monday 23

I awoke & found it a nice warm morning had breakfast at 8 o.c. & at 10 got ready to go for a ride on the elevated cars. We got into carriages & were driven to the station. The Queen Mrs. Carter Miss Carter Mrs. Hoffnung Mr. Hoffnung Miss Hoffnung

Mrs. Beckley Curtis Mrs. Hewitt Mr. Beckley J Boyd & I were taken after getting at the depot to a train of cars which was all decorated with flags & was a special train at our disposal. In a few minutes we were off on our way in mid air above houses in some places & in some where you can look in to room of private houses. It was a very pleasant ride. It took us 2 hours to go around. It is 30 miles around the scenery was very nice. We passed several new houses not quite completed & which will be grand one when done. We passed the bridge station & saw it crowded with people. In some places it was very dirty & in some quite clean. We got home at 12.30 & had lunch after which I got ready to go & do what little shopping I wanted to do before we left for London. Their Majestys rested the rest of the afternoon. I got home at 5 o.c. & had dinner at 6 o.c. At 8 o.c. their Majesty & party went to the opera. I took a walk around & home & retired early. All well except Liliu slight cold but getting better.

Tuesday 24

I awoke & found it was breakfast time. After breakfast I packed up our things as we team early in the morning for London. The Queen & party went to visit some fort in the Harbor. I in a little while got our things all packed & ready. At 12 I took a hasty lunch & took a walk up to the square. It is a large place in the center of city & covered with trees & flowers & is planted with beautiful flowers & seats are all along the walk. There were hundreds there spending the afternoon. In the center of this square is a pole with a strong electric light that lights up this part of the city at night. There are several statues of noted men here & there which sets the place off. After I had seen all I wanted to see I strolled around & back to the Hotel & found their Majestys had got back & had enjoyed their visit. Had dinner at 6 o.c. & after which I again took a last stroll in the city & got home at 10 & found their Majesty had retired for the night. All well.

Wednesday 25

We were awakened this morning at 5 o.c. & got ready to take an early breakfast as we are to leave to day for London at 6 o.c. We had breakfast & at 6.30 o.c. we got into carriages & were driven to the Depot where we were to take passage on one of the largest steamers in New York. It is the City of Rome. We arrived there in due time & after bidding friends good bye we boarded the steamer & in a few minutes after 7 o.c. we were on our way. There were a large crowd on the wharf to see us off. Mr. & Mrs. Beckley Mr. & Mrs. Carter & Allen & others were also there. We left New York mid cheers & clapping of hands. As we passed on our way out there was a beautiful sight. Ships steamers boats were all along the wharf & some were crowded with people some going up the river & others getting ready to go to sea & on the brooklyn side it is very pretty with its green banks & beautiful houses & its gardens. We passed a large Fort at the entrance. Off in the distance we could see Coney Island with the large Elephant towering above the houses. We met large steamers & ships on their way into port. At the entrance was a large ship that was sunk during the night & all that was to be seen was the top of the mast. After we got out side then I began to see the amount of people that was on board. We had a very large list of passengers. There were 762 cabin passengers & several in the steerage over a 1000 in all. I went into the Saloon & found it quite a beautiful finished place for the passengers to pass away the time. It is painted white & gilded in gold with a large mirror at one end. In the center is a place left open to give light into the dinning saloon & it has a long box that runs across the center of this place that is filled with pretty flowers & vines entwined along the railing that goes around this opening. There is a piano here in this saloon & the seats around the Saloon are covered in garnet velvet & finished off very nicely.

As you go down you get into the dinning saloon. It is quite a large place & has 11 long tables. It is like a large dining room in one of the large Hotels. At one end of the Saloon is a large organ & on each side is a large side board of walnut. This is very near the center of the ship & the state rooms run forward & aft of this saloon. The rooms are small but comfortable. At 9 o.c. we went down to breakfast No 2 & enjoyed it. After breakfast we went to our rooms & got ready in case we should be sick. After we had got out of sight of land we got into a thick fog. Some of the passengers were sick & others rather enjoyed the ride. As it was so smooth we were not sick at all. The Queen spent the day in her room & so did Liliu. It was foggy all day. At 12 we had lunch & slept the rest of the day. At 6 had dinner & spent a few hours on deck & retired at 9 o.c. All well.

#### Thursday 26

I awoke this morning & found it was still foggy & cold but the water nice & smooth. We breakfast at 9 & spent the day reading. Most of the passengers were on deck. At 12 had lunch & spent the afternoon in reading. Some of the passengers spent the day playing cards & chess checkers & other amusements. We made in 24 hours from the starting point 371 miles. The Queen spent an hour on deck & went to her rooms. At 6 o.c. had dinner after which I spent the evening on deck. The fog had cleared away after we had dinner & it was very pleasant on deck. I saw what they call the northern light it is Just like lightning but appears very quick & often. We retired quite early. The Queen is well & so is Liliu. So ends this day.

#### Friday 27

I awoke & found it quite cold but beautiful weather the steamer glides along without a roll. It is one of the best sea boat that I was ever on. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. & spent the forenoon on deck. The passengers are getting over their sea sickness & are enjoying the trip. Some are reading & others playing cards. At 12 o.c. we made 24 hours 409 miles. Lunch was served as usual & most all were down to dinner. The Queen & Liliu are well & enjoyed their lunch of poi & after which the afternoon was spent in reading. There was a ship in sight bound south. At 6 o.c. had dinner. The Queen & Liliu had their dinner in their rooms & enjoyed it. After dinner I spent the evening on deck till 9 o.c. The days seems to grow longer as we go further north. It is not dark at 8 the sun sets at 7 & still it keeps bright. All well. So ends this day.

#### Saturday 28

I awoke & found that it is foggy & the whistle a blowing every minute & it is quite cold. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which I spent the morning below writing. The Queen & Liliu spent the day in their rooms. Tating & crocheting. We made at 12 o.c. 405 miles. Lunch was usual & enjoyed it. We are always ready when it comes meal time. Spent the afternoon reading. At 6 had dinner after which we spent the evening on deck. It is still foggy. At 8 we retired for the night. All well.

#### Sunday 29

I awoke & found that it was a bright morning & very pleasant weather. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which it was announced that there was to be a sermon at 10.30 o.c. At the time appointed The Queen & Gen Dominis & Iaukea & most of the passengers attended services, which was conducted by one of the passengers who was a preacher. It was very good & interesting. We sang a few hymns & after a prayer we retired to the upper decks. There was a whale seen quite close to the ship & a school of porpoise. We made 390 miles to day. It was so foggy that we had to steam slow.

Lunch at the usual hour, after which the afternoon was spent in singing hymns. A schooner was seen in the distance. Had dinner at 6 o.c. The Queen had a poi dinner in the room with Liliu. After dinner I spent the evening on deck till 8.30 & retired for the night. All well.

Monday 30

I awoke & found it quite cold. Breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which we spent the forenoon in reading & playing games. It is beautiful on the water & the steamer being so long & large it hardly rocks but Just glides along. We made 378 m. It was so foggy last night we had to steam slow. Lunch as usual & spent the afternoon writing. At 6 o.c. had dinner & spent the evening on deck singing some of our songs which was liked by the passengers. I retired at 10 o.c. All well.

Tuesday 31

I awoke & found it kind of hazy & cold. Had breakfast at 9 o.c. I spent the forenoon reading. The Queen & Liliu spent the morning in their rooms tating. At 12 we made 290 miles. Lunch as usual to which we did Justice to. The afternoon was spent in reading & games. A ship was sighted & passed near us. Dinner at 6 o.c. & all enjoyed it, after which I spent the evening in the Saloon as there was a concert on bord given by some of our passengers who are primadona & singers. At 8 o.c. the saloon was full of people. Liliu & Gen. Dominis was present. The programe consisted of singing & recitation. The singing was very good & was enjoyed by all. A collection was taken up for the Seamen Orphans Home which amounted to 100 dollars. After the concert we went up on deck to look for land as we expect to see land by 11 o.c. At 11.30 land was sighted & in a few hours was off Queens town & there a tug came off to take those that were to go ashore there. A basket of flowers was sent to their Majesties from here by Mr. Seymore the Hawaiian consul. At 1 o.c. the passengers were all on bord & were on their way ashore & in a few minutes were on our way for liverpool. I retired at 1.30 o.c. All well.

Wednesday June 1

I awoke & found it a clear but cold morning. Breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which we got our things ready to go ashore as we expect to get to Liverpool at 6 o.c. Land was sighted at 10 o.c. It is a high land but quite barren to our left is Ireland in the distance. We had lunch at 2 o.c. We saw quite a number of steamers & ships on their way in. There was a tug came out to meet us where we had to come to an anchor. as it was low tide. On bord was Mcfarlane Mr. Armstrong Davies Hoffnung dressed in their uniforms. After we had got our things on board we boarded the tug mid cheers of the passengers & started for shore. It was so hazy that we couldnt see the place very good. A salute was fired for the royal party. In 2 hours time we arrived in Liverpool harbor on our left was a fort & on our right on an Island was a large bathing place called brighton beach & a large Depot is built there for the cars & for parties coming there to spend a day. This bath house is a small house on wheels room enough for one is rolled to the waters edge & there you can come out right into the water. There were quite a number on the beach. On a point is a large light house. As we neared the wharf we found it quite a long one. It is 6 miles long & crowded with ships. There was a ship in the Harbor water logged. The buildings along the wharf look neat & are quite ancient like in its appearance. We got to the landing in a few minutes & found it swarmed with people. A line of soldiers were there in their gay uniforms of red Jackets & black pants & a high hat covered in some black hair skin. There were 3 ladies Mrs. Jannion Mrs. Armstrong & mother were there to receive their Majesties with large bouquets of roses. A handsome carriage was in waiting to convey the Queen to the Hotel.

The Grooms were dressed in a very rich costume. The Mayor of the city met the Queen as she landed mid cheers of the people. After we had entered carriages we drove for the North Western Hotel. On the sides of the Queen's carriage were 6 mounted police in their uniforms who escorted the Queen to the Hotel. We got there in a few minutes & found quite comfortable rooms. This is quite a large hotel & is finished off very nicely. Inside the floors are of marble & so are the pillars & stairs. I like the appearance of Liverpool. It is so clean on the street but I am sorry to say that there is a lot of poor people here. I passed several women on the way to the Hotel with gunny bag dresses on. It seems a shame to see so many poor people in such a grand city. We had dinner at 8 o.c. after which we spent the evening at home. Right opposite us is a large building called the St. Georges Hall. It is used for a museum. There are some fine buildings here that we passed on our way to the Hotel. We all retired early.

Thursday June 2

I awoke & found it a raining & quite cold. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which we spent the day at home as it is still raining. Her Majesty Liliu Curtis Gen. Dominis Mr. Hoffnung & Armstrong took carriages & drove to the state house. I didn't go out as it is so disagreeable out of doors. I sat & watched the passers by. At 1 o.c. had lunch & spent a few hours writing. The Queen & Suit got back & enjoyed their visit. Had lunch & went over to the St. George Hall & saw what is to be seen of interest. As it cleared up a little at 5 o.c. I took a short walk down the street looking in the shop windows. There were everything you could think off in the stores. I at last came to a long building & found it to be a market place where you can get everything in the provision line. There were beef shops pork poultry & wild birds & Rabbits all kinds of vegetables & fruits flowers made in bouquet & wreaths & lot of other things to mention. After spending an hour there I proceed homewards & got there in time to have dinner after which we got ready to go to the Alexander theatre. The Queen Gen Dominis Curtis Mr. Hoffnung Mrs. Hoffnung & Mr. Boyd all went to the theatre. Liliu didn't go as it was wet & damp. I went & enjoyed the play. The actor was Mr. Sullivan in one of his best pieces & that is Hamlet. It was grand & he is such a good actor. The House was crowded. I admired the scenes in this play. The costumes were grand. This Theatre is not a large one but is a very neat looking theatre. The boxes were occupied by some of the society ladies of Liverpool dressed in their low neck dresses & powdered hair. After the play I went home & found the party had got back & as it was getting late we retired for the night.

Friday June 3

I awoke & found it a nice morning. We had breakfast at 8 & as we were to leave here today for Rackheath Hall I went & packed up our things & got ready to go by the 11 o.c. train. At the time appointed we were ready & as the train was only at the back entrance to the Hotel we didn't have far to go before we were on board the train. The station was crowded with people all anxious to get a sight of the Queen. The depot is a large building with a glass roof. After we were all on board in a few minutes we were off on our way. We passed several beautiful buildings. The only fault here is the houses are so dirty looking with too much smoke which makes them black looking. About 10 minutes after we left the depot we came to Edge Hill station & took on a few passengers & then proceeded on our way. After we left this station we came to an open country & what a sight this was. Great large fields of grain & the fences are of some kind of shrub but short & all one height & is just a green & beautiful hedge. Here & there are houses where the owner of these acres of land live. Back in the distance are the Surry Mountains & is covered with trees.

We passed a large pottery manufactory & saw piles of pots there ready for the market & also a large lime shop. There were car loads of lime near where we passed. We went over a large iron bridge that crossed a large river. We also passed a canal that runs from the Surry Mountains to the sea & there were steamers on their way out. The way they work it is a line is fastened to the ship & then is fastened to a horse on shore which it pulls it along its way. It did seem queer to me to see a vessel so far in land & in such a narrow river like place. As we went along the scenery improved. We passed acres of pasture land & cattle feeding on it. There was a large castle off in the distance among the trees which look like some of those pictures we see sometimes in papers & books. We passed several small stations but didnt stop. In some places we passed miles of wild Margaret & Forget-me not. At one of the large station that we came to The Mayor came to see the Queen dressed in his full dress with a large gold necklace of gold with a large locket. There were 3 men there with the Mayor that bore 2 large gold concerns with a crown on the top & the other man held a sword which is called a mace. There were thousands of people there to see the Queen & all greeted her with cheers & waving of hankerchief. After we left this station we went on our way & arrived at our destination at 6 o.c. & as there were carriages there in waiting it didnt take long before we were at Rackheath Hall. A private residence of one of the Gentlemen of London a Mr. Stewart who had invited the Queen to spend a few days with his family which consisted of a wife & son 12 years. This is a very large place. There are acres of land & mostly in timberland. The house is in the center of the grounds & is an old fashioned one. It looks like a castle but is a very comfortable place. They have quite a number of servants & are kept busy. After we had arrived there we were shown to our rooms & found them beautifully furnished. At 10 o.c. we went down to dinner. The ladies here dress as if they were going to a ball when they go to dinner. They put on the best they have. After dinner we spent the evening singing & retired early.

Saturday June 4

I awoke at 8 o.c. & found that I was to early. It is a beautiful morning. I went out & took a walk in the gardens & oh what a sight. Flowers of all kinds on one side of the house is a conservatory & is full of all kinds of plants & ferns. Then there is a large house for fruit trees & grapes. The trees are planted in beds & are trained like a vine. There are peaches plums pears apples all laden with young fruit. There were also grape vines all bearing. In large pots were strawberries & some of the plants were full of berries & ripe. It is very interesting to visit such a place. I went into one of the pasture & found it covered with beautiful wild flowers & there were a lot of wild rabbits. There were several deers there that they keep until near the hunting time when they turn them loose in the woods & then hunt for them. I also saw a place where there were quite a number of boxes of pheasents eggs which were there for hens to hatch. After they are old enough they are let loose & then hunt for them in the woods. This is the place to spend a week or so. Beautiful weather. I got back to the house & found it near breakfast time. At 10 had breakfast after which we spent the day at home. Among the trees & flowers we lunched at 1 o.c. & after lunch I spent the afternoon in fishing in one of the ponds near the house. We had dinner at 9 o.c. & retired early.

Sunday 5

I awoke & found it a beautiful morning. We had our breakfast at 9 o.c. after which their majestys got ready to go to church. I spent the day going around in the woods. Their Majesties left at 11.30 to go to a town called Norwich to attend

the afternoon service. At 1 o.c. we had lunch after which we spent the rest of the day wandering around. At 6 Their Majesties returned & got ready for dinner. & at 9 o.c. dinner was served. There were a few young ladies staying here with us. Friends of the Hostess who were all dressed up in silks laces & diamonds. After we had our dinner we spent a few hours in the drawing room. This room is a very pretty room. Its walls are painted in different scenery & are very pretty. There are also some fine paintings & the room is furnished beautifully. There is also a billiard room where the men passaway the time. We retired at 10.30 o.c.

Monday 6

I awoke & found it a fine morning. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. after which I got ready to go to Norwich to get a few things. There was a carriage waiting to take me there. I was on my way in a few minutes & found it a very pleasant drive. As we got near Norwich my companions pointed out to me in the distance a large church. whose spires are above the rest. As we entered the city we found that the people there making preparations to receive the Queen as she was to go to town to day at 10 o.c. I like the appearance of Norwich. It is very good & kept very clean. I passed the church whose spire I saw in the distance & found it a very large church. The Queen was to come there first & then to Guild Hall where there was to be a lunch & from there to the castle. There were great crowd at the church waiting to see the Queen. I went & got what few things I wanted & then went to the Guild Hall & saw the decorations. The entrance was a mass of palms & small shrubs in pots & over the door was draped the Hawaiian flag & here & there were flags of different color. Up in the room where the lunch was to be served was a very pretty sight. There was a long table beautifully set with its different dishes & colored glasses & great large bouquet of flowers on the wall were draped different flags & in the windows & corners were palm trees & large pots of Hydranges. It was very tastefully done. From there I went to the church & found the Queen had arrived & was in the church. So I hurried home & after having dinner we again came to town with some of the ladies of the house. We first went to the church & there I saw one of the largest churches in that city. It is very high & is black & dirty with age. This church is 1700 years old & is as strong as it could be. There are some very fine painting on the ceiling & each picture represent a portion of the bible. The floor are all marble. The pilliars are very large & at the center of the church is a large organ. We went into a large room & there saw a large Bible that the Queen of England took her oath on the day of her coronation. I opened the book & saw her name in the book in her own hand writing. It was presented to this church & is kept there for the public to look at. It is very near fifty years old. As we came out I noticed some of the floor stones were like those of the dead & found out that there were parties burried in under those stones & were hundred of years old. There were several of them. There was a painting on the wall that was 3 hundred years old but was begining to spoil. We visited the place where the services are held & saw where the great men sits when they attend church. I saw some chairs made for the monks to sit on. They say that in olden days that the services were so long that the monks would fall asleep & so these chairs were made for them to sit on & if they happened to go to sleep & kind of stoop over they would fall down on the floor. I tried one & found it was very easy to go down. After we had seen all of interest we again took carriage & drove for the castle. When we got there we were taken by one of the guards & was shown all over the house. This castle is a round building & is on the top of a round hill like place. As we entered the gates we found that the walls were very thick. We were taken first to where the food & bread is cooked for the prisoners. I forgot to say that this castle has been turned into a prison. We found the bread very good. From there

we were taken to the cells where the prisoners are kept & found them locked in their cells & were busy making mats & others making hammocks. From there we visited a porch where the Queen went & a paper was read to her relating to the History of this castle which is 1700 years old. From there we went to where the prisoner is put before he is executed & then to the gallows & what an awful place. There is a large square hole with a platform that is put on hinges with a spring. The stands on this platform & then the rope is put around the neck & fastened to a ring in the floor & at the signal the trap falls down & the prisoner is hanging by the rope. The last man that was hung there was about 2 years ago & he was decapitated. Those that are hung there are buried right around the outer walls. From there we visited a treading mill where the prisoner is put to exercise. There is a large & long roller with steps that goes around by machine & the prisoner is put in a place where he has to step pretty lively to keep up with the roller. There are 50 steps to the minute & if he should be slow he falls to the floor. After we had seen all we thanked our guide & started for home, as it was getting late. I only wished we were to stay here a longer while as there are lot of places of interest here to visit. This is one of the ancient town in the English history. As we went on our way home we saw in places flags hanging out of windows & on poles that were put out to help decorate the streets where the Queen passed on her way to church. The stores are crowd with good of all kinds. I admire this town very much. It is kept very clean. The roads are of this word pavement which makes it so nice to ride on. We passed a portion of an old fort which is all destroyed except the tower which has been preserved to let people see where some of the battles were fought. It has small round holes all aroun it & I was told that in those days they fought with bows & arrows & those holes were for the arrows to go through to kill the enemy. There is a very pretty view as you go along. The houses in some places are very old & picturesque. After we got out of the city we came to a drive where the trees overhang each other for miles which made it a very pretty drive. We got home at 6 o.c. Their Majestys got home at 6.30 & got ready for dinner. As there was to be a farewell dinner there had been some invited to take dinner with the Queen & company. There was a band that came from Norwich to play that evening which made it quite pleasent. At 9 o.c. dinner was served to 30 people which was quite a nice dinner. The tables was beautifully decorated with flowers & fruits & fairy lights. After the dinner the company retired to the drawing room & spent the evening at singing & at 12 o.c. the company after bidding the Queen Good night went home. We retired at 1 o.c. All well.

Tuesday 7

I awoke at 5 o.c. & found the Queen ready to go for a walk. We went aroun the gardens & out on the road as far as this estate went & turned back. It is about 2 miles from the house. We got back to the house at 7.30 & found the rest of the company still asleep. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. after which The Queen & Liliu went out for a short drive & back as we were to leave here to day for London. I got our things ready to leave by the 2 o.c. train. At 12 o.c. The Queen planted a tree that was brought for her so as Mr. & Mrs. Steward may always remember her visit. A very handsome silver spade was made for that purpose which The Queen made it a present to the Lady of the house. After having a light lunch we started for the depot & got there Just in time. After bidding our friends good bye we started off on our Journey. We met the same kind of scenery all the way along as we saw on our way from Liverpool. At one of the depots we saw a great crowd of people & found that the mayor of that place had come to pay his respect to the royal party. He was dressed in his uniform & had his mace with him which was carried by 2 men. After a few minutes stop we were off again on our way. As the train left the depot the

crowd sent up cheers & the ladies Joined in by the waving of their hankerchief. We arrived at London at 7 o.c. At the Depot there were great crowds of people. There were carriages there awaiting to take us to the Hotel. In a few minutes we were off on our way to the Alexander Hotel. London appears to be a beautiful place. The roads are wide & are very clean. The houses are large & beautiful. We passed by the London bridge & off in the distance was the house of parliament. We got to the Hotel in a few minutes & were shown to our rooms. This is not a large Hotel but is more of a family Hotel. It is a very nice finished in side the floor on the first floor are of different kinds of stone put to gether. The stairs are of marble & finished very nicely. At 8 o.c. we had our dinner. after which we spent the evening at home. The Queen received company & after they had gone we retired for the night.

Wednesday 8

I awoke & found it a fine morning. We breakfasted at 8 after which I spent the forenoon writing. The Queen received company this morning & didnt go out at all. At 1 o.c. had lunch after which we spent the afternoon in writing & getting our things in order. At 8 o.c. we had dinner after which I took a short walk down the street but as it was late the stores was all closed. I found that Hyde park was right opposite the Hotel but didnt go there. There were a few organ grinders on the street. There were quite a number of carriages on the road & the sidewalks was crowded with people. I didnt go far as the streets are so cut up that one is liable to be lost. So I went home & retired for the night.

Thursday 9

I awoke & found it a beautiful morning. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. after which I spent the morning at home doing some writing & other little business I had to attend to. At 1 o.c. we had lunch after which I went down the street to get a few things. All the store were open & what a sight first a cigar shop then an oyster shop & a Jewelers Boot store Liquor Saloon Carpet store dry good a market place & several others. There are lot of Jewellery shops & cigars stores. In some of the dry good stores you can get everything you would require to furnish a house. Silks of all shades & velvets of all shades are plentiful & very cheap I got what I wanted & returned home. On the streets there are all classes of people the rich & the poor. The rich drives up to the store door & has a footman who has his hair all powdered white to open the carriage door for her or him & waits to get his order at the door. While the poor goes about crying out flowers sir a penny a bunch. Matches shoe strings & other nic nacks & the new boys call out the different paper & the boot black say a shine sir a penny a shine & a lot of other ways to get a few pennies. You would see some pretty girls standing on the corners singing & who ever pittty them gives them a penny & that is the way it goes in London & every where we have visited. I got home & had lunch at 1 o.c. after which I spent the afternoon at home. The Queen & Liliu received company this afternoon & also spent the day at home. At 8 o.c. we had dinner & after which the Queen had company. The days here are very long at 8 o.c. the sun Just about set & is light for an hour or so afterwards. As I was tired I retired early. All well. So ends this day.

Friday 10

I awoke & found it a lovely morning. The sun out & the skye nice & clear. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I & a gentleman took a walk up the st past the park into the most business part of the city. We came to a corner where we turned

& found ourselves into a street that run in a circle like & all the different stores you could think of was there. It did look beautiful to see all the stores open & the windows crowded with pretty things of all discription. There were great large fur stores with large tiger skins nicely finished with their heads preserved so that it has the whole skin made for a rug. Silks satins velvets & cloth of all discription are in these stores. I entered one store & found that each counter has but the one thing to sell that is if you want velvets you go to Just a certain counter & if you want ribbons you go to another counter & so on. It is worth the visit. There were so many pretty things that it is imposible for me to discribe all that I saw. The stores here are grand buildings. This is where all the rich people go to do their shopping. The street was crowded with carriages & people. I got home at 12 o.c. & after having lunch we spent the afternoon at home. At 4 o.c. The Queen Liliu Gen Dominis Mr Hoffnung Curtis went for a drive in Hyde Park & got home at 6.30. The Queen enjoyed the drive very much & so did the rest of the party. At 7 o.c. had dinner after which Their Majesties got ready to go to the Opera at Her Majesties Theatre. At 8 o.c. they took carriages & drove there. As I was not anxious to go out I retired early. All well.

Saturday 11

I awoke & found it a nice morning. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I went down the st to get a few things & got back by 11 o.c. At 12 we had lunch after which we got ready to go to Albert Hall to hear Mdme Patti at 2 o.c. I left the hotel & took a cab & drove there. Their Majesties didnt go till 3 o.c. As I got there I found it a large round built building with a glass roof. I got my ticket & went in & found that it was in the shape of a horse shoe & at one end was a large organ. There were 6 circles that began below to the top of the house on the 2 & 3 circles were the private boxes very nicely trimmed in red velvet. At the time appointed the house was full & at 3 o.c. The Opera began with the playing of the orchestra after which appeared a Jentleman & sang in Italian. He was a good singer. Then came another gentleman & sang also in Italian. Then came a youn lady & played a beautiful piece on the violin. She understands how to handle the bow & is master of the instrument. Then came the wonderful Patti who sang in Italian. I have often heard of this great singer but never had the chance to hear her sing but to day I have heard her & I can say that she is a wonderful good singer. She can sing to a very high note with perfect ease. After she finished singing in Italian she was encored & she sang that beautiful song of Home sweet Home. I have never heard that song sung so good but when she sang it it made me think of that dear sweet Home far away. I was very much pleased with her singing & I think every one else was ~~by the way~~ they were encoring her. After the concert was over I went out & saw across the street a large monument of Albert King of England & husband of Queen Victoria. It is a beautiful piece of work. It is on a large square foundation of stone which runs up in steps & in the center is this monument. It is very high & is of stone. It is built like the steeple of a church with fine carvings. It is built square & in the center is a large bronze figure of Albert in a sitting position which is all gilded in gold. The stone work is ornamented with different kind of stones & at the four lower corners are great large marble figures of four different nations. There is Africa which is a cammel & a woman on its back with her servants around her. Then there is one of Asia North America South America which are all of fine work in stone. The inside of the canopy is lined with different colored glass which represents some part of the bible. After I had seen all I went on my way home & got there in a little while. The streets are crowded as usual. We dined at 8 & retired early. So ends this day.

Sunday 12

I awoke this morning & found it a fine & a beautiful morning. We breakfasted at 9 after which the Queen got ready to go to church. At 10 o.c. Mr. Syng Curtis Gen. Dominis Liliu & the Queen got into carriages & were driven to one of the oldest church in London. I spent the morning at home. At 1 o.c. we lunched after which I went for a walk. In my walk I passed by Her Majesty Queen Victoria palace. I stood a few moments to get a good look of the place. The palace stands in a large yard with a high iron fence. The gates are large & very fancy. On each post is a small lion. The house is large but not as fine a work as some of the building in the city. It is 3 stories high & is built with a court. On the top of the house are some fine work in marble in the center is the lion. Then there are 2 figures on each side on the corners are a group of flags in stone. It might look better if it were not so dirty looking with the smoke & soot that hangs over the city in winter time. The yard is quite bare which if it had a nice flower garden it would improve the place. From there I went up the street to Westminster Abbey. I passed several fine houses on my way up & at last got to the place. It is a very large building & is a work of art. There is some fine work in stone here. The building is very high & has two large towers & on each side is a clock. The whole thing is something fine. Words cannot do Justice to it. As it was closed I could not get a view in side. From there I went across Westminster bridge. This is quite a long bridge & is made of brick. There are 4 large pillars of stone to support it. The whole thing is quite a work of art. There were quite a number of people on the river in steamers & boats. This<sup>is</sup> called the Thames river. Off in the distance was a large building wick is called the crystal palace. On each side of this river were great manufacturing houses. After I had seen all there I went down the street & came to Nelson Monument which is a long pilliar of marble & on the top is Nelson in his uniform. On the four corners of the monument is a large bronze Lion. It stans in the centr of Trafalgar Square. From there I wandered homewards. I passed several beautiful mansions & hotels. I at last arrived at Hyde park. This is quite a large place. It contains 900 acres of land & is all covered in green grass & trees. There is a beautiful road here in this park & is Just crowded with people horses & carriages. There were thousands of people there some riding & others walking. It is quite a pretty place. This is where you will see all the pretty things & the rich dressed in their fine clothes. I have seen it when it was so crowded that one would not be able to cross the road for an hour. It is a regular place for people to come and spends hours watching the fashion of London. You can always tell a rich person by the coach man wig which is white & dressed up in velvets suits & gold buttons. In the center of this park is a large pond of water & here & there in beds are beautiful plants which sets this park off. There are several parks in London but this is the nearest to where we are stopping. They are making great preparation along the roads for the coming Jubilee. Grand stands are being erected & a seat are 5 to 10 dollars. I got home at 6 o.c. & got ready for dimer. At 8 o.c. we had dimer & spent the evening at home. The Queen also spent the evening at home. I retired early. All well.

Monday 13

I awoke & found it as usual. We had breakfast at 8.30 after which I went down Oxford st. to get a few things. This is about the widest st in London & there are some fine stores on this st. I found it as crowded here on this st as in the park. Miles of carriages coming & going. One has to wach his chance to go across the st. After getting what I wanted I started for the hotel & got there by 11.15 At 12.30 we had lunch after which I spent the afternoon at home. Their Majesties also spent the afternoon at home. At 6 we had dinner after which The Queen got ready to go to Mr Hoffnungs dinner & reception. At 8 o.c. Their Majesties were

ready & were driven there. Liliu Gen Dominis Curtis accompanied the Queen. I took a short walk around & back to the Hotel & retired early. All well. So ends this day.

Tuesday 14

I awoke & found it quite hazy but nice & warm. We breakfasted at 8 after which I spent the morning at home. At 1 o.c. we had lunch & at 2 o.c. The Queen got ready to go to visit some medical colage where ladies are taught to be Doctoress & from there to some place where there was to be an exhibition of organ playing. I got ready & went down the st & entered the army & navy auxilary & there I saw a sight. This building is quite a large building & 3 stories high & has everything you could think of to sell. On the lower flowers are milenery & resturant & a meat market & pountry groceries hardware & on the 2 are barber shops hair dressing shops for ladies & gentleman. Then there are carpet rooms furniture draperys shoes flowers & picture gallery & in the house adjoining are very near the same first a crockery store groceries chees & butter room tobacco & cigars stoves & a thousand of other things. After purchasing a few things I started on my way home. I passed several beautiful private resedence. The streets are crowded with people all the hours of day & night & there is always some kind of music going along it is either a band or hand organ. After wandering around I at last reached home & got ready for dinner which we had at 8 o.c. We spent the evening at home. All well. So ends today.

Wednesday 15

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. after which I spent the morning at home writing letters. At 1 o.c. we had lunch after which I went out to get a few things. I went through the park & found it crowded as ever. As it is getting near the holiday the streets are corwded all day long & so are the stores. I got what things I wanted & started home. I arrived at the Hotel at 5 o.c. & found their Majestys had gone to the Princess Theatre & got back at 6 o.c. much pleased with their afternoon performance. We dined at 8 o.c. Their Majestys Queen & Liliu Gen Dominis Iaukea got ready to go to Lady--- Goldsmith Ball. At 10.30 o.c. they got into carriages & were driven there. I spent the evening at home & retired at 12 o.c. So ends this day.

Thursday 16

I awoke this morning & found very smoky & misty. We breakfasted at 9 & spent the morning at home. It is quite warm to day very much like home weather. We lunched at 1 o.c. after which Their Majesties got ready to go to the Agricultural Hall. At 2 o.c. They entered carriages & were driven there. I took a walk around sight seeing. I passed several large & handsome building. Some 6 & 8 stories high & also found quite a number being draped & decorated for the Jubilee. Some of the decoration are beautiful & elaborite. On some of the houses have long pipes running along the top of the house & down the sides & over the windows & doors & in the center of the house it is in the V.R. shape & it has thousands of gas Jets & when it is lit it has a very fine appearence all along the pipes & the letters are a stream of fire. In some other places they have got some fine work in colored glass & in all shapes large crown lions & coat of arms. The grand stand that is near the Cathedral is decorated very fine with red & gold cloth & the seats are selling at 23 all along the route are erected platforms for the accomodation of those that are willing to give 5 & 10 dollars for a seat. It is not quite complete yet. After going around here & there I got home to the hotel at 6 o.c. & had dinner at 8. In the eve Their Majestys got ready to go to  
I spent the evening walking the streets sight seeing & got home at 10 o.c. & retired for the night.

Friday 17

I awoke & found it nice clear & warm weather. It is day light here at 2 in the morning only I dont rise so early. We breakfasted at 9 after which I went down to Oxford Street where most of the best stores in London are. All along the road were crowded with carriages & people. The stores are crowded with people & in the windows are a most beautiful display of goods of all discription. The stores here are from 3 to five stories high & are finished off in some fine carving in stone. After purchasing a few arcticles I started for home as I had walked 2 or 3 miles along this road & I had quite a distance to go before I would get any where near home. I met several organ grinders on the St. The most interesting sight I saw was 3 children on the St. One had a small bass violin & the other two had 1st & 2nd violin. The smallest of the 3 was a boy & the others were his sisters. The boy played the pieces while his sisters played the bass violin & they played very well. There is a lot of that class that make a living by going around here & there playing for money. After walking quite a distance I arrived at Hyde park & took a short cut across & back to the Hotel. We dined at 1 o.c. & again went out. As I went up the st. I saw quite a crowd of people & on going to the spot found that the prince of Wales & wife & daughters were out & on their way home to the Palace. I got a view of the Princess & prince Albert Victor. They are quite fine looking. There were mounted soldiers that wrode ahead to keep the street clear & also some wrode behind to see that no harm was done. The decoration are going to be very fine here for the Jubilee. They have erected a large arch & it is to be draped in cloth & other material. Carpenters are busy making seats on platforms & decorating housses. They have all along the line of march long poles which is to be used for flags. After going here & there & seeing all I could see of interest I started home & got there at 6.15. Their Majesties had been out to Her Majesty barracks & witnessed a drill & returned home very much pleased with their visit. We dined at 8 after which The Queen & Liliu & party got into carriages & were driven to the Iyceum Theatre, as the celebrated Mr. Irving was to play there. After they had gone I promonaded through the park & after a good long walk I returned home & retired for the night. All is well.

Saturday 18

I awoke at 5 this morning & found it nice weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which we got ready to go out. As the Queen & Liliu were going to have some potogh taken. At 10 o.c. we got into carriages & drove to regent st at Walery & spent a few hours there. We got back at 1.30 & had lunch. At 4 o.c. Their Majesties got ready to go for a drive in Hyde park. I spent the afternoon at home writing. At 6 o.c. The Queen got back from her drive & at 8 o.c. we had dinner. after which Their Majesties had company & spent the evening at home. I took a short walk around & back & retired early. All well. So ends Saturday.

Sunday 19

I awoke & found it as usual. good weather. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. We spent the forenoon at home. At 1 o.c. we lunched after which I took a short walk around. I passed Westminister abbey & found it crowded with pèople. There were services going in the chappel & it was so full that the people was obliged to stand at the door. The preperation they are making here is going to be very nice. There are crowds of people on the St to day taking in the sight. I crossed Westminister Bridge & saw a couple of men having a swimming match. There were also several rowing boats with men & ladies rowing up the river. After taking a good walk I returned home. Their Majesties spent the Sunday at home. We dined at 8 o.c. & spent the evening at home. All well.

Monday 20

I awoke & found it nice weather. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which their Majesties received company. I got ready & went to Walery to have some <sup>photos</sup> taken. I spent an hour there & on my return found the St. crowded with people awaiting the arrival of the Queen Victoria from Scotland. She arrived in London at 0 o.c. but I missed the sight. I got home & had lunch. The Queen got ready to go to call on Her Majesty the Queen of England at 1.30 o.c. The Queen, Liliu, Curtis & Mr. Syng got into carriages & were driven to Buckingham Palace & when on arriving there was ushered into the presence of the Queen. The Queen of England on seeing Queen Kapiolani arose & came forward & kissed & shook hands with Kapiolani & also shook hands with Liliu. There were only her Majesty family present at this very happy meeting of The Queen of England & the Queen of Hawaii. After spending a few happy moments Their Majesties returned home & spent the afternoon at home. I went out & done a little shopping & got home at 4 o.c. & then went across the St to Hyde park & there what a sight miles & miles of carriages & thousands of people. The park was so crowded that carriages had to stand for 15 minutes before they could move on. I had the pleasure of seeing Princess Beatrice & Princess Victoria as they were out for a drive. They are both very handsome women. There were also several kings & princes & dukes & Lords out driving After spending an hour watching the fashion of London I went home & got ready for dinner which we had at 8 o.c. Their Majesties received company & spent the evening at home. All well & enjoying good health.

Tuesday 21

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm & as this is the Jubilee day every one is busy getting ready to go to see the sight. The streets are already crowded as people began to go where they could get a good view of the procession at 3 & 4 o.c. in the morning. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which Their Majesties got ready to go to the Jubilee services. At 10 o.c. Gen. Dominis & J. Boyd got into carriages & were driven to the Abbey & at 10.30 The royal party that were staying at the Alexandra Hotel got into their carriages as follows. The first carriage contained Mirza Hissam Sultan of Persia & Suite. The second carriage contained the Prince Varoprakar of Siam & Suite. The third the Prince Komatsu of Japan & Suite & The fourth contained Queen Kapiolani Liliuokalani Gov. Iaukea & Mr. Syng. The first three carriages were not so grand as the carriage that was sent for the Queen. Although the Grooms men were dressed in a very handsome suit of scarlet plush & gold trimmings. But the Queen carriage was a covered carriage trimmed with scarlet velvet & gold chord draped very handsomely & the driver wore a scarlet suit of velvet & gold trimmings knee britches & a 3 cornered hat & powdered wigs & so were the foot mens that stood on a platform behind the carriage. It was the finest state carriage I ever saw. Then there were about 60 life guards on fine black horses. They were dressed in a scarlet Jackets & white pantaloons with a steel helmet & also a sort of a Jacket of steel around their body & each man had a drawn sword. As The Queen entered the carriage they saluted her & as the party started for the church the life guard rode in front & back & on the sides of the Queens carriage. It was a grand sight to look at as they moved on their way to the church. There were a tremendous crowd at the Hotel door to see the Queen & such cheering as I shall never forget. After their Majesties had gone I got ready & went up the street to try to get a view of the royal procession. After shoving pushing & elbowing my way through a tremendous crowd I managed to get a very good place to view the procession. The day was so warm & there were such a crowd that there were several ladies fainted. The people were packed like sardines in a box. There was hardly room to turn around in. It was that way for miles all along the line of march. There were 3000 police men all along the roads to see that

there were no disturbances but they had their hands full in keeping back the crowd. At 11.15 o.c. The Royal procession left the palace & proceeded on their way to the abbey. As they came along the way they were greeted with cheers & the waving of handkerchiefs. The first carriages contained as follows. The ladies in waiting on the Princess of William of Prussia. Princess of Saxe Meiningen. Duchess of Edinburgh & the Princess of Wales. The second ladies in waiting to the Duchess of Connaught. Duchess of Albany. Duchess of Serge & Princess Beatrice & Princess Henry of Battenberg No 3 chamberlain to the crown princess of Germany. Ladies in waiting to the Princess Louise Marchioness of Lorne. Princess Christian Schleswig Holstein. Princess of Wales No 4 Ladies in waiting to the crown princess of Germany. Chamberlain to the Princess of Wales. Lord in waiting & gold stick in waiting No 5 Lord Chamberlain Lord Steward Lady of the bed chamber Lady in waiting to the Princess of Germany. No 6 Mistress of the robes Her Highness Princess Victoria of Schleswig Holstein. Princess Margarete of Prussia. Prince Alfred of Edinburgh. No 7 Princess Victoria of Prussia. Princess Sophia of Prussia. Her Ducal Highness the Princess Louise of Battenberg H.R.D.H. the Princess Irene of Hesse. No 8 Duchess Elizabeth of Russia. Princess Maud of Wales. Princess Victoria of Wales. Princess Louise of Wales. No 9 H.R.H. the hereditary Princess of Saxe Meiningen. H.R.H. Princes William of Prussia H.R.H. Duchess of Albany Duchess of Connaught. No 10 H.R.H. Duchess of Edinburgh. Princess Beatrice & Princess Henry of Battenberg H.R.H. Princess Louise Marchioness of Lorne Princess Christian of Schleswig Holstein. No 11 H.R.H. crown Princess of Germany. H.R.H. Princess of Wales & Her Majesty Queen Victoria. Her Majesty carriage was followed by Grand sons & Grand son in laws on horse back as follows. H.I.H. The Duke Serge of Russia H.R.H. Prince Albert Victor of Wales. H.R.H. Prince William of Prussia. H.R.H. Prince Henry of Prussia. H.R.H. Prince George of Wales. H.R.H. the hereditary grand Duke of Hesse. H.H. the H. Prince of Saxe Meiningen. H.H. Prince Christian Victor Schleswig of Holstein. H.Se.H. Prince Louis of Battenberg. Then followed Sons in Law of the Queen. H.R.H. Prince Christian of Schleswig Holstein. H.I.R.H. the crown prince of Germany. H.R.H. the Grand Duke of Hesse. H.R.H. Marquis of Lorne & came Sons of the Queen. H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught & Strathern. H.R.H. Prince of Wales. H.R.H. Duke of Edinburgh. Then followed Master of the Horse. Keeper of Her Majesty private purse, the clerk Marshalls. Aides de Camp to the Queen & co. It was quite a procession that went to the church. The Queen carriage was the same as that of Kapiolani only it had 6 cream colored horses & 3 postilion. But their dress was the same. I got a good view of the Queen as they passed by. She looked very well & smiled & bowed her head to the people as she went along. The streets were beautifully decorated all along the line of march. There were poles all along the way with a flag a flying at the top & then there were leis run from pole to pole & across the street here & there & also string of flags run across the street here & there. At the corner of Hay Market there was a large arch with God save the Queen in large letters & draped with flags & flowers. All the houses were decorated with flags flowers plants in pots & cloth of various colors. It presented a grand appearance. There were several grand stands decorated very handsomely with red & yellow cloth looped up here & there. There were quite a number of streets out of the line of march that was decorated very nice. Bond St. for one was Just a mass of flags of all colors fastened to ropes & run across the street from side to side, all the length of street. As there was such a crowd I could get any where near the church. There must of been millions of people here to day as the streets were crowded & so were all the houses & grand stands. After the procession had passed I went back to the Hotel & had lunch & again went out sight seeing. I was Just in time to see some of the royalty return from the services. There were quite a

number of Indian Princes on horseback dressed up in gay uniforms of their own country & also a razah who was a large man & dressed in a very rich costume which were ornamented with diamonds pearls & rubies. They were cheered by the people as they passed by. Their Majestys Kapiolani & Liliu & Curtis & Gen Dominis after the services were driven to the Palace & there dined with the Queen & a few invited guest composed of Kings Queens dukes Princess Lords earls Countesses & Princes & several others. After walking around for a while I returned home, as there were not much pleasure in walking as there were such a crowd in the street. Their Majesties returned at 4 o.c. very much pleased with what they had seen & of the very pleasant time they had spent at the Palace. I sat on the porch & watched the passers by for quite a while. It was very interesting. We dined at 8 o.c. after which their Majesties got ready to go to a reception at the Palace. At 10 o.c. Their Majesties were driven there. I then went out to see the illumination which were grand. The streets seemed to be ablaze with fire. Nearly every house were illuminated. Some were lit up by gas & others with lanterns of various colors. There were some houses that had gas pipes running along the top & down the sides & over windows & doors with thousands of gas Jets which looked very pretty & some had fairy lights of various colors. On Bond St it was lit with electric lights which looked very well. It is one of the grandest sight I have seen in the way of illuminations. There were millions on the street & all seemed to enjoy the sight. I got home at 1 o.c. & retired for the night. All well. So ends this day.

Wednesday 22

I awoke & found it was a fine morning but not such a crowd on the St. as the day before. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I got ready & went out to get a few things for her Majesty. Most all the stores were open. After getting what I wanted I started for home & had lunch at 1 o.c. At 3 o.c. The Queen & Liliu & Curtis went out for a drive. I went across the street to Hyde Park & found it crowded with people. There were 10 to 15000 children there waiting to see the Queen as she passed through on her way to Windsor Castle. At 6 o.c. her Majesty drove through the park mid cheers of the school children & the people who had gathered there to get a view of her. There were millions of air balloons let loose as she entered where the children were & also a large balloon with 4 men in it went up up & out of sight. She staid but a few minutes & went on her way home. I then spent an hour watching the carriages go by with its loads of Londons Aristocrats. In all their fine dresses & Jewels. I got back to the Hotel at 7 o.c. & at 8 o.c. we had dinner. Their Majesty enjoyed their ride very much. After dinner Their Majestys got ready to go to a ball at the Legation. At 10.30 Their Majesties & Curtis Gen Dominis were driven there. I went out & found the illumination were still in its beauty & crowds on the street. After wandering around sight seeing I returned home & retired for night. All well.

Thursday 23

I awoke & found nice weather. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which I went out sight seeing & done a little shopping. Everything seem to be quiet & every one to business. After getting what I went for I returned home. The decorations are still up in some places & others are being taken down. The park is crowded with parties out driving & horse back riding. I got home at 1 o.c. & had lunch. At 2 o.c. The Queen & Suite visited Mme Tussauds Historical Gallery. I went for a walk around the Abbey & found carpenters busy taking down some of the grand stands that was erected for the Jubilee. The streets are always crowded with people &

carriages. Some of the houses around this part of London are 7 & 8 stories high & are very nicely finished. After taking a good long walk I wandered homeward & arrived there in good time. Their Majesties got back from their visit & was very much pleased with their visit which was very interesting. We dined at 8 o.c. after which their Majesties got ready to go to Lord Salisbury ball. At 10.30 Their Majesties & Suite were driven there & spent a pleasant evening. I took a short walk around the block & home & retired for the night. All well.

Friday 24

I awoke & found as usual fine weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. At 10 o.c. Their Majesties got ready & were driven to the Tower of London. I went on sight seeing. I got on one of the St. bussess & took a long ride out of the city as far as the buss went. It was very interesting ride. I was driven in some of the poorest St in London but I found them very clean. The houses were not very respectable in appearance but was kept as neat as possible. I passed some very large stores in other parts that were grand building. I also passed some large factory such as pottery factorys & glass ware large brewery & also a large canning factory where salmon & fruit are put up in cans & glass Jars. On my way back I visited Mdme Toussaude Historical Gallery. It is a large building with a glass dome & beautifully finished. I paid a shilling to go in. As I entered I was struck with the beauty that was before me. The floor was a checkered marble & the stairs was of granite very handsomely polished. At the head of the stairs was a large portrait of Queen Victoria in oil painting in her coronation robes which was beautifully done & on the other side was a large portrait of Prince Albert husband of Her Majesty which was also a beautiful painting. As I turned to go into the hall what a sight, there was in store for me. There were Kings Queens Princes dukes Lords Earls Razahs in fact all the Kings & Queens & Princess & Princes from the year 1000 to the present day. It is one of the grandest sight I ever witnessed. They were wax figures of life size which was Just as natural as life with their different & most beautiful robes which were trimmed with dimonds pearls rubies & several other precious stones. The figures were so perfect that you would think that it was real. What fine and beautiful men & women there were in days gone by. Such noble looking people. I could not begin to do Justice to discribe what I saw. It is a sight I never will forget. There was a group there of the Queen Victoria & her family which was very good. If there is any one that has not seen the Queen all they have to do is to pay a visit here & there you will see her as she appears at the present day. The most striking group is when the Queen was crowned as she stood at the alter taking her oath. Her robes that she wore that day is on this figure & is a most beautiful robe of gold cloth embroidered with clover leaves & thistles & also the Ladies & Lords that attended the services which were her maids of honor. Their different figures were dressed as they were the day of her coronation, in velvets laces & dimonds pearls rubies sapphires & other beautiful & valuable stones. There were also a group consisting of the late Pope of Rome as she stands in his robes with his guards around him. In another room was shown all that belong to Napoleon when he died. The clothes he wore & hat boots & even to the bed he died on. On the bed was a figure of Napoleon as he died with the clothes & hat he had on & between his fingers were a crucifix of Christ which was on his breast. It is a very sad sight to look at for it looks so real. There is also his carriage that he rhode in the campagne of Russia & which was captured on the eve of the battle of Waterloo. It is quite old fashion in appearance. There were also different groups of murderers who were noted for some of their most gastly deeds. There were a group that were dressed in the fashion in the reign of William 1. 1066 to the present day.

There were groups of the Emperor of Germany & Suit as he stands at his reception day & also the princes of Wales & her children & her maids of honor as they appear on reception day in all their grandyeaur. There were a group of Garfield, Grant, Lincoln & Andrew Johnson. After spending a couple of hours there I started for home. At 2 o.c. I had lunch & again went out into the park sight seeing. The park is crowded as ever miles & miles of carriages. It is a beautiful sight to look at. The London band played this afternoon in the park which made it quite lively. I went home at 5 o.c. & found their Majesties had returned from their visit & was in much praise of the beautiful sight they had seen. We dined at 8 o.c. after which the Queen got ready to go to a reception & dinner given by the Japanese prince Komatsu. At 11 o.c. Their Majestys were driven there & spent a pleasant evening. I retired for the night. All well.

Saturday 25

I awoke & found it nice weather. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. after which I went out to bye a few things. After going around here & there I returned home & lunched at 1 o.c. after which I spent the afternoon at writing. Their Majesties went to Mrs. Hoffnungs dinner & spent a pleasant afternoon after which they paid a visit to the Bishop of London. They got home at 7 o.c. I got ready & went to see the famous buffaloo bill. It was a little ways out of the city. After arriving there I found my way into the place where the entertainment was to take place. It was a large & round building built like an amphitheater where the public sat it was covered over but the center was an open space & as the days were long it didnt need any light. I was disappointed with what I saw. It was nothing but what one would see every day at home among the natives in breaking a wild horse & riding. There were quite a number of Indians but they did nothing but racing on horseback. The only thing of interest was a young girl of 16 or 17 who was a crack shot & which she exhibited there by shooting at some glass balls that were thrown up in the air. After the performance I went into the exhibition room but as it was late there was no chance to see anything. So I returned home & retired for the night. Their Majesties spent the evening at home.

Sunday 26

I awoke this morning & found it as usual. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which Liliu Gen Dominis & J. Boyd went for a ride up the Thames river. The Queen Curtis & Mr. Synge attended services at the Soldiers church at Her Majestys Barracks. I took a walk up to Westminster bridge & boarded one of the river boats & took a ride up the river. It is quite a pleasant sight along the banks beautiful private houses with its large grounds covered with trees & flowers. I passed by a large park which looked nice & green with foliage. After going for miles up the river I got of at a place called Chelsea & walked a couple of miles up along the river. There are beautiful vegetable gardens here & also lot of fruit trees. I again boarded the steamer & went back & got out at London bridge. I have heard so much of the London bridge but was surprised with its appearance which were not as nice as the Westminster bridge. I then started for home. I passed the st Pauls church which was a grand building. I got home at 2 o.c. and had a light lunch & again started out for a ride to Caimbridge. I got on to one of the street busses & went on my way. I noticed that the decorations were as much here out of the city as in the city. The private houses along the roads are beautiful. I passed a large place called the Kews Garden. It looked like a beautiful place to spend the day. There was a large conservatory in the middle of the grounds & also a museum. As it was late we had no time to go in but rode on our way until we came to a large & beautiful park. Here we rested for a short time & again started for home as it was getting late.

We didnt get to Cambridge but had rhode some 10 or 15 miles out of the city. We got back to the Hotel at 9 o.c. & had dinner & spent the evening at home. All well but tired out with the days traveling.

Monday 27

I awoke & found it as usual nice weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I spent the morning going around getting a few things that I wanted. At 1 o.c. we lunched & at 2 o.c. their Majesties went to the American Exhibition. After they had gone I also went there to see the sight. There were everything there that you could think of to fit up a store with. There were also some fine work in machinery for different works. Here I saw the making of carpets & cloth which is very interesting. There were samples of cologne clocks Jewelry sewing machines preserved fruits linens cuttlery scenery views & a lot of other things to numerous to mention. There was a machine there that was making brick which was also interesting. After spending an hour or so I went home & got there at 7 o.c. At 8 o.c. we had dinner. Their Majesties got ready & went to the Luceum Theatre to see Mr. Irwing & Miss Ellen Terry the celebrated actors play in Faust. After they had gone I took a walk around the streets & home to bed. All well.

Tuesday 28

This is also a beautiful morning. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. Their Majesties got ready & took a ride to Westminster a place of interest. I got ready & took the cars for Liverpool station & took the cars from there for Stroud Green. I left the station at 11 o.c. & after a short ride arrived at Stroud Green. It is a very pretty place more of a resident place for the merchants & business men. I like this place very much. It is kept very clean & the houses are almost all of one style of building. I called on Mr. & Mrs. Walker & after spending a few very pleasent hours there I returned home & got there in time for dinner. After which their Majesties got ready to go to a ball given at the Guild Hall where some 5000 people were invited. At 10.30 Their Majesties & Suit were driven there & spent a most enjoyable evening. I spent the evening at home with some friends who had called & retired early. All well.

Wednesday 29

I awoke this morning & found it nice weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I went to get a few things that I wanted before we left London. After spending a few hours into different stores I returned home & had lunch at 1 o.c. At 3. o.c. Their Majesties got ready to go to the Garden Party at the Palace where they spent a most enjoyable afternoon. Here they bade the Queen good bye as it was the last of the Jubilee festivities. I spent the rest of the day writing. Their Majesties got home at 8 o.c. I had dinner at 8.30 after which I took a walk around the block & got back early. Their Majesties spent the evening at home. All well.

Thursday 30

I awoke & found it as usual fine weather. We breakfasted at 8.30. At 10.30 The Queen & Suite went to a fair & spent the day there. I went to the American Exhibition to get a few things that I saw there. This is one of the most interesting houses I was ever in. It is worth the visit. There are also some fine paintings by American artist, there on exhibition. From there I took a short ride on the buss & got home at 4.30 o.c. Their Majesties got home at 6 o.c. after having dinner. They got ready to go to Lady Goldsmith dinner. At 10.30 they were driven there.

I took a walk through the park to Oxford St & saw Barron Rothchilds house beautifully illuminated as there was a ball there. It is quite a fine building & was crowded with people. I got home at 12 o.c. & retired for the night. All well.

Friday July 1

It is fine weather as usual. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I got our things to gether & had them packed. As we were to leave early Saturday morning at 10.30 our trunks were shipped to Liverpool so as not to be troubled in getting them together. I spent most of the day writing a few letters. Their Majesties spent the day at home receiving company who had come to say good bye. At 3 o.c. I took a walk to London bridge & back. We dined at 8 o.c. after which I got ready went with some friends to the Alambra Theatre & witnessed an opera which there were about 100 ballet dancers dressed in some of the most gorgeous costumes. The scenerys were very handsome & the play was very good. After spending a most enjoyable evening there we went to a large dining room & had some fresh oysters which was very good. From there we returned home & retired for the last time in London. Their Majesties spent the evening at home with company. All well.

Saturday 2

It is quite cold this morning & misty like. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. At 9.15 we got our things together & left the hotel in carriages for the depot. After a long ride we arrived there. After bidding friends who had gathered there good bye we got on the cars & were whirled away from London mid the cheers of the people who had gathered there to get a last look of Queen Kapiolani. We were taken for miles over land which were planted with grain & which were being cut down by the farmers & carted away to the barns. We passed miles of woodland & beautiful country seats. We saw the same scenery that we saw coming over. At 3 o.c. we got to Liverpool. Here The Queen was met by the Mayor of that place. There were a line of soldiers there also that saluted the Queen as she passed by. A band that was sent along with the soldiers from London played God save the Queen. The Queen & party got into carriages & were escorted to the wharf by a squad of life guards on horse back. After I got our things together I got into a carriage that was waiting & was driven to the wharf where a steam launch was waiting for our luggage. After getting it on bord we started for the stmr Servia which was out in the stream. We got there in due time & got everything on board & at 5 o.c. we started on our way out. It was such a clear day that we got a good view of Liverpool. It appears to be a very fine place. The buildings are grand in structure. As we passed the fort a salute of 21 guns was fired. There were several steamers & vessels on their way out. I took a last look of that wonderful & historic land where we had spent a most pleasent time & went below to see to our rooms. This is quite a fine boat of the Cunard Line & as long as the city of Rome but a better finished & more comfortable rooms. After getting our things in its place I went on deck & found that we were very near out of sight of land. We had dinner at 7 o.c. There are not very many passengers going back but Just such a crowd to spend a few pleasent days. I retired at 9 o.c. All well.

Sunday 3

I awoke & found it nice & smooth & was off the coast of Ireland. At 8 o.c. we had breakfast & at 10 o.c. we entered the port of Queens town. This appears to be a nice place. There are several large ships here & also some war ships. A tender came along side that brought passengers & the mail. As the stmr didnt leave until

the tender made a second trip I went on shore but as there was only a few minutes I didnt get chance to go around to see the place. I got a few pebles from the beach & a bunch of shamrock. As we went back an admiral from one of the war ships went off to see the Queen. In a few minutes we were off on our way. A salute was fired from one of the ships as we passed out. At 1 o.c. we lunched & spent the afternoon in reading. We are having very nice weather & everyone is Just enjoying it. We dined at 5 o.c. after which we spent the evening on deck. I retired at 10 o.c. All well.

Monday 4

A nice morning & beautiful weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. & spent the afternoon reading. The Queen spent her time chrochaing. At 1 o.c. we had lunch after which the afternoon was spent in reading & others at quoits playing. Dinner at 5 o.c. Spent the evening singing & retired at 9 o.c.

Tuesday 5

It is quite foggy this morning but nice & smooth. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. & spent the day reading. The Queen is crochaing & Liliu is reading. At 1 o.c. had lunch & spent the afternoon reading. Dinner at 5 o.c. Spent the evening on deck. All well.

Wednesday 6

It is a little ruff this morning. We breakfasted as usual & spent the morning reading. Quite a number are sick to day. At 1 o.c. we had lunch & spent the rest of the day reading as there was nothing else to do. We dined at 5 o.c. & spent the evening on deck singing. All well.

Thursday 7

It is very foggy this morning & quite ruff. Breakfast at 8 o.c. I spent the morning writing. The fog cleared up at 11 o.c. & saw a sail many miles away. The Queen is crochaing. The passengers are getting over their sea sickness & are on deck enjoying the fresh air. At 1 o.c. had lunch & spent the afternoon reading. It was quite pleasent now as it has smoothed down. We dined at 5 o.c. & spent the evening on deck singing some of our favorite Hawaiian songs. We retired at 10 o.c. All well.

Friday 8

I awoke & found it a raining & a heavy fog. We breakfast at the usual hour and spent the morning writing. The fog cleared up by 10 o.c. Some of the passengers spent the day reading & quoit playing. At 1 o.c. lunch to which we all did Justice to. The afternoon was spent reading. A sail was in sight on her way to New York. At 5 o.c. had dinner after which we spent the evening on deck. All well.

Saturday 9

It is fine weather to day nice & smooth. We are Just crossing the Guff stream. At 8 o.c. breakfast. I spent the morning writing. As there is to be a concert on board to night to amuse the passengers some of them are practicing their parts. At 1 o.c. lunch. Queen is crochaing & Liliu is reading. Spent the afternoon on deck reading. We dined at 5 o.c. & spent the evening on deck. At 8 o.c. we went

to the opera & spent a pleasant evening listening to singing & recitation. At 10.30 carriages were ordered & was driven to bed. All well. ] ]

Sunday 10

I awoke & found it beautiful weather. There was a large steamer in sight going the same direction as we were. We breakfasted at 8.30. After breakfast it was announced that there was to be a meeting of praise at 10.30. At the hour appointed Their Majesties & passengers gathered in the Saloon. The Captain took the chair & opened the services by singing a few verses in the Hymn book & then he offered up prayers & then sang again a few verses of Rock of Ages. Then the Capt read a few chapters in the book of John. Then at the last we sang a few verses of Safe in the Arms of Jesus & was ended by prayers. On going on deck I found that a heavy fog had come on & remained so all morning. The stmr kept blowing her whistle every few minutes so as to avoid danger. At 1 o.c. we had lunch after which we spent the afternoon reading. At 6 o.c. we had dinner & all enjoyed it. I spent an hour reading. At 8.15 the fog cleared up & then we went along our way without fear of an accident. The stars were bright & the sky was clear of clouds. The wind was very cold which drove the passengers to the saloon where it was nice & warm. The Queen is well & so are the rest of the party. We retired early.

Monday 11

I awoke this morning & found that we were in sight of land. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which I got our things ready to go ashore. At 10 o.c. we were off Coney Island & had a good view of the place. We could see the large elephant off in the distance---also the hotel. There was a large hotel on an Island called Fire Island which is well patronized & where people go to spend the summer. There are also bathing houses there. We got at the entrance to the by 11 o.c. & was met there by the health officer & custom officers. After a short delay we proceeded on our way. A review cutter came off to meet the stmr with Mr. Carter & Mr. Allen on board who had come off to meet the Queen. After they had been aboard a few minutes they got ready to go ashore in the cutter. Their Majesty Liliu & party got on board & were taken to the Cunard line depot. As the cutter left the stmr a salute of 21 guns from the cutter was fired in honor of the Queen. I staid behind to see to our baggage. We got to wharf at 12.15 o.c. & after getting our baggage together I started for the Victoria Hotel & got there at 2.30 o.c. & found Their Majesties resting. We had lunch at 3 o.c. after which I went out to get a few things. After getting what I wanted I went home & got ready for dinner which we had at 8 o.c. I then took a short walk around sight seeing but as it was so late that most of the stores were closed but the streets were crowded as usual. There were several plays going on but as it was so late I didnt go in. I got home at 10 o.c. & retired for the night. Their Majesties spent the evening at home & retired early. All well.

Tuesday 12

I awoke this morning & found it nice & warm. We breakfast at 9 o.c. after which I again went out to purchase a few things. After going the rounds for an hour or so I returned home & had lunch at 1 o.c. after which I got our things together as we were to leave for Cal. at 6.30. After getting all our baggage labled & packed I had them sent to the depot & were put in the baggage car. At 4.30 we had our dinner & at 5.30 we left the Hotel & started for the depot & got there in due time. There was a special car for the Queen which was quite a comfortable one. There were several ladies come to bid the Queen good bye. After spending a few minutes

on the car with the Queen they bade the Queen good bye & in a few minutes we left the depot which was a large building with a glass roof. In leaving New York City we passed several large & beautiful buildings & also fine private residence. We after a short ride we came to the Hudson river & rode along for miles. The scenery here are beautiful. The river is quite wide & as smooth as a pond. There were several large steamers on their way up the river. On one side of the river was a high bluff & covered with trees & in among them were 2 large hotel. This must be a nice place to spend a few months as the scenery is so beautiful & the river so smooth that it must be grand here moonlight nights. All along the river was covered with green shrubs. We passed several acres of wood land & also beautiful fields of grain. It grew dark so fast that we were unable to see more of the place. We are going back by the Union Pacific line & we expect to see some fine scenery on the way. We retired early. All well.

Wednesday 13

I awoke this morning & found that we were at Buffalo. We only staid there 5 minutes & were again on the way. We passed several small stations until we came to Cleveland where we stopped a few minutes. This is a beautiful place. The houses are large & are beautifully finished. The city is near lake Erie & as our route was along the lake it gave us the opportunity of seeing this beautiful lake which is very large. As we stopped at the depot a few minutes we saw a vessel being towed up a river that had an iron bridge across that swing open as the vessel got near it & closed again after it had passed. In a few minutes we were again on our way. We passed a large & beautiful park which is called Cleveland park. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. We passed acres of ripe grain that was being cut & also several orchards. Some of the station we passed were on a plain like with Just a few houses & hardly any trees. After going for miles on a desert that was very dry & warm we got to a place called south bend & stopped a few minutes. This appear to be a nice place but it is very warm. Here we had lunch. After a stop of 20 minutes we were again off on our way. We passed several acres planted with grape vine & which were bearing & also acres of asparagus. We stopped at a few small stations to get water. There were a lot of wild flowers on the road which looked beautiful. Wild sun flowers were in great abundance & also wild daisies. At 6 o.c. we had dinner. We got to Chicago at 10.30 & staid there 20 minutes. This is a beautiful city but as it is so dark we were unable to see more of the place. There was a large fire in some store when we arrived. There were several fire engines on the street at work putting out the fire. Miss Davidson met us at the depot who had come to see the Queen. She brought a large bunch of roses for the Queen. As our stay here were not long we were off in a few minutes. We retired at 11 o.c. All well.

Thursday 14

I awoke this morning & found that we were at a station called West Liberty a barren spot with Just a few houses. We stopped Just long enough to get water & went on our way. We breakfast at 9 o.c. At 10.30 we passed a place called Iowa City & saw a large building with a large dome which was gilded. It is called the capitol of Iowa. We passed several stations that was not of much interest. At 12.30 we arrived at demoins. This is a little city that appears to be a nice place. There are several Indians here. We had lunch at 1 o.c. As we were only here for a few minutes we were on our way again. We are still on a desert like place. There are quite a lot of prarie dogs to be seen here & there which are very cunning & look very much like rats. We had a little rain this afternoon which laid the dust & made it a little cooler traveling. We arrived at council bluff at 6.47. There were a few changes in the cars some that came over with us were left behind & others

Joined on. There is a very large depot here but Just a few houses. After leaving this place we had dinner. The next station was Omaha. This is quite fine city large building & quite a number of manufacturing houses. The depot here is a very large building with a glass roof. As it was getting dark we were unable to see much of the place. We staid here Just long enough to take on passengers & mail & again went on. We retired early. All well.

Friday 15

I awoke & found that we were at North Platte. Here we had breakfast. This is quite a nice place. There are a few stores & a large hotel. The scenery here is very nice. This place is in a valley like. On one side are the mountains but it is quite bare. Off in the distance we could see snow on the mountain top. As we only stopped here for breakfast we were again off in a few minutes. We passed several stations on the way. In some places were several acres of grain fields & vineards which looked beautiful. We arrived at a station called Sidney at 1.15. Here we had lunch. This is a desolate looking place Just a few houses & hardly any trees. After taking on some water & refreshing ourselves with a good lunch we were again on the way. At 5.40 we arrived at Cheyenne. This is quite a city. There are several large business houses here & also 9 churches. Some of them are beautifully finished. The place is lighted by electric lights. The depot is a fine large building. There are crowds of people here come to get a glimpse of the Queen. After a stay of 20 minutes we again went on. At 7 o.c. we had dimer & retired for the night at 8.30. All well.

Saturday 16

I awoke & found that we were at green river. This is a little country like place with a few houses. Here we had breakfast & then went on. We passed by several hills some which were dug away or cut by erosion in the most grotesque figures. Some resembling an owl & another that of an ruined castel. The land is covered here with small shrubs & wild flowers. We arrived at Montpelier at 2.10. This is Just a small place with one hotel & a few houses. We stopped here for water & to have lunch. In a few minutes we were again on the way. At 4.35 we arrived at a place called Soda Springs. This is a nice looking place but there are Just a few houses. There is a large hotel here where people spend the summer. There are several springs here of mineral water which is said to cure catarah & dyspepsia. We only staid here 5 minutes & were on the way. We are now going into the valley & around the mountains. The pine trees are nice & green & makes the hills look beautiful. At 7 o.c. we got to Pocotello a small station where we had dinner. There are several Indians here. After a stop of 20 minutes we again went on. As it is dark so that we cant see much we retired for the night. All well.

Sunday 17

I awoke this morning & found that we were at a station on a plain & had stopped here to wait till repairs had been done to the tracks, as there had been a wash out. It had rained so heavy the day before that it washed away a portion of the track. We were delayed 12 hours. Here we had breakfast after which some of the passengers went chasing rabbits which are plentiful here. There are another train here that is going the same route. At 11.15 we started again on our way, as the track had been repaired. We passed by several large mountains. We are

going up little by little on the sides of these mountains. We passed a place called the devils slide where on the side of a hill is a sort of a shoot from the top of the hill to the ground which is of stone & looks as if it had been built there. As we kept going higher & higher the scenery became more beautiful. We had lunch at 1 o.c. after which I spent the afternoon looking at the beautiful scenery around. We got to a place where there are large coal mines where lot of it is shipped to different places & also a large saw mill where lumber is cut & sent down to a station a few miles away by the means of a flume which is built for miles & has a good flow of water right from the mountain. We got to Caldwell at 5.30 a small station. We had dinner at 6 o.c. & as it commenced to rain we retired early for the night. All well but tired with this long ride.

Monday 18

I awoke & found that we were at Ogden a small but beautiful little city. There are several large houses most of them manufacturing houses. There is a large brewery here. The scenery is beautiful. The place are planted with trees which adds to the appearance of the place. Here we had breakfast & again started on our way. We passed several stations but didnt stop. We are now some 2000 feet high & is traveling along the mountain sides. Down below in the valley is a large lake which is said to be full of salmon & where sports man spend months in fishing & hunting. The scenery here is beautiful. The mountains are covered with trees & in some places snow is seen in abundance. We passed through a snow shed 40 miles in length & it took some time before we got out of it. We passed a place called Cape horn. In looking out of the cars one would have to look some thousands of feet down into the valleys below. Off in the distance was a large mountain fire. The scenery here was also very striking. We lunched at 1 o.c. After going for miles in a downwards course we arrived at Sacramento at 5 o.c. This is a large & beautiful city. Off in the distance was a large & beautiful building which was the state house. There are large iron works here & where some of the cars are built. We met hundreds of men coming from their days work. The place is lighted by electric lights. The private residences here are like those at home with a front yard & a nice garden. The trees & plants are Just in their beauty as we only staid here 10 minutes we were off again & bound for Oakland. We went over a low bridge some miles in length. It was over a marsh like & we had to go very slow. There were thousands of frogs here in the marsh & the noise they made were similar to that of young ducks. We got to Benecia at 10 o.c. & here we were met by Counsul McKinley who accompanied us to Oakland at which place we got at 12 o.c. It was a pretty sight going into Oakland. It looked as if the place was illuminated with millions of lanterns. The Queen & party got into carriages & was driven on board of one of the largest boats & were taken across the bay to San Francisco. I staid & got our baggage together & went over to the city & after getting our things into an omnibus I started for the hotel & got there at 1.30 & found the Queen & party in the parlor with company. The young princes were here to welcome her & also Mrs. Swan. The parlor was decorated beautifully with flowers. After the Queen had a light supper we retired for the night. All well.

Tuesday 19

I awoke this morning early & took a short walk before breakfast. We had breakfast at 9 o.c. after which I went to the Occidental Hotel to see Sister Amelia whom I was glad to see. After spending an hour with her I returned home & found the Queen was entertaining company who had called to see her. As we are to leave to day for Honolulu at 2 o.c. I got our things together & sent them on board the stmr Australia. We lunched at 1 o.c. & at 1.45 we left the Palace hotel & drove down

to the wharf & boarded the stmr. We met several Islanders here who were over for a vacation. At 2 o.c. precisely we left the wharf after bidding our dear friends good bye who had come down to see the last of us. We steamed out from the wharf mid the aloha & the waving of hankerchiefs. In a few minutes we were so far away that we could not see any more of those that we left behind us. The ride out to the gates was delightful. It was so smooth & the weather so clear that we had a good opportunity to take a last look of that dear old land where we spent so many happy hours. The hills look beautiful with its green shrubs & tall trees & off in the distance loomed up the Cliff house & below on the rock in the water were the seals which were basking in the sun. Here & there were ships making for the port. It took but a few minutes before we were miles away from land. I went below to see to my rooms & to get our things in their places. I have got the same room that I had when I came up. The Queen has comfortable rooms on deck. We dined at 6 o.c. There are very few passengers on board. We spent the evening on deck till 9 o.c. & retired for the night. All well. So ends this day.

Wednesday 20

I awoke & found it was near breakfast time. We breakfast at 8 o.c. The Queen had her meals in her room as she is suffering with a sprained foot. After breakfast we spent the forenoon reading & some playing cards. The Queen & Liliu are crochaing. At 12 o.c. we had made 295 miles. We lunched at 12.30 after which we spent the rest of the day reading. We are having beautiful weather. At 6 o.c. we had dinner & spent the eve on deck singing & retired at a late hour. All well.

Thursday 21

I awoke & found it still fine weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. The Queen is still suffering from the sprain. After breakfast we spent the day reading. At 12 o.c. we made 303 miles. At 12.30 we had lunch after which we spent the afternoon reading & others at card playing. We dined at 6 o.c. & spent the eve on deck till 9 o.c. then I retired for the night.

Friday 22

It is still fine weather. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. The Queen is much better this morning & is spending the morning crochaing. We made 314 miles to day at 12 o.c. We lunched at 12.30 & spent the afternoon reading. We dined at 6 o.c. & spent the eve on deck singing. We retired at a late hour. All well & anxious to get in.

Saturday 23

I awoke & found it a nice & cool morning & the weather fine. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. after which we spent the morning reading. The Queen is better & was down to breakfast. She is crochaing & so is Liliu. At 12 o.c. we made 307 miles. We lunched at 12.30 & spent the afternoon reading & others playing cards. It is very smooth today. We dined at 6 o.c. & spent the evening on deck singing till a late hour & then retired for the night.

Sunday 24

It is still fine weather & a nice warm day. We breakfasted at 9 o.c. & spent the morning reading. All the passengers are Just enjoying this trip & are all on deck. At 12 o.c. we made 302 miles. We lunched at 1 o.c. & spent the day on deck reading. All well & enjoying the sea ride very much. We dined at 6 o.c. & spent the eve on deck. I retired at 9 o.c.

Monday 25

I awoke & found it Just the same weather only a little warmer. We breakfasted at 8 o.c. & spent the morning on deck reading. The Queen is well & is crochaing & so is Liliu. We made 290 miles at 12 o.c. We lunched at the usual hour after which we spent the afternoon on deck reading. We had a little rain but it didnt amount to much. At 6 o.c. we had dinner & enjoyed it very much after which we spent the last evening on deck singing some of our favorite Hawaiian songs & retired at a late hour.

Tuesday 26

I awoke this morning early & found it still fine weather. On our left was the Island of Molokai & after going a few miles we came in sight of Oahu with its high mountains atowering above the clouds. We breakfasted at 8.30 after which I got our things ready to go ashore. After getting all our baggage together I went up on deck & found that we were near Dimond Head. At 10.30 we were of Waikiki & in a little while the tug boat Eleu came out to meet us with Mr. Cleghorn & J. Holt on board. In a little while The Queen & Liliu J. Dominis & party went on board of the Eleu & went ashore. At 11.15 we steamed slowly up the passage & as we neared the wharf a salute from the English Man of War was fired & the Band on the wharf played Hawaii Ponoï & then Aloha Oe. There was a large crowd on the wharf to see the Queen land. In a little while they landed mid cheers of the people & as the carriage was in waiting.
